Manifesto Issued by Executive of Irish Labor Party Appeals to All to Voice Approval of Railroaders' Action in Refusing to Handle Trains Carrying Munitions-Financial Aid Is Sought.

Dublin, June 11 .- A manifesto pledging support for the Dublin railwaymen and dockers in their refusal to handle munitions has been issued by the executives of the Irish labor party and trade union congress. The manifesto defles the King and the British Government, saying: "Not all the armies in the Empire will compet us to become traitors to our own nation. We will not shrink from the consequences of that view, although the whole fabric of the commonwealth be convulsed."

Appeal to every man and woman in Ireland to support the men is made in the manifesto. It says thousands of pounds are needed weekly

to provide for the workers. The railwaymen generally up to this time have only refused to handle munition trains, but railwaymen at Dingle, County Kerry, on Wednesday refused to man a train with soldiers aboard. The soldiers were obliged to leave the train before it could proceed.

RAILWAY BONDS TO PAY INCREASE IN WAGES DEMANDED BY THE MEN

Deputation of Councillors and L. R. C. Representative To Confer With City Solicitor Regarding Legality of the Scheme.

The newsprint formerly supplied to these publishers has been diverted to United States. It represents the United States. It represents an addition of only one per cent to the 650,000 tons now being exported annually to that country, but it is the life blood of the Canadian daily newspapers from whom it has been taken. No question of price is involved as Canadian publishers are quite willthe Canadian publishers are quite will-ing to pay the current contract prices for export to foreign countries. The present crisis had been precipi-tated by the actions of a very small minority among the newsprint manufacturers of Canada. It has come to the attention of the department of customs and inland revenue, that certain purely retail revenue, that certain purely retail dealers are charging their customers with the sales tax on the sales made to consumers, and showing such sales tax as a separate item on their bills or invoices.

Under the resolution before parliament the sale of goods by the bona fide retailer, selling exclusively to the consumer, is not liable to the 1 per cent sales tax.

The amount of the sales tax, which the retailer has paid upon the goods at the time of purchase from the wholesaler, may be included in the retailer's bill to the consumer, provided that it is not included in the cost upon which profit is calculated, and provided also that it is not shown as a separate item on the retailers' bill or invoice. 
AUSTRIAN CABINET MEMBERS RESIGN

Break Is Caused by Minister of War's Decree.

Vienna, June 11.—The Austrian cabi-net headed by Dr. Karl Renner as chancellor, which has been administering the country's affairs for the great er part of the time since the armistice, has resigned office.

Dr. Renner presented the resignation shortly after midnight, following meeting of the cabinet with represer tatives of the Social Democrats. The break came unexpectedly over the minister of war's decree on army discipline, which question was raised in the national assembly yesterday by the Christian Socialists.

Windsor, Sarnia and Chatham Representatives Occupy the Morning Session—Summary of Comparative Costs of Transportation.

Windsor, Sarnia and Chatham representatives occupied this morning in giving evidence before the Canadian waterways commission, now sitting here under the chairmanship of C. A. Magrath. Senator C. D. Clarke and Sir William Hearst are the other members of the commission. Alexander Simmers of Windsor gave a clear summary in very brief form of the comparative costs of transportation with and without water competition.

Transportation hold-ups on the part Saved Millions.

From Cleveland to Fort William and Duluth, previous to the deepening of the Sault Ste. Marie canal, the coal transportation rate was \$3.50 a ton. Now it was 50 cents a ton. Grain freight rates had been 15 cents a bushel and now are 2½ cents. Twenty-five million dollars had been saved to Canada alone in cheaper transportation since the Soo canal was deepened. The entire cost of deepening the canal was being returned annually to the people of Canada through the cheaper rates. From Fort William to Port Colborne, grain was carried for 4 cents a bushel, a distance of 1.100 miles. From Port Colborne to Montreal, a distance of 300 miles, it cost 7 cents a bushel. The deepening of the Soo canal made the difference. out water competition.

Transportation hold-ups on the part of the railroads he blamed for high prices and social unrest, and he also mildly criticized the banking system, which allows about eighteen men to control the circulation of Canadian money. DISPLEASES GOMPERS

Plank Adopted at the G. O. P. Convention Not Up To Expectations.

PLUMB OUTLINES PLAN

Washington Delegate Advocates Public Ownership On New Basis.

Montreal. June 11.—The labor plank adopted by the Republican national adopted by the Republican national convention at Chicago was condemned here today by President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor. He referred especially to the section of the plank providing for the settlement of public utilities strikes by tribunals similar to the Esch-Cummins transportation act of 1920.

The plank, Mr. Gompers asserted, is directly contrary to what labor had demanded of the Republican party.

"We had asked the convention to go on record in favor of the repeal of the compulsory arbitration sections of the compulsory arbitration sections of the transportation act," he added, "but the Republicans appear to have not only refused our suggestion, but would extend it to all utilities."

Charges Dishonesty.

Mr. Gompers arrived here today from Chicago, where he had presented labor's demands to the National Republican platform committee. Charges that the management of the American railroads are "dishonest" were made here today by Glenn Plumb of Washington, originator of the "Plumb plan" for public ownership of the railroads in addressing the annual convention of the dressing the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor. They cannot be otherwise, he said, under the present system in the United States, which "surrounds them with temptation"

"It appears to us that the Ontario railway board has made recommendations, that are by no means justified by the auditors' report. A martin was sitting within fifteen feet of the sparrow at the time, and the report, though directed nearly perpendicularly up, did not disturb him enough to make him open his wings, much less to fly away.

It is interesting to watch the indifference of these birds to human beings at the market house. On a crowded market day, when the ground below is swarming with people, the martins pursue their job only ten feet over one's head, as calmly as if there were not a person within a mile. Surely they have found that there is safety in the proximity of man.

ART OF FELLING CHIMNEYS.

In England an interesting method of felling lofty imneys is practiced. Its originator is James Smith of Manchester, and he is credited with having felled without accident nearly 100 tall chimneys, which for

one reason or another had become useless. Some of these were from 200 to 250 feet in height.

The method consists in removing the stones or brick near the foot of the chimney and substituting an underpinning of wood, which is afterward set on fire. About two-thirds of the area of the base is removed up to a height of five or six feet, so that most of the weight rests upon the underpinning. 

There had never been a man on the board possessing the slightest sympathy with the farmers and they had gone after the dairymen and hampered their business. Dairymen were getting out of the business, be-cause they could not make it pay. Mr. Sutherland said that the board of grain sutherland said that the board of grain commissioners had made millions out of the sales of screenings fom government elevators. He did not know where these screenings were going, but it should be made impossible that screenings, which probably contain a large percentage of noxious weeds, be sold to the farmers for feed. He prophesied that if the present act passed phesied that if the present act passed the House, its operation would spell ruin to the dairymen, and the livestock industry would receive a further

It nearly drowned out a minority report presented by Edwin J. Gross, the Wisconsin member of the committee, and signed only by himself. The substitute provided for the flat rejection of the league of nations idea, advocated gov-

ernment ownership of railroads and contained other proposals, which the convention hooted as "socialistic."

The relative chance of the presidential candidates apparently was little affected by the platform agreement and on conby the platform agreement and on convention eve there was in evidence no development which changed the situation with Wood, Johnson and Lowden leading, but without any of them having delegates to nominate. So far as the talk of those on the inside revealed, the attainment of harmony over the troublesome treaty plank had no reflex on any of the candidacies, except, possibly in the case of Senator Johnson. 





Stormy Session Ends in Negroes Being Given Full Membership.

MONTREAL, June 10 .- The American Federation of Labor in its annual convention here today wiped out the "color line" and warned its affiliated international unions that negro workers must be given full membership.

The federation's action came at the end of a stormy session, which nearly resulted in a "race war" between delegates from the southern states and the negroes and their sympathizers.

Rejecting the recommendation of their organization committee, the federation for the first time in history Rejecting the recommendation of their organization committee, the federation for the first time in history threatened the autonomy of an affiliated union by requesting the Brotherhood of Railway Clerks to give the negro freight-handlers, express and station employees full membership and eliminate from its constitution the words "white only."

Power to Interfere.

The committee's report of non-concurrence on the ground that the federation had no power to interfere with the constitution of an affiliated union immediately drew the fire of the negro delegates and those of several northern states, chiefly Illinois and New York.

There was a voluminous exchange of oratory, in which the negroes charged "taxation without representation" and "discrimination," to which their opponents replied with accusations of betrayal by negro workers of the whites in past labor disputes.

Indignation of the negro delegates was aroused several times during the debate when speakers referred to them as "nigger freight-handlers," and their objection to such remarks was sustained by the acting chairman, James Duncan. They charged that the use of the word "nigger" was a slander to the race.

Several motions were made on the floor to demand that the railway clerks abolish the "color line" in its constitution or forfeit its charter in the federation. One of these was later modified to "request" the brotherhood to give the negro full membership. It was accepted by an overwhelming majority.

Aged Man Puts On Heavy Clothing Before Drowning Himself.

THAMESVILLE, June 10.—The body of William Irwin, aged 55, a soldier of fortune, and claiming up to about two years ago the universe as his home, was found in the River Thames, about three miles up the river from here and directly opposite Tecumseh Farm, Longwoods road, in a badly decomposed condition, by Fred Herron and James McLean of this town.

Missing Six Days.

Deceased was respected by the people who knew him. He was taken ill about two years ago with influenza, and had been unable to resume the wanderings in which he delighted, and which had taken him to every part of the globe. He had lately lived alone in a house on the Longwoods road, about half a mile from where the body was found. During his illness he was cared for by his neighbors, and recently, when it was suggested he should go to a hos-

During his illness he was cared for by his neighbors, and recently when it was suggested he should go to a hospital, had talked of going away, as he was only a burden to them. He had talked of going to Flint, Michigan. The last time he was seen alive was Friday, June 4.

Coroner Dr. S. Stewart was called, and after viewing the body decided that it was a clear case of suicide, and that an inquest was unnecessary. It is believed that the dread of having to go to a hospital caused him to drown himself.




