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Canada.

Upper Canada.—Business continues to drag

its slow length along in the Upper Canada

House of Assembly. A great many measures

however, are in preparation, and will very soon

be brought under consideration. On the 17th

instant Mr. Prince introduced a bill, providing

that the House should not necessarily be dis-

solved on the death of the King. The proposal

excited a good deal of discussion. It is a mat-

ter of minor importance, and can only be of

very casual operation. The members who

opposed it, insisted that its supporters were

afraid of meeting their constituents again at the

hastings. It certainly might have been intro-

duced with much better grace at the close than

at the commencement of the first session of a

new Parliament. But the members of the Pro-

vince House of Assembly prove themselves by

their deeds to be actuated by a sincere desire

to promote the general interests of the country,

and to have brought to the aid of legislation

enlightened principles, and an earnest of them-

selves, or others like them, being returned in the

event of a general election.

Mr. Steward has succeeded in having a Se-

lect Committee appointed, to "take into con-

sideration that part of the Journals of this

House, so far as regards certain resolutions of

the House of Assembly of Lower Canada; and

a letter from the Hon. L. J. Papeau, Speaker

of the said House, accompanying the same,

with power to send for persons and papers, and

to report thereon.

It will be recollected how the precious docu-

ments in question were not brought under the

consideration of the last House till within a

few days of the close of the session. It was

expected to be postponed, and that the debate

upon the motion—that is, the letter and the

resolutions contained therein, should be subject of the

British Constitution, they were returned to the

Speaker of the House of Assembly of Lower Canada,

was cut short by a summons for the House to

attend at the Bar of the Legislative Committee

to be held on the 17th inst. It was not till the

19th inst. that the subject was brought under

consideration. However doubtful the sense of the

debate, there might have been, the nature of the

decision of the present House, there can be no

mistake in anticipating.
