

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I. COURSE OF STUDY.

Classics, Mathematics, and English.

In Classics.--Latin Grammar, Greek Grammar, and one easy Latin and one easy Greek author. The authors recommended are:---Casar: Sallust; Virgil (Eneld-B. I.); Xenophon (Anabasis, B. I.): Homer (Iliad B. I.).

In Mathematics.—Arithmetic; Algebra, to Simple Equations, inclusive; Euclid's Elements, Books I. II, and HI.

In English .- Writing, dictation.

For the literary and scientific subjects of the Full Course, the students attend the classes of the Faculty of Arts in McGill College, according to the terms of affiliation with the University, in which Faculty the Full Course extends over four years and leads to the Degree of B.A. But in the Third and Fourth Years, Theological students are allowed exemption from attendance on certain classes, should they desire it. Thus the studies of the Third and Fourth Years of the Full'Course are prosecuted simultaneously in the Faculty of Theology and in the Faculty of Arts. The work of the Fifth Year is confined to the Faculty of Theology.

The following is the course of study in the University which students in Theology must pass through in order to obtain the Degree of B.A. :--

First Tear.-Classics; French or German or Hebrew; English Literature; Pure Mathematics: History; Elementary Chemistry.

Second Year.-Classics; French or German or Hebrew; English Literature; Logic; Pure Mathematics; Botany.

2 hird Year.-Classics; English Literature; "Mental and Moral Philosophy; Mixed Mathematics: Zoology.

Fourth Year .- Classics; Mental and Moral Philosophy; Mixed Mathematics; Mineralogy and Geology.

The Theological Course proper begins with the Third Year of the Full Course, and extends over three full Sessions. It embraces the following subjects:--(1) Systematic Theology; (2) Historical Theology; (3) Pastoral Theology; (4) Homiletics; (5) Greek Testament Exegesis; (6) Church History; (7) Evidences and Biblical Literature.

In both Departments, the Session begins at the middle of September; and examinations are held at Christmas and at the end of the Session in the several subjects of the year. Students must pass these examinations as a condition of maintaining their proper status. Candidates who are admitted to the Theological Course proper ("Shorter"), in accordance with §3, Chap. IV. of the Regulations, are required to attend such classes in McGill College as the Faculty of Theology may deem expedient and also to pass the examinations of such classes.

II. BY-LAWS AND REGULATIONS:

CHAPTER I.

OF THE CORPORATION.

1. This Corporation is called a The Congregational College of British North America."

2. Its object is to educate Ministers for the Congregational Churches of Canada, and the other Provinces of British North America.

3. All who contribute one dollar annually to the funds of the College are members of the Corporation, and entitled to a voice in the management of its affairs.

4. A Regular Meeting of the Corporation is held annually, for the reception of the Report of the retiring Directors, the election of a new Board, and the transaction of other necessary business.

5. The Annual Meeting is held at the same time and place as that of the Congregational Union of Canada.

6. Special Meetings of the Corporation may be held for the transaction of special business, on a requisition to that effect to the Chairman of the Board of Directors, signed by, at least, twenty members of the Corporation. Provided always, that no such Special Meeting be held without two months' public notice thereof, signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Board of Directors.

CHAPTER II.

OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS

1. The Board of Directors is elected from members of the Corporation, and consists of a Chairman, Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and not less than ten, nor more than fifteen other members, who hold office for one year, but are eligible for re-election.

2. Five members of the Board form a Quorum.

3. The functions and duties of the Board are :—The oversight and management of the affairs of the College during their year of office; and on the expiration of the same, to present a report of their proceedings, as well as of the general condition of the College, to the Corporation at its Annual Regular Meeting, or at such other times as the Corporation may require.

4. The proceedings of the Board of Directors are subject to the sanotion of the Corporation, and are regulated by By-laws, which may be enacted, amended, or repealed at any Annual Meeting. 5. may Prov least

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ct to the sanction h may be enacted, 5. Vacancies in the Board, whether occurring by death or resignation, may be filled by the Board, as soon after their occurrence as it may see fit Provided always, that no such appointments be made without a vote of, at least, a majority of the members of the Board.

CHAPTER I

1. The Professors receive their appointment from the Corporation; or in exceptional cases, from the Board of Directors, subject to the approval of the Corporation.

2. Their duties and their salaries are determined by such regulations as the Corporation may from time to time ordain in that behalf.

3. The Professors constitute a Faculty of Theology and, as such, are entrusted with the educational department of the College, subject to the sanction and control of the Board of Directors.

4. In cases of Discipline, the Faculty may admonish or reprimand a Student, or prohibit his attendance on the classes, preliminary to reporting him to the Board to be further dealt with

 The Faculty are required to make regular reports of their proceedings to the Board.

CHAPTER IV.

OF CANDIDATES FOR ADMISSION.

1. Every Candidate for admission into the College must present to the Directors the testimony of the Church of which he is a member, respecting his piety and apparent suitableness to the work of the Ministry, together with a written statement of the grounds of his own conviction that he is called of God to that work, and of his views of Christian doctrine and Church Government.

2. Candidates for admission to the Full Course must be prepared to pass the Matriculation Examination in the McGill University.

3. Candidates who are graduates of any University, or who can satisfy the Board that they are otherwise possessed of sufficient acquirements, may the at once admitted to the Theological Course. Also, as exceptional cases, such candidates may be admitted to that course as it may be expedient, in the judgment of the Directors, to train as preachers, without the ordinary literary culture.

4. Approved Candidates are received on a probation of four months, at the close of which, if the result of their probation be satisfactory, they are admitted to the Full Course.

CHAPTER V.

OF THE STUDENTS.

· 1. Students are, during their Literary Course, under the general supervision of the Theological Professors, and take such subjects in the Theological Department as the Board may direct. The Students, both in the Literary and the Theological Department, are required to attend exclusively to the studies approved by the Board.

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3. Every Student, on his admission into the College, is required to sign a declaration of obedience and consent to the By-laws and Regulations of the College.

4. Students are allowed to live with such families only as are approved by the Board of Directors. Changes of abode must be promptly notified to the Secretary of the College.

5. Attendance upon the classes in the College and the use/of the Library is allowed without charge to the students. Aid may also be granted to them from its funds, to meet the expense of board ;—the amount of such aid to be fixed at the beginning of each Session.

6. As a part of their preparation for their future work, the Students, under the sanction of the Directors, preach the Gospel, as they have the opportunity.

7. Every Student, when admitted into the College, on the expiration of the term of his probation, is required to procure a formal dismissal from the Church to which he formerly belonged, and, without delay, to obtain admission into a Congregational Church in the place in which the College may be. Such dismissal and admission must be reported by him to the Board. Furthermore, he is expected to be as regular as possible in his attendance upon the services, ordinances and church-meetings of the Church to which he belongs during his College course.

8. Students are not allowed, during their College course, to enter into the marriage relationship, without the knowledge and consent of the Board of Directors.

9. Students who leave the College without obtaining the official sanction and discharge of the Board, are required to refund to the College whe amount expended by it for their education.

10. Churches who desire the services of Students with the view of permanent settlement in the Pastorate, or otherwise, are requested to communicate with the Board, through the Secretary.

CHAPTER VL

OF THE COURSE OF STUDY AND EXAMINATIONS.

1. The Full Course of study extends over five Sessions, and is divided into a Literary Course of two Sessions, and a Theological Course of three Sessions.

2. In the Theological Department, the course of study includes the Original Languages of the Scriptures, Biblical Literature, Systematic and Pastoral Theology, Church History, Homiletics, and Excgesis of the Greek Testament, with such other accessory subjects as the Board of Directors may from time to time appoint. gical Department, I by the Board.

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tudy includes the e, Systematic and gesis of the Greek oard of Directors 3. In the Theological Course, the Students are examined at the close of each Session, in all the subjects of the year. The examinations are conducted by Examiners (among whom the Theological Professors are included) chosen by the Board of Directors, and by means of printed questions and written answers to the same. Those who pass are arranged according to their Proficiency, as 1st Class, 2nd Class, and 3rd Class. If a student fail to pass in any subject, he is required to undergo a Supplemental Examination in the same. The results of these Sessional Examinations are recorded by the Board, and reported to the provation at the Annual Meeting.

4. The Session in the Theological Department begins on the second Wednesday in September, and ends on the second Wednesday in April.

5. The Professors are at liberty to hold, during the Session, such Class Examinations as they may deem necessary, other in the manner aforesaid or orally.

6. In the Literary Course, Suddents are required to pass such examinations as may be appointed by the Faculty of Arts of the McGill University-The Board of Directors are required to obtain from the said Faculty of Arts a Report of the Examinations of the Students in the several subjects thereof, and also of their attendance and conduct during the Session in the University, and to present the same at the Annual Meeting of the Corporation.

CHAPTER VII.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

1. In reference to matters not provided for in the foregoing By-laws, the Diffectors may act according to their discretion ;—subject always to the approval of the Corporation at any Regular Meeting.

2. Alterations may be made in the Bylaws and Regulations, or new ones added, by any Annual Regular Meeting of the Corporation, provided that notice of such alterations or addition has been given at the meeting next preceding.

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IV. PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL MEETING

1872.

The Annual Meeting of the Corporation of the CONGREGA-TIONAL COLLEGE OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA was held in the Congregational Church, Montreal, on Friday, June 7th, 1872

(1) On motion, the Hon. J. G. Robertson was appointed Chairman, and the Rev. R. Lewis, Secretary of the Meeting.. The Rev. W. F. Clarke offered prayer.

(2) The Secretary of the College read the Report of the Board of Directors, and, in the absence of the Treasurer, the Report of the Finances for the past year. The Principal, as Treasurer of the Fund, read the Report of the Board touching the Lillie Marmorial Fund.

(3) Moved by the Rev. K. M. FENWICK; seconded by the Rev. D. McCallum; and resolved :--

That the Reports now read be received and adopted and printed for circulation, and that the following gentlemen be the Board of Directors for the ensuing year :--

Chairman-Rev. Charles Chapman, M.A. Treasurer-Mr. James P. Clark. Secretary-Rev. George Cornish, LL.D. Directors-Revs. Henry Wilkes, D.D., LL.D., F. H. Marling, K. M. Fenwick, A. Duff, John Fraser, E. Ebbs; Messrs. C. Alexander, Henry Lyman, James Baylis, P. W. Wood, H. Vennor, C. R. Black, Theo. Lyman, W. R. Ross, R. C. Jamieson. And that Messrs. J. B. Learmont and Robert Mills be requested to audit the accounts of the Treasurer.

(4) Moved by the Rev. C. CHAPMAN, M.A.; seconded by the Rev. F. H. MARLING; and resolved :--

That this meeting do now adjourn, to meet again on Saturday, the 8th, at 10.30 a.m.

(5) Saturday, June 8th, the Corporation met and resumed business at the hour appointed. The Rev. S. N. JACKSON offered prayer.

(6) Moved by the Rev. Dr. CORNISH; seconded by the Rev. DR. WILKES; and resolved :---

That the sum of \$25, be voted to the Proprietors of the Canadian Independent from the funds of the College in consideration of the valuable official services rendered by the Magazine to the College.

(7) Moved by the Rev. S. N. JACKSON; seconded by the Rev. F. H. MARLING; and resolved :--

That the Board be authorized until additional Professorships can be fully established, and so far as the funds allow, to make arrangements for temporary Lectureships in the Theological Department of the College.

(8) Moved by the Rev. J. A. R. DICKSON; seconded by the Rev. JOHN FRASER; and resolved :--

That this meeting, while cherishing the belief that the most earnest efforts are demanded in order to secure for the rising ministry as high a form of scholarship as possible, is, at the same time, deeply sensible of the supreme importance of the Holy Spirit's influence; and, therefore, earnestly asks the churches, as heretofore, to observe the second Sunday in October as a day of special prayer, that holy and gifted men may be called to the work of the ministry, and that all the operations of the College may prosper during the coming ression.

(9) Moved by the REY. JAMES HAY; seconded by the Rev. JOHN MCKILLICAN; and resolved :-

That the cordial thanks of this Corporation be given to the Colonial Missionary Society, for its continued confidence and sympathy, and for the valuable pecuniary assistance rendered by it to the College, during the past year.

(10) Moved by the REV. E. EBBS; seconded by the Rev. ENOCH BARKER; and resolved :--

That this meeting renders its cordial thanks to the Rev. Dr. Wilkes, for his valuable services in visiting many of the churches, in the interest of the College; and, also, to the Rev. Dr. Cornish, for his zealous and zuccessful efforts on behalf of the Lillie Memorial Fund; and, considering it to be of great importance that the churches should be made well acquainted with the aims and working of the College, respectfully requests the Professors to devote a part of their vacation next year to this purpose.

(11) After special prayer and thanksgiving by the Rev. W. F. CLARKE, the Corporation adjourned.

V. REPORT FOR SESSION 1871-2.

The Board of Directors of the Congregational College of B. N. A. beg to submit to the Corporation the following as their Report of the proceedings and condition of the College during the thirtythird Session of its operations.

The Session of 1871-72 was formally opened with a public service in Zion Church in the presence of your Board, the professors and students of the College, and a goodly audience. An able address, on the topic of *Theology in relation to Modern Thought*, was delivered by the Rev. Chas. Chapman, M.A. Another pleasing feature of the proceedings was the delivery by the Rev. Henry Ward Beecher of a stimulating and characteristic address to the students. The College is under great obligation to both Mr. Chapman and Mr. Beecher for their valuable services on this occasion.

During the past Session four Candidates for admission presented themselves, and, after the usual probation, they were admitted to the standing of students of the College taking the Full Course. Their names and churches are :---

(1) Finlay Malcolm, Scotland, Ont.

(2) Richard Burgess, East Tilbury, Ont.

(3) James R. Black, Zion Church, Montreal.

(4) Zenas Crowell, Liverpool, Nova Scotia.

Of those on the books during the previous Session the following have been in attendance the whole of this, viz:--(5) Duncan McGregor, B.A.; (6) R. W. Wallace; (7) D. D. Nighswander; (8) Joseph Griffith; (9) W. H. A. Claris; (10) John Allworth; (11) E. D. Silcox; (12) Wm. McIntosh; (13) John W. Clarke. Thus there have been thirteen students on the books and funds of the College, and in actual attendance during the past Session. After the depression that existed a few years ago, this increase in number is gratifying.

The Session closed at the stated time and with the usual examinations, except in the class of Prof. Cornish. The Rev. Chas. Chapman, M.A., and the Rev. A. Duff, kindly gave their assistance in conducting the examinations in the Department of Theology, for which service the thanks of the College are due to these gentlemen.

In the final examination in the Faculty of Arts of the University, Messrs. Wallace and Allworth successfully passed for the degree of B.A., the former with First Rank Honours in Mental and Moral Philosophy.

The progress of the junior students in the work of the Faculty of Arts has not been altogether satisfactory to your Board. For this, large allowance must be made in favour of these students on the score of inadequate preparation and inexperience and unacquaintance with the methods of working pursued. It is greatly to be desired that pastors and churches were more conversant with the course of study and the amount and character of the preparation required for entrance, since in that case they would be in a better position for advice and recommendations to candidates for admission. Your Board are more firmly convinced than ever of the importance of insisting upon the students taking the Full Course of study in order to adequate preparation for their future work. The short Theological Course must be allowed only in carefully selected and exceptional cases. And they would have it made known throughout the churches that the Full Course of study, if honestly pursued, is one that is sufficient to occupy all the time and thought that the student can give to it, and to make his college-life anything but one of ease and indifference. But the training thus secured, and the knowledge thus gained, are a rich reward for all his toil, the value of which he will more highly appreciate every year of his public ministry.

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The following students have completed their course and have received certificates to that fact from your Board, viz :--

Messrs. Duncan McGregor, B. A.; R. W. Wallace, B. A.; W. H. A. Clarris, and D. D. Nighswander. They leave enjoying the confidence and best wishes of your Board for their future usefulness and success.

The following are the reports of the work and examinations in the Department of Theology during the past Session.

(1) Dr. Wilkes reports as follows :---

The Session now closed has been one of regular and steady work without interruption on account of ill health on the part of either the teachers or pupils. There have been eight students in the Theological Department, of whom three have now completed their curriculum. One who has remained to complete his Arts Course and to graduate, finished in Theology last year, having enjoyed too sessions under the late Dr. Lillie. The four junior students have not attended any lectures, except a few in Homiletics, but they have taken part in the weekly class-exercises in plans of sermons, homilies, &c., and have been with us in our devotional services once a week.

Being apprehensive that, in some instances, too much had been required last Session of the students who were in the midst of their Arts Course, I made several subjects optional, confining the requirement of attendance to Lectures on Theology, Homiletics, Church History and Biblical Criticism. There were 42 on the first of these subjects, beginning with our Lord's Atonement, passing on to the blessings resulting therefrom, and ending with the Church and its Ordinances. The Homiletical Lectures numbered 14 in addition to the class-exercises. In Church History there were 35, using Kurtz as a text-book, including the 3rd period of the Ancient and Classical form of Development (A.D. 692-1453) the Mediæval and Germanic form of Development. First period, centuries 4-9; Second period, centuries 10-13; Third period centuries 14-15, and the Modern Germanic Development, century 16 (only from 1500 to 1540). Twenty was the number on Biblical Criticism; the part of that wide subject chosen being Old Testament Introduc. tion. Of these we were indebted to the Rev. Charles Chapman, M.A.

for six on the Prophecies by Isaiah, containing a thorough examination of modern adverse criticism. The other fourteen that preceded them were on the Pentateuch, and the books of Joshua and Judges, including observations on the Hebrew language and literature. On two of the above subjects we had written examinations at Christmas as also at the close of the Session. Having a sufficient number of volunteers, I formed a class of five to complete the part of Westcott on the Canon left over from last Session.;—a class of three to study Butler's Analogy, Part ii; and one of six to go through Barnes' Evidences of Christianity in the 19th Century. Written examinations have been held on all these subjects, the results of which will be found below. I have again to speak in the highest terms of the uniform punctuality, propriety of conduct, and diligence of the students.

The want of adequate pecuniary resources has grievously interfered with the proper growth of our library. This year we have ventured, rather in faith that money will be forthcoming than as having it in possession, somewhat to improve it by the addition of between forty and fifty volumes of valuable works. We have had also to expend \$60.00 either in binding, or rebinding important volumes which must have been lost without it. I have to make special mention of the zeal and efficiency of Mr. Silcox in arranging the books, and superintending the work of rebution thus far accomplished.

The tabular statement of the examinations is placed below with the remark, that, while I personally conducted those at Christmas, the Rev. Charles Chapman, M.A., assisted in the matter of Old Testament Introduction, and the Rev. Archibald Duff in the remaining Sessional Examinations; for these services, and for Mr. Chapman's six able lectures, my thanks and those of the Board of Directors are due.

Your Board have deemed it necessary that the sum paid to Mrs. Lillie for the past year from the College Funds should be reimbursed from the assets of the Lillie Memorial Fund. The thanks of the Corporation are due to the Principal and Secretary for the valuable services they have, by their respective visitations, rendered to the College.

The statement of the Treasurer shows the financial condition of the College. The disbursements have amounted to \$3,396.28; of this sum \$300 do not fall within the working expenditure proper. The actual expenditure of the year has, therefore, been \$3,096.28. The receipts have amounted to \$3,669.21; these include \$170.81, the balance in hand at the beginning of the year; \$83.00 received on account of 1870.71; \$1215.24, the grant of Colonial Missionary Society; and \$1806.66 contributed by the Churches. Thus a balance of \$272.93 is left in the hands of the Treasurer, a gratifying result when the enlarged expenditure of the Session is taken into account.

VII. REPORT OF THE LILLIE MEMORIAL FUND

As the Lillie Memorial Fund was sought for by order of the College Corporation, it is not needful in this report to explain its design, or to vindicate its creation. Suffice it to say, that after waiting metime for spontaneous responses to printed circular appeals, which were not very productive, the Rev. Professor Cornish undertook an extensive visitation of the Churches, both in Ontario and the Maritime Provinces, which did prove happily successful. Dr. Wilkes undertook to ask friends in Montreal and in Sherbrooke for help, which was readily and liberally granted. The combined results of these efforts fulfilled the conditions on which the sum of £300 sterling was promised by the Colonial Missionary Society, accordingly that sum was obtained. Instructions were given to the Board of Directors on a former occasion to appropriate to this object the Port Stanley Chapel Fund, and such part of the Canada Permanent Building Society Stock as might be needful to complete the \$5000. It has been the desire of the Board to encroach as little as practicable on that stock, and to make it the nucleus of a further endowment fund. Such additional endowment is obviously of great importance to the future efficiency of the Institution. Suitably to endow colleges is of recognized utility; and, while it would not be desirable to remove the claims of our College from the practical sympathy and regular aid of its friends, it would be very desirable to have an endowment at least fifty thousand dollars. With this conviction, it is prod posed to make what may be obtained, and may remain over the \$5000, the commencement of an Endowment Fund, the appropriation of the revenue from which will form the subject of consideration after some sufficient definite sum is obtained.

The assets of the Fund derived from the several sources, indicated by appended lists and statements amount to \$5,182.43.

The sum of three thousand dollars is now held by the Trustees appointed, in suitable bonds having security of the highest class; and they will further invest at the earliest proper opportanity. This fund is properly chargeable with the two years' annuity already paid; it has, indeed, repaid to the general treasury one of the years' annuity, but it is hoped that such rapayment, extending over a number of years, will be forthcoming from the interest in excess of six per cent. which may be obtained.

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VIII. REPORT OF JOURNEY BY THE PRINCIPAL IN MAY, 1872.

Leaving the night train I reached Brockville early on the 2nd May, and proceeding by rail and stage to Lanark village, fulfilled my first appointment that evening, by preaching a sermon and describing our College work. There will be a contribution from this congregation which would not probably have been made but for the visit—amount \$24. The following afternoon the appointment at Lanark First Church was fulfilled in like manner, and \$9.25 handed to me as the collection. On Sunday, 5th-May, preached twice in Brockville, where \$4 were handed to me as part of a contribution which is to follow immediately. One young man connected with Lanark First Church may ere long become one of our students: Mr. Douglas is aiding him in preparation.

Tuesday evening, May 7th, I preached and, according to the course pursued in every instance, described our work and insisted on an annual contribution to the funds of the College, at *Belleville*; the next evening at *Cold Springs*, where Mr. Silcox is supplying; and the next at *Cobourg* occupied for the summer by Mr. Griffith. From the two places last named contributions will be at once taken up and forwarded. The following evening, Friday, I met in the same manner a congregation at *Whitby*, and received from Mr. Gibbs a contribution of \$3 as an earnest of others to be now sought for and remitted.

On Sunday, 12th May, preached to three Congregations, Markham, nine miles onward Stouffville; and three miles further Altona. Though the usual contributions had been remitted, Mr. Day had announced a collection at the two places last named which oayment, extending om the interest in

yielded respectively \$11.75 and \$2.25. The congregations of the three places were satisfactory as to numbers and attention. The appointment at *Manilla* was not fulfilled, at the request of Mr. McGregor and friends; and that of Tuesday, at Rugby, failed because of trains behind time and connections missed. But on Wednesday and Thursday evenings I had good congregations in Mr. Sanderson's field, namely, at *Oro*, nine miles from Rugby, and at *Vespra*, six miles from Oro. Collection at Oro \$4. I am indebtod to Mr. Miller of Markham for the drive of nine miles on Sunday, to Mr. Day, for the drive to Altona, and to Mr. Sanderson for conveyance in his carriage about 30 miles on two days and the early morning of the third, free of all charge. On Friday evening a small congregation at *Pine Grove* listened attentively, and contributed \$25.50, of which \$16 were handed to me on account.

Hamilton occupted me twice on the Lord's Day, 19th, and we may hope that the future contribution of this vigorous and prosperous church will indicate that the services were not in vain, as affecting the interests of the College, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings were occupied in addressing Congregations at Fergus, Gurafraxa, Douglas, and Eramosa. Mr. Andrew Gerrie, Rev. Robt, Brown and Rev. M. Archer, and Mr. John Anderson each conferred gratuitous favours by driving me from place to place. The Eramosa Congregation handed me the handsome contribution of \$34.60. An early start from Fergus and three lines of railway enabled me to meet Mr. Hindley at St. Thomas on Friday afternoon, Queen's birth day, who drove me seven miles to Frome where, in the evening, I addressed the last congregation that assembled to listen to me as a deputation from the College Board. The day was my 24th from home, and the 'sermon and address the twenty-first. I received the kindest treatment throughout, and a generous hospitality from ministerial and other brethren. A very large number of young men in the aggregate have had their attention directed to the claims of our Divine Master upon His young servants in regard to the Christian Ministry. The nature of our college training and the duty of the churches to sustain this important institution have been set before the people

in the various places visited. The sum of \$84.85 was handed to me, and I hope that, before the accounts are closed, a larger sum additional will be paid in from the several places noted as to make collections, to which *Frome* should be added. Expenses \$45.

Sunday and Monday, 26th and 27th May, were spent in London, taking part in the ordination and settlement, as pastor, of Mr. R. W. Wallace, B.A. But an account of these exercises does not belong to this Report.
