Will Bury an Unknown Canadian Soldier in Ottawa

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.—The body of an unknown Canadian sol-dier is to be brought from the old western battlefront and buried beneath the Victory tower of the new parliament building.

It is proposed that the body shall be placed in a vault ex-cavated in the solid rock foundation under the great archway of the Victory tower, and between the two portals which give en-trance to the buildings. The grave will be set almost immediately below the altar in the memorial chamber overhead, and will be marked by a marble slab raised above the grave. This slab will be suitably inscribed.



History of Matter Brief.

The history of the matter is briefly as follows: At the conappointed by the imperial authorities, was in charge of all matters pertaining to the graves of soldiers. A Canadian section, under the direction and control of the office of the overseas minister of militia, was working in conjunction with this commission in

England, France and Flanders. The office of the overseas minister of militia was disbanded on the 1st of March, 1920, and was succeeded by what was called the overseas detachment.

The object of this overseas detachment was to "carry on" and clear up the remnants in connection with military matters and the war which were left unfinished by the office of the overseas minister. This, of course, included the Canadian war graves section, working in conjunction with the Imperial War Graves Commission, to which I have already referred.

Sir George Perley, the Canadian high commissioner, agreed to withdraw this Canadian section from France, acting with the Imperial War Graves Commission, and allow the graves of Canadian soldiers to be attended wholly and solely, and to come under the control of this imperial unit. This overseas detachment was demobilized on the 31st of March of this year.

The Australians were requested to adopt a similar course to that of Sir George Perley, but they declined, and continued to retain the sacred privilege of administering affairs pertaining to deceased Australian soldiers and their graves, in harmony with the imperial unit.

It is not for a moment to be thought that the Imperial War Graves Commission will treat our men who made the supreme eerning their graves.

Much valuable information had been collected and was being classified and indexed, and records of all Canadian graves were being prepared by the overseas detachment.

In addition, the graves of unidentified Canadian soldiers were being carefully and methodically dealt with under this systematic routine, resulting in establishing in many cases the identity of the previously unidentified graves. It was thought, therefore, after the recalling of the Canadian section, and having only a couple of men continuing in the high commissioner's office with the work in connection with photographs of Canadian graves, that there would be a unit, or section, of some kind provided by the Canadian authorities for the attention of matters concerning Canadian graves, and to complete the work still remaining to be done.
