# SAYS A CRISIS

# WAS PAID \$30 FOR EACH CORPSE

They Looked Over the Death Returns and Decided Upon the Most Suitable Subjects.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 10. the Central College of Physicians and Surgeons, charged with knowingly receiving stolen bodies of dead persons for dissection, which has been in progress for some days, has been full of sensational incidents. It was shown that many bodies had delivered at the college by Rufus Cantrell and his band of negro ghouls. Cantrell testified that he had accompanied Dr. Alexander on numerous occasions to the local board of health office, where the doctor looked over

the death returns and then gave him instructions about getting the bodies.

The defense got in a strong point when it produced a report from the war office at Washington, showing that Cantrell has enlisted in the regular army in 1897, and a year later was discharged, on a surgeon's certificate, because of 'epilepsy,' which was followed by confusional and homicidal insanity, existing prior to service."

Cantrell told his story in a straight-forward manner. He said he was persuaded by Dr. Alexander to enter the grave-robbing business and was assured that it was legal. He then entered into a contract to deliver bodies at the college for \$30 each. He asserted that Dr. Alexander made arrange-ments with a livery stable to let him have a rig whenever a body was to be stolen. Dr. Alexander also gave him money with which to buy revol-Live Dry Goods and Fancy vers, the witness said, but warned him "not to shoot anybody unless it was absolutely necessary to protect him-

The witness testified to numerous night excursions to country grave-yards, and gave the names of thirty persons whose bodies he had stolen, and also the date on which the graves were robbed. Cantrell said Dr. Alexander had paid him the contract price

for every one of the bodies. When Cantrell mentioned the theft of Meredith McMullen's body from the Lick street cemetery, a sob broke upon the stillness of the court room. The sob was uttered by Mrs. Mc-Laughlin, a sister of Mrs. McMullen. The graves of two of her brothers were robbed and neither of the bodies was recovered. Cantrel

### Montreal's Long-Distance Power

On Saturday the city of Montreal for the first time was in receipt of eight thousand horse power over the transmission lines from Shawinigan Falls, a distance of eighty-four and three-tenths miles. The lines and plant will be extended so as to supply 30,000 horse power for the use of the Canadian metropolis. This is the most important long-distance electrical system east of the Mississippi River. The transmission line consists of approximately 4,500 cedar poles, 10 inches in diameter at the base and 7 inches at the top, with a minimum length of 35 feet, the poles being set 6 feet in the earth and in line at a distance of 100 feet from each other, Four feet below the top and bolted to each other, is Georgia hard pine cross arm 4Z inches square and 6 feet long, which has been treated in liquid asphalt. Each of the three cables is composed of sever strands of No. 6 B. and S. guage aluminum wire, one strand forming a straight core around which are twisted the remaining six wires. The diameter of the cable is one-half inch, and i weighs a trifle over 2 2-3 ounces per lineal foot. As there are seven wires in each of the three cables, it follows that 1,771 miles of aluminum wire were used on the entire line, and that the total weight of wire used was over 250,000 pounds. The work of construction did not commence until August last, so that the system has been completed with remarkable rapidity. It is estimated that it requires, on an average, about 20 tons of coal to produce one horse power for 24 hours per day for a year of 365 days, and that the Shawinigan Falls will develop energy equivalent to that produced by six million tons of soft coal per annum. The city of Montreal is to be con-



# WHIPPED NEGROES PUBLICLY

Two of Them Were Women-A Race War Feared.

Fayette, Mo., Feb. 10.-A race war has been started here as the result of his back and was sent home in agony. causing not a little trouble. Since that "I think the C. P. R. suffered less than public whipping of three negroes on the courthouse steps Friday night. A committee of the Law and Order League took the negroes from their omes and whipped them publicly for alleged misconduct. Two of them were women. Since then the negroes and white people have been in open enmity, and it is said 75 negro families have been frightened into leaving the vicinity. The only negro man who was whipped Friday night made a desperate resistance. It took several men to carry him to the post. He cursed his captors as the lash was applied, which resulted in the whip being wield-ed only the more vigorously. When the ordeal was ended the negro was so weak from loss of blood that he was put to bed, instead of being driven from town. The women, who were not whipped severely, were taken to the outskirts and told to go. There is much excitement here, and a clash is




