# TELEPHONE TALKS.

TO TELEPHONE USERS AND THE CENERAL PUBLIC,-

In laying the foundation for the investigation by the Parliamentary Special Committee it was claimed that Telephone conditions in Canada were not satisfactory because they do not compare favorably with European countries. In this respect statements were made and statistics presented regarding telephone service in Great Britain, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Holland, France, Germany, and other countries of Europe. The movement for municipal telephones in England and Scotland was specially commended.

We cannot adequately deal with all of these in the limits of one "Talk." The information presented to the Committee by men well versed in the prevailing conditions in Europe was exceedingly interesting, and a brief resume will we think, be acceptable to those who are following this series.

In Great Britain the conditions briefly stated are as follows: The telegraph business is a Government monopoly and this includes the telephone. But while the Government owns and operates all the telegraph lines and the long distance telephone lines, it has been "farming out," so to speak, the local exchange telephone service under a license system limited to a term of years.

The greater portion of the exchanges are owned and operated by the National Telephone Company.

In 1899 the Government passed an Act enabling local municipalities to provide exchange telephone service.

The Government itself established a telephone exchange in the City of London to compete with the National Company. Just before service was commenced, however, the Post Office Department decided to enter into an agreement with the National Company to charge the same rates, to exchange service between the subscribers of the two systems, and to restrict their operations as far as possible to separate areas in order to avoid wasteful expenditure in duplication of plant.

The Government has also established local exchanges at a number of small places. During the past year experiments have been made in a limited way in giving rural service, but the Government report states that "the receipts have not covered the cost of attendance and maintenance."

The National Company's exchanges, the Municipal exchanges, and the Government exchanges, each have a connection with the Government long distance lines on equal

The Government has contracted to take over the National Company's business on the expiry of the present license in 1911, and it is expected that at the same time it will take over all other telephone exchanges throughout the country.

This briefly outlines conditions of telephone service in Great Britain at the present time.






