London, Nov. 16.-The Queen has abandoned the idea of going to the theaters this season, but, by way of compensating some people for the disappointment thus caused, she has arranged for a performance at Windsor Castle on Nov. 26 by Signor Lango's company of Mascagni's opera, "Cavalleria Rusticana." The Queen comes south from Balmoral next Friday, and it is probable that early in the spring she will spend some time near Mentone in the Riviera. She is determined, apparently, to do as little as possible to help London tradesmen, so the Liberal newspapers say. HOZIER AND HIS WIFE.

AT SIXES AND SEVENS. A pretty quarrel seems to be brewing in the Tory party arising out of the old burning question of local government for Ireland. The Tories are pledged to bring in an Irish local government bill at the next session, and if the pledge should be broken many Liberal Unionists would, in all probability, revolt against the Government. On the other hand, there is loud talk of mutiny in the Tory ranks should a bill be brought in, and for the moment, at any rate, the Government is between the devil and the deep sea. Members of the Irish Tory party, led by Col. Saunderson, have never disguised their antipathy to the proposed legislation, and most of them openly declare that they would rather have home rule and take their chances in a Dublin Parliament than their chances in a Dublin Parliament than to be a minority in numerous county to make the form of the first pouncils which will be established if the new system of local government in England be applied to Ireland. At Toledo yesterday (Friday) the K. of L. convention discussed the important resolutions offered by A. W. Wright to settle differences between the K. of L. and the American Federation of Labor. They were finally adopted—95 yeas and 5 nays. If these resolutions are accepted by the Federation it means that over 60,000 laboringmen will be organized in labor assemblies or unions. The resolutions provide: 1. All Knights of Labor working at a trade or calling shall recognize and respect the working cards of all unions of the same trade or calling attached to or affiliated with the American Federation of Labor or connected with any labor organizations who are parties to the agreement when such unions shall in like manner recognize and respect the working cards of such Knights of Labor. 2. All labels the property of the federation shall be officially recognized and indorsed by the Knights of Labor, and all Knights of Labor labels shall be officially recognized and indorsed by the federation and the other parties to this agreement. 3. No person who is suspended or expelled from any union in affiliation with the federation or of any other body a party to this agreement, or who is in arrears for dues or assessments or in any other way indebted to such union or organization shall be admitted to membership in any assembly of the Knights of Labor or who is indebted or in arrear for dues or assessments to such assembly shall be admitted to membership in any union affiliated with the assembles or or union affiliated with the assemblies or organizations who are parties to this agreement. 4. The provisions here made shall be promulgated as soon as practicable, and go into effect on and after Jan. 1, 1892; and be it resolved that no local or other assembly of Knights of Labor shall force an alliance or affiliation with any body or organization that shall refuse to enter into an agreement as above with this order; and be it further resolved, that should the American Federation of Labor at its coming annual session refuse to

at its coming annual session refuse to enter the agreement as outlined above, it shall be the duty of the general officers of the Knights of Labor to issue an address to the workingmen of America, setting forth all the facts FATEFUL FLAMES.

The building is in the heart of the downtown business and banking center, and is surrounded by high brick blocks. One of the first steamers to arrive was No. 1, and Capt. John Grady and Fireman Michael Hawley and Charles Ward, of the same company, carried a line into the building. An instant later one of the floors fell, crushing Capt. Grady to death and seriously injuring Hawley and Ward. Grady's body was recovered, and the other two were sent to a hospital, where they are reported as in a critical condition. After an hour's hard work the firemen gained the mastery of the fire and confined the flames to the Frankfort street buildings. Total loss, \$208,600; covered by insurance.

It is a question of the propriety of a Gov ernment compelling a citizen to defend his vote, at a sacrifice of time and money, when the smallest honest effort would show that he is as much entitled to the franchise as the fattest monopolist in the land. It is a question of the right of lawmakers to apel a freeman to submit to the badgering of inquisitive party agents, even after he has solemnly sworn that he possesses the necessary qualification.

The Act cannot be defended merely because it is a law. Tyranny is not right because it is legalized. But just as the enforcement of laws of this kind in the past has led to revolution and the driving out of those who enforce them, so we know that a peaceful revolution is now in progress not only in London but throughout the land, which will sweep away this law and thoroughly discomfit the apologists for it. The best way to get rid of a bad law is to enforce it as the Franchise Act is now being

Let the Inquisition go on a little while onger. The law must go soon.




