The vapor in the upper regions of the air just on the point of being condensed. Why is a red sunset an indication of fine day to-morrow?

Because, although watery vapor is in the air, it is probably only on the verge of incipient condensation, and not sufficiently so on her now-and with the rebuke working to form rain clouds; and this slowly-progressive transition of vast volumes of the air through the temperature of the dew point, can only occur in serene weather at sunset and not at sunrise.

Why is a red and lowering sky at sunrise an indication of a wet day? The red and lowering appearance of the morning sky, which indicates foul weather, probably indicates such an excess of vapor eing present in the whole atmosphere that clouds are actually forming in the higher regions or upon the point of condensation which the rising sun can not disperse.
