## EXPLANATION

 OF THE Articles of the CalendaASTRONOMIBAL NOTIGES FOR THE YEAR 1888.

On the left hand page of each month are given the data required for Solar observations for Time and Latitude, namely:-The Equation of Time (Sun fast or slow of clock) which is given for the instant of apparent Noon and the Sun's Declination at Mean Noon, both Greenwich Time. Also the Sun's apparent Semi-diameter to the nearest tenth of a second for every day throughout the year with these exceptions, all the calculations are reduced to the nearest minute Local Mean Time, Charlottetown Latitude $46^{\prime \prime} 13^{\prime}$ 55 N . Longitude $63^{\prime} 7 .{ }^{\prime} 23 \mathrm{~W}$.

The Sun's Declination at Greenwich Apparent Noon if required can be obtained from the data here given by multiplying the hourly variation of Declination by the Equation of Time for the same day, reduced to the decimal of an hour and applying the result according to the conditions as given below :

From the Sun's Semi-diameter may be found the Sun's horizontal Parallax (which equals the earth's apparent Diameter as seen from the distance of the Sun) by dividing by the constant quantity 107.44, which is the proportion that the Sun's actual diameter bear to that of the earth, taken as unity. Thus for July 1st, when the Sun is in its furthest from the earth we have the Apparent Semi-diameter $15^{\prime} 46^{\prime \prime}$ which give $\frac{15^{\prime} 4^{\prime \prime} 6^{\prime \prime} 1}{1007.4}=\frac{94^{\prime} 6}{107.44}=8^{\prime \prime} .805$ the Sun's Horizontal Parallax at that tide. In like manner on the 31st December when the Sun is in perigee we find the Horizontal Parallax to be 9. 106.

The Parallax in altitude may be obtained from the Horizontal Parallax thus found by the natural cosine of the observed altitude.

On the Right Page of each month are the changes of the Moon its Rising, Southing and Setting, and the time of High Water at Charlottetown. The bearing of the Moon at the time of change, the Perigee and Apogee, the time of its crossing the Equinoctial and of reaching its greatest North and South Declination.

It being generally found that the Lunar Equinoctials are marked by atmospheric disturbances, the greater the more nearly their times agree with those of the Moon's changes on Perigee. $\mathrm{x} \times$ or $\mathrm{x} x \times$ added where two or three of these influences concur within the space of 48 hours.

## ECLIPSES.

During the year 1886 there will be two Eclipses, both of the Sun, but neither of them visible at Charlottetown.
I. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, Greenwich Mean Time of conjunction, March 5 th, 10 h .8 m .57 .2 sec., the centre of the Moon's Shadow passing from near the eastern extremity of New Guinea across the Pacific Ocean and Mexico to near Yucatar.
II. A total Eclipse of the Sun August 28-29, Greenwich Mean time of conjunction in Right Ascension August 29th oh. 58 m .34 .8 sec ., the centre of the Shadow passing from the coast of Venezuela across the Atlantic, South Africa and South Madagascar.

## PLANETS.

Mercury.-Mercury will be at his greatest angular distance west of the Sun as a morning star, and to the east as an evening star at the following dates: January 8th $\mathbf{2 3}{ }^{\circ} \mathbf{2 r ^ { \prime }}$ West, March 21 st, $18^{\circ} 31^{\prime}$ East, May 6th, $26^{\circ} 16^{\prime}$ West, July 18 th, $26^{\circ} 52^{\prime}$ East, September ist, $18^{\circ} 5^{\prime}$ West, November 13 th, $22^{\circ}{ }^{\circ} 29^{\prime}$ East, and December 22nd, $21^{\circ} 5^{\prime} 2^{\prime}$ West, between these dates his motion will be retrograde and direct alternately passing the Sun in conjunction inferior or superior according as the planets motion is retrograde or direct.

Venus.-Venus at the beginning of the year an Evening Star, with direct apparent motion (that is from west to east) till January 26th, then retrograde till March 7th, and direct to the end of the year coming to inferior conjunction with the Sun February 18th, in superior conjunction December 2nd.

Mars.-His motion will be retrograde till April 17th, afterwards direct. He will be in opposition to the Sun March 6th, coming to the meridian at midnight at his greatest brightness and least distance from the earth.

Jupiter.-Jupiter begins the year with direct motion till 20th January, retrograde till 23 rd May, after which direct to the end of the year. He comes in conjunction with the Sun October, re-appearing as a Morning Star at the end of the month.

Saturn.-Having just passed his opposition to the Sun (Dec. 25), commences the year with retrograde motion, so continuing till March 2nd, after which direct to the end of the year, he will be in conjunction with the Sun July 3rd, reappearing as a Morning Star about the end of the month.

Uranus.-Uranus commences the year with retrograde motion till January 13th, till he retrograde till June 10 th, then direct to the end of the year. This minute planet may be looked for during the first half of the year a little to the eastward of Jupiter and Mars and may be recognized at the times of his conjunction with those planets on July 9th, $34^{\prime}$ due north of Mars, and August 16th, $31^{1}$ ( $=$ the Moon's diameter) due south of Jupiter.

To estimate the distance given in the above table, $3 \mathrm{I}^{\prime}$ may be taken as equal to the Mean Apparent diameter of the Moon. At their conjunction on August 8th, Venus and Saturn being but $x^{\prime}$ apart, would appear to the eye as one star, and they may be so seen in the East just before sunrise that morning. An interesting grouping of Jupiter, Mars and Uranus will be seen in the early part of July.

## OCCULTATIONS.

There will be eighteen occultations of Planets by the Moon, one of Mercury, May 1st; two of Venus, January 7th, April 30th ; one of Mars, June 9th ; of Jupiter, eight, January 25 th, February 20th, March 20 th, April 16th, May 13 th, June 9th, July 7 th, August 3rd ; and six of Uranus occurring a few hours after the first six of Jupiter. The actual occurrence will not be observable here, happening either in broad daylight or when the Moon is below the horizon.

In the course of each month there are many occultations of fixed stars by the Moon (more than 1500 during the year) but of stars less than the third magnitude they cannot be observed without the ard of the telescope, out of forty-eight above that magnitude the following eight may be seen, namely four of Aldetaran ist magnitude in Tauras in January 16th, 6 h .12 m. p. m. ; February 12th, 55 m . past midnight ; October 16th, $7 \mathrm{~h} .13 \mathrm{~m} . \mathrm{p}$. m., and November 13 th, 2h. $33 \mathrm{~m} . \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.

One of Regulus rst magnitude in sea October 22nd, 4 h . p. m., (a near approach) one each of Beta, Eta and Gamma, 3rd magnitude of Virgo April 16th, 3 h. 1om. a. m., April ${ }^{17} 7 \mathrm{th}, \mathrm{Ih} .37 \mathrm{~m} . \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m} .$, and May 15th, 11 h .10 m. p. m. The time here given being when the star is centrally behind the Moon.

Tagging metal, plain, japanned or coated, in coils not over $11 / 2$ inches in width, when imported by manufacturers of shoe and corset laces, for use in their factories.
Locust beans, for the manufacture of horse and cattle food.
Hoop iron, not exceeding three-eights of an inch in width, and being No. 25 gauge or thinner, used for the manufacture of tubular rivets.
Buckram, for the manufacture of hat and bonnet shapes Recovered rubber, and rubber substitute.
Cutton yarns finer than No. 40, unbleached, bleached or dyed, and not finer than No. 60 , for the manufacture of Italian cloths and worsted fabrics.

## Exports Prohibited.

The export of deer, wild turkeys, quail, partridge, prairie fowl and woodcock, in the carcass, or parts thereof, is hereby declared unlawful and prohibited, and any person exporting or attempting to export any such article, shall, for each such offence, incur a penalty of one hundred dollars, and the article so attempted to be

exported shall be forfeited, and may, on reasonable cause of suspicion of intention to export the same, be seized by any officer of the Customs, and if such intention be proved, shall be dealt with as for breach of the Customs laws.
The importation into Canada of all goods manufactured or produced, wholly or in part, by prison labor, or which have been made within, or in connection with, any prison, gaol or penitentiary, is hereby prohibited under a penalty of two hundred dollars, together with the forfeiture of such goods and the parcels or packages in which they are contained,

The rate of Postage on a letter posted within the Dominion of Canada, for transmission by Mail to any place in Canada, is three cents per half ounce weight ; but the Statute provides that this rate must be prepaid by Postage Stamp at the time of posting the letter.

Any such letter posted wholly unpaid (or prepaid less than'one full rate of three cents) cannot be forwarded to its destination, but will be sent to the Dead Letter Office, with the reason plainly written or marked upon it-" postage not prepaid."

On letters posted at an office to be delivered from it, commonly known as "drop letters," the rate is one cent per $1 / 2 \mathrm{oz}$.; to be in all cases prepaid by postage stamp affixed to such letters when pbsted.

The charge for the Registration of a letter is 2 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

## CANADA AND NEWFOUNDLAND.

Letters for Newfoundland are charged at the rate of five cents per half ounce, and must in all cases be prepaid.

Post Cards 2 cents.
The Registration fee to Newfoundland is the same as to places withing the Dominion, and must in all cases be prepaid by Registration stamp.

## CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES. -

The rate of postage upon letters passing by mail between Canada and the United States is the same as to places within the Dominion, and must in all cases be prepaid by postage stamp, one rate, viz : 3 cents.

The Registration fee to the United States is 5 cents, to be prepaid by Registration stamp.

TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS AND PERIODICALS ADDRESSED TO PLACES IN CANADA, NEWFOUNDLAND AND UNITED STATES.

On all newspapers and periodicals other than those from the office of publication, including all newspapers and

periodicals published less frequently than once a month, the postage rate is one cent per 4 ounces which must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Newspapers and periodicals weighing less than one ounce, may be posted singly ; if prepaid by postage stamp, one-half cent each.

Newspapers and other periodicals published in the United Kingdom, and re-posted by News Agents to regular subscribers, are not liable to any additional postage.

## PARCEL POST.

To any part of the Dominion, for each parcel weighing Not more than 4 ounces, 6 cents, Exceeding 4 ozs., and not exceeding 8 ozs., 12 cents, Each additional 4 ozs., or fraction, 6 cents.
Parcels should not exceed 5 lbs . in weight, or 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth, and should be marked "by Parcel Post." Parcels may be registered by affixing a 5 cent Fegistered Letter Stamp thereto, in addition to the postage.

## MISCELLANEOUS POSTAL MATTER,

VIZ : BOOKS AND PAMPHLETS, PRINTED CIRCULARS, PRICES CURRENT, HANDBILLS, ENGRAVERS' BLOCKS, ETC., ETC.

When posted addressed to any place in Canada, and not exceeding 5 lbs in weight, 24 inches in length, and 12 inches in breadth, or depth, must be prepaid by Postage Stamp at the rate of 1 cent per 4 ounces in weight, and must be put up so as to admit of inspection. Such books, papers, returns, etc, must not be accompanied by any instructions or directions.

Legal and Commercial papers generally are liable to letter rate of Postage.

The rate of postage on Seeds, Cuttings, Bulls and Roots is 1 cent per 4 ounces, the weight of a package not to exceed 24 ounces.

In sending money by mail it is always best to transmit by

Money Order if possible. If sent by letter, it should always be registered, and a receipt obtained.

Money Orders on the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, the United States, British India, Italy, Germany, Switzerland, Jamaica, New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania, are drawn in Canada Currency, and may be had for any sum not in excess of $\$ 50$; but Postmasters are at liberty to issue several orders of $\$ 50$ each, if required by the remitter.

Patterns and Samples of Merchandise, posted for places in the United States, are subject to the special rate of 10 cents each, prepaid by postage stamp, and must not exceed 8 ounces in weight.

The Cone, when hoisted by itself, indicates that it is expected that the wind will attain a velocity of 30 miles an hour, but will not exceed 40 miles; and it is not intended that an ordinarily well found vessel should stay in port, Dut simply as a warning to mariners that strong winds are expected from the quarter indicated.

The Drum will always be hoisted when the velocity of the wind is expected to exceed 40 miles an hour.

The night signal, corresponding to Nos, 1 and 3, is two white lanterns hanging perpendicularly.

Night signal corresponding to Nos. 2 and 4, is two white lanterns hanging horizcntally.
