Cyclone Insurance

A Sequel to the Late Westminster Concentrated Blow.

Township Fund for Mutual Benefit

Important Action Taken to Provide Against Any Future Disaster.

township of Westminster was held at W. L. Odell's hotel last week to conagainst damage by high winds or cypletely smashing all buildings, woods and orehards that stood in its track. This caused a general feeling of insecurity and alarm, and at a meeting of the directors of the Westminster Fire Insurance Company, held on July the directors reported that nearly all the members were anxious that the ompany should insure against cynes as well as against fires, or that an independent company should be formed for that purpose. It was de-cided to issue bills calling a public meeting at W. L. Odell's, to consult on the best means of effecting mutual on the best means of effecting mutual insurance against cyclones. A number of the ratepayers met at W. L. Odell's accordingly. Mr. A. M. Hunt was appointed chairman, and R. G. Rose secretary. In the meantime H. He answered promptly that a fire in-surance company could not legally insure against cyclones, and that there was no law to authorize the establishment of a mutual cyclone insurance company, and that the only way they could secure their object was by the formation of a joint stock company, with a large paid up capital, or by special legislation for that purpose.

After Mr. Hunter's reply had been discussed by the meeting it was deiscussed by the meeting, it was de-ided to send a petition to the Legisature of Ontario praying for the legis-ation necessary. The following petition was adopted without one dissenting

To the Honorable Legislative Assembly of the Province of Ontario, in parliament assembled:
"The petition of the undersigned atepayers of the township of Westginster humbly showeth: minster humbly sheweth:
"That whereas a number of the inabitants of the township have on sev-ral occasions suffered loss and damage by high winds or cyclones, more especially by a cyclone on the 29th June, which has caused a general feeling of insecurity, our earnest desire to mitigate the losses caused by such occurences, has been expressed. Judging by past experience, cyclones are not likely to occur offen in this province.

to occur often in this province, and i the losses were shared by the whole community, a mere trifle from each would suffice to pay the damage, and give the people a feeling of security, f they knew they could rely on a system of insurance to make good two-thirds of their loss, would be worth many times the amount they would be required to pay.
"Your petitioners, therefore, humbly pray that your honorable body would enact the necessary legislation to sancon the establishment of mutual cydone insurance companies, or otherwise authorize township councils to

vy a special rate to pay two-thirds of their contents, by winds, so that we may mutually share and help to relieve each other's unavoidable misfortunes. "And your petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray," etc.

After a full discussion, the general opinion of the meeting was strongly in favor of the plan of authorizing township councils to levy a special rate for that purpose, and managing it the same way as they do the dog tax fund. Our township is assessed at a little over \$3,000,000, and a rate of two-tenths of a mill on the dollar would produce \$600 per annum. This amount, we be-lieve, would be sufficient. To raise that amount, a man assessed at \$1,000 would pay just 20 cents a year, and the man assessed at \$5,000 would pay \$1. This urely would be a cheap method of purchasing a feeling of security and avoiding that dread which everyone who has seen the effects of the cyclone of June 29 is apt to feel at the sight of every black cloud on the horizon. The latter erroneously believed that the signature of the arbitration treaty had been effected. This, as a matter of course, will be the next step. Probably there will be direct negotiations between Great Britin and Venezuela for a commercia treaty. Negotiations concerning umpire of the arbitration tribunal are still proceeding. The statement goes on to say that the failure of the Anglo-American arbitration treaty greatly disappointed President McKinley. The British Government had induced the discussions between Sir Julian Pauncefote and Secretary of State Sherman as to whether a new short treaty could not be arrived at. Phelan's advent in Cincinnati was In June, 1894. He came as the personal representative of Eugene V. Debs, to conduct the Cincinnati portion of the great railroad strike. Phelan at once came popular with the labor men of Cincinnati and vicinity, and during the Debs strike he was the lion of the hour. His speeches to the strikers and other labor men were full of logic, wit and timely utterances, and every time he addressed a crowd he made a hit. Phelan's management of the Cincinnati end of the strike was pronounced As a result of his effective work, the

strike reached a danger point in Cincinnati and Ludlow, where Phelan was unusually active. At the crisis of the strike the gov-ernment took hold, and Phelan was

arrested for contempt of court. His arrest almost cipitated a riot in the railroad yard. Cincinnati. He was convicted in the United States courts, and Judge Taft sentenced him to six months in the Warren county jail. 



not be verified. BRITAIN-NOT ENGLAND.

Resentment of the Scots at Their Suppression From the National Title.

To the Editor of the People's Journal, Sir,-I beg leave to inclose a copy of a translation of a paragraph referring to the "Britain, not England" petition which has just appeared in the wellread French paper, Le Temps, which may be of interest to your readers if printed in your columns. I am, etc., THEODORE NAPIER.

Hon. Secretary Scottish National Petition to the Queen:

Edinburgh, 25 Merchiston Park, May 12, 1897. (Copy.) A correspondent sends us from Bombay the text of a singular document which is being circulated in India. It is a petition from the Scotsmen of the British Empire requesting Queen Victoria to bear in mind that she is not only Queen of England or of Ireland, but also of Scotland. They recall the history of the United Kingdom, and the part which Scotland has taken in its development; they bring forward their glorious past to claim their right of existence as a separate nation-a right affirmed since the year 1320 in a "remonstrance" of the Scottish barons to the pope; a right admitted by the Protector Somerset at the time when a complete union was proposed in 1547; a right confirmed in the first clause of the treaty of union of 1706, which substituted for the term "England" that of "Great Britain" when speaking of the two countries collectively.
"We maintain," say the petitioners "that if the national honor of Scotland requires the fulfillment of this first

rticle in the treaty of union, the national honor of England is none the less pledged to see that it is honestly and loyally observed." After the sacrifices which we have made we consider that our country is entitled to share with the other nationalities in the United Kingdom in the glory that accrues to the British Empire—a glory which should not be monopolized by England.

"This unconstitutional attempt to Anglicize the United Kingdom must fect on the all-important question unity between Britain and Further Britain, or Britain-beyond-the-seas, If the colonies had to regard England and not Britain as the only representa-tive of their common nationality, a powerful tie of national sentiment itiated and developed among the Scot-tish, Irish and Welsh colonists. 


