CAPTURED JAP GUNS.

St. Petrsburg, May 26. - Viceroy Alexieff teregraphs that a report is current that Port Arthur was bombarded May 24, but says he has not received any official confirmation of the rumor.

It is reported that Gen. Rennen kampff's Cossacks, who are operating on the line of Gen. Kuroki's communications have made an important cap ture of some of the enemy's guns which were being taken forward to Feng Wang Cheng. No other details are given. This report comes from members of the Emperor's suite. JAKOVLEFF'S ESCAPE.

St. Petersburg, May 26. - Captain Jakovleff, former commander of the Russian battleship Petropavlovsk, and Schmidt, the late Vice-Admiral Makaroff's aide-de-camp, have returned here. Schmidt tells a remarkable story of his escape. He was busy entering up the admiral's log when the explosion occurred. He jumped out of the chart room on to the bridge of the flagship, which was lunging from one side to the other. He saw Admiral Makaroff and Grand Duke Cyril clinging to the end of the bridge. Almost instantly the great ship put her head down and plunged straight to the bottom. By Alleged Setting Afloat of Submarine Mines.

THE TIMES ON THE QUESTION

London, May 26. - The Times today has the following editorial: "The alleged action of the Russians in setting mines adrift in the high seas is exciting here and in the United States the interest we anticipated. 
