Subject For Consideration.

Paris. Dec. 31.—Great interest is manifested among conference delegates and in French political circles in President Wilson's trip to Italy because of the importance of the subjects he is expected to discuss there. Foremost among these subjects, it is supposed, will be questions relative to the Adriatic. Fiume and the Dalmatian coast, concerning which the Jugo-Slavs and the Italians are not in accord. The pretensions of the Jugo-Slavs to Fiume and the Dalmatian coast are founded on their claim to a preponderance of their nationals in the populations there. According to the views of the Jugo-Slav leaders, the controversy involves the right of peoples to dispose of themselves. This is one of the first concrete questions of this kind that President Wilson will be called upon to discuss. Italy's historic claims, together with her interest in ample protection along her Adriatic coast will, naturally, also be considered. Plans for the departure of President Wilson from Rome on Wednesday night may be affected by the crisis in the Italian Cabinet.

Any power which "started something" menacing the general peace would be immediately squelched. Any trouble maker or makers could be quickly clubbed into submission.

Evidently the French premier believes there is to be no general disarmament. There surely would not be while such a powerful alliance as he suggests existed. It would act as a continual spur to nations outside the combination to prepare for war singly, or together, by secret pacts. Again, if the Entente alliance forced all other peoples to become weaponless, it would be acting a good deal after the fashion of the Prussian. And in either circumstance it would mean the continued expenditure of stupendous sums for the upkeep of adequate forces by land and sea. Even a beneficent militarism, as no doubt such a balance of power would be considered, is not desirable in the new order of things the world hopes for. Finally, what if a member of the dominating group should break the rules? A there is to be any discount for cash change in ministries might easily produce some act which would split the accord and the "balance of power" would go glimmering, to the delight of the lawless. Much more attractive, at least on its surface, is the proposed league of nations big and little, with some sort of international police. According to its wealth, situation and importance every nation could subscribe to the expense of keeping the peace. It would reduce the chances of further war because no one. nation would have sufficiently powerful forces to strike alone. There must be mutual trust between all the nations if the peace is to be kept. That would be difficult should a group of powers arrogate to itself the right to dictate and punish.

Some one in authority should read Kipling's "Tommy" and take the moral implied very much to heart. The first step that justice demands is searching investigation, and Ottawa appears to have been moved to act by the publicity given the complaints.
