OTTAWA, Feb. 10 .- The long delayed an nouncement that the budget speech would be delivered on Tuesday was made by the finance Minister in the House of Commons this afternoon, and thereafter Mr. Foster had his proposition for the amendment of the Civil Service Superannuation Act indorsed in Committee of the Whole, and bill was introduced to carry out the scheme, which will only apply to those entering the service after the act is passed. SWEPT FROM THE DECKS.

Frightful Experience of the Steame Pomeranian.

A Number of the Crew and Cabin Pas-sengers Drowned - The Ship Obliged to Return to Greencek.

London, Fsb. 11.—The Allan Line steamer Pomeranian, from Glasgow, Jan. 27, via Moville for New York, has returned to Greenock after losing a number of her crow and passengers in a heavy storm. The Pomeranian was about 1,150 miles westward from Glasgow, when she encountered weather of unusual severity. The gales had increased with great suddenness until a heavy sea unexpectedly swept over the deck, carrying everything before it like an avalanche. The deck, saloon, chart house, the bridge and the boats were smashed and swept away by the tremendous force of the waves, and when the sea had passed over the decks were a scene of ruin and the shricks of perishing sailors and passengers could be heard in the waves that surged about. Capt. Daizil had been on the bridge and when the avalanche struck the vessel he was swept from his post and was dashed against the bulwark, where he lay, stunned and helpless. The mates, John Cook and John Hamilton, who were on the bridge with the captain, were swept out to sea and drowned. Besides the first and second efficers named two quartermasters, two stewards, four first cabin passengers and one second cabin passenger perished by drowning.

James and Lilian Gibson, of Dalkeith,

James and Lilian Gibson, of Dalkeith, Jane Caffery, of Londonderry, and John Stewart, of Glasgow, were the first cabin passengers lost. They were in the deck saloon at the time of the disaster, and were hurled overboard with the ruins of the saloon. They were never seen again, but survivors say a despairing cry pierced the air even amid the thunderous roar of the waters. Peter Forbes, of Dundee, was the second cabin passenger missing, and the stewards were James Pritchard and Fred Westbury. Two seamen, P. McLean and W. Urquhart, who were on duty at the time, also perished. For a moment after the catastrophe the survivors were too stunned to act. With the captain disabled and the first and second officers drowned there was no one for the motor. abled and the first and second officers drowned there was no one for the moment to give orders. The third officer quickly brought the crew to their senses and took prompt action to save the steamer and its human reight from further calamity. All the instruments for navigation had been swept away except the "after compass" by which the steamer had to be navigated. Capt. Dalziel was borne below. His injuries were fatal, and he died on the following morning. The crew cleared away the wreckage and the vessel started on its return voyage, making its way back slowly and carefully to Greenock. The survivors of passengers and crew are in a very exhausted condition after their terrible experience.

DESTITUTE COLONISTS.

Russian Colony in Connecticut, Lazy

in Summer, New They Starve and Freeze.

LYME, Conn., Feb. 11.—Stories of most terrible privation and suffering due to the recent cold weather come in from the colony of Russians at Chesterfield, who are colony of Russians at Chesterfield, who are deserting their little farms by scores. About sixteen months ago the colony was established, over 400 Russian families settling on small farms. During last summer they did but little work and in the fall their crops were poor. Numerous deaths have occurred, due solely to hunger and cold, and those who are left have begun to leave in large numbers. They have gone to New York, where they will anneal to to New York, where they will appeal to their fellow-countrymen for aid. All of the farms will be deserted by the end of nex

THE GOLD STRINGENCY.

New York Banks Publish Their Course of Action—No Gold Accounts To be Opened by Clearing Houses.

New York, Feb. 11.—The banks made no further effort yesterday to replenish the treasury's stock of gold. In consequence of their course toward the treasury the banks have had any number of inquiries from their customers as to various possibilities should the demand for gold increase. With a view of answering these the following statement was prepared as the result of consultations between a number of leading bank officials. Shortly before the resumption of specie payments the clearing house made the following ruling:

1. Decline receiving gold coins as "special deposits," but accept and treat them only as "lawful money."

Interesting Report of the U. S. Senate Committee

Appointed in View of the Homestead Trouble-Employment of Armed Detectives Condemned-Arbitration the Best Basis for Settlement.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 10.—Mr. Gallinger from the Senate committee, appointed to investigate and report the facts in relation to the employment by private parties of armed bodies of men or detectives in connection with differences between workmen and employers submitted the report of the committee to-day.

The committee found that even the proprietors of the detective agencies admitted that the presence of the so-called Pinkertons at a strike served to unduly inflame the passions of the strikers, and the employment of detectives in the guise of mechanics impressed the committee with

mechanics impressed the committee with the belief that it is an utterly vicious system, responsible for much of the ill-feeling and bad blood displayed by the

teeling and bad blood displayed by the working classes.

"It strikes your committee," the report continues, "that if Mr. Frick had acted upon the views laid down by Mr. Andrew Carnegie in his article, 'The Results of the Labor Trouble,' and had further extended negotiations with his workmen, the Homestead strike might have been avoided."

There was no evidence, they say, to show the slightest damage was done, or attempted to be done, to property on the part of the strikers. At the same time there seems to be no excuse for the scenes of disorder and terrorism for which the strikers were themselves respon sible. The committee reached these con clusions: 1. Rights of employers and workmen are equal.

equal.
2. Employers have an undoubted right, provided they fulfil their agreement, to employ and dismiss men at pleasure.

3. Workmen can legally organize for mutual protection and improvement.

4. When dissatisfied with wages or

4. When dissatisfied with wages or hours they should attempt arbitration.
5. Failing in this they have a right to discontinue work, either singly or in a body. discontinue work, either singly or in a body.

6. Having discontinued, they have no right—either legal or moral, by force we intimidation—to keep others from taking their places or to attempt to occupy, in jure or destroy the property of their employers.

7. In all controversies, arbitration having failed, reliance should be placed upon the power and adequacy of the law.

8. Whether assuredly legal or not, the employment of armed bodies of men for nrivate nurroses, either by employers or emrivate nurroses, either by employers or em-

employment of armed bodies of men for private purposes, either by employers or employers, should not be resorted to, and such use is an assumption of the State's authority by private citizens.

9. States have undoubted authority to legislate against the employment of armed bodies of men for private purposes, but the power of Congress is not clear, although it would seem that Congress ought not to be powerless to prevent the movement of such bodies from one State to another.

In conclusion the committee says that its investigations have led it to conclud that the fault is not wholly on one side that middle ground seems to be in direction of arbitration.

Brothren,—We desire to welcome you once more at our annual meeting. We also congratulate Canadian Craft Masonry that thoughtful brethren had in their hearts the establishing of an institution that for nearly a quarter of a century has done so much good. Six hundred and thirty thousand dollars have already been paid out by this association to the widows and orphans of Masonry in this country, placing in numberless cases the loved ones above the cold charities of the world. This is the only Masonic Benefit Association of the kind in Canada, and there is no cheaper or safer insurance on the regular assessment plan than Class B affords, and yet its growth is not as rapid as was expected. Two hundred and twenty-two applications were received during the year, four of which were rejected, so that our net increase was 218. Our entire number, in both classes, good at present is 1,424, carrying an insurance of \$1,000,000. Eight hundred certificates have been written in class B. There is not a healthy man in a Masonic lodge to-day, who is under the age of 45, that should not be enlisted under our banners. A very small fee, paid every two months, insures a blessing in the way of a Masonic lodge to-day, who is under the age of 45, that should not be enlisted under our banners. A very small fee, paid every two months, insures a blessing in the way of a provision for the bereft family at a time when most needed. Our investments have been very remuerative. During the year we received a very liberal offer for our street railway stock, which was valued at \$11,880, and which we sold for \$15,300. The profits we applied in paying off death claims, giving the membership the immediate benefit of the sale. The surplus funds belonging to the reserve we have re-invested in Masonic Temple stock, which we purchased at par value, and which is now earning a good dividend. We have had one death less than in 1891, making 27 to provide for. Three of these were paid from the revenue arising from the reserve fund, amounting to \$4,200. The youngest died at 49 years, and the oldest at 75 years. The former was nineteen years a member of the association, carrying a certificate of \$1,500, and paid \$473 03; whilst the other was a member of twenty years, carrying a certificate for \$1,200 and had paid \$570 43. NO PLACE FOR PINKERTONS.

Interesting Report of the U. S. Senate Committee

Appointed in View of the Homestead Trouble—Employment of Armed Detectives Condemned—Arbitration the Best Basis

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 10 .- Mr. Gal-

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 10.—Mr. Gallinger from the Senate committee, appointed to investigate and report the facts in relation to the employment by private parties of armed bodies of men or detectives in connection with differences between workmen and employers submitted the report of the committee to-day.

The committee found that even the proprietors of the detective agencies admitted that the presence of the so-called Pinkertons at a strike served to unduly inflame the passions of the strikers, and the employment of detectives in the guise of mechanics impressed the committee with the belief that it is an utterly vicious system, responsible for much of the illifeding and bad blood displayed by the working classes.

"It strikes your committee," the report continues, "that if Mr. Frick had acted upon the views laid down by Mr. Andrew Carnegie in his article, 'The Results of the Labor Trouble, and had further extended negotiations with his workmen, the Homestead strike might have been avoided."

stead strike might have been avoided.' tead strike might have been avoided."

The committee declares that the employment of a private armed guard at Homestead was unnecessary. There was no evidence, they say, to show the slightest damage was done, or attempted to be done, to property on the part of the strikers. At the same time there seems to be no excuse for the scenes of disorder and terrorism for which the strikers were themselves responsible. The committee reached these conclusions:

clusions:
1. Rights of employers and workmen are

1. Rights of employers and workmen are equal.
2. Employers have an undoubted right, provided they fulfil their agreement, to employ and dismiss men at picasurs.
3. Workmen can legally organize for mutual protection and improvement.
4. When dissatisfied with wages or hours they should attempt arbitration.
5. Failing in this they have a right to discontinue work, either singly or in a body.

5. Failing in this they have a right to discontinue work, either singly or in a body.

6. Having discontinued, they have go right—either legal or moral, by force esting their places or to attempt to occupy, injure or destroy the property of their employers.

7. In all controversies, arbitration having failed, reliance should be placed upon the power and adequacy of the law.

8. Whether assuredly legal or not, the employment of armed bodies of men for private purposes, either by employers or employers, should not be resorted to, and such use is an assumption of the State's authority by private citizens.

9. States have undoubted authority to legislate against the employment of armed bodies of men for private purposes, but the power of Congress is not clear, although it would seem that Congress ought not to be powerless to prevent the movement of such bodies from one State to another.

In conclusion the committee says that is investigations have led it to conclud that the fault is not wholly on one sid, that middle ground seems to be in direction of arbitration.

THE SHORTHORN BREEDERS. Protest Against the British and United States Embargo on Canadian Cattle.

Toronto, Feb. 18.—The annual meeting of the Dominion Shorthorn Breeders' Association began this morning at Shaftesbury Hall. According to the yearly report a marked improvement is shown over any other year in the number of registrations of animals. There were 3,467 certificates issued for new animals. The association will join with the American Breeders' Association in conducting a milk test for Shorthorns at the World's Fair, where they expect to have animals that will be a credit to the Province.

The report also shows an increase in membership of 61; total membership, 3,908; income from members for the past year was \$1,896.



each been sentenced to five years' imprison ment for participation in the Panams scandals-scandals of bribery and corruption even worse than those of the Canadian Pacific scandal, and even worse than those more recently partially laid bare but unpunished at Ottawa. "Few sadder spectacles have been witnessed in this century," says the New York Sun, "than the sentencing of M. Ferdinand De Lesseps to imprisonment as a swindler and a violator of trust. M. De Lesseps is almost 90 years of age. He is the most famous of living Frenchmen, and his success in constructing the Suez Canal has won for him a lasting place among the world's illustrious names. He cut a highway from the Mediterranean to the Indian Ocean and brought Europe thousands of miles nearer to the mmercial centers of Asia. He performed a service to mankind and to his native land mmeasurably grander and more valuable than the achievements of a Turenne or Napoleon. De Lesseps has been called 'The Grand Old Man' of France, and he has well merited the title. That such a career should end under the shadow of ignominy, branded with a judicial sentence for fraud, is one of the most melancholy

tragedies in history.
"But while the sentence of the cour may adjudge De Lesseps a criminal, it can not convince the public that he was guilty of deliberate and intentional crime Carried away by belief in the power of his own genius and his ability to succeed in overcoming any obstacle, he attempted the impossible. There is no reason to doubt that he was honest in the attempt and sincerely confident that he could cut canal through the Isthmus of Panama. In endeavoring to achieve his object he used the means of others with the same freedom and prodigality that he had lavished the treasures of Egypt at Suez. But the treasures of Egypt belonged to the Khedive, while the money contributed to Panama came from thousands of small investors in France; and when the Panama enterprise proved a failure a nultitude lost their small fortunes accumu lated by painful economy. Every corne of France has seen something of the wreck, the privation and suffering resulting from

the collapse of the Panama enterprise.

"That collapse found De Lesseps broken in fortune and palsied by the burden of years. The bitterness of disappointed ambition, and the agony of wounded pride have been added to the weight of extraordinary age in crushing the mind and body, whose wonderful vigor and apparently indomitable energy had so long evoked the admiration of men. It is said that he is but the living shadow of his former self, and that the law's cruel decree has been pronounced against one no longer able to appreciate its full severity.

"The Panama tragedy is practically ended with the sentence of De Lesseps, his son and their associates. There are other and grave charges of the corruption of ex-Ministers of the Cabinet and legislators. These will doubtless be brought to trial, and some of them at least to punishment but the interest of the world at large has centered upon the constructor of the Suez Canal, the illustrious Frenchman whose name is imperishably associated with that mighty achievement for the benefit of man-Guilty or innocent, deep sympathy will be felt everywhere throughout the civilized world for the aged man whose career of marvelous success has terminated n such signal dishonor."

Mr. Ouimet told the delegation that his Government was hard up, and hinted that this much-needed harbor of refuge and commercial port should be put in shape partly by the local municipalities. We cannot reconcile this view with the frequent declarations of the Finance Minister that Canada has collected a surplus of taxation amounting to several millions, which it now has in its capacious coffers. Even if it were true that there is a paucity of funds in the treasury, we would still hold that this national work should be performed by the Dominion Government at its own expense. As or Reeve Payne put it, bluntly, many people have been supporting the National Policy of high taxation through thick and thin. They have found that it has been very thin for them, and they now desire to have returned to them a portion of the enormous taxation that they have contributed in recent years. Mayhap if they had been permitted to retain the money in their pockets, and if other districts had been compelled to foot their bills for local improvements, they would be less importunate. 

ANOTHER GREAT TELESCOPE. ANOTHER GREAT TELESCOPE.

Another great telescope, the largest in the world, has just been completed by Warner and Swatey, of Cleveland. The instrument was constructed for the new Government Naval Observatory on Georgetown Heights, D. C. When the telescope is pointed to the zenith the object glass will be 38 feet above the floor. The weight of the telescope is 30 tons. The tube is 32 feet long and 3 feet in diameter at the middle, from which point it tapers toward either end. It has three motions of speed, operated by clock work, one for the stars, one for the sun, and one for the moon.

The present year has been inaugurated by a number of humanitarian measures in Europe. Among the most noteworthy are the arming of the Irish constabulary with ordinery police truncheons in lieu of the bayonets which they have hitherto worn and used, and a decree issued by the Russian Government exempting female convicts from corporal punishment. PRACTICAL HOME TRAINING.

When manual training with its domestic economy department of cooking and sewing was being urged as a necessary part of public school training, teachers and wise men brought forth the argument, "That it is not needful for wise men to teach these things." From every city came the answer. "Mothers do not teach these branches and our girls are being brought up without practical household training." One summer a lady had 260 girls from offices, stores and factories to board during two weeks' vacation. At the end of the summer she found that but nine of the number knew how to make a bed, and many of them made it a boast that they "had never made a bed in their lives."

Some did not ever know whether a sheet or a blanket should be put on first. And these were not destitute girls, but such as represent our self-respecting wage-carners—girls who were boarders, paying a fair price, and yet who were expected to make their own beds. NEHEMIAH'S PRAYER.

LESSON VII, INTERNATIONAL SERIES. FEB. 12.

Text of the Lesson, Neh. i. 1-11-The Promises of God-Golden Text, Psalm xxx, 10-Commentary on the Lesson by the Rev. D. M. Stearns.

1. "The words of Nehemiah, the son of Hachaliah." Nehemiah (comforted of Jehovah) was one of the Jewish captives selected by Artaxerxes, the Persian monarch, to fill the office of cupbearer. He arrived at Jerusalem about thirteen years after Ezra was governor of Judea, remaining about twelve years, and then returning to Artaxerxes, from whom he received a new commission. He went again to Jerusalem and ruled there for another twenty-two years, B.C. 445-428. He was one of the greatest men of the Hebrew nation, renowned for his zeal, patriotism, courage, humanity and earn

another twenty-two years, B.C. 445-428. He was one of the greatest men of the Hebrew nation, renowned for his zeal, patriotism, courage, humanity and earnest devotedness to God and to His service ("Searching the Scriptures," by Dr. Anderson). One of the most interesting things in the book is the edict to rebuild the city (chapter ii, 5, 8), from which begins Daniel's seventy weeks.

2. "I asked them concerning the Jews that had escaped, which were left of the captivity, and concerning Jerusalem." The church of to-day seems not to appreciate the fact that Jerusalem was and is and shall yet be a city very dear to Jehovah, and more dear than we can understand to every loyal Jew. "The Lord hath chosen Zion. He hath desired it for his habitation. "The Lord shall yet comfort Zion and shall yet choose Jerusalem." "At that time they shall call Jerusalem the throne of the Lord" (Ps. cxxxii, 13; Zech. i, 17; Jer. iii, 17).

3. "And they said unto me, The remnant that are left of the captivity there in the province are in great affliction and reproach." By comparing verse 1 and chapter ii, 1, with Ez. vii, 6, 7, we find that this desolation was the condition of things at the Holy City thirteen years after the great reformation wrought through Ezra, and we feel inclined to ask why it was so. With the temple finished, the worship restored and such purifying as Ezra had accomplished, why was there no more zeal for God? If one question can help to answer another we would ask, Why, with all the open doors of this generation to carry the gospel to every creature and the vast amount of money in the hands of Christians, are there so many hundreds of millions still without the Gospel?

4. "And it came to pass, when I heard these words, that I sat down and wept, and mourned certain days, and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven." Here is a man away off in Babylon so interested in the welfare of Jerusalem and in the honor of the God of Israel that for several days he gives himself up to mourning and fasting and praying for

Compare Daniel fasting and praying for three full weeks that he might know the mind of God (Dan. x, 2, 3); see Paul three years at Ephesus, warning the people night and day with tears (Acts xx, 31), and remember that God is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him (Heb. xi, 6), 5. "And said, I beseech thee, O Lord God of heaven, the great and terrible God, that keepeth covenant and mercy for them that love Him and observe His commandments." From here to the end of the lesson we have his prayer, and it

Observe that in chapter ii, 4, he one day prayed without uttering a word with his lips, for at the same moment he prayed to God and spake to the king. Compare this verse with chapter ix, 32, and Ex. xxxiv, 6, 7, and see in Jer. xxxii, 17, the comfort to be obtained from the God of heaven.

6. "I pray before Thee now day and night for the children of Israel, Thy servants, and confess the sins of the children of Israel." Identifying himself with the nation, he confesses their sins.

8. "Remember, I beseech thee, the word that thou commandest thy servant Moses." He reminds God of the curse which He by Moses had said should come, and which had come. He did not question the authorship of Moses, nor did he doubt that Moses spoke the words of God. He believed God condemned himself and his people and justified God.

9. "But if ye turn unto Me, and keep My commandments, and do them." He

He is quoting now in his prayer from Deut. xxx, 1-5, where Jehovah promised, on condition of true repentance and obedience, to restore them to their land and bless them and give them a heart to love Him supremely; but the condition was, "If thou turn unto the Lord thy God with all thine heart and with all thy soul" (Deut. xxx, 10). As He chose Jerusalem to put His name there and magnify Himself from thence, so Ho chooses us to bear His name and magnify Him in these mortal bodies (Acts ix, 15, 16; Phil. 1, 20).

10. "Now these are thy servants and thy people whom thou hast redeemed by thy great power and by thy strong hand." So pleaded Moses, reminding God that notwithstanding all their sin still they were His people and His inheritance which He brought out of Egypt (Deut. ix, 26, 29). So pleaded Daniel also as he identified himself with the sinful nations and asked mercy in these words, "O Lord, forgive for thine own sake, O my God, for thy city and thy people are called by thy name" (Dan. ix, 15, 19).

11. "Prosper, I pray thee, thy servant this day, and grant him mercy in the sight of this man." Having poured out his soul on behalf of his people, he now asks a special favor on his own behalf, and yet for their sakes as their benefactor. Every such intercessor, our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, lives for us and will in due time come again for us.



Down at the bottom of all social disorder, political corruption, depression in business, stagnation in trade, suffering in homes, and the like, lies the liquor traffic. Here you see store-houses crowded with goods wanting purchasers; there you see homes crowded with women and children, made wretched from the want of money to purchase those goods. Here you see banks glutted with money, tied up and useless to the community because the owners have not confidence enough in the situation to investit; there you see laboring men idle part or the whole of the time, because of the general dullness. Those are the facts. Now, what is the cause? Some say it is over-production, and there is a real over-production in some branches of trade. But to prevent over-production will not be to solve the problem. Here is a sick man and six doctors are trying to find out what his malady is. One doctor is at his head, another at his feet. And the doctors at his feet asy: "There is a great rush of blood here; "There is no rush of blood here; his limbs are ioy cold." Now, would it be a correct diagnosis of that patient's condition to say that he is suffering from an over-production of blood? It is exactly the same way about this unhappy stagnation of trade. The warehouses and the banks are full; there is a rush of blood, an over-production at these centers. But the extremities—the homes, the individual wage-workers—suffer from n such trouble; they are chilled from want of the rich, life-giving fluid. And so, what we need at this juncture is to warm the extremities, to put shoes on the feet, oil in the cruse, and meal in the bag.

The people have not money enough to buy. And why? They help to produce, don't they? The trouble is the wage-workers of this country spend annually \$600,000,000 for intoxicating liquors. The aggregate of the nation's drink b CURE FOR SLACK TIMES

soon, 000,000 for intoxicating liquors. The aggregate of the nation's drink bill is much larger, but this amount comes out of the pockets of the people. If the workingmen should suddenly say: "The money which we have hitherto spent for intoxicating liquors shall henceforth be expended for useful articles," and if for a week they should turn is loose upon cotton goods, how much money do you suppose would be directed into the cotton trade in one week? Not less than \$3,000,000. If this were done, all the wholesale dealers and retail dealers would cry out: "Send more cotton goods down here, there is a boom in the cotton trade." And if the workingmen should suddenly take it into their heads to take she earnings, that they hitherto have used for intoxicating liquors, and spend them for furniture, how much do you suppose would be let loose upon the furniture market: Not less than \$6,000,000 in four weeks. There would then be no stagnation of trade in the furniture market.—[Col. Bain, of Kentucky.

THE SOUTH CAROLINA LIQUOR

The liquor law which is to go into force in South Carolina on the 1st of next July will prohibit the manufacture, sale, barter or exchange, or the keeping and offering for sale, barter or exchange of any spirituous, malt, vinous, fermented or other intoxicating liquors, or any compound or mixture thereof. State agents, however, will be empowered to sell liquor, but under such close restrictions as will put it out of the power of most people to buy it. Another clause in the law makes it a misdemeanor, punishable by fine or imprisonment, fer any club to have liquor in its possession, even if it is not sold or given away. It is the pinion of many who know the situation shat while the law will be strictly enforced against the colored people, LAW. the stratton that white the law will be strictly enforced against the colored people, the white chivalry of the State will still be able to assuage their thirst much as usual. If this should turn out to be the case, the law will raise the moral status of the colored people and lower that of the white people.—(Burlington (Vt.) Free Press.





PETITION FOR A PLEBISCITE.

To the Legislative Assembly of the Province

of Ontario:
Your petitioners respectfully call the attention of your honorable body to the following facts:

1. That notwithstanding the restrictive legislation at present in operation, intemperance with its attendant evils still exists in our Province to an alarming extent, is a constant source of misery, pauperism and crime, and a persistent hindrance and menace to the moral and material well-being of our people.

2. That your petitioners believe that the only right and effective legislative method of dealing with this evil, is by the speedy enactment and thorough enforcement of total prohibition.

3. That not only do your petitioners believe that such legislation would be right in principle and very beneficial in operation, but that it is also desired and would be approved by a large majority of the electors of this Province.
