THURSDAY, January 22, 1852.

THE House having, by several Proclamations, been prorogued until this day, then to meet for the dispatch of business:

And the Members in attendance not being sufficient to form a Quorum;

In virtue of a Commission from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to the Honorables the *Attorney General, William Swabey* and *Stephen Rice*, a copy of which is as follows:—

To our trusty and well beloved the Honorables Charles Young, William Swabey and Stephen Rice, Greeting;

WHEREAS we have by our Writs commanded our High Sheriffs to assemble the several Inhabitants, Electors of this Island of Prince Edward, for the First, Second and Third Districts of Prince County, and for the Second District of King's County, and for the Town and Royalty of Georgetown, in King's County, and thereout to cause them to choose and elect six proper and fit persons to serve us in General Assembly, to be held for our service at Charlottetown, in our said Island, in the room of the Honorable James Warburton, who has accepted the Office of Colonial Secretary; and the Honorable Joseph Pope, who has

accepted the Office of Treasurer; and Allan Fraser, Esquire, who has accepted the Office of Collector of Excise for Charlottetown; and the Honorable John Jardine, who has accepted the Office of Controller of Navigation Laws for Saint Peter's; and the Honorable Edward Whelan, who has accepted the Office of Queen's Printer; and of James Macdonald, Esquire, deceased: And whereas our said High Sheriffs have, as commanded, held the said Elections, and returned to our Secretary of our said Island, the names of six proper and fit persons duly elected and qualified to serve us in our said Assembly: *These are*, therefore, to command you, or any two of you, that you do forthwith proceed to the place where our Assembly usually meet, and then and there administer unto each and every of the said six persons who are returned as aforesaid, the Oaths appointed by Law to be by them taken; and when you shall have so administered the said Oaths, you shall send the same unto our said Secretary, certifying under your Seals, what you shall have done in the premises, together with this Writ.

Witness our trusty and well beloved Sir Alexander Bannerman, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief, in and over our said Island of Prince Edward, at Charlottetown, in the said Island this Twenty-second day of January, in the Year of our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-two, and in the Fifteenth year of Our Reign.

Mr. Speaker having then taken the Chair;

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by *Henry Palmer*, Esquire, Usher of the Black Rod:

Mr. Speaker;

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor commands the immediate attendance of this Honorable House at the Bar of the Council Chamber.

Accordingly, Mr. Speaker and the House went up to attend His Excellency.

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that when the House did attend His Excellency this day in the Council Chamber, His Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of the Legislature, of which Mr.

Speaker said he had, to prevent mistakes, obtained a copy, which was read by the Clerk, and is as followeth:—

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

I have great satisfaction in again meeting the Legislature for the Despatch of Business, at a season of the year which I trust will be more convenient for you than the one I was necessarily obliged to summon you at the opening of the last Session. After its prorogation I visited mostly all the different localities in this Island. It is almost needless for me, I hope, to express the grateful sense I entertained of the kindness I every where met with; but I wish to embrace this opportunity of acknowledging that kindness, and to say it was greatly enhanced to the Queen's Representative, by the expressions of loyalty and attachment to Her Majesty's Person and Throne, which all classes of Her subjects in this Colony seemed anxious to impress upon me. During my visit in the country, I ascertained with regret that there is a lamentable want of Education, and until lately great apathy seems to have prevailed on this most important question; while in this Town I am happy to find many benevolent individuals taking a warm interest in the rising generation, and the cause of Education. It becomes, therefore, the duty of the Legislature to put their shoulders to the wheel, and in addition to the provisions they make for the Academy in Charlottetown and District Schoolmasters, to take care that the inestimable blessings of Education be extended to every corner of this Colony. The necessity for a more efficient system is a subject which has for some time occupied the anxious attention of the Government; and a measure will soon be submitted for your consideration, which I am sure will meet with from you that impartial deliberation and favour, which its great importance demands.

Of the thirty-four Acts which you passed last Session, twenty-eight have been left to their operation; on the provisions of two of the remaining six, I have ascertained the views of Her Majesty's Government, to which I shall presently advert; but before doing so, I may acquaint you that the loan of £10,000, which you authorised the Government to borrow, was easily affected at 5 per cent., and the whole sum appropriated to the purposes for which you intended it. The 6 per cent. Warrants are called in; all Warrants under £10 are paid on demand, and I am happy to say, that no higher rate of Interest than 5 per cent. is now paid on any obligations which the Treasury has to discharge. In regard to the two Acts I have alluded to, I shall first notice the Civil List Bill of last Session: it seems there was an accidental omis-

sion in the Act, which required that the title of the Sovereign should continue in the land, and thereby render valid any legal proceedings that might arise in reference to Crown Lands; a similar clause, under similar circumstances, was introduced into the Nova Scotia Act, and I am confident you will take an early opportunity to remedy the omission, in order that the Bill may receive the Royal assent.

The other Act is the One-ninth Bill. This Act has not been confirmed, Her Majesty's Government requiring clearer proof of its necessity. My belief of its equity and justice was fortified by both branches of the Legislature, although several Honorable Gentlemen, Members of the Legislative Council, considered that unless some case arose to call for Legislative interference, it was unnecessary: such cases have arisen, and more may follow; and I cannot help thinking, that all inconvenience and difficulty arising from uncertainty, might have been obviated, had the Legislature, on passing so important a Bill as one to regulate the Currency, also defined by Statute the just and equitable provisions, so necessary on such an occasion, for all the existing contracts and obligations according to the established practice, custom and usage of the Colony; in other words, that "parties should in future pay and receive at the rate at which they had before paid and received," without subjecting their contracts and obligations to the interpretation of the Courts of Law. It shall be my duty to endeavour to afford proof to Her Majesty's Government, of the necessity for legislation on the principle which I have just enunciated, and which induced me to give my assent to the Bill in question.

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The state of the Revenue, notwithstanding that you made wise reductions of duties last Session on some articles of general consumption, you will, I think, have reason to be satisfied with. The amount for the year would have been larger, had it not been for the unusually early winter, which has frozen up and prevented several vessels from reaching the Island, laden with cargoes subject to revenue duties.

The Estimates will soon be laid before you, and I doubt not you will readily vote the necessary Supplies for the Public Service. By a wholesome control over the expenditure, and keeping it always within the amount of the revenue, you will soon increase the credit of the Colony, enable its Government to carry on a better system of Finance than has hitherto prevailed, which cannot but prove to be acceptable and advantageous to the community at large.

Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

A Bill for the Recovery of Small Debts will be submitted for your consideration.

I shall not farther trespass on your time at present than by directing your attention to a question which has become of great importance to Prince Edward Island. In 1849 its Legislature passed an Act for reciprocal free Trade with the United States, in certain enumerated articles. That Act has remained a dead letter, and we have no right to complain of the policy which may prompt the United States' Government to adopt such legislation as they may think most conducive to the interests of the citizens of that great Republic, with whom, I trust, we shall always continue on terms of amity and friendship. But while concessions are sought for, advantageous to the United States, we have a right to expect, before they are granted, to be met in a corresponding spirit of reciprocal advantage. And I am induced to express that opinion, because I observe, during the same Session of 1849, the Legislature of this Colony agreed to a joint Address to Her Majesty, apparently unconditionally, praying for the abrogation of the Treaty of 1818, which prohibits others than British Subjects from prosecuting the Fisheries at a less distance from the Shore than three miles, the construction put upon that Treaty being, that the distance shall be computed from the head lands. The Address to which I have alluded was very graciously received by Her Majesty, and was to meet from her Government with that earnest consideration which so important a subject demanded. But no further correspondence seems to have taken place with my Predecessor. The importance of the Fishery, and the magnitude of the United States' fleet of Fishermen may be estimated, when I inform you that upwards of two hundred sail were at one time in one of our harbours in the autumn, and no fewer than seventy-two of their vessels were cast ashore, or were more or less damaged on the Shores of this Island during the disastrous gale at the beginning of October last. I have, therefore, considered it to be my duty, with the advice of the Executive Council, to renew the correspondence with Her Majesty's Government on the Fishery question. Negotiations, I am informed, are now pending, which, I trust, will terminate to the mutual advantage of both Countries. But if no concessions can be granted by the United States, I hope you will direct your energies to induce British Capitalists to prosecute that important branch of trade and industry, and afford every facility to erect fishing stations along the shores of this Island.

With the blessing of God, I trust that your endeavours to promote the welfare and prosperity of the Colony, and the happiness of the People, may meet with success.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed, to provide Stationery for the use of the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Whelan*, Mr. *Mooney* and Mr. *Clark* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed, to receive Tenders for the Printing of the Journals of this House, for the present Session, and to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*, Mr. *Davies* and Mr. *Laird* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of six Members be appointed, to keep up a Good Correspondence between the two branches of the Legislature, and to report their proceedings from time to time, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*, Mr. *Clark*, Hon. Mr. *Coles*, Mr. *Wightman*, Mr. *Palmer* and Mr. *Thornton* do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated by Message, to the Legislative Council.

Ordered, That the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer* do carry the said Message to the Council.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to examine Bills to be engrossed, or that have been engrossed.

Ordered, That Mr. *Fraser*, Mr. *Flynn*, Mr. *Beaton*, Mr. *Thornton*, Mr. *Wightman*, Mr. *Yeo* and Mr. *Haviland* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, with leave to report from time by Bills or otherwise.

Ordered, That Mr. *Clark*, Mr. *Beaton*, Mr. *Haviland*, Mr. *Thornton* and the Hon. Mr. *Whelan* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to examine and report on the Public Accounts, with power to send for persons, papers and records.

Ordered, That Mr. *Fraser*, Mr. *Thornton*, Mr. *Clark*, Mr. *Davies*, Mr. *Beaton*, Mr. *Flynn* and Mr. *Haviland* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of seven Members be appointed, to prepare and report, with all convenient speed, the draft of an Address, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered this day to both Houses of the Legislature.

Ordered, That Mr. *Clark*, Mr. *Fraser*, Mr. *Davies*, Mr. *Laird*, Mr. *Mooney*, Mr. *Thornton* and Mr. *Beaton* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to revise the Journal of each day, after the adjournment.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Whelan*, Mr. *Flynn*, Hon. Mr. *Jardine*, Mr. *Davies* and Mr. *Thornton* do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That a copy of the Journal of the House be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, each day, as soon as may be, after the adjournment.

Resolved, That a Committee of three Members be appointed, to whom shall be referred every private Bill, to report thereon.

Ordered, That Mr. *Fraser*, Mr. *Haviland* and Mr. *Thornton* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That a Committee of five Members be appointed, to enquire into the mode most advisable to be adopted with reference to the more concise and expeditious reporting and publishing of the Debates of the House, and to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Coles*, Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*, Mr. *Thornton*, Mr. *Palmer* and Mr. *Wightman*, do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That the Postage on all Letters and printed Papers to and from Members of the House, during the present Session, shall be charged to the Contingencies of the House, and that the Post Master General

be requested to keep an Account thereof, to be furnished to the House at the close of the Session.

Resolved, That no petition praying aid for Roads, Bridges and Wharfs, or for any object of a local or private nature, be received after Friday, the Twentieth day of February next.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be inserted in each of the Newspapers published in Charlottetown.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Ten o'clock.

MR. CLARK from the Special Committee appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, with power to report from time to time, by Bills or otherwise, presented to the House the First Report of the said Committee, which Report was again read at the Clerk's Table, and is as followeth:—

The Committee appointed to examine and report what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, submit :

That the Act, 8 Geo. 4, cap. 7, intituled "An Act to continue and amend an Act passed in the Fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled 'An Act to regulate the Sale of the interest of Leaseholders when taken in execution,'" will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 59 Geo. 3, cap. 7, intituled "An Act to regulate the Sale of the interest of Leaseholders when taken in execution," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 5 Geo. 4, cap. 12, intituled "An Act to regulate the Fisheries of this Island," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 3 Will. 4, cap. 23, intituled "An Act to empower the Administrator of the Government to shut up such Roads, or parts of Roads, as are no longer required," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 3 Vic., cap. 12, intituled "An Act to regulate the Floating of Logs, Scantling, Deals, and other kinds of Wood, down the Rivers and lesser Streams in this

Island," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 6 Vic., cap. 9, intituled "An Act to amend the Act regulating the Floating of Logs, Scantling, Deals and other kinds of Wood, down the Rivers and lesser Streams in this Island, and for other purposes therein mentioned," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 5 Vic., cap. 14, intituled "An Act to regulate the Letting of Stalls in Charlottetown Market House, and for other purposes therein mentioned," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 10 Vic., cap. 16, intituled "An Act to revive, continue and add to the Act relating to the Charlottetown Market House," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 6 Vic., cap. 20, intituled "An Act relating to Landlord and Tenant," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 9 Vic., cap. 3, intituled "An Act to consolidate and amend the several Acts relating to Dogs, and the Taxation thereon," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 9 Vic., cap. 22, intituled "An Act to facilitate the intercourse between this Island and the Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 9 Vic., cap. 27, intituled "An Act to make provision for the regulation of Seamen shipped on board of any Ship or Vessel owned in or belonging to

Prince Edward Island, while such Ship or Vessel shall be within the precincts of the said Island," will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 10 Vic., cap. 9, intituled "An Act for the encouragement of Education," will expire on the First day of May next.

That the Act, 10 Vic., cap. 14, intituled "An Act to alter and amend an Act made and passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend an Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown,' will expire on the last day of the present Session.

That the Act, 12 Vic., cap. 10, intituled "An Act for raising a Revenue," will expire on the First day of May next.

That the Act, 14 Vic., cap. 9, intituled "An Act for raising a Revenue," will expire on the First day of May next.

That the Annual Grant of Five hundred Pounds, during three years, to the Royal Agricultural Society, by the Act, 12 Vic., cap. 22, sect. 15, has now ceased.

Ordered, That the said Report be committed to a Committee of the whole House to-morrow.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

Mr. *Clark* from the Special Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the present Session, reported the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee—and he read the same in his place, and afterwards delivered it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read.

Ordered, That the said draft Address be committed to a Committee of the whole House to-morrow.

The Hon. *Colonial Treasurer* from the Committee appointed to receive Tenders for the Printing of the Journals of the House, for the present Session, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:

Your Committee who were appointed to receive Tenders for the Printing of the Journals for the present Session, have to report, that they have received Tenders as follows:

One from John J. Pippy, engaging to perform the work for the sum of Thirty-five Shillings and Six-pence per sheet, and Four Shillings for Binding and Stitching per copy; and One Shilling per copy for Stitching only.

Secondly—One from James J. Rice, at the rate of Twenty-nine Shillings. Three Shillings and Nine-pence per copy, additional, for Binding, and Nine-pence for Stitching, only.

Thirdly—One from John Ings, on the following terms: Twenty-four Shillings and Three-pence per sheet. Three Shillings and Four-pence for Binding each copy; and One Shilling and Three-pence per copy, for Stitching, only—which being the lowest Tender, your Committee recommend the House to adopt.

Ordered, That in the customary Contract and Bond to be entered into by the Printer for the due performance of the work, of Printing and Binding the Journal of the House, it shall be stipulated that One hundred and sixty copies of the Journal—being ten extra—shall be completed and delivered to the care of the Librarian, on or before the First day of August next; of which number, ten copies shall be placed at the disposal of Mr. Speaker, and the residue distributed as ordered by the House in the Session of 1850—the contractor to be paid an extra proportionate rate of One Shilling and Six-pence per sheet, for the additional ten copies, being Twenty-five Shillings and nine-pence per sheet for the whole issue.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Ten o'clock.

SATURDAY, January 24, 1852.

MR. SPEAKER called the attention of the House to a circumstance which had been brought to his notice, and which might be held to involve a breach of the privileges of the House, viz.: That the Clerk Assistant had, on the first day of the present Session, been served with a summons, issued by the Clerk of the Court of Commissioners for the recovery of Small Debts, in Charlottetown, to appear before that Court on the 3rd day of February next, to answer in an action for an alleged debt; and, thereupon, it was

Resolved, That this House cannot consistently with its privileges, and a due regard to the Public interests, dispense with the attendance of any of its Officers, during the sittings thereof; and, therefore, that the said Clerk Assistant be not permitted to obey the Summons aforesaid, until the first Court day after the termination of the Session.

Ordered, That the Chief Clerk of the House do communicate the above Resolution to the said Court of Commissioners.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee, to take into consideration the draft Address, reported from the Special Committee, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses at the opening of the Session, being read—

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Flynn took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed Chair.

And the Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House,

to take into further consideration the draft Address reported from the Special Committee, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to both Houses, at the opening of the Session.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Flynn took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Flynn reported, that the Committee had gone through the Address, paragraph by paragraph, and had adopted the same, without making any amendment thereto, and the said Address being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

To His Excellency SIR ALEXANDER BANNERMAN, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

May it please your Excellency;

We Her Majesty's faithful subjects, the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, respectfully tender to your Excellency our thanks for your Speech at the opening of the present Session, and desire at the same time to convey our acknowledgments to your Excellency, for having called the Legislature together at a season of the year more convenient to us than that at which your Excellency was necessarily obliged to summon us at the opening of the last Session.

It affords us sincere gratification to learn that your Excellency's visit to the different localities of this Island, after the prorogation of the last Session, was characterised by great kindness towards your Excellency on the part of the Inhabitants of the Colony, and by the expressions of loyalty and attachment to Her Majesty's person and throne, which all classes of Her subjects in this Island seemed anxious to impress upon you.

It is the sincere regret of the House of Assembly, that the inestimable blessings of Education are not more widely diffused throughout this Island, and the necessity for a more efficient system has long been apparent to us. We are glad, therefore, to learn

that this subject has occupied the anxious attention of your Excellency's Government; and we beg to assure you, that any measure submitted to us in relation to it shall receive at our hands that impartial and serious deliberation which its great importance demands.

We are gratified to learn that the Loan of £10,000, which the Legislature, last year, authorised the Government to borrow, has been easily effected at 5 per cent., and that all obligations which the Treasury has now to discharge are subject to no higher rate of Interest than 5 per cent.—thus effecting an important saving to the Colony.

The accidental omission of a clause in the Civil List Bill of last year, to provide for the continuance of the Sovereign's title in the Crown Lands of this Colony, shall receive our earliest attention, in order that so important a measure may receive the Royal allowance.

We regret to learn that Her Majesty's Government have not yet seen the necessity of leaving the One-ninth Bill to its operation, inasmuch as further cases have since arisen calling for Legislative interference on the subject of that Bill, and clearly demonstrating the equity and utility of the principle it sought to establish. The inconvenience and difficulty arising from that uncertainty, which cannot fail to be felt in the absence of such a Bill as the One-ninth, might, indeed, have been obviated, had the other Branch of the Legislature, on passing so important a Bill as one to regulate the Currency, also defined, by Statute, the just and equitable provisions so necessary on such an occasion for all the existing contracts and obligations according to the established practice, custom and usage of the Colony, as the House of Assembly were anxious they should do, when the Currency Bill passed this Branch of the Legislature in 1849. The assurance that your Excellency will afford to Her Majesty's Government proof of the necessity for legislating on the principle of the One-ninth Bill, is to us a gratifying guarantee of your Excellency's desire to promote the interests of the Inhabitants of this Colony, and we confidently anticipate that such proof will be the means of the Royal allowance being yet extended to the Bill.

When the Public Accounts shall be laid before us, we make no doubt that the state of the Revenue will afford us much satisfaction, and this satisfaction would, we are sure, have been greatly enhanced, had it not been for the unusually early setting in of the Winter, and closing of the navigation, by which several vessels, laden with dutiable cargoes, were prevented from reaching their places of destination in this Island.

We will cheerfully make suitable provision for the maintenance of the Public Service; and, in doing so, it will be our earnest endeavour to keep the expendi-

ture within the limits of the Public Revenue, so that the Government may be enabled to place its financial operations on a firmer basis than that which has hitherto prevailed.

Our best attention will be given to the consideration of any Bill which your Excellency's Government may submit, having a tendency to improve the operation of the Courts for the recovery of Small Debts.

Fully sensible of the immense advantages which would result to this Colony from Reciprocal Trade with the United States, we feel grateful for the interest which your Excellency evinces on that subject; and we are rejoiced to learn that the correspondence has been renewed, under your Excellency's administration, with Her Majesty's Government, in Britain, with the view of abrogating the Treaty of 1818, which prohibits others than British subjects from prosecuting the Fisheries of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, at a less distance from the Shore than three miles, in order that the citizens of the United States, who are fully alive to the value and importance of our Fisheries, may enjoy the unchecked privilege of prosecuting, in common with our own people, that great branch of trade and industry. But whilst thus desirous of strengthening the bonds of amity and friendship between Her Majesty's subjects in this Island and the citizens of the United States, we have a right to expect concessions from the Government of that Country, in respect to a removal of restrictions upon Trade between this Colony and the United States, fully equivalent to the advantages we are disposed to surrender. But should the policy of the American Government be opposed to the granting of any such concessions, and our just and reasonable expectations left unsatisfied, it will then become our duty—and one which we shall labour zealously to discharge—to invite British capital and enterprise to our shores, and to afford them every encouragement and protection in our power, for the purpose of turning to account that immense source of wealth and prosperity which lie hidden in the waters that encircle our young Colony.

In conclusion, we beg to join with your Excellency in the hope, that the blessing of God will attend our joint endeavour to promote the welfare and prosperity of this Colony, and the happiness of its people.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Resolved, That the said Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the whole House.

Ordered, That a Committee be appointed to wait on His Excellency, to know his pleasure when he will be attended by the House, with the Address.

Ordered, That Mr. Clark, Mr. Davies, Mr. Mooney, Mr. Thornton and Mr. Douse do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Whelan have leave to introduce a Bill to regulate the Sale of Arsenic.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time, and ordered to read a second time on Monday next.

Mr. Thornton, in his place, presented to the House the Impost and Light Duty Accounts for the District of Three Rivers, for the past year.

Ordered, That the said Accounts be referred to the Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts.

Then the House adjourned until Monday next, at Ten o'clock.

MONDAY, January 26, 1852.

MR. CLARK from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to know his pleasure when he will be attended by the House with their Address, in answer to the Speech of His Excellency at the opening of the Session, reported, that His Excellency had been pleased to appoint to-morrow, at One o'clock, to receive the House in the Legislative Library.

The Order of the Day, for the House in Committee, on the Report of the Special Committee, appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, being read;

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. Jardine took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed Chair.

And the Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and bring in Bills pursuant to the above reported Resolutions.

Ordered, That Mr. Clark, Mr. Fraser, Mr. Pabner, Mr. Haviland, Mr. Davies, Mr. Flynn and the Hon. Mr. Jardine do compose the said Committee.

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Ten o'clock.

TUESDAY, January 27, 1852.

A PETITION of Martin Byrne, a Candidate at the late Election for the Town and Royalty of Georgetown, was presented to the House, by Mr. Fraser, and the same was received and read, complaining of an undue election and return for the said Town and Royalty, and praying, for reasons therein set forth, that the House will either cause the return to the Writ of election to be so amended, that Petitioner shall take his seat in place of the present sitting Member, Roderick Macaulay, Esquire, or that the Return may be altogether set aside, and a new Writ of Election issued.

Mr. Speaker having acquainted the House, that the said Petition was accompanied by a Bond conformably with the Act, 11 Vic., cap. 17, relating to the manner of proceeding upon controverted Elections,

Ordered, That the said Petition do lie on the Table.

Resolved, That the House will on Thursday next take into consideration the said Petition.

The Hour appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to receive the Address of the House in answer to His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session, having arrived, the House went up; and being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that the House had attended upon His Excellency, and presented their Address; to which His Excellency had been pleased to make the following reply:—

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly;

I thank you for this Address, and feel gratified that you concur with me, generally, in the views which I

considered it necessary to submit for your consideration, at the opening of the Session, on topics of great public importance. It will, I assure you, be no less my inclination, than it is my duty, cordially to co-operate with you in bringing to a favourable termination, such measures as may tend to promote the prosperity of the Colony, and the happiness of all classes.

A Petition of divers inhabitants of Township 48, was presented to the House, by Mr. Mooney, and the same was received and read, setting forth the necessity of the establishment of a more comprehensive system of Education, which may secure to all the youth of the Island, the benefits of a practical English education, through the instrumentality of Free Schools, to the support of which all should be bound to contribute; and which would provide a more adequate and permanent support for Teachers: and praying that by a further Assessment on Land, Property, Income, or in any other way deemed most expedient, means may be provided to carry such object into effect.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to the Special Committee appointed in the last Session, to enquire into the expediency of making Education free throughout the Island, and to report thereon, this Session.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

The Hon. the Colonial Secretary, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, presented to the House the following Extract of a Despatch from the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, to His Excellency, and which was read by the Clerk, as follows:

DOWNING STREET,
August 20, 1851.

SIR ;

1. The Civil List Bill now before me, requires amendment.

2. The maintenance of the right of the Crown over the soil itself, is essential, if it were only for the purpose of the various legal proceedings which it may be necessary to take, in reference to such land; nor do I understand in what manner the Legislature proposed to supply the deficiency.

3. Although sensible, some inconvenience may not improbably arise from this Act remaining in force for the time, in its present shape, yet I should be unwilling to advise Her Majesty to disallow a Legislative measure, which, as I readily admit, appears to fulfil all the essential conditions on which the Crown was prepared to surrender these Revenues.

4. I, therefore, postpone submitting it to Her Majesty, for Her decision upon it, until the Legislature shall have had an opportunity of considering the propriety of making the amendments I have now suggested; you will, however, understand, that it cannot be allowed to remain in force, in its present shape.

Ordered, That the said Bill be engrossed, and that the Title be, "An Act to further continue an Act relating to Landlord and Tenant."

The Hon. Mr. *Coles* laid on the Table of the House a volume of Thomson's Essay on Magna Charta—a donation to the Legislative Library from C. Birch Bagster, Esq., late of this Island, and now of London. Mr. *Coles* likewise intimated, that he was advised by Mr. Bagster of a further gift left by him to be transmitted to the House, being a *fac simile* of Magna Charta in a gilt frame.

Ordered, That the Clerk do write to Mr. Bagster, thanking him for his acceptable donation.

A Petition of James Gillanders was presented to the House by Mr. *Clark*, and the same was received and read, praying remuneration for his services as a licensed Teacher at Lot 28, for a short period of the year.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to the Committee appointed to examine

and report on every Petition praying compensation to Teachers.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

Two Petitions were presented to the House, and the same were received and read, viz. :

By the Hon. *Colonial Secretary*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Township Eleven, praying for the establishment of a system of free Education, by a further Assessment on Land, Property, Income, or any other mode deemed most advisable.

By Mr. *Fraser*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Oyster Cove, and Indian River Settlements, praying for a like object.

Ordered, That the two foregoing Petitions be referred to the Committee appointed in the last Session, to inquire into the expediency of making Education free throughout the Island, and to report thereon this Session.

The Hon. *Colonial Secretary* presented to the House the Impost Accounts for the District of Orwell Bay, for the Quarter ended December 31, 1851.

Ordered, That the said Accounts be referred to the Committee appointed to examine and report on the Public Accounts.

The Hon. Mr. *Coles* from the Committee appointed to enquire into the mode most advisable to be adopted with reference to the more concise and expeditious reporting and publishing of the Debates, and to report thereon to the House, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which was again read at the Clerk's Table, as followeth :

Your Committee having heard Mr. Irving, on the subject of his duties, as Reporter to the House, are of opinion, that Mr. Irving cannot, without some assistance, fully report the debates of the House, and your Committee, therefore, recommend that an Assistant Reporter be engaged by the House.

A motion being made that the Report of the Committee be agreed to—

The Hon. Mr. *Coles* from the Committee appointed to join the Committee of the Council, to prepare an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, praying that she will cause to be removed the restrictions of the Treaty of 1818, with the Government of the United States, on certain conditions, presented to the House the draft of an Address as prepared by the Joint Committee, and the said Joint Address being again read at the Clerk's Table, was, on the question being put thereon, unanimously agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY;

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, humbly beg leave to renew our assurances of devoted loyalty and attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government; and we beg again to approach the foot of the Throne, on the subject of our Joint Address, for-

warded to Great Britain so long ago as the Year 1819, praying for an abrogation or relaxation of the Treaty of 1818, with the United States' Government, as concerns the Fisheries surrounding this Island. This Address, as we were informed by your Majesty's Colonial Minister, was most graciously received by your Majesty, and, we were told, would receive the earnest consideration of your Majesty's Government.

We beg to state, that this subject becomes of daily increasing moment.

Your Majesty's Representative, the Lieutenant Governor of this Island, in the late Fishing season, had the opportunity of personally witnessing hundreds of Fishing Vessels belonging to the United States, fishing on our Shores, and frequenting our Harbours, in direct contravention of the Treaty of 1818.

His Excellency has not the means of preventing an intrusion so detrimental to our best interests—the single Ship of War of your Majesty's fleet, usually employed in this duty, being inadequate to the extensive service required of her.

The Citizens of the United States have an advantage over the subjects of your Majesty in this Island, which prevents all successful competition, as our own Fish, caught on our own Shores by strangers, are carried into their Ports by themselves, whereas we are excluded by high protective duties.

The Legislature of this Island passed an Act in the Twelfth Year of your Majesty's Reign, which offered to reciprocate with the United States in the interchange of certain enumerated articles; notwithstanding which offers, our Fish and Agricultural Produce, for which latter there is an extensive demand in the Northern States of the American Union, remain subject to high duties.

And although the British Navigation Laws have been so relaxed, that Foreign built Vessels, owned by British subjects, may obtain British Registries, a concession from which the Citizens of the United States have very recently derived great advantages, by the Sale of their Vessels, stranded on the Shores of this Island, during the disastrous Gale of last Autumn, no reciprocal advantage is offered to us, which, if obtained, would be of immense importance to the builders of Ships and Fishing Vessels in this Island.

Your Majesty's subjects are desirous to continue to cultivate the good-will of the Citizens of the United States, by every reasonable concession, and with a due consideration of the value of the intercourse, which, on a basis of reciprocal advantage, might be established. They presume that the immense importance to the United States of an uninterrupted right of Fishing on the Shores of this Island, as a basis of Treaty, ought to ensure for them valuable concessions; and if this be not possible, that the Fisheries out to be

scrupulously maintained in the spirit of the Treaty of 1818.

We most humbly pray, that your Majesty will be most graciously pleased to take the premises into your favorable consideration, and cause to be removed the Restrictions of the Treaty of 1818, prohibiting American Citizens from fishing within certain prescribed limits on the Shores of this Island, provided the American Government admit Articles, the growth or production of this Island, into the United States, duty free, in accordance with the Act of the General Assembly of this Island, passed in the 12th Year of your Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to authorize Free Trade with the United States of America, in certain enumerated Articles, including Fish, also Vessels built on this Island to American Registry."

And as in duty bound, we shall ever pray.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Resolved, That a Committee of this House be appointed, to join a Committee of the Council, to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the Joint Address of both Houses to Her Majesty, praying for the removal of the restrictions of the Treaty of 1818, with the Government of the United States, on certain conditions.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address to Her Majesty, be a Committee on the part of this House, to prepare the said Address to His Excellency.

Ordered, That the foregoing Resolution be communicated by Message to the Council.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Coles do carry the said Message.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

Resolved, That the House will to-morrow resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration the subject matter of the above Documents laid before the House, relative to the leasing of the Charlottetown Ferry.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Coles*, Mr. *Montgomery* and the Hon. *Colonial Secretary* be a Committee for that purpose.

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Two Petitions were presented to the House, and the same were severally received and read, viz. :

By the Hon. *Colonial Secretary*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of the First Electoral District of Prince County, setting forth, the necessity of an improved system of Education, based upon the principle of affording to all a Free Education, and praying for the adoption of certain measures for the encouragement and support thereof

By the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Tryon, setting forth, that this Island is not in a condition, in a pecuniary point of view, and otherwise,

to warrant the establishment of Free Schools, and praying that no extra tax may be imposed for the support of Education.

Ordered, That the two last preceding Petitions be referred to the Committee of the whole House on the consideration of the Report of the Special Committee appointed to enquire into the expediency of making Education free throughout the Island, and to report thereon.

Six Petitions were presented to the House, and the same were severally received and read, viz. :

By the Hon. *Colonial Secretary*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Townships 11 and 12.

By the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of a Settlement back of Tryon—both praying aid to improve their Road communications.

By the Hon. Mr. *Whelan*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Launching Place, and its vicinity, praying a grant to extend the Wharf at the aforesaid place.

By the Hon. Mr. *Coles*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Covehead Road, Township 34, praying a grant to repair a Road.

By Mr. *Mooney*—A Petition of Alexander Macdonald and Martin Power, Township 48, praying for a grant of Seven Pounds Ten Shillings, appropriated in the Session of 1848 towards opening a Road, on condition of the right of way being conceded—and which has since been obtained.

A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Township 31, praying a grant to build a Bridge in the Bannockburn Settlement.

Ordered, That the Six last preceding Petitions do lie on the Table.

Two Petitions were presented to the House, and the same were severally received and read, viz. :

By Mr. *Davies*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Pisquid Road, and head of Vernon River, praying a grant to effect an alteration in the Pisquid Road, by running a

straight line so as to cut off the windings thereon—accompanied by a plan.

By the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Wilmot Creek Settlement, praying for the opening of a Road.

Ordered, That the two last preceding Petitions be referred to the Committee appointed to report on all Petitions relative to the opening of new lines of Roads—to examine the same and report thereon.

Mr. *Fraser* from the Special Committee appointed to report on every Private Bill, and to whom was referred the Bill to Incorporate the People called Bible Christians, to examine the same, and report thereon, presented to the House the fourth Report of the said Committee, which being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :

Your Committee appointed to report on Private Bills, having examined the Bill to Incorporate, in Prince Edward Island, the People called Bible Christians, submit—that the said Bill comes within the meaning of those deemed of a Private nature; but inasmuch as the fees upon similar Bills have not hitherto been strictly exacted by the House, your Committee recommend that the said Bill be exempt from such Fees.

The Bill to Incorporate, in Prince Edward Island, the people called Bible Christians, was then read a second time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Clark* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. *Clark* reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill without making any amendment thereto; and the Report was again read at the Clerk's Table.

Ordered, That the said Bill be engrossed, and that the Title be, "An Act to Incorporate, in Prince Edward Island, the People called Bible Christians."

The Hon. Mr. Coles, in his place, presented to the House the Second Report of the Visitor of Schools for King's County, for the past year, and, thereupon, it was

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, to whom shall be referred the different Reports of the several Visitors of Schools, for the past year, to examine the same, in order to report how much of the said Documents it is expedient to recommend to the House to publish, as an Appendix to the Journals.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Coles, Mr. Thornton, Mr. Fraser, Hon. Mr. Jardine, and Mr. Davies do compose the said Committee.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee on consideration of the Report of the Special Committee appointed to examine and report on the management and system of Sale of Crown Lands, being read,

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Mooney took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

A Message from the Council by Mr. DesBrisay:

Mr. Speaker;

The Legislative Council have passed a Bill intituled "An Act to provide for the care and maintenance of Idiots, Lunatics and persons of unsound mind," to which they desire the concurrence of the House of Assembly.

And then he withdrew.

And then the said Bill was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Ordered, That the Order for engrossing the Bill relating to the recovery of Small

Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned, be discharged, and that the said Bill be re-committed to a Committee of the whole House, for the purpose of amending the same.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Clark took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Clark reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill and made several amendments thereto; which amendments were again read at the Clerk's Table, and agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the said Bill, as amended, be engrossed, and that the Title be "An Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned."

Three Petitions were presented to the House, and the same were severally received and read, viz.:

By Mr. Mooney—A Petition of divers Inhabitants of St. Peter's Road, Township 36.

A Petition of divers Inhabitants of North side of Elliot River Settlement, Township 31,—both praying aid to repair Roads.

A Petition of divers Inhabitants of York River and Anderson's Road Settlement, praying a grant in aid of individual subscription, to build a Bridge over the York River, at or near the site of the old Bridge.

Ordered, That the Three last preceding Petitions do lie on the Table.

A Petition of James Flynn, Teacher, Monaghan Settlement, Township 36, was presented to the House by Mr. Mooney, and the same was received and read, praying an allowance for his services as such.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to the Committee appointed to report on all Petitions praying compensation

to Teachers, not entitled by Law to the Public allowance, to examine the same and report thereon.

A Petition of divers Inhabitants of Cape Traverse and Seven Mile Bay, was presented to the House by the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*, and the same was received and read, praying for the establishment of Free Education.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to the Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the Report of the Special Committee appointed to enquire into the expediency of making Education free throughout the Island, and to report thereon.

A Petition of divers Inhabitants of North Lake Settlement, and others of Township 47, East Point, praying for an enactment for the protection of the Gaspereaux Fishery in the said Lake.

Ordered, That the said Petition be referred to a Special Committee, to examine the same and report thereon, by Bill or otherwise; and that it be an instruction to the Committee to consider and report in like manner, on the expediency of protecting the Salmon fishery likewise.

Ordered, That Mr. *Beaton*, Mr. *Thornton*, Mr. *Fraser*, Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*, Mr. *Laird*, Mr. *Clark* and Mr. *Yeo* do compose the said Committee.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the Report of the Special Committee appointed to enquire into the expediency of making Education free throughout the Island, and to report thereon.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Haviland* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. *Haviland* reported, that the Committee had gone through the Report of the

Special Committee, without making any amendment thereto; and the Report was again read at the Clerk's Table, and is as follows :

Your Committee appointed, last Session, to enquire into the expediency of establishing a system of Free Education throughout the Island, have to report—that they find the present system of Education, although liberally supported by Legislative grants in aid of the salaries of Teachers, does not stimulate the inhabitants to that increased solicitude, and consequent efforts to educate their children, a measure which is of such vital importance to the well-being of every country, and particularly so to the inhabitants of this Colony.

Your Committee find, that during a series of years, different modes have been adopted to encourage good and efficient Teachers to locate themselves in the several Districts, but they are of opinion that unless School Masters' salaries are wholly paid by the Government, and a system of Free Education established, many settlements will not be able to reap the benefits of Education for the rising generation, under the present system; for they find that in the year 1844 there were 126 Public Seminaries imparting instruction to 5,040 pupils, while, in 1850, there were only 130 Schools, including Primary and Infant Schools, and 4,547 pupils; shewing a decrease of pupils, while during that period, the increase of children, under 16 years of age, was about 7,000; although the Legislative allowance had been increased from the year 1843 to 1850, from £1,349 18s. to £2,068 7s. 1½d.; but as the present law allows two-thirds of the Districts to assess the remainder for the support of the Teacher, in addition to the public grant, litigation in many instances, has been the result; and in many cases parties have paid the assessment and kept their children at home, and frequently many are summoned to the Small Debt Court for the amount assessed,—Your Committee likewise find, that on an average, there ought to be from 8,000 to 10,000 children attending School, yet it is lamentable to reflect, that not more than half that number are receiving regular instruction.

In view of the foregoing data, your Committee would, therefore, recommend that a Bill be passed, providing means to establish Schools on the free system throughout the Island, and that a tax of one half-penny per acre, be imposed on all Lands in addition to the present Land Assessment, and eight-pence each on the pasture Lots in Georgetown Royalty; and 2s. each on Pasture Lots in Charlottetown and Royalty; and that a rateable tax be assessed on all property in Charlottetown, and Common, and Georgetown, as well as on all Shops, Dwelling Houses, &c., throughout the Island, where there is not a certain

number of acres of Land attached thereto, and the remainder to be taken out of the General Revenue of the Island; that one Visitor be appointed to superintend the Schools, who shall not have any other occupation; and that one Member be added to the Board of Education from Prince and King's Counties; and that an extra allowance be given to Masters of the higher class, for every Pupil whom the School Visitor will certify has been taught, not exceeding Ten Shillings per Scholar, until his salary amounts to £60 per annum; and encouragement be given to Female Teachers for such Districts as would prefer them.

Your Committee have examined 50 Petitions in favour of the free system, bearing upwards of 1,700 signatures; two conditional, signed by 139 individuals; and three against the scheme with 200 signatures—all presented to the House in the present Session; and, although some of those in favour, differ in the detail, yet all approve of the Free system. With reference to the few against it, the parties seem to be under an impression, that a tax of Twenty or Thirty Shillings per 100 acres, would be levied to meet the expense; and should that be the case, they would prefer the present system; but your Committee are satisfied that when they are made aware that it is not contemplated to tax the land to a higher amount than Four Shillings and Two-pence per hundred acres, in addition to the present land tax, scarcely an individual will be found to oppose the principle.

A motion being made that the Report of the Committee be agreed to,

Mr. *Mooney* moved, in amendment, that after the word "that," all be struck out, and the following substituted :

"The Report be amended, so as to tax all lands that may be leased, or otherwise let by agreement, or verbally; and that the said tax be paid by the Proprietor or Proprietors of such lands, into the Treasury of this Island,—the same to be appropriated for the purpose of general Education, saving always and excepting the Tenant, who shall be free from the said tax."

The House divided on the motion of amendment.

"It be recommended to the House, to add to the amount yearly expended for the purposes of Education, a sum out of the general Revenue, from Two to Three thousand Pounds, and to raise the present Government allowance to School Masters, viz.: from Fifteen Pounds and Twenty Pounds, respectively, to Twenty-five Pounds and Thirty Pounds; and that to Female Teachers, in a rateable proportion; making it conditional on the Inhabitants of each District, and Town, and Royalty, to raise a like sum, by Assessment on land, or by any other means they may deem suitable to their circumstances—if the former, the same to be imposed according to the value thereof, by Assessors, to be chosen and appointed by the Householders of such Districts and Towns."

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of Malcolm Livingston, of Dog River, beg to Report—that they have examined Thomas B. Tremain, Esq., the late Proprietor of the Hillsborough Ferry, relative to Petitioner's claim, who stated, that a grant of £25 had been placed at the disposal of the Government towards the repair of the Protecting Block on the Ferry side, but on proceeding to examine the same, with a view of carrying out the repairs, it was found that the old Block had been so much injured by time, wear and worms, as to be utterly useless: and that he then applied to Sir Donald Campbell, the late Governor, and explained to him the state thereof, who told Mr. Tremain, that although he would not officially guarantee the expense attending the building a new one—yet knowing the necessity of it, he thought Mr. Tremain ought to go on with the work, and might depend on the Legislature for payment. Acting on the foregoing advice, he agreed with Malcolm Livingston, the Petitioner, and one Macphée, to perform the work, guaranteeing to them the before named grant of Twenty-five Pounds: at the same time assuring the contracting party, there was not doubt, that any additional sum that might be required would be supplied by the Legislature: and at the same time informed Petitioner, that he had seen Mr. Brennan, who offered to supply the timber and materials for a new Block, and take the chance of a Legislative grant for payment: and that the advances were made by Mr. Brennan, who yet remains unpaid.

Your Committee are of opinion, that the demand made by Petitioner of Ninety-eight Pounds Twelve Shillings and Three-pence is reasonable for the work performed—which has been of material service towards the purpose for which it was intended.

They, therefore, recommend that the balance due on the said Block, amounting to Seventy-three Pounds Twelve Shillings and Three-pence, be voted to the Road Correspondent, to be paid to D. Brennan, Esq., and to any other parties who may have a well founded claim for labour and materials contributed towards the erection of the said Block.

Ordered, That the said Report be referred to the Committee of Supply.

THE Hon. *Colonial Secretary*, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered the following

Message:

A. BANNERMAN, Lieut. Governor.

THE Report of Messrs. Cundall and Brecken, auditors appointed by a Committee of the Executive Council, to inspect the Books and accounts of the several Government departments, where money is received and paid on the Public Service, was laid before the Lieutenant Governor on the 19th instant.

He was happy to find, that after a minute investigation of the accounts and vouchers, they were found to be correct, and these gentlemen further certify the accuracy of the receipts and expenditure in the different Public Offices.

But among other observations, on the management of the Impost and Excise Office, the Lieutenant Governor noticed, that the Auditors remark, on two entries of dutiable articles "imported for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on which no duties were exacted; that they were not aware of any Statute exempting them, and feel it their duty to state the circumstance."

The Lieutenant Governor feels it to be his duty to state, that no demand was ever made on him for duties on the articles alluded to. He was aware, as the auditors are, that he could not have pleaded *Statute Law*; yet if such a demand had been made, he would have resisted it, and paid no more than his predecessors had done, for, as he understands, upwards of half a century.

At the same time, the Lieutenant Governor assures the Assembly, that if the Legislature considers the ex

emption alluded to, by Messrs. Cundall and Brecken an improper one for the Lieutenant Governor to possess, he shall cheerfully give his assent to any Act which will abrogate the usage which has hitherto prevailed in the Colony.

Your Committee submit, that the Lands which were sold in 1851, amounted in value to £119 0s. 7d., of which amount only £11 19s. 6d. were paid. The remaining sum of £107 1s. 1d. became due and payable, the one half on the 1st January, 1852, and the other half will be due on the 1st January, 1853. The amount of expenses attending said Sales, after being taxed was £21 17s.

Your Committee submit, that the mode in which Crown Lands are disposed of at present, seems too expensive and inconvenient, and therefore recommend, that the Crown Lands on Lot 15, be disposed of at the upset price of 4s. per acre, and that the Government be authorised to dispose of the same, on application to any of the Acadian French, for actual settlement, in tracts of fifty Acres, at such upset price: that the Lands on Township 55, and likewise the Lands in the several Towns and Royalties, be disposed of by the Registrar and Keeper of Plans, in Charlottetown, by Public Sale, at the rates hereinafter mentioned—to be paid for by three annual Instalments, the first to be paid when the Land is Sold, preference being always given to any persons who may be located on, or in the actual possession of, any such Land, to the extent of not more than 100 acres in one piece. In case the said Instalments are not regularly paid, or the whole amount thereof at the termination of the stipulated period, that then the Government shall resume such Lands, and dispose of the same at Public Sale as aforesaid; and, after deducting the balance due the Government, and the expenses attending the same, the residue, if any, to be paid over to the person who first applied for, and paid part of such purchase money.

Your Committee are of opinion, that the following is a fair upset price, and recommend that the same be adopted, without any charge for conveyance:

Folio 4, line 7, from top—Strike out the word "of."

Same folio, line 9—After the word "costs," insert the word "Shall."

Same line—Strike out the word "remaining," and insert the word "remain."

Same folio, line 10—After the word "may," insert the words "for that purpose."

Last folio, line 4, from the top—After the word "Superintendance," add the following four sections, viz. :—

"Every person who shall place, or cause to be placed, any Boom, Timber, Lumber, Wood, or other Material, in the Water or upon the Shore of the River, at or off the end of any of the Public Streets in Charlottetown, so as to obstruct in any manner free access from the said River to the said Town or Streets thereof, shall forfeit and pay to Her Majesty, for each and every offence, a Fine in any sum not exceeding Seven Pounds, in the discretion of the said Justices.

"It shall be the duty of the persons appointed to remove Nuisances and Obstructions from off the Streets, Highways and Squares within Charlottetown, its Common and Royalty, under the Thirty-sixth Section of the said Act of the Twelfth Victoria, Chapter Eleven, and they are hereby authorized and required strictly to enforce the last preceding Section of this Act within their respective Districts or Precincts, and to remove, or cause to be removed, all such Obstructions as aforesaid, and to prosecute for the Fine and Penalty aforesaid, all persons who shall or may place, or cause the same to be placed, in such situation; and any person so appointed as aforesaid, who shall fail in the due performance of the duties hereby enjoined upon him, shall forfeit and pay to Her Majesty, for each and every offence therein, a Sum or Fine not exceeding Five Pounds, in the discretion of the Court—which Fine, and also the Fine imposed in the last preceding clause of this Act, shall be recoverable in the same manner as the Fines and Penalties in other cases imposed by the said Act of the Twelfth Victoria, Chapter Eleven, are herein before made recoverable.

"Poplar Island Bridge, and the Highway from thence to Charlottetown Royalty, shall be deemed to be part of the said Royalty for all purposes of this and the several Acts of Assembly relating to the repairs of Highways, or to the removal of Nuisances therefrom, or to any Punishment or Penalties inflicted upon persons causing any Nuisance thereupon.

“ The Justices of the Peace having the direction of the performance of Statute Labor for the said Town and Royalty, shall and may appoint, revoke, displace, and as often as necessary further appoint any fit person to collect Wharfage Rates at said Bridge—whose duty it shall be to take and receive from the Owners or Masters of all Vessels moored or made fast to such Bridge, the Sum of Three Shillings per day (Sundays excepted) during the time while so moored or fastened; and to demand and receive from each and every such Owner or Master the amount of all Damage or Injury by them respectively done to the said Bridge; and in case of refusal of any such Master or Owner to pay the Wharfage Rate or Damage, then it shall be lawful for such person so to be appointed as aforesaid, to sue for and recover the same, with Costs, before any Justice of the Peace or Court of Commissioners for the recovery of Small Debts in Charlottetown, by Capias or otherwise; and the amount of such Judgment and Costs shall be levied by Warrant of Distress and Sale of the Materials of the Vessel—one half of such Rate and amount to be paid to such person so to be appointed, and the other half to the Justices of the Peace having the direction of the performance of Statute Labour, to be expended for the repairs of the said Bridge.

Ordered, That the said Bill, with the amendments, be read the third time tomorrow.

The Lieutenant Governor has to acquaint the Assembly, that the Despatch alluded to was forwarded to the Secretary of State by his immediate Predecessor, under the belief, that it would be unwise to concede Responsible Government, unless accompanied with a measure to limit the Franchise, to a closer assimilation to a right of voting exercised in the other North American Colonies, where it is confined to Freeholders alone; by limiting the County constituencies to Freehold, not less than Forty Shillings; and Leaseholders, possessing Fifty Acres, at an annual rent of Fifty Shillings, twenty years' occupation, and improvements thereon, amounting to £300 Currency; to raise the qualification of the Members of the Assembly, and to reduce their number to Nineteen. Such was the substance of the Despatch, and the Lieutenant Governor is of opinion, that laying it before the Assembly, with the proposed Law necessary to have effected such a change in the Constitution;

would not tend to aid the Assembly in the revision of the Election Law, which, he observes, is now under their consideration.

THE Lieutenant Governor sends herewith, for the information of the Assembly, Copy of a Despatch from Earl Grey, dated the 19th February, marked No. 1, Military; and also Copy of the Despatch to which it refers, No. 11, of the date 9th February, 1850, acknowledging a Despatch of date 2d January, of the same year, from the late Lieutenant Governor—of which a Copy is also herewith sent. The documents Nos. 1 and 2 referred to in the Despatch of the 2d January, 1850, were not copied, and the Lieutenant Governor has no opportunity of knowing the grounds on which the Grand Jury threw out the Bill alluded to in that Despatch. No subsequent proceedings seem to have taken place on the subject of desertion from the Army. The Lieutenant Governor observes, by the Act 50 Geo. 3, cap. 2, it was enacted, that "In order to give every encouragement to His Majesty's subjects in this Island to check a practice disgraceful in itself, and highly injurious to His Majesty's service, the sum of Five Pounds be paid out of the Revenue of this Colony, for the apprehension of every deserter, either from His Majesty's Army or Navy."

The subject is one of great importance to the Colony, and the Lieutenant Governor feels confident the Local Legislature will readily co-operate with him to remedy

the evil complained of by the Colonial Minister, and afford him every information required in His Lordship's Despatch.

their rights and interests in and to real property in this Island, before the passing of the Law referred to,—the Law having passed without their knowledge, whilst absent from the Island, and while they were unaware that they had any right or claim to property on the Island—have to report: that they cannot recommend any alteration in the Act in question, it being in force about Fifteen years, and the Committee are not aware of any complaint having been, before, made of its operation; and as the Petitioners would be excluded by the 13th Section of the above recited Act, giving Twenty years in quiet possession a good and valid title against the former owner or owners of Property residing in the British Provinces, and as the precise property claimed is not described, it may have been sold for the non-payment of the Quit Rent, or Land Assessment, and the equity of redemption expired.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Clark reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill and made several amendments thereto; which amendments were again read at the Clerk's Table, and agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the said Bill, as amended, be engrossed, and that the Title be, "An Act relating to Charlottetown Ferry, and the Wharfs connected therewith."

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Ten o'clock.

THURSDAY, March 18, 1852.

MR. DAVIES, from the Special Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of Daniel Fraser, Belfast, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

Your Committee appointed to enquire into the prayer of a Petition from Donald Fraser, of Belfast, for building a Block, and repairing the wharf at Pinette River, North Side, wherein he sets forth having taken the above job from the Commissioner, for £29 15s.; that the same was finished, according to contract,

and approved of by the Commissioner, who paid him to the amount of £15, by draft on the Road Correspondent, and refused to make good the balance, in which Petitioner conceives himself aggrieved, and prays the House to make good the balance—have to report, that it appears from a copy of Affidavit, set forth on the back of the Petition, and attested to by three persons, before C. M. Willock, Esq., J. P., that the statements therein contained are correct.

Your Committee have also examined a written statement from Samuel Murchison, the Commissioner, to the effect of having sold the job as stated by Petitioner, but afterwards having become aware of the error, in having disposed of the amount appropriated by the Legislature for the two Wharfs, on the present con-

tract, he immediately made the same known to the Contractor, who agreed to perform the job for £15, instead of the £29 15s. as let for, on the day of sale.

Your Committee have also examined an Affidavit, obtained together with the foregoing statement from the Government, attested to by two persons, who state, that a representation was made to them by the Contractor (Fraser) to the effect, that if they would not bid against him, he would take them into partnership in the job; and that they are aware several other persons were prevented from bidding under the same pretence, who were deceived by the Contractor denying them any right of a share in the job.

Your Committee beg further to report, having examined Mr. Angus McLeod, and Mr. Allan Finlayson, of Belfast, whose testimony fully confirms the greater part of the statement relative to the sale of said Wharf, made by the Commissioner. From the evidence adduced before your Committee, they are of opinion, that the said Donald Fraser has no equitable claim on this House, for any further sum, as they consider the amount paid equal to the value of the work.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to correspond with Her Majesty's Imperial Government, with the view of obtaining a Return of the amount of arrears of Quit Rents.

Ordered, That Mr. *Davies*, Mr. *Mooney* and Mr. *Laird* do compose the said Committee.

The Bill authorizing the Harbour and Ballast Masters of the various Harbours and Rivers in this Island, to superintend the laying down, erection and maintenance of the Buoys and Beacons therein, was, according to order, read a second time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Flynn* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. *Flynn* reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill, and

made an amendment thereto; which amendment was again read at the Clerk's Table, and agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the said Bill, as amended, be engrossed, and that the Title be, "An Act authorizing the Harbour and Ballast Masters of the various Harbours and Rivers in this Island, to superintend the laying down, erection and maintenance of the Buoys and Beacons therein."

Mr. *Davies*, from the Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that he will be pleased to correspond with Her Majesty's Imperial Government, with the view of obtaining a Return of the arrears of Quit Rents, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee, which Address being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

To His Excellency SIR ALEXANDER BANNERMAN, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

May it please your Excellency;

THE House of Assembly have to acknowledge the receipt of your Excellency's reply to their Address of the 15th instant, wherein your Excellency is pleased to state:—"In reply to the Address of the Assembly, requesting that a Return of the actual amount of the arrears of Quit Rents should be laid before them,—on enquiry, the Lieutenant Governor finds there is no record, or source of information from which he can obtain the Return sought for by the Assembly."

The 11th Section of an Act 43 Geo. 3, cap. 2, for repealing an Act intituled "An Act for the effectual recovery of certain of His Majesty's Quit Rents in the Island of St. John," might be held to warrant the supposition on the part of the House of Assembly, that such a source of information did exist, which Section is as follows:—

"And whereas many of the Proprietors of Land in the Island of Prince Edward are resident in Great Britain and Ireland, and cannot conveniently pay their Quit Rents in the said Island, Be it therefore enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that if any Proprietors of Lots or parts or shares of Lots of Land in the said Island, residing in Great Britain or Ireland, shall and do, on or before the first day of August next enu-

ing the passing of this Act, discharge and pay their Quit Rents in arrear, and shall pay their future Quit Rents annually and regularly in London, to the Receiver General of His Majesty's Quit Rents, or his sufficient Deputy, such Lots or parts or shares of Lots shall not be liable to be proceeded against as directed by this Act.

"Provided nevertheless, that if such Proprietors do neglect to pay their Quit Rents from time to time, for the space of Six months after the same shall become due and payable, according to their undertaking as aforesaid, the said Lots or parts or shares of Lots, shall be liable to be proceeded against as herein directed; and the Receiver General of His Majesty's Quit Rents, or his Deputy as aforesaid, shall for that purpose transmit to the proper Office in the Island of Prince Edward, within three months from and after the expiration, from time to time, of the said Six months, whenever such neglect shall happen, an account of such Proprietors, who shall so neglect their payments that the same may be made liable, and be proceeded against accordingly; and such account so transmitted as aforesaid, shall be conclusive evidence that the said Proprietors have so neglected to pay their Quit Rents, and that the said Lots or parts or shares of Lots are liable to be proceeded against as herein directed."

We respectfully submit to your Excellency's consideration the following paragraph, taken from a Report of a Committee of the whole House on the State of the Colony, 21st March, 1825, wherein it appears a Receiver General of His Majesty's Quit Rents, actually resided on the Island, and collected considerable sums of money by his authority, viz. :

"That it further appears to your Committee, by the evidence of the Acting Receiver General, that the whole Quit Rents received by him amounted to the sum of Three thousand Nine hundred and Eighty Pounds; about Four hundred Pounds of which was collected by his Deputies; in doing which, there were but few instances of actual distraint, as the parties generally settled by paying their Quit Rents, together with the Deputies' charges for travelling and other fees, and that the expenses incurred in recovering the remainder of the said Quit Rents, and paid out of the Quit Rents' Revenue, absorbed the whole of the said Three thousand Nine hundred and Eighty Pounds, excepting the sum of Six hundred and Seventy Pounds, which was handed over to the present Receiver General, out of which, there is still payable, upwards of Four hundred Pounds due, on the before mentioned proceedings."

The House of Assembly would here observe, that in the year 1829, an Address was presented by the House of that day to the then Lieutenant Governor,

to be forwarded to His late Majesty King George the Fourth, wherein His Majesty's right is fully recognized, as is shown by the following paragraph taken therefrom :

"We have learned with dismay that your Majesty has been advised to order the collection of the arrears of Quit Rents, due by this Island, from the 1st day of January, 1823.

"While we acknowledge the justice of your Majesty's claim, which we would most cheerfully discharge, did our ability correspond with our inclination, we are constrained to declare—humiliating as the confession is—that the whole circulating medium of the Colony would be inadequate to meet one fourth of this large accumulating sum.

"Under these circumstances, was your Majesty's present order enforced, the distress which must inevitably ensue, would prove most calamitous to the Colony, and involve in utter ruin a large portion of its deserving and industrious population."

To which the following reply was conveyed to the Lieutenant Governor, by Despatch, bearing date Downing Street, 1st September, 1829 :

"I have to desire you will acquaint the Legislature in reply, that as far as circumstances will permit, His Majesty's Government have every desire to comply with the prayer of the Address; I shall, therefore, be prepared to advise His Majesty to accept of a permanent grant of £1000 per annum, in lieu of any further demand on account of arrears of accruing Quit Rents; and this will be appropriated to such objects in aid of the Civil or Colonial Establishment of the Colony as may receive His Majesty's sanction; subject, however, in the first instance, to the payment of any charges which may have been heretofore imposed upon Quit Rents, for which the sum in question is a commutation."

To this Despatch the House of Assembly, on 26th April, 1830, drew up a reply, from which the following extract is respectfully submitted :

"While we acknowledge your Majesty's undoubted right to the payment of these Rents, and feel grateful for the liberality displayed in the offer to commute them, our duty to your Majesty compels us to state the reasons by which we have been actuated in not availing ourselves of the proposed commutation."

The intention of the House of Assembly in calling your Excellency's attention to the foregoing quotation, and extracts of correspondence, is, that your Excellency may see that they have not lightly or erroneously formed an opinion of the equity and magnitude of those claims without due consideration; and they respectfully request that your Excellency will be pleased to correspond with Her Majesty's Government on the subject, with a view of obtaining a Return of the actual amount of the arrears of Quit Rents.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

The amendments made by the Council to the Bill intituled "An Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned," were, according to order, read a second time.

Ordered, That the said amendments be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Wightman* took the Chair of the Committee; and after sometime spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. *Wightman* reported, that the Committee had come to a Resolution; which Resolution being again read at the Clerk's Table, was, on the question being put thereon, agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Resolved, That the First, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth and Fourteenth of the said amendments be agreed to; and that the Second, Third, Fourth and Twelfth of the said amendments be disagreed to.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to draw up reasons to be offered to the Council, at a conference, for disagreeing to certain of their amendments to the said Bill.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Coles*, the Hon. Colonial Treasurer, Mr. *Wightman* and Mr. *Clark* do compose the said Committee.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee, on the re-consideration of the

Bill, ordered to be referred back to the Committee of the whole House, to require Landlords, or Claimants of Rents, to put the Titles by which they claim, upon record, in the proper Offices of Record in this Island, with the view of adopting an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, praying the Royal leave to be given to the enactment of such a Law, being read,

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. *Jardine* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported, that the Committee had come to a Resolution, which he was directed to report to the House.

The Chairman also acquainted the House, that he was directed by the Committee to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

The Resolution reported from the Committee was then read by the Clerk, and, on the question being put thereon, was agreed to by the House, and is as follows:

Resolved, That it be recommended to the House, that the Registrar and Keeper of Plans do make a Return to the House of the several Grants of Townships in this Island, which are recorded in the Registry Office of this Colony.

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intituled "An Act for the encouragement of Education, and to raise funds for that purpose, by imposing an additional Assessment on Lands in this Island, and on Real Estate in Charlottetown and Common, and in Georgetown and Common."

An amendment was proposed by Mr. *Palmer* to be made to the Bill in clause 42, by adding at the end thereof the following: "Provided that the number of Scholars taught by such Female Teacher, shall average not less than Twenty throughout the year."

The Hon. Mr. *Coles* moved, in amendment to the said proposed amendment, that the said clause be struck out of the Bill.

The Hon. Colonial Secretary then moved, that the said Petition be referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Fraser moved, in amendment to the motion, that all after the word "Petition," be struck out, and the following substituted: "be withdrawn by the Hon. Colonial Secretary."

The House divided on the motion of amendment:

YEAS—9.

NAYS—3.

So it was carried in the affirmative.

The question being then put on the main motion, as amended, it was agreed to by the House, and

Ordered, accordingly.

Mr. Davies, from the Special Committee to whom was referred the Petition of James Peake, James Duncan, and others, Merchants and Ship-owners in Prince Edward Island, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as follows :

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of the Merchants and Ship-owners of Charlottetown, complaining of the charge made on Island Ships in passing through the Gut of Canso, have to report—that such complaint appears to well founded, and the grievance complained of, of long standing.

Your Committee also observe that the matter was brought before a Committee of the whole House, in

the Session of 1825, and a series of Resolutions passed, complaining of the unjustness of bringing Ships to anchor, in passing through the Gut of Canso, as well as of the large amount demanded, which they say is "an excessive charge, exceeding the amount of Light dues throughout the British and Irish Channels." That the foregoing representations were conveyed in an Address to the Lieutenant Governor, with instructions, requesting His Excellency to use his influence to have the matter complained of satisfactorily settled; notwithstanding which, the Island shipping still continues subject to these exactions.

Your Committee have examined Mr. Wm. Heard, Merchant, Charlottetown, and from the evidence given, find that many of our Ships have been brought to, and detained, and sails and ship's stores taken for the payment of Light dues.

Your Committee are of opinion that the amount of money collected in the Gut of Canso—amounting in the last year to over £1,500—is a sum more than sufficient to defray the charge of keeping up the Light Houses of Nova Scotia, from which our shipping can receive any benefit.

Your Committee further recommend to the House, to address His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor on the subject, conveying to him the grounds of complaint, and praying that he may be pleased to enter into a correspondence with the Government of Nova Scotia, with a view of ascertaining the amount of money the Nova Scotia Government may accept as a commutation for the free passage of Island Ships to the Ports of Nova Scotia.

Ordered, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, pursuant to the foregoing Report.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Report, be a Committee to prepare the said Address to His Excellency.

The amendment made by the Council to the Bill intituled "An Act to alter and amend an Act passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend an Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown,'" was, according to order, read a second time.

Resolved, That the said amendment be disagreed to.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired with the Council on the amendment made

to the Bill intituled "An Act to alter and amend an Act passed in the Sixth year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, intituled 'An Act to alter and amend an Act for the establishment of an Academy in Charlottetown.'"

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Coles do go to the Council and desire the said Conference.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Coles, Mr. Thornton, Mr. Davies and the Hon. Mr. Jardine be a Committee to manage the said Conference.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to consider further of a Supply.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. Jardine took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Hon. Mr. Jardine reported, that the Committee had come to Forty-seven Resolutions, which he was directed to report to the House, whenever it shall be pleased to receive the same.

Ordered, That the Report be received on Monday next.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

The Hon. Colonial Secretary, from the Special Committee to whom were referred the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, delivered to the House, on Monday last, and the accompanying Copies of Despatches, with reference to the desertions from the troops garrisoned in Charlottetown in the year 1849, to report thereon by Bill, or otherwise, with power to send for persons, papers and records, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

THE Committee to whom were referred the Despatches and other documents having reference to the desertion of Troops from the Garrison at Charlottetown, beg to report as follows :—

Your Committee have examined Colonel Lane as to the number of deserters during the last five years. Colonel Lane has answered the queries put to him by the Committee, which are as follow :

Q. How many Desertions were there from the Garrison of Charlottetown, during the years 1847, 1848, 1849, 1850 and 1851?

A. Can only answer as to the two last years mentioned. Fourteen of the 97th deserted, in 1850; and and Eight of the 38th, in 1851.

Q. How many deserters were re-taken by the Troops, or by the Inhabitants and Civil power, during the years above mentioned?

A. Seven deserters were re-taken since 1849, by the Troops, on the information of the Inhabitants; and one during the last Summer, by a Constable named Hartz.

Q. State any circumstances which may come within your knowledge respecting desertions from the 38th Regiment, and the time at which such desertions usually take place?

A. Cannot tell respecting the 38th Regiment; but desertions generally take place immediately previous to the removal of the Troops.

Q. How many men deserted from the 42nd?

A. One.

Q. Can you suggest any means of preventing the Desertion of the Troops?

A. The great cause of the escape of Deserters is owing to the limited number of Officers, non-Commissioned Officers and Privates; parties cannot be spared to send after them. I would recommend, as the most effectual means for the apprehension of deserters, that a description of each should be published in the Gazette, hand-bills struck off and posted up without delay, and that any person afterwards harbouring such deserters should be fined Five Pounds, to be recovered by summary process, and paid to the informer.

The fine now imposed is £30, which Colonel Lane thinks too high, as people are unwilling to subject their neighbours to so heavy a penalty.

Colonel Lane further remarks, that many of the Soldiers get married without the consent of the Commanding Officer, and desert, because their wives are not allowed to accompany them, when the Regiment leaves.

Q. Have you ever experienced any unwillingness on the part of the Inhabitants to aid in the apprehension of Deserters?

A. Never.

Your Committee would further remark, that every encouragement is given to the Inhabitants of the Island to apprehend deserters from Her Majesty's forces, both Sea and Land, *vide* 50 Geo. 3, cap. 3, sec. 3, of an Act to prevent the harbouring deserters, &c., which is as follows :

“And in order to give every encouragement to His Majesty's subjects in this Island to check a practice disgraceful in itself, and highly injurious to His Majesty's service: Be it further enacted, That a sum of Five Pounds be paid out of the Revenue of this Island, for the apprehension of every Deserter, either from His Majesty's Navy or Army.”

Under all the circumstances, your Committee have not been able to discover that the Inhabitants have been in the habit of harbouring Deserters to obtain cheap labour. On the contrary, every exertion appears to have been made by the Inhabitants to prevent desertion; they do not value the labour of Soldiers, who, in scarcely a single instance, understand the labour in a new country; nor do they usually remain in this Island, but make their way to the United States, where they can—owing to the number of American Vessels always on the coast of the Island—make their way with little or no trouble.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, pursuant to the recommendation contained in the preceding Report.

Ordered, That the Hon. *Colonial Secretary*, the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer* and Mr. *Davies* do compose the said Committee.

Mr. *Davies*, from the Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in conformity with the Resolution reported from the Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of the subject of the Fishery Reserves, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee, which being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

To His Excellency SIR ALEXANDER BANNERMAN, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

May it please your Excellency;

THE House of Assembly having under consideration, the Fishery Reserves heretofore vested in the Crown, and transferred to the Government of this Island, deem it expedient that all persons should be warned from trespassing on the same. With that view, the House of Assembly request, that your Excellency will be pleased to issue a Proclamation cautioning the Public against trespassing on, or renting the said Fishery Reserves, or in any way occupying the same without License from the Government of this Island.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

The Hon. *Colonial Secretary*, from the Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, pursuant to the Report adopted from the Committee of the whole House, on the consideration of His Excellency's Message, and the accompanying Copies of Despatches with reference to the desertions from the Garrison of Charlottetown, in the year 1849, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee, which being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

To His Excellency SIR ALEXANDER BANNERMAN, Knight, Lieutenant Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Island Prince Edward, and the Territories thereunto belonging, Chancellor, Vice Admiral, and Ordinary of the same, &c., &c., &c.

May it please your Excellency;

THE Assembly having had under their consideration a Despatch from Earl Grey, No. 11, Military, of date 9th February, 1850, together with the other Despatches on the subject of desertion from Her Majesty's Troops on this Island, have agreed to the Report herewith transmitted.

The Assembly are anxious that your Excellency should cause the Report to be transmitted to the Colonial Office, and they have no doubt, from your Excellency's knowledge of the facts, that you will be enabled to convince Her Majesty's Government, that the Inhabitants of this Island do not encourage deser-

tion; on the contrary, they have shown every disposition to put down a practice "disgraceful in itself, and highly injurious to Her Majesty's Service."

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee, on the consideration of the several Petitions presented to the House in the present Session, praying for an enactment to prohibit the Importation, Manufacture and Sale of Spirituous or Alcoholic liquors, or for such other measures as may seem meet for the suppression of the evils of Intemperance, being read,

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Flynn* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. *Flynn* reported, that the Committee had gone into the consideration of the subject to them referred, and had come to three Resolutions thereupon, which Resolutions were again read at the Clerk's Table, and are as follow :

1. RESOLVED, That the suppression of vice claims the attention of every enlightened Legislature.

2. RESOLVED, That the intemperate use of ardent Spirits, as a beverage, is demoralizing to Society, and by impoverishing the people who indulge in it, essentially retards the prosperity of the country which they inhabit.

3. RESOLVED, That the House be recommended to take into its consideration, at its next sitting, the expediency of prohibiting by Law, the Importation and Distillation, for purposes of traffic, of all Spirituous Liquors at present used as a beverage; and that the Laws now in force regulating the retail of Spirituous Liquors are inefficient for the purposes intended, and are thereby greatly

evaded; and that much of the vice and evil arising by the improper retail of Spirituous Liquors may be prevented, by imposing further restrictions on the sale thereof, and a different mode of granting Licenses for that purpose.

And the First of the said Resolutions being again read, and the question put thereon, it was unanimously agreed to by the House.

The Second of the said Resolutions being then again read,

Mr. *Clark* moved to amend the same, by leaving out the word "intemperate," in the first line thereof,

the expediency of revising the Laws for regulating the traffic in ardent Spirits, and for the punishment of Drunkenness, in certain cases, with the view of placing the granting of Licenses hereafter to be issued for the sale of ardent Spirits, under other and different regulations from those which at present exist; and of otherwise checking the evil of Intemperance."

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon, it passed in the negative.

The question being then put on the said Resolution, it was agreed to by the House.

The Thirty-seventh to the Forty-fifth of the said Resolutions, inclusive, being again severally read, were, on the question being put thereon, agreed to by the House.

The Forty-sixth of the said Resolutions being again read,

The Hon. Mr. *Whelan* moved to amend the same by striking out the word "Twenty," and substituting "Thirty."

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon, it passed in the negative.

The question being then put on the said Resolution, it was agreed to by the House.

The Forty-seventh of the said Resolutions being then again read, and the question put thereon, it was agreed to by the House.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare and bring in a Bill for appropriating the Supplies granted to Her Majesty, this Session.

Ordered. That the Hon. Mr. *Jardine*, Mr. *Flynn* and Mr. *Davies* do compose the said Committee.

The Bill relating to Light and Anchorage duties, was, according to order, read a second time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Clark* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

On motion of Mr. *Fraser*—

Resolved, That no measure with the view of framing a Bill thereon, which is not now

before the House, shall be entertained after after Wednesday, the 24th March, instant.

The Hon. Mr. *Coles*, from the Committee to whom were referred the several Reports of the Visitors of Schools, for the past year, to examine the same in order to report how much thereof it is expedient to publish as an Appendix to the Journals, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

Your Committee appointed to arrange the printing of the School Visitors' Reports, in the Appendix to the Journals, have to recommend that the remarks on the different Schools be left out.

MR. WIGHTMAN, from the Committee to whom was referred the Petition of divers Inhabitants of Township 66, complaining of illegality and irregularity in a Sheriff's sale of Lands on that Township, to examine the same, and report thereon, with power to send for persons, papers and records, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report was again read at the Clerk's Table.

Ordered, That the said Report be committed to a Committee of the whole House to-morrow.

Mr. Davies, from the Committee appointed to prepare and report the draft of an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, pursuant to the Report of the Special Committee to whom was referred the Petition of James Peake, James Duncan, and others, praying for the removal of the obnoxious Light Duty imposed upon the Island Shipping, in the Gut of Canso, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Committee, and the same was again read at the Clerk's Table.

Ordered, That the said draft Address be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Mooney took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave to sit again—which the House agreed to.

Mr. Palmer, from the Committee appointed to draw up reasons to be offered to the Council at a conference, for disagreeing to their amendment to the Bill intituled "An Act to enable Thomas Robson to obtain Letters Patent for a Fog Bell and Ho-

izontal Windmill," presented to the House the Report of the said Committee, which being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:

BECAUSE, by the First Section of the Act of the General Assembly, passed in the Seventh year of the Reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for granting Patents for useful inventions," the duration of time for which the Lieutenant Governor is authorized to grant such Patents, is limited to Ten years; and as the Patent required by the said Thomas Robson from the Government of this Colony, must be issued by the Lieutenant Governor thereof, it cannot, under the restriction of the above recited Act, be granted for a greater period than Ten years.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired with the Council on the subject matter of their amendment to the said Bill, and that upon such Conference, the managers on the part of this House, do communicate to the Committee of the Council, the above reason for disagreeing to their amendment.

Ordered, That **Mr. Palmer** do go to the Council and desire the said Conference.

Ordered, That **Mr. Palmer**, **Mr. Thornton**, **Mr. Haviland** and **Mr. Yeo** be a Committee to manage the said Conference.

The **Hon. Colonial Secretary**, from the Committee appointed to wait on His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address and Copy of the Report adopted by the House on the subject of His Excellency's Message of the 15th instant, with the accompanying Papers, relating to desertions from the Garrison at Charlottetown, reported the delivery thereof, and that His Excellency was pleased to say he would comply with the desire of the House.

The **Hon. Mr. Coles**, from the Committee appointed to draw up reasons to be offered to the Council, at a Conference, for disagreeing to certain of their amendments to the Bill intituled "An Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned," presented to

the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth :—

BECAUSE, with reference to the Second of the said amendments, the amount of the Jurisdiction of the Courts being increased from Eight Pounds to Twenty Pounds, the House think it advisable, that the number of Commissioners should be increased: disappointments have often been caused to Suitors by the absence of Commissioners, and the want of a sufficient quorum to try causes; and the increase in the number of Commissioners to Five, was made to obviate this inconvenience.

The other amendments disagreed to, hinge upon the former, except the Twelfth, respecting which, the House of Assembly think that it would be better to allow the clause to remain as originally passed by them.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired with the Council, on the subject matter of the amendments to the said Bill, and that upon such Conference, the Managers on the part of this House, do communicate to the Committee of the Council, the above reasons for disagreeing to their amendments.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Coles do go to the Council and desire the said Conference.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Coles, Mr. Thornton, Hon. Mr. Jardine and Mr. Davies be a Committee to manage the said Conference.

On motion of Mr. Thornton—

Resolved, That the Commissioner of the Tenth Road District, King's County, be authorized to expend the sum of Ten Pounds—voted towards the new line of Road from Murray River to Vernon River—for the repairs of South River Bridge, in addition to the sum of Fifteen Pounds, already appropriated, but which latter sum has been found insufficient, there being in consequence, no offers at the sale of the work, held on the 15th instant, as appears by the Report of the Commissioner to the Government.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the Bill relating to Light and Anchorage duties.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Clark took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Clark reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill and made several amendments thereto; which amendments were again read at the Clerk's Table, and agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the said Bill, as amended, be engrossed, and that the Title be, "An Act relating to Light and Anchorage duties."

Then the House adjourned until to-morrow, at Ten o'clock.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. *Jardine* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Hon. Mr. *Jardine* reported, that the Committee had gone through the Bill, and made several amendments thereto; which amendments were again read at the Clerk's Table, and agreed to by the House.

Ordered, That the said Bill, as amended, be engrossed, and that the Title be, "An Act relating to the weighing of Coal, Culm and Coke in Charlottetown."

Ordered, That the Order limiting the time for the reception of Private Petitions be suspended, and, thereupon,

A Petition of the Minister and Trustees of St. James' Church, Charlottetown, was presented to the House by Mr. *Palmer*, and

the same was received and read, praying for an amendment of the Act Incorporating the Minister and Trustees of the said Church.

Ordered, That the said Petition do lie on the Table.

Ordered, That Mr. *Palmer* have leave to introduce a Bill to alter and amend the Act to Incorporate the Minister and Trustees of St. James' Church in Charlottetown.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House; and the same was read the first time.

Ordered, That the said Bill be referred to the Special Committee appointed to report on every private Bill, to examine the same, and report thereon.

Two Messages from the Council by Mr. DesBrisay :

1. Mr. Speaker ;

The Legislative Council do agree to a Conference as is desired by the House of Assembly, on the amendments made to the Bill intituled "An Act relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned," and have appointed the Hon. Mr. Attorney General, and the Hon. Mr. Rice a Committee to manage the said Conference, to meet in the Conference Room instanter.

2. Mr. Speaker;

Read a third time, as engrossed, the Bill intituled "An Act to facilitate the proving of Wills and Testamentary dispositions within this Island."

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

And being met—

Ordered, That Mr. *Palmer* have leave to introduce a Bill to prevent the stealing of Dogs.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into further consideration the Bill referred back to the Committee of the whole House, to require Landlords, or Claimants of Rents, to put the Titles by which they claim, upon record, in the proper Offices of record in this Island, with the view of adopting an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, praying the Royal leave to be given to the enactment of such a law.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. *Jardine* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Hon. Mr. *Jardine* reported, that the Committee had agreed to a Bill to compel the registration of the Original Grants or Patents of Lots or Townships of Land in this Island; which Bill being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House.

The Hon. Mr. *Jardine* also reported, that the Committee had agreed to an Address to the Queen, which Address being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

May it please your Majesty;

WE the Representatives of your Majesty's faithful and loyal people of Prince Edward Island, in Colonial Parliament assembled, most respectfully submit the inconvenience and insecurity arising from the want of a law to oblige the original Grantees, or Patentees, of the Crown, of Lots or Township Lands, to put their Grants, or Patents, on record, in the proper Office in this Island.

The frequency with which Lands in new Countries change hands, and in particular in this part of your Majesty's dominions, together with the conflicting claims, sometimes of parties, to the same land, render an Act such as is referred to indispensable.

The Assembly, in order to remedy the want complained of, have agreed to a Bill for that purpose, which is herewith transmitted.

An Act bearing a title somewhat similar to the present, although varying in its principles, was passed in the year 1832—the second of the Reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth—but disallowed by the Crown. Since then, the Government of this Island applied to that of Nova Scotia, for Copies of the several Original Grants of Township Lands of this Island, recorded in that Province, previous to this Colony becoming a separate Government; and incurring considerable expense and some trouble, they obtained Copies of those Grants so recorded, and which were copied into the Public Records of this Island; by the addition of which to those previously recorded, the great majority of the Original Patents from the Crown, are now recorded in this Colony. But a few Proprietors, namely, those of Townships Nos. Eight (8), Twelve (12), Twenty (20), Twenty-five (25), Forty-four (44) and Forty-six (46), still continuing to withhold the recording of their Patents in the Registry Office of this Colony, which is deemed essential to the security of property, and the contentment of the People residing thereon;

The Assembly, therefore, humbly submit, that those Proprietors, above enumerated, ought to have their Original Grants from the Crown recorded. They further most humbly submit, that a request so reasonable, which does not infringe upon private rights, and is considered requisite in matters of reference, when disputes arise between parties, ought no longer to be withheld from this Island.

May it, therefore, please your Majesty to cause instructions to be transmitted to the Lieutenant Governor of this Colony, that it is your Majesty's pleasure the Bill herein referred to be passed into a law.

Ordered, That the said Bill and Address be engrossed.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to forward to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, the said Bill and Address, for the purpose of being laid at the foot of the Throne.

Ordered, That Mr. *Mooney*, Mr. *Davies* and the Hon. Mr. *Jardine* do compose the said Committee.

Ordered, That the Hon. *Colonial Secretary* have leave to introduce a Bill to regulate the Office of the Colonial Secretary and Road Correspondent of this Island, and the amount of Fees to be taken therein.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House; and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

The Hon. Mr. *Jardine*, from the Committee appointed to prepare and bring in a Bill for appropriating the Supplies granted to Her Majesty, this Session, presented to the House a Bill, as prepared by the Committee, and the same was read the first time, and ordered to be read a second time to-morrow.

Resolved, That the House do now resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to consider further of Ways and Means.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

The Hon. Mr. *Jardine* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Hon. Mr. *Jardine* reported, that the Committee had come to Three Resolutions, which he was directed to submit to the House whenever it shall be pleased to receive the same.

Ordered, That the Report of the Committee be now received.

The Resolutions reported from the Committee, were then severally read at the Clerk's Table, and are as follow :—

1. **RESOLVED**, That the several rates and duties imposed and levied under the Act of 14 Vic., cap. 9, be continued and amended, for one year, from and after the First day of May next.

2. **RESOLVED**, That all persons distilling Spirituous Liquors shall take out a License, and pay for the same Ten Pounds, and shall also pay Six-pence per Gallon, duty, on all Spirits distilled.

3. **RESOLVED**, That a duty of Ten per cent. be paid on all ready made Clothing imported.

Ordered, That the question of concurrence be now separately put on the said Resolutions.

And the First and Second of the said Resolutions being again severally read, were, on the question being put thereon, agreed to by the House.

The Third of the said Resolutions being again read, and the question of concurrence put thereon,

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. Whelan do carry the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence.

The Order of the Day for the House in Committee, on the consideration of the Report of the Special Committee to whom was referred the Petition of divers Inhabitants of Township 66, complaining of illegality and irregularity in a Sheriff's sale of Lands on that Township, to examine the same, and report thereon, being read,

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. Clark took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And Mr. Clark reported, that the Committee had gone through the Report of the Special Committee, had amended, and then adopted the same, and the Report so amended, was again read at the Clerk's Table, and is as followeth :—

Your Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of the Inhabitants of Lot 66, to inquire into the allegations contained in said Petition, and to ascertain the truth by investigation, have examined several

parties, and the substance of their evidence is as follows :—

Mr. DesBrisay states, he was present at a Sale of lands at Georgetown, and became a purchaser; but not in his own name, to something over Four thousand acres of land. The real owner of the land, was stated to be Mr. Worrell, and the Original Grantee, was the late Thomas Wright Esquire, Surveyor General, whose Grant is on record: and on the day of Sale, there were several bidders for the land, but one in particular, Mr. Martin O'Halloran, who bid about Sixty Pounds. Was aware that the Sheriff was asked to put it up in small lots, who said he would do so, if the persons could shew a description of the tracts they wished to purchase, which had not paid tax; but none of said persons shewed such plans. Mr. DesBrisay states the reason the land was sold, was that Mr. Worrell purchased from several Proprietors who held under the Original Grantees, some of whom reside in foreign countries, which might cause a delay in proving the title when disputes arose, and therefore, caused a Survey of the Township, to ascertain such parts as had not paid the Assessment, which was done on behalf of the Trustees, and according to the plan exhibited at the sale, shewing the parts which had paid the tax, and requested the Sheriff to sell those parts for which the tax had not been paid.

The evidence of P. M'Callum, Esq., Sheriff, shews that he had, according to the nature of the Writ put in his possession, disposed of a portion of land on Lot 66, for Land Assessment, according to the general rule of disposing of land in such instances; and when the property was offered for sale, there were some bidders: Mr. DesBrisay and Martin O'Halloran. The amount of Assessment due on land was specified in the Writ. He gave a Sheriff's Deed in the name of Joseph Hensley, Esq., according to the plan of the Proprietor. No person attending the sale gave him to understand that they had paid the Assessment for any part of the land sold.

Martin O'Halloran, in reply to a Letter from the Chairman, states, he knew nothing of the Petition referred to, until acquainted as above; but will acquaint some of the complainants of the Chairman's Letter, and desire them to appear before the Committee.

Silvester Keough, a resident on part of the land sold at Sheriff's Sale, was absent from the Island at the time, but when the Petition was receiving signatures, allowed his name to be signed to it. He holds 50 acres, and which has been in possession of himself and others for 27 years, but omitted paying the Land Tax in 1849. Is anxious to redeem his land, if he

can enter into an arrangement to that effect, with the present claimants in Charlottetown.

Your Committee submit, that with respect to the above Petitioners, on a full investigation, they find the charges set forth in the Petition, as to the Sheriff having sold lands, on which were valuable buildings and improvements, and where the Assessment had been paid, to be unfounded; as is also the statement that Mr. Pope was present at the sale; and they also find, that no application was made to the Sheriff to dispose of any part whereon the levy was made distinctly, with the exception of Andrew Murphy, who attended the sale and was in possession of about Twenty-six acres, on which he had ploughed and made improvements, but has no documentary title, and also professed to pay any cost and expenses incurred thereon, but did not, at the sale, request the Sheriff to put it up separately.

Your Committee are of opinion, that the proceedings relative to the Sale of this block of land, were irregular, and not according to Law; inasmuch as the Act 11th Vic. cap. 7, says:—"The Supreme Court shall order and direct, that so much of the said several lands, against which judgment shall be given, as shall be sufficient to pay the sums charged by this Act, together with reasonable costs, be sold at Public Auction to the highest bidder."

And, for this reason, your Committee submit, that your Petitioners have just grounds of complaint in conceiving themselves aggrieved by the manner of disposing of this Block of Land in one Lot, containing 4,400 acres—Whereas your Committee are of opinion, that the land ought to have been sold in quantities not over one hundred acres, or as much of a hundred acres as would have satisfied the arrears of Land Assessment, about £14, together with costs thereon.

Your Committee recommend in future, the propriety of all lands whereon the Sheriff is authorised to levy for Land Tax, being particularized, and sold in separate hundreds, or according to the quantity of land on which the tax is unpaid, where the Law does not point out any other course of proceeding, until the amount of levy and costs is defrayed, so that intending purchasers, as well as parties interested, may have an opportunity of redeeming their property, and of becoming purchasers.

And the said Report being again read,

Mr. Palmer moved to amend the same, by leaving out all after the word "evidence," in the fifth line, and inserting the following in lieu thereof:—

"Report, that there is no evidence by which it appears that the Sheriff of King's County has acted illegally in selling Lands, on Township No. 66, for non-payment of Land Assessment, and inasmuch as no person owning Lands on the said Township hath been molested or disturbed in his right thereto, beyond what is prescribed by the necessary proceedings under the Land Assessment Act, there appears to be no grounds for the interference of this House to disturb the said sale".

The House divided on the motion of amendment:

This amount of excess added to the Balance standing against the Colony, on the 31st January, 1851, including Debentures and Treasury Notes, exhibits a debt due by the Colony, on the 31st January, 1852, of £17,938 17s. 4½d. as herein set forth, viz.:—

Your Committee submit, that over £1,300 of the amount included in last year's expenditure, was incurred in the year 1850, and unprovided for, so that, strictly speaking, last year's expenditure was under the Receipts.

Your Committee further submit, that last year's Receipts exceeded the Receipts of the previous year by £107 11s. 7½d., and they believe that, if the Navigation had not closed so very early, last year's Revenue would have been about equal in amount to

that of any previous year. An increase of Receipts was received at the Treasury during the year ending 31st January, 1852, from the Secretary and Registrar's Offices of £103 11s. 3½d.; Light Duty, £36 5s. 10d.; Rum, £705 3s. 4d.; while there has been a decrease on Molasses of £346 11s.; on brown Sugar, £156 5s. 6½d.; on Tea, £204 5s. 3½d. But to shew more clearly where the increase, as well as the deficiency, has taken place, in the different branches of the Revenue, during the past, compared with the previous year, your Committee have prepared a

Tabular statement, herewith annexed, marked (A.) Your Committee would remark, that there appears to be standing against the Proprietors of Lands several sums, amounting in all to £1,325 12s. 4d., for Roads opened under the Road Compensation Act, part of said amount being due since 1834; and your Committee recommend that measures be taken forthwith, to enforce the payment of said amount. Your Committee recommend that the Auditor's Classification of the Public Accounts be inserted in the Appendix to the Journals.

THE House of Assembly beg respectfully to request, that your Excellency will be pleased to forward to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, the accompanying Bill agreed to by the House, to compel the registration of the Original Grants or Patents of Lots or Townships of Land in this Island, together with the Address of the House of Assembly, to Her Majesty, on the subject of the said Bill, in order that such Bill and Address may be laid at the foot of the Throne; and that your Excellency will also be pleased to give the subject referred to, your powerful recommendation.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address, be a Committee to wait on His Excellency with the same.

The Hon. *Colonial Treasurer*, from the Special Committee to whom were referred

all Petitions relative to the opening of new lines of Roads, to examine the same and report thereon, presented to the House the Report of the said Committee; which Report being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

THE Committee to whom was referred the several Petitions praying for the opening of New Roads, beg to submit the following Report:—

1st. With reference to the Petition of the Inhabitants of Lots 36 and 37, respecting two gates, placed across a road, &c., for want of a Plan and fuller information, the Committee are unable to report on the merits of the application.

2d. The Petition of certain inhabitants of Bedford Parish, Lot 48, and the Report of an Inquisition on a line of Road to connect the Old Georgetown Road with the Monaghan Road, Lot 48, the Committee recommend that £10 only should be authorised to be expended in opening this Road, to as great a width as that sum will accomplish; and that the completion of the Road hereafter, should be effected by Statute Labour, and such assistance as may be afforded by the ordinary grants for Roads in that District.

3d. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Lot 56, King's County. This application is recommended to stand over until the proposed Road has been explored, and a plan and estimate of the probable expense of making the same has been laid before the Legislature.

4th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of the Head of Montague River, for a line of Road along the County Line. The Committee recommend that £10 should be expended in making this, for the present, a bridle Road, on condition that the right of way is first secured to the Public, free of any expense.

5th. The Petition of Patrick Stephens, and others, praying for a grant of money towards opening a new line of Road from Murray Harbour Road to Port Selkirk. Thirty-nine Pounds Ten Shillings is recommended to be paid as compensation for the right of way—the House having already made a grant, in addition to the amount of private subscriptions, towards the making of this Road.

6th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Pisquid Road, Lot 49. Your Committee are of opinion that the alterations prayed for in the Petition can be effected under the provisions of the amended Road Act of the present Session, and cannot, therefore, advise any special grant for the Road in question.

7th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Wilmot Creek, Lot 25. This Road is recommended to be opened under the provisions of the Compensation Act; the Commissioner to first ascertain the amount of compensation demanded by the parties.

5th. The Petition of Angus M'Phee, Peter M'Phee, Donald M'Phee, and others, of Cardigan Point. The Road prayed for in this application has been provided for by a grant, during the present Session.

9th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Lots 51 and 52. The sum of £5 is recommended to be expended on that part of the Road prayed for, passing through Lot 51, on condition that the right of way is secured to the Public, free of expense; and that the said Road be opened from the main road to the line of Lot 52.

10th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Lot 65, South side of Elliot River. The sum of £8 is recommended to be applied in aid of the Road prayed for, on condition that a right of way be first secured to the Public, free of expense.

11th. The Petition of Inhabitants of Rustico, New Glasgow, and adjoining settlements, praying for the opening of a Road. Your Committee would recommend that the Government should order this application to be complied with, on condition that the parties interested pay for the right of way—but not otherwise.

12th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Lots 36 and 37, South side of Hillsborough River, praying for the opening of a Road along the boundary of Lots 36 and 37, to the Road leading from the Monaghan Road to Mr. Worthy's Mills. Your Committee are of opinion, that the object prayed for should be provided for out of the ordinary grant for Roads and Bridges for the District next year, as the parties are willing to give a right of way.

13th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Dog River Settlement, to have a Road straightened. Your Committee would observe with reference to this application, that a remedy will be provided by the amended Road Act of this Session, if the Petitioners wish to substitute another line of Road for the one now in use, that will be more advantageous for the Public.

14th. Report of Commissioners on line of Road from McLean's to Plasted's Mills, Lot 14. Your Committee would recommend this Road to be opened by the Government, and stumped and levelled only, for the present; a plan which they deem advisable to be adopted, generally, in cases where the sole expense of making the Road devolves on the Public.

15th. The Petition of Inhabitants of Point Prim, for straightening a line of Road. Your Committee do not deem it expedient to recommend any special grant for this object at present.

16th. The Petition of Archibald Ellison, Princetown Royalty, praying for the opening of a Road. In reference to this Petition, it appears to the Committee, that the Government many years since agreed to accept another and better line of Road through private

property, in lieu of the Road prayed for, which first mentioned Road was opened, and is now dedicated to the Public; but if the Petitioner considers his legal rights infringed, the remedy must be sought elsewhere.

17th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of West River Settlement, and part of Township 46, for opening a line of Road. Your Committee are unable to recommend that any action should be taken on this application, as no plans nor estimates accompany the Petition; nor is such information afforded as will enable them to judge of the necessity of the Road in question.

18th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Lots 9 and 10, for a new Road. Your Committee do not consider the Road prayed for to be of that Public utility to warrant the expense that would be incurred in opening the same.

19th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Lot 17, and vicinity, praying for the opening of a Road from Sedgwick Settlement to Miscouche. As no plan or estimate has been furnished, and as the Road prayed for appears to be more for private than public accommodation, your Committee cannot recommend that any grant should be made for the service until a right of way be secured to the Public, free of expense.

20th. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Township 50, praying for the opening of a Road. Your Committee would recommend that this application should stand over until the next year, and that, in the meantime, the Commissioner of the District be required to ascertain what amount of compensation, if any, is required for the right of way, and the probable expense of making the Road.

21st. The Petition of the Inhabitants of Lot 47, praying for a line of Road from the West River, Lot 17, to Surveyor's Pond. The charge—amounting to £31 11s. 3½d.—returned as the compensation required for a right of way—including the expenses of the inquiry—appears to the Committee to be extravagant, particularly as the Road prayed for is represented as being of great convenience to the parties through whose land it runs, as well as to others; and they therefore, suggest, that no further action should be taken on the application, until a right of way can be obtained on more favourable terms.

Your Committee would recommend that a Copy of this Report be sent to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, with a request, that he will be pleased to give effect to the recommendations therein contained.

WHEREAS the House of Assembly, in its last Session, addressed His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on the subject of certain Fees retained by the late Colonial Secretary, in his alleged capacity of Private Secretary: And whereas His Excellency forwarded the Assembly's Address to Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, accompanied by a report of a Special Committee of the House of Assembly on the same subject, together with Mr. Haviland's answer thereto, in order to obtain His Lordship's opinion on the same: And whereas His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor has laid before the House of Assembly, during the present Session, a Despatch addressed to His Excellency by the Right Hon. the Secretary of State for the Colonies, wherein His Lordship has given expression to the following opinions: That the question relating to the retention of Fees by the late Colonial Secretary is one which would have been more properly submitted for the Courts of Law; but that inasmuch as Mr. Haviland acted in the capacity of Private Secretary, the Fees retained by him for Marriage Licences "according to the best opinion he was able to form on the materials before him, were rightly claimed;" that, as regards the Fees on Marriage Bonds, it is, in His Lordship's opinion, a question to be settled between Mr. Haviland and the parties who paid those Fees, who might contest the claim of the former to those Fees, if it were an improper one; and that as respects the Fees on Tavern, Pedlar and Ferry Licences, His Lordship considers Mr. Haviland's claim to them much more doubtful than his claim to the Fees on Marriage Licences, but recommends the Assembly to allow the subject to drop, and to rest satisfied with having put an end, for the future, to what they regard as an abuse: *And whereas* the House of Assembly deems it inexpedient, at this period, to take any steps with the view of enforcing the refunding of Fees exacted upon Marriage Bonds and Licences, the right of the late Colonial Secretary to which is, at least, open to doubt and uncertainty; but that inasmuch as the abolition of an abuse is

no justification of an alleged exaction of Fees for Tavern, Pedlar and Ferry Licences, the absence of any right to which on the part of Mr. Haviland is, in the opinion of the House of Assembly, unquestionable. *Resolved therefore*, That the House be recommended to address the Government of this Colony, requesting them to take the necessary proceedings to recover from Mr. Haviland the sum of One hundred and Twenty-seven Pounds Four Shillings and Five-pence, being the amount of Fees illegally retained by him for granting Tavern, Pedlar and Ferry Licences, while acting as Colonial Secretary.

The Legislative Council have passed the Bill intituled "An Act for appropriating certain Moneys therein mentioned, for the service of the year of Our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-two."

And then he withdrew.

Then the House adjourned for one hour.

The Hon. Colonial Treasurer, from the Committee appointed to join the Committee of the Council to prepare an Address to Her Majesty the Queen, on the subject of the charges borne by this Colony for the transmission hither of the British Mails from Halifax, Nova Scotia, presented to the House the draft of an Address, as prepared by the Joint Committee; which draft Address being again read at the Clerk's Table, was agreed to by the House, and is as followeth:—

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.

May it please Your Majesty;

WE your Majesty's loyal and dutiful subjects, the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, would humbly represent to your most gracious Majesty, that owing to the insular position of this Colony, your Majesty's subjects residing therein have not hitherto derived the like benefits with the inhabitants of any other of your Majesty's North American Provinces, from the recent changes which have

taken place relative to the postal arrangements for the transmission of the Mails between the United Kingdom and the North American Provinces. That the charge now borne by this Island for the conveyance of the Mails by steam between the Province of Nova Scotia, in the summer, and from New Brunswick, across the ice, in the winter, is upwards of Eight hundred and Forty Pounds currency, which added to the deficiency occasioned by the reduction on Colonial Postage, exceeds One thousand Pounds per annum—a sum which the limited resources of this Colony are ill able to bear. That for upwards of thirty years past, your Majesty's Government has been pleased to allow the amount of British Packet Postage, collected within this Island, which has seldom exceeded Four hundred Pounds sterling per annum, to be applied towards the liquidation of this charge, but which is now ordered to be remitted to your Majesty's Imperial Exchequer—a regulation which we humbly trust your Majesty will not enforce until the department is self-supporting. That as the British Mails are now transmitted from Halifax to the Islands of Newfoundland and Bermuda—as well as to all other places where steam conveyance is required on this side of the Atlantic—without charge to those places, and at a cost of upwards of Eleven thousand Pounds per annum, to your Majesty's Imperial Government, we are induced to hope that your Majesty will not place your loyal subjects in this Island, in a worse position than any of our fellow subjects in the other Provinces.

We, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to direct, that the amount of British Postage, collected in this Island, may be allowed to be applied towards defraying the charge for the conveyance of the British Mails to the Shores of this Island, until the revenue arising from the Post Office department in this Island, shall be sufficient to defray the charges for the same.

And as in duty bound your Majesty's Petitioners will ever pay.

Ordered, That the said Address be engrossed.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to join a Committee of the Legislative Council, to prepare an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the Joint Address of both Houses to Her Majesty the Queen, on the subject of the charges incurred by this Colony for the transmission, hither, of the British Mails from Halifax.

Ordered, That the same Committee who prepared the Address to Her Majesty, be

a Committee to prepare the Address to His Excellency, and also to wait on His Excellency with the same.

Ordered, That the said Resolution be communicated by Message to the Council.

Ordered, That the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer* do carry the said Message.

The amendments made by the Council to the Bill intituled "An Act to alter and amend the Act made and passed in the Second year of the Reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act to Incorporate the Minister and Trustees of St. James' Church in the Town of Charlottetown,'" were read the first time, and are as follow:—

Folio 2, line 3—After the word "that," insert "the Reverend Robert MacNair."

Same folio, line 12—After the word "places," insert "save and except the said Robert Macnair, or the Minister of the said Church for the time being."

Folio 4, line 7—After the word "persons," insert "in addition to the said Minister for the time being."

Folio 5, line 3—After the word "and," insert "with the said Minister for the time being."

Ordered, That the Tenth Standing Rule of the House be suspended in this case; and then the said amendments were read the second and third time.

Resolved, That the said amendments do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. *Palmer* do carry back the said Bill to the Council, and acquaint them that this House hath agreed to their amendments.

Ordered, That the Order limiting the time for the introduction of new matter be suspended, and that the Hon. *Colonial Treasurer* have leave to introduce a Bill to regulate the Bankruptcy and relief of honest but unfortunate Debtors.

He accordingly presented the said Bill to the House, and the same was read the first time.

Ordered, That the said Bill do lie over until the next Session, and that meanwhile, One hundred and Ten Copies thereof be printed and interleaved for the use of the Legislature.

Folio 1—After the word "thereof," in the Title, insert as follows :—

1. "Whereas it is deemed expedient to amend certain parts of an Act made and passed in the Eleventh year of the Reign of Her present Majesty, cap. 31, intituled "An Act to repeal the Acts for the admission of Barristers, Solicitors and Attorneys, and to make other provisions in lieu thereof:" Be it therefore enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, From and after the passing of this Act, when and so often as any person being an Attorney and Barrister of any other British Province or Colony, and who shall be otherwise qualified for such admission, under the provisions of the said recited Act, shall apply to be admitted as an Attorney and Barrister of the Supreme Court of Judicature of this Island, it shall be lawful for such Court to admit such person and to call him to the Bar of this Island, without requiring that the person so making application shall have previously entered and continued for One year as a Student in the office of One of the Attorneys of the said Court, having the rank of a Barrister, as in the said recited Act mentioned, provided it shall appear

to the said Court, and be clearly proved, that Attorneys and Barristers of the Supreme Court of Judicature of this Island, are, at the time when any such application shall be made, entitled to equal privileges and freedom of admission to the Bar of the Courts of Law, Equity and Judicature, in the Country, to the Bar of which the Attorney, Solicitor and Barrister seeking admission belongs, as are by this, and the said recited Act, extended to such person so making application as aforesaid ; and provided, also, that such person so applying for admission, shall, at the same time thereof, produce a Certificate from one of the Judges of the Suprior Courts of the Country, to the Bar of which he belongs, of his being on the Rolls of such Court, and of his being in actual practice at the time when such Certificate was granted, which Certificate shall bear date within Six Months previous to such application so to be made, as aforesaid ; and such Applicant shall also produce a Certificate of such Court, or of a Judge of the same, of his having conducted himself with credit and reputation since his admission, and also of his being a person of good moral character ; and such Applicant shall also be subject to an examination or otherwise, touching his qualifications, at the discretion of the said Supreme Court of this Island.

2. "A Barrister of any Court in Great Britain or Ireland shall be entitled to be admitted to practice as a Barrister and Attorney of the Supreme Court of Judicature of this Island, after having previously resided in this Island, at least Twelve Months, on his producing a satisfactory Certificate, bearing date within Sixth Months previous to such application from a Judge of the Court, to the Bar of which he belongs, of his being on the Rolls of such Court, and of his being in actual practice at the time when such Certificate was granted ; and that he has conducted himself with credit and reputation since he was called to the Bar, and

that he is a person of good moral character; and if he shall be otherwise qualified as aforesaid, and if required by the Judges of the Supreme Court of this Island so to do, shall submit himself to, and pass a satisfactory examination touching his fitness and capacity as aforesaid."

Ordered, That the Tenth Standing Rule of the House be suspended in this case; and then the said amendments were read a second time.

Ordered, That the said amendments be now committed to a Committee of the whole House.

The House accordingly resolved itself into the said Committee.

Mr. *Fraser* took the Chair of the Committee; and after some time spent therein,

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

And the Chairman reported, that the Committee had made some progress, and had directed him to move for leave sit again—which the House agreed to.

he belongs, and that he is a person of good moral character; and if he shall be otherwise qualified for such admission, under the provisions of the said recited Act, and if required by the Judges of the Supreme Court of Judicature of this Island so to do, shall submit himself to, and pass a satisfactory examination touching his fitness and capacity as aforesaid."

Resolved, That the said amendments, as amended, be agreed to.

Resolved, That a Conference be desired with the Council on the subject matter of the said amendments.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Whelan* do go to the Council and desire the said Conference.

Ordered, That the Hon. Mr. *Whelan*, Hon. Mr. *Coles*, Mr. *Fraser* and Mr. *Laird* be a Committee to manage the said Conference.

May it please your Excellency;

At the close of a Session wherein the Assembly have passed a greater number of Bills than were ever carried through in one year, by any former House in this Colony, and of which, some from their extensive scope, required to be so moulded and guarded, as of necessity to be of great length, it devolves on their Speaker to offer the liberal means they have provided, for enabling the Executive to carry into effect those measures, for the accomplishment of which, the Assembly have constitutionally avowed their desire: therefore, in the name, and on the behalf of Her Majesty's loyal Commons of Prince Edward Island, do I now tender, and respectfully request the assent of your Excellency to the following Bills of aid and supply, viz. :—

An Act for raising a Revenue.

An Act further to continue an Act relating to Dogs and the taxation thereon.

An Act to consolidate and amend the Acts now in force, regulating the letting of Stalls in Charlottetown Market House, and for other purposes therein mentioned.

An Act relating to Light and Anchorage Duties.

An Act for the encouragement of Education, and to raise funds for that purpose, by imposing an additional assessment on Land in this Island, and on Real Estate in Charlottetown and Common, and Georgetown and Common.

An Act for appropriating certain Moneys therein mentioned, for the Service of the Year of Our Lord One thousand Eight hundred and Fifty-two.

To each of which His Excellency was pleased, in Her Majesty's name, to give his assent.

And then His Excellency was pleased to make the following Speech to both Houses:

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;

The business of the Session having been brought to a close, I am happy to relieve you from your Legislative labors, and thank you for your regular attendance to your public duties during the last two months.

It has afforded me great satisfaction to find that the anxious attention you have bestowed on the important question of Education, has terminated in your passing a measure, which, although not perhaps satisfactory to all classes of the community (which no legislation will ever be), yet cannot fail to be productive of great good to the public at large. In framing it, you have born in mind the injunction imposed on me by our most gracious Sovereign, an injunction confirmed by successive Colonial Secretaries of State, among others, by the distinguished Nobleman, the Earl of Derby, now Her Majesty's Prime Minister, namely: "You are to permit all persons inhabiting our Island of Prince Edward, under your Government, to have full liberty of conscience, and free exercise of their respective modes of religious worship, provided they be contented with a quiet and peaceable enjoyment of the same, not giving offence or scandal to the Government."

Care will be required in carrying out the details of the measure; and experience, I trust, will enable the Government to render it efficient, and as little burdensome to the Tax-payer as the unavoidably increased expense attendant on an improved and extended system must necessarily give rise to.

I am glad to observe that "a Bill relating to the recovery of Small Debts, and to repeal certain Acts therein mentioned," has passed the Legislature.

At the opening of the present Session of the Imperial Parliament, I observe that Her Majesty was pleased to say, "nothing tends more to the peace and prosperity of the country, than the speedy and impartial administration of justice;" and it will afford me great pleasure, at all times, to co-operate with you in promoting such measures as will secure to this Colony, the blessings which our gracious Queen contemplates from an impartial administration of justice,

which I am sure it is Her Majesty's desire should extend to all her Dominions.

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly ;

I have to thank you for the Supplies voted for the Public Service; the respective grants to which you have directed their application will be strictly attended to, and among others, I observe with satisfaction the appropriation of One Hundred Pounds, in addition to the legal Endowment, for the support of unprotected insane persons. I saw the other day several of that description in the Jail of Charlottetown, and I cannot help thinking that the confinement of those unfortunates in a prison is very undesirable, if it can be possibly avoided. The Lunatic Asylum has great capabilities of extension. Without a large expenditure it can be made subservient to the purposes contemplated by the Act which authorized its construction, viz: "An Asylum for Insane persons, and other objects of charity"—such as aged and infirm paupers, who are unable to work, and may be extended also to those who can and ought to work, who at present prefer to beg. I am convinced that such an Institution, properly conducted, will meet with your support and that of the public. I hope, with the concurrence of the Trustees of the Asylum, that some plan may be devised, which, while it will increase the comforts of the deserving poor, will, at the same time, decrease public expenditure.

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council ;

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

I shall take care to forward the different Addresses which you have entrusted to me for presentation to Her Majesty; and, again thanking you for your assiduous attention to the public business, I sincerely wish you success in your various avocations.

After which the Hon. the President of the Legislative Council said—

Gentlemen ;

It is the will and pleasure of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that this General Assembly be prorogued until Thursday, the Third day of June next; and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until Thursday, the Third day of June next, to be then here holden.

My Lord;

1. I have the honor to enclose for your Lordship's perusal the documents marked 1 and 2, the latter accompanied by papers A, B, C, and D.—I regret having to trouble your Lordship on the subject to which they refer, but I do so in the fulfilment of a promise I made to the Assembly, by message, during the protracted discussion which took place between that Branch of the Legislature and me, when in accordance with my instructions, I was endeavouring to arrange the Provisions in the Civil List Bill which your Lordship considered indispensable, before the new system of Government was to be conceded to this Colony.

2. One of those provisions was to be a Sum of £200 currency, to be paid annually to the late Colonial Secretary, whose length of service your Lordship thought entitled him to remuneration; and my instructions were peremptory, that such must be granted before Her Majesty's Revenues be surrendered to the Colony.

3. The Assembly objected to those remunerations, and with great pertinacity, stating among other reasons in regard to Mr. Haviland, that he had appropriated to his own use certain fees that he was not entitled to, and that an investigation was then pending by a Committee of the House appointed for that purpose.

4. I answered, that, until the accusations against Mr. Haviland were proved, I could not entertain them, and must abide by my instructions; but if the late Colonial Secretary had appropriated any sum or sums of money illegally to his own use, they must be refunded, and with that view, I would, on being furnished with the proper information, refer the whole case for your Lordship's decision, and on this assurance the discussion on Mr. Haviland's case terminated; and, with a like remuneration to the late Attorney General, the Civil List Bill passed.

5. At the conclusion of the Session, the Assembly moved an Address to me, and sent me the Report of the Committee, to which I have alluded. I furnished copies of these documents No. 1, to Mr. Haviland on the 27th ult. I received that Gentleman's answer, No. 2. Under these circumstances I have to request that your Lordship will favor me with your instructions. There is no such official in this Colony as Private Secretary, and the statements about the practice of former ones, are so conflicting and confused, that I am induced to ask for the weight of your Lordship's authority. There appears to me, on perusing the documents, to be a remedy for obtaining justice to the accuser and accused in this case. I only regret such a one should have arisen to trouble your Lordship, but your decision cannot fail to prove more satisfactory than any of mine.

SIR;

I have to acknowledge your Despatch No. 37, of September 12th last, enclosing a Report of a Committee of the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, on the subject of certain Fees alleged to have been illegally taken by Mr. Haviland, as Private Secretary to the Lieutenant Governor, and his answer to the allegations of the Committee.

2. I understand the question submitted by you for my decision, to be, whether or not the pension which has been awarded to Mr. Haviland, under the Civil List Act, ought to be made subject to any deduction on account of those fees, if illegally taken.

3. I must observe, that the question at issue is one which would have been more properly submitted for the decision of the Courts of Law, than that of the

Secretary of State, since both the Committee and Mr. Haviland rest their respective claims on the law of the Island, as contained in its statutes, interpreted by usage, and it is for the Courts, not the Secretary of State, to determine whether or not certain fees have been illegally taken.

4. What I have to say on this subject, must, therefore, be only taken as an expression of opinion, which I give in the hope, that as the matter has been thus referred to me, the parties may be willing to abide by it.

5. If I understand the allegations of the Committee rightly, they charge Mr. Haviland in the first place with having taken certain Fees as Private Secretary, which belonged to him as Colonial Secretary, and which he, therefore, ought to have paid over to the Treasury of the Island,—in the second place with having taken certain other Fees, to which he had no right in either character.

6. But I do not find that the Report of the Committee distinguishes so plainly between these two classes of fees, as to intimate which in their opinion, Mr. Haviland ought to refund to the Treasury, and which have been illegally taken from individuals. I must, therefore, exercise my own judgment on this subject.

7. The Fees on Marriage Licenses, according to the best opinion I am able to form on the materials before me, are rightly claimed by Mr. Haviland, as belonging to him in his character of Private Secretary.

8. The Fees on Marriage Bonds, which Mr. Haviland has now abandoned, if justly taken at all, were taken in the same right as those on Marriage Licenses, that is, as Private Secretary, and could not under any circumstances have been claimed for the Public Treasury. The question, therefore, whether Mr. Haviland had any right to take such Fees, is one between himself and the persons who paid them, not between himself and the Public Treasury. It was for the parties themselves to contest the right, if the claim were an improper one, and it may, as far as I know, be open to them still to do so, in respect of payments which they have already made. But in my judgment the question as to the payment of Mr. Haviland's pension, as late Colonial Secretary, ought not to be affected by the allegation, that he has illegally taken these Fees as Private Secretary from individuals; at all events, in the absence of a judicial decision against the legality of the Fees, it would be unjust to withhold from him on this ground any part of the pension assigned to him for his passed services.

9. There remain the Fees on Tavern, Peddlars and Ferry Licenses. As to these, the questions both

whether Mr. Haviland had any right to take them, and in which right he took them, may be subject to more doubt than as regards Marriage Licenses. But inasmuch as it was notorious that he did take them as Private Secretary, and as he was allowed to continue doing so for several years, without objection, I do not think that it would now be expedient to take any steps to bring his right to them into question before a Court of Law, (where alone it could be determined) in order if the decision should be against him, to enforce repayment.

10. I should, therefore, strongly recommend the Assembly to allow the subject to drop, and to rest satisfied with having put an end for the future, to what they regard as an abuse.

SIR ;

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 47, of the 13th of October last, explanatory of the provisions of the "Act relating to Emigrants," to which objections were raised in my Despatch of the 2d September.

I transmit for your information the copy of a Report of the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, to whom I referred the subject; and concurring with the Commissioners as to the tendency of the amendments made in this Act, as compared with the provisions of the Law of 1848, I can only repeat the opinion I expressed to you in my former Despatch, that nothing would contribute so much to the advancement of the Colony, as its being chosen as a place of settlement by an eligible class of Emigrants, a result which cannot reasonably be expected, while the restrictions imposed upon Emigrants arriving there are more onerous than in other parts of North America.

Although, therefore, I shall advise Her Majesty that the Act should be left to its operation, in its present form, I consider it highly desirable for the interest of Prince Edward Island, that the subject should be reconsidered by the Legislature.

COLONIAL LAND EMIGRATION OFFICE,

SIR;

1. We have to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 4th instant, accompanied by a Despatch from the Lieutenant Governor of Prince Edward Island, on the subject of the Act passed in the last Session of the Legislature of that Island, intituled "An Act relating to Emigrants."

2. We infer from this Despatch that Earl Grey had pointed out to the Lieutenant Governor the objections to this Act, suggested in our Report of the 19th of August last, to the effect, first, that the amount of the Tax imposed on Emigrants was unusually high, and, therefore, calculated to discourage immigration; and, secondly, that the 4th clause imposed on the Master a duty which he would not always be capable of performing. To this Sir A. Bannerman has replied, that the object of the Act was to diminish, rather than increase, the Tax on Immigration, and that the duty imposed on the Master, of preventing the landing of any Passengers until certain conditions had been complied with, was also enacted in the Act of 1848, and was not then objected to.

3. In respect to the first point, we would beg to observe, that the Tax imposed by the Act of 1848 was, on every

For indigent or impotent Emigrants, or men over 60, and women over 50 years of age, either double Tax, or a commuted Tax of 10s. each. All these taxes were doubled on Emigrants arriving after the 1st of September, and trebled on those arriving after the 1st of October.

The Tax imposed by the Act of the last Session was, on every Passenger and Emigrant,—including cabin passengers—arriving between the 1st of April and 1st October, 12s. currency, equal to 10s. sterling; on those arriving between 1st October and 1st April, 18s. currency, equal to 15s. sterling, with an addition of 5s. currency, or 4s. 2d. sterling, on Emigrants placed in Quarantine for 5 days; and 10s. currency, or 8s. 4d. sterling on those placed in Quarantine for 10 days. The additional Tax on Emigrants arriving between the 1st October and the 1st of April, may, however, be commuted for a Bond to repay any expenses incurred within 12 months on account of such Emigrants. We subjoin a comparison of the two Acts, in a tabulated form, as the readiest means of bringing the difference between them clearly into view:

5. We should hardly ourselves take the same view as Sir A. Bannerman has expressed of the effect of those alterations, because, although the Tax of 1851 is less heavy on Emigrants placed in Quarantine, or arriving after the 1st of September and the 1st October, and upon indigent, and impotent, and aged Emigrants, it is heavier on healthy Emigrants arriving between the 1st April and 1st September, which in every Emigration must be expected to constitute the bulk of the Emigrants. We should have little doubt that the aggregate sum received on an average of years, would be greater under the Tariff of 1851 than under that of 1848. And it is to be remarked, that the Act of 1848 did not contain the special clause making Cabin as well as Steerage Passengers liable to the Tax. But it was not only, or principally, with reference to the previous Act of Prince Edward Island that we questioned the policy of so high a Tax; but rather, as we intimated with reference to the similar Tax in the adjoining Provinces, and the neighbouring States of the Union. We annex an extract from our last Colonization Circular, showing the amount of the Tax in the other British North American Provinces, and we may add, that in the State of New York the Tax is \$1½, or 6s. 3d. Sterling.

6. Secondly, in regard to the penalty imposed on the Master for allowing Passengers to land until certain conditions have been complied with, it is, no doubt, true that a precisely similar clause was contained in the Act of 1848, and not then objected to. It will be remembered, however, that the Act of 1848 was passed in Prince Edward Island as similar Acts were passed in the other British North American Provinces under peculiar circumstances. The frightful mortality had occurred among Emigrants during the preceding year, and the contagion which they had imported with them into the Countries which received them, joined to the apprehension, then general, of a return of the sickness and mortality of 1848, appeared to justify and require measures of unusual strictness for the protection of the settled Inhabitants of the Colonies. Accordingly, precautionary Acts were passed by the Legislatures of Canada, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia, as well as Prince Edward Island, and were allowed to go into operation. These Acts, however, have since been modified in Canada and New Brunswick in those parts which were most calculated to restrict Emigration.

7. It appeared to us that the clause to which we referred, though justifiable when there was a risk that a large number of destitute Emigrants might be thrown into Prince Edward Island, was scarcely required now that Emigration has returned to its ordinary course. And considering the importance to Prince Edward Island of obtaining an accession to its population and capital, we thought it our duty, in considering the Act of last Session, to point out this as one of the clauses which seemed calculated, in some degree, to discourage the resort of Emigrants to the Island.

27TH FEBRUARY, 1852.

SIR;

I have the honor to send herewith, a statement of the receipts and expenditure of moneys, for the repair of Roads and Bridges in Charlottetown and the Royalty.

The difficulty and expense of recovering sums unpaid before the Court of Commissioners of Small Debts, has deterred the Justices from following up their claim in that Court, and the Act of rates and Dog Tax is nearly £50 short of what it ought to be.

I have received instructions to state, that the Hermitage Bridge, and two other sower what is called the Two Mile Run, are in a state of delapidation, and will absorb, at least, £80 to make them only passable.

The Bridge built over Wright's Mill Dam, was so imperfectly finished, and differed so much from the specifications, that the Commissioners felt themselves bound to make a deduction of £20 from the sum contracted to be paid.

It will likewise be observed, that that Bridge was to cost £100, the remainder of the sum was under another contract for the buttresses, approaches, &c.

All of which is submitted by the Board for the information of the Hon. the House of Assembly.

We have to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 21st inst., with copy of a Report of a Committee of the House of Assembly of Prince Edward Island, on the expediency of erecting Light Houses

on that Island, together with an Address to the Lieutenant Governor of the Island, in which His Excellency is requested to ascertain what sum the adjoining Colonies may be disposed to contribute towards the erection and support of such Lights.

We beg to state for the information of His Honor the Administrator of the Government, that this Government has already erected several Light Houses, from which the Trade of Prince Edward Island receives almost equal benefit with this Province; but the Island has not contributed either towards the building or support of those Lights. The Light Houses to which we refer are as follow: one on Cranberry Island, at the Southern entrance of the Gut of Canso; one at the Northern entrance of Pic-tou Harbour; one at Louisbourg; one at Beaver Island; and one now building on Sand Point, at the Southern entrance of the Gut of Canso.

It may not be out of place here to state that the Government of Prince Edward Island agreed, thirty years ago, to pay to this Province an annual sum of about £70 or £80, towards the support of Cranberry Island Light, at the entrance of Canso, which was about that time erected by this Province, under this agreement, but we believe that no part of this sum has been paid. Light money was, however, actually levied with this intention on all vessels arriving in the Island, and a large sum collected.

These collections were made during a period of more than twenty years before there was a single Light House erected on the Island.

The Light Houses proposed to be erected will be of great benefit to the trade of Prince Edward Island, this Province, and the other adjacent Colonies; but under the circumstances above detailed, we do not think we should be justified in recommending any contribution, on the part of Nova Scotia, towards them.

This Province has now twenty-three Light Houses in operation, and four in the course of construction; and it is likely that others will be erected before long, in which Prince Edward Island will benefit.

Report of the Auditors of Public Accounts.

CHARLOTTETOWN,
February 14, 1852.

SIR;

We have to acknowledge the receipt from you of a memorandum signed by the Hons. George Coles and William Swabey, as a Committee of the Executive Council, recommending the annual inspection, by us, of the Books of Account of the several Government Offices, where money is received and paid on the Public service.

Having completed the inspection thereby required—for the year 1851—we now proceed to report thereon, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

We have visited, in succession, the Post Office, the Registrar's Office, the Charlottetown Impost Office, and that of the Road Correspondent.

The Books at the Post Office appear to be kept in a very accurate and careful manner, and as plain as it is possible that Accounts of such an intricate nature can be kept. In this department the receipts may be classed under four heads :

1. THE BRITISH, OR 10D. STERLING RATE.—This is accounted for to the General Post Office in London, which Office keeps check upon the department here. Bermuda and Newfoundland postage is also accounted for to the Office in London.

2. COLONIAL, OR THE 2D. STERLING RATE, ON BRITISH LETTERS, paid to the credit of the Government of P. E. Island. In this branch the integrity of the Post Master is entirely to be depended on, as in some cases no check can be exercised upon him. On the arrival of nearly every Mail, that Officer has to charge himself with sums not charged to him by the Office sending.

3. INTER-COLONIAL.—Under this head may be classed the Rates received on Letters received from, and sent to, the Offices at Pictou, Halifax, Amherst and St. John, N. B. These Offices keep check on each other, monthly sheets being mutually exchanged.

4. INLAND, OR 2D CURRENCY RATE.—The Post Master General in Charlottetown has the correction of the accounts of the County and Way Offices.

In the Registrar's Office we corrected the few errors and omissions discovered there, and certified the balance. That Officer had paid into the Treasury, on account of Fees, more than the amount received.

In the Crown Land department we would recommend, that a Ledger should be prepared, in which names of purchasers of Lands—sold prior to May 1851—with the amounts paid and due, might be ascertained on inspection.

In the Impost and Excise Office we compared the Importer's Entries with the Books and the furnished Accounts, and find them to correspond. This Office being that in which the greater part of the Revenue of the whole Colony is collected, cannot be kept with too close vigilance on the part of the Officer in charge of it, to counteract the attempts at fraud which may be made by individuals to evade the payment of Duties. Impressed with this consideration, we feel it our duty to offer the following remarks :

1. In few instances the Report of the Master corresponds with the Entries made by the Importers. We would respectfully submit, that some means should be adopted to compel the Master of each Vessel to furnish, on Reporting, an accurate account of his Cargo.

2. The Merchants' Entries are frequently altered, and shew marks of erasure. We consider this objectionable, inasmuch as in any action for false entry a difficulty would be experienced in the want of clear proof necessary for conviction.

3. We notice in some cases two Entries by the same individual of Dutiable Goods, arriving in the same Vessel. In such cases a more particular form of Oath for the Post Entry would be necessary, as in each case the Entry is attested to as the whole Importation.

4. A custom prevails at this Office of granting permits to land Dutiable Goods before the Entry is filled or attested to, or the duties secured. This

practice, we conceive, is not only objectionable and contrary to Law, but liable to abuse and injurious to the Officer.

5. In the conversion of Newfoundland currency into that of this Island, 20 per cent. only is added. As the Spanish and Mexican Dollar is current in that Colony at 5s., and other coins in proportion, it appears to us that the Par of Exchange is 25 per cent.

6. We notice two entries of Dutiable Goods, imported for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, on which no duties were exacted, in conformity with a long standing usage. As we are not aware of any Statute exempting them from Impost Duty, we feel it our duty to state the circumstance.

7. Two entries of Watch Machinery have been made, on which the Duty exacted was 5 per cent.

There is a doubt on our minds whether these Goods should not have been classed under Wheel Machinery, paying 15 per cent.

We would respectfully suggest, that the Impost Office and Post Office should be inspected quarterly.

The Accounts and Books of the Road Correspondent were minutely examined. Vouchers for all the payments were exhibited and compared—the balance struck, and a copy certified.

We have previously reported on the Accounts of the Royal Agricultural Society.

I beg leave to acknowledge the receipt of your circular and printed form by yesterday's Post, and am extremely sorry that it is not in my power to give his Excellency a correct Account of the Exports from this place, as it was late in July last before I received authority to clear out vessels from this Port, but beg leave to state, that there were 2 Brigs from 200 to 250 tons each, loaded with timber and deals for Great Britain; and 7 Schooners, from 30 to 70 tons, for the British North American Colonies and the United States, with Agricultural produce, and

obliged to clear out in Charlottetown, before that period; and also in November and December there were 4 Schooners, from 40 to 100 tons, with cargoes of produce for the above mentioned places, and also cleared out in Charlottetown, making thirteen in all; and what has been cleared out with me you have a correct statement on the printed form, and also what has been entered inwards. You are aware that the supplies from Great Britain and the United States, and also from the British Colonies, are principally landed in Charlottetown, and the country people supplied by the Charlottetown Merchants, with the exception of what produce is shipped away by the firm-

Specification for the construction of a Light House at the Port of Georgetown, together with a Dwelling for the Keeper, to be built with sound wood and Island stone, according to the plan and sections herewith.

BASEMENT. To dig out the ground to the depth of five feet below the present surface, trenches to be taken out for the foundation and walls, and after they are in, to fill in and ram down the ground with wooden rammers; to level and to do such other rough ground work as may be necessary for forming the sectional ground lines, shewn upon the drawing, and finally to leave the ground altogether free from all useless soil or other materials. The earth to be taken out a sufficient depth to obtain a hard and solid foundation for the footings, these and the walls to be of Island stone of best quality, free from salt, &c., &c., and laid throughout in the direction of its natural bed in level courses; the stones to be of large size and thickness, with bond stones the whole thickness of the wall, at three feet distance in every course where required for securing proper bond; each course to be laid in good mortar properly flushed in every course, composed of stone lime and sharp sand, free from salt, in proportion of one bushel of lime to two of sand. The line of the wall on the outside to be octagonal and butter, as shewn in section; on the inside to be circular, and twenty feet six inches in diameter; the stone to be made even on the inside and faced on the outside, seven feet perpendicular in height from the footings, where it is to be three feet six inches in thickness, and two feet four inches at the top, the joints to be all upright, and none to be on the angles.

THE TOWER. To frame eight angle ribs (from A to B in plan) to consist of four upright and four horizontal pieces of timber, to be well put together, the mortices, and closely fitted and pinned, the joggles accurately made, and the whole screwed up tight and firm with wrought iron screw bolts, one inch and quarter diameter, and proper washes and screw nuts, in the places and form shewn in the drawing, so that each of the eight pieces of framing for the angles

may be firm in itself, and leave an octagonal opening in the centre of — feet diameter, and when put in their places, are to be filled in between in the manner shewn on the left hand of the drawing, the cross pieces to be fixed with two rag bolts at each end, those in the inside the same way. The whole skeleton thus completed is to be first evenly faced and then covered with sound three inch spruce or pine plank of even thickness, twelve inches wide, and free from sap, shakes and rot, the edges to be bevelled to an angle of sixty degrees, to be close and straight jointed, well fixed on with seven inch wrought iron spikes, eight to each plank to the top of the third story, and six to each one above, the heads to be punched down as to a ship's deck, so as not to bruise the plank, with the maul. The upright curb to receive the lantern, and the coping outside the same to be planed, the coping to be groved into the curb, and the under edge throated, the mitres to be groved and tongued, both to be secured by up and down, in and out, five-eighths iron bolts to the frame work. The facing pieces round the Tower under the coping are to be of three inch plank planed, rebuted on the lower edge to receive the shingles, and to be well and carefully spiked on. The planking on the main body being made flat and even without any irregularities in the surface, the angles are to be cased with inch and half sound pine or spruce boards fixed with wrought nails, planed, rebuted together, and finished with a returned inch bead, the line of angle to be perfectly straight from bottom to top, the inner edge to be rebuted to receive the shingles if required. The space between the angles to be covered with sound pine shingles, in straight five inch courses, to be shaved to an equal thickness, jointed with a plane, and made square at the butts, and nailed with wrought nails, the whole to be made wind and water tight. To put a water table

of sound spruce round the base of the Tower, to project — inches, with a three inch plank twelve inches wide under the same (as shewn in the drawing) both to be planed, and well fixed with bolts and spikes; to be groved and tongued at the mitres. Eight stout window frames to be made, and fixed with circular heads on linings, to be fitted with two inch sashes properly hung upon centres, the head to open inwards and fitted with strong hooks and eyes, to keep them open when required, also bolts to fasten them inside; each to be glazed with nine panes of strong glass, about eleven by nine inches, well bedded with putty inside and out. To fix a piece of copper over the window heads and cheeks outside, to turn off the water, the whole to be impervious to rain and wind.

FLOORING. To joist the ground story with sound spruce scantling, twelve inches by four inches, home to the outside planking (as shewn in ground plan) to be spiked down to the supporting timbers, and to the upright when they come in contact; to cover the same with sound three inch spruce plank of even thickness, groved and tongued, three-eighths in thickness, to be close jointed and well cramped together, and fixed with seven inch spikes, two in each joist.

STAIRCASE. To make and fix an octagonal winding staircase, in the centre of the building, with strings, bearers, newels and rails complete, leaving a well hole (as shewn in the plan) four feet diameter, the risers and treads to be of one and a half inch sound spruce, free from sap, and fixed with wrought nails.

LANTERN. To make and fix a lantern with a railing outside (as shewn in the drawing) of the best refined wrought iron; the upright angle pieces also, the top and bottom bars to be three inches wide by three quarters of an inch in thickness, the bars forming the sash part to be one and a half inch by a quarter inch in thickness, prepared with rebates in the inside for the reception of the glass, that broken ones may be replaced without going out, all to be neatly fitted and made water tight. To form the roof with twenty four ribs, or rafters of iron one inch and half by three-eighths, or half an inch, the eight main angles to be a little stouter. The railing outside of the lantern to consist of four wrought iron bars horizontal, three quarters or an inch diameter, and eight perpendicular ones at eighteen inches distant from the glass, and to be properly secured as shewn in the drawing. The lantern to be secured by broad iron straps, bolts and nuts to the principal uprights and joists below the floor, as shewn in section. To provide, and put in, seventy two panes of stout plate glass, about seventeen inches by eleven inches, as many of them as may be required to be put in and well bedded in the inside and out with good linseed oil putty, and made perfectly water tight.

The floor of the light room, and that of the story below it to be joisted with good spruce timber sawed, eight inches by four inches, notched down, to be covered with inch plank, prepared and fixed in the same manner as the ground story, the sides to be lined up to the lantern in the same way, and made to keep out the wind. The floor, the stand for the lamps, and all the wood work in the light room, to be covered with sixteen ounce copper, and fixed on with copper nails. To form a lobby at the top of the stair to communicate with the light room, also to allow of access to the outside of the lantern when required; the size of the lobby will depend upon the space required to be darkened on the land side of the Light House. Two stout framed doors to be well fitted and hung, especially the outer one, to keep out rain and snow, and to be well secured with bolts and latches.

To put up a two inch four pannelled brad and butt door, with a suitable strong frame and sill, to have inside linings and casings on both sides, the door to be hung with four inch bolts, and a twelve inch stock lock and latch, provided and fixed. Two proper ventilators of copper in the lantern, and cast iron shores, or steps, on the wall to receive the framing.

KEEPER'S LODGE. To dig out a cellar to receive the house and porch of the size given in the drawing, five feet below the present level of the ground, to build up a stone wall of good quality in regular courses, and upright joists six feet high, eighteen inches in thickness, and faced on both sides, each course to be well bedded in good mortar, well flushed in, to have proper footings and bond. The earth to be levelled, &c., and cleared away as required at the Light House.

The building to be substantially framed, and divided as shewn in plan; to be rough boarded and shingled with best pine shingles, in six inch courses, on the walls, the roof in five inch courses, and strips of birch bark on all the joints throughout, and put on with wrought iron nails, a plain board put round under the eaves, and a projecting water tabling at the base, plain corner castings. To put up a good sound brick chimney with two flues half a brick in thickness, with proper foundations from the cellar, the flues to be properly pargetted, and the whole outside plastered round. Two floors to be laid of inch and quarter spruce boards, groved, tongued and planed, and properly nailed; the joists to be of sound spruce without sap, eight inches by four, notched down, and placed as shewn in the drawing. The rooms to be eight feet high, the walls and ceilings to be lathed with stout laths, and finished with two good coats of plaster, a plain board skirting to be put on afterwards. To make five plain strong buttoned doors, groved and planed, stout lining and mouldings both sides round

the same, to be hung with proper butt hinges and screws, and fitted with iron latches and two eight inch knob locks to be put on; a plain chimney piece in one room, if required; to make a strong stair to lead to the cellar, and another to the attic. The inside partitions four by four inch studs; the outside studding six inches by four inches; the cells twelve by ten, and the other main timbers nine by six inches. The seven window frames to have inside linings, and one and a half inch sashes, glazed with good glass and properly put in with putty. All the wood work inside and out to be painted twice over with best white lead and linseed oil. The roof to be finished with metallic paint.

Annual Report of the Governors and Trustees of the Lunatic Asylum and House of Industry: together with an Account of the Expenditure thereof, for the past year, and other papers connected therewith.

CHARLOTTETOWN,

March 5, 1852.

SIR:

By order of the Board of Trustees of the Lunatic Asylum and House of Industry, I have the honor to transmit herewith the returns for the year ending February 29, 1852, of that institution, together with several papers connected therewith, for the information of the Hon. the House of Assembly.

The information afforded by Dr. Mackieson, tends to throw light on the result of treatment of lunatic patients; his remarks extend over the last three years.

It will be seen that where cases are of recent occurrence, lunatic maladies have given way to medical treatment, and it is to be regretted that the means at the disposal of the Trustees are so limited as to create a painful conviction that there are many persons laboring under this most grievous of all afflictions who might, could they have been properly treated, have been restored to sanity and their families.

It appears, by reference to the last census, that there were then in the Island ninety-nine idiots and lunatics.

The Trustees feel themselves bound, by the Act regulating the institution, to entertain a certain num-

ber of imbecile paupers; these, it will be seen by the report, are incapable of contributing, even by housework, towards the maintenance of the institution.

Charity, of one form or another, might provide for such as these, but it is not so with lunatics; and any grant the Legislature might please to make, not being subject to the law, might be made exclusively for the care of lunatics.

It will be seen that the salary of the Medical Officer, supposing it to be £25 per annum, is greatly in arrear.

I am directed in addition, to remark on the fact of there being no secure enclosure annexed to the Lunatic Asylum, or even cheerful rooms, and that consequently that moral treatment which has been found so useful an auxiliary in the cure of lunatic disorders, is extremely circumscribed, if it can be said to exist at all.

GENTLEMEN;

A period of three years has now elapsed since I furnished your Board with the first general Report of the Lunatic Asylum; and considering the sanative results we have since obtained, it is with much satisfaction that I now submit to your inspection the accompanying tabular statement of its practical operation, as it shows in a more distinct view than words can elucidate, the greatly increasing success and general usefulness of this new institution.

At my last general Report, in February 23, 1849, there remained in the Asylum 7 cases of lunacy, all of which, with one exception, were chronic, or of long standing: 3 of between two and three years standing, and 3 upwards of ten years duration. Of the former, 2 have since recovered; of the latter, 2 may be considered incurable—one from hereditary predisposition, the latter from being now of thirteen years standing.

We now arrive at those cases admitted since last Report. They amount to 12 in number, of which 1 has died from debility or exhaustion consequent on paralysis, 3 are chronic cases of twenty, twenty-four and thirty years standing, respectively, and who, from other potent causes, have been adjudged incurable. Of the remaining 8, recent admissions, (with the exception of the last, but recently placed under treatment,) every one has been discharged cured, and which, I am proud to state, exhibits a larger proportion of recoveries in recent cases than I have been able to discover in the records and reports of any similar institution in Britain or America, amounting

to nearly 90 per cent, and gives as large a proportion of recoveries as we obtain from other acute diseases, and furnishes the most urgent reasons for parents and guardians to forward their afflicted relatives for medical treatment, with the least possible delay.

As respects the paupers, they amount to 7 in number, all of them superannuated men, broken down under the pressure of years and chronic infirmities, inseparable from the octogenarian state, whose years range from 61 to 84, and who can in no degree contribute either to their own maintenance or to the funds of the Asylum.

In conclusion, impressed as I am with the importance of my position and trust, it is to me a matter of no small gratification to observe the steady and rapid progress in improvement and usefulness, as developed in the foregoing statistics, notwithstanding the disadvantages I daily experience in the moral treatment of the insane, from limited resources and stunted endowment; but I hopefully anticipate that when the attention of the Legislature shall be directed to the particulars comprised in the accompanying succinct statement, they will not hesitate to extend their pecuniary sympathy to this the only Hospital in operation on the Island, and to the alleviation of a distress, need I say, the most afflicting incident to humanity.

Letter from the Consular Agent of the United States, and the Lieutenant Governor's answer thereto.

CONSULATE OF THE UNITED STATES,
PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND AGENCY,
Charlottetown, March 2, 1852.

May it please Your Excellency:

While the Legislature is in session, I beg leave to bring the subject of this letter under your Excellency's consideration.

Owing to the very many and melancholy disasters that occurred on the North Coast of this Island, during the gale last autumn, many of the owners of vessels, and others interested, have intimated to me their willingness to contribute towards the erection of Harbor Lights at the entrance of Malpec and Tracadie harbors, as well as to the erection of Lights at the East Point and North Cape—the latter two, however, being under the consideration of Government, I would wish for the present to confine myself to the two first mentioned.

I have been solicited to proceed to the United States, during the early part of the ensuing summer, for the purpose of forwarding so necessary and desirable an undertaking; but it is necessary that I should, if possible, elicit from the local Government, in the first instance, to what extent it would contribute towards these objects; and I need scarcely observe that the success of the contemplated plan will depend in a great measure on its liberality.

Your Excellency is aware that the number of our fishing vessels is rapidly increasing, and that every encouragement and facility should be afforded them. That Harbor Lights, at the entrance of the two harbors above mentioned, would be of very great advantage to all vessels thus employed—as at present, in every instance of a sudden gale from the North, during dark nights and thick weather, the fishing vessels are obliged to leave the fishing ground, and run for shelter round either the North Cape or East Point, and thereby lose considerable time in regaining the fishing ground each time.

I have heard it observed by fishermen, that nearly one-third of their time is thus lost; whereas if Harbor Lights were erected at the above-mentioned harbors, this necessity would in a great measure be obviated. It is considered that good and substantial

lights, sufficient for the purpose, could be erected at the cost of £400 to £450 each, or perhaps less, which would, no doubt, be otherwise of great benefit to the Colony, by very materially increasing the trade at these ports.

I beg, therefore, most respectfully to crave your Excellency's early and earnest attention to this matter, and trust that your Excellency will feel yourself at liberty to call the attention of the Legislature to it, during the present session; and I hope to be placed by its action in such a position that I may be enabled to induce parties in the United States to contribute any sum that may be wanting to effect the desired object.

I should hope that the Reciprocal Trade question between the United States and this Colony, yet undetermined, will not, as I humbly conceive it need not, be allowed to interfere with the erection of lights, as under the treaty already in force between the United States and Great Britain, the American fishing vessels are permitted to enter the harbors of the Colony, for shelter, wood, water, &c.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, March 5, 1852.

The Lieut. Governor has received the letter dated the 3d January, from Mr. Henry Palmer, Consular Agent for the United States of America at Prince Edward Island, on the subject of erecting lights at the entrance of Malpeque and Tracadie harbors, on the North side of this Island. In compliance with Mr. Palmer's request, the Lieut. Governor has submitted the letter for the consideration of the Legislature. Should Mr. Palmer proceed to the United States, as he proposes to do, "for the purpose of forwarding so necessary and desirable an undertaking," the Lieut. Governor would venture to suggest that the U. States citizens should be made fully aware of the Colonial Statute 6 Victoria, cap. 14, which received the royal assent on the 3d Sept. 1844.

Minutes of Evidence taken before the Committee of the whole House on Privileges, in the matter of the Hon. Edward Whelan, and Edward Palmer, Esq., two of the Members.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY,
Monday, March 8, 1852.

The House resolved itself into a Committee of Privileges, on the matter of the accusation preferred by Edward Palmer, Esq., Member of this House, against the Hon. E. Whelan, also a member of this House, during the debate, in Committee of the whole House, on the Lawyer's Bill on the 2d instant.

Mr. Flynn took the Chair of the Committee.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Coles, Mr. J. B. Cooper was appointed Clerk of the Committee.

Ordered, That the Clerk of the Committee, in his capacity of a Justice of the Peace, do administer an oath to each of the witnesses who may be required to give evidence before the Committee.

Resolved, That any witnesses called in the present proceedings (not Members of the House) shall not be allowed to be present at the examination of other witnesses, prior to their own examination.

On motion, the following extract from the Journals of this House, of the 2d March instant, was read by the Chairman:

"Whereas Edward Palmer, Esq., a Member of this House, while the House was in Committee on the Lawyers' Bill, charged the Hon. Edward Whelan, a Member of the House, by implication, with being a perjurer, by having taken his seat in this House without a qualification; *Therefore, Resolved*, That Mr. Palmer retract the implied accusation against Mr. Whelan—unless he is prepared to substantiate the same—and do apologise to this House for such uncalled for and unfounded language; and that Mr. Whelan be required to apologise to the House for the unbecoming language made use of by him in debate."

And the said Resolution being again read, Mr. Thornton moved, in amendment to the same, to leave

out all after the word "Whereas," and substitute the following:

"Edward Palmer, Esq. and the Hon. Edward Whelan having, in debate, in Committee of the whole House, on the Lawyers' Bill, made use of unparliamentary language towards each other: and Edward Palmer, Esq., having, by implication, during the debate, accused the Hon. E. Whelan of perjury, in taking his seat in this House without the legal qualification; and there appearing to this House no foundation for such accusation; but, inasmuch as the language was called forth by certain insinuations on the part of the Hon. E. Whelan, which E. Palmer, Esq., understood as attacking the character of his late Father; *Therefore, Resolved*, That the said E. Palmer, Esq., and the Hon. E. Whelan, do severally apologize to the House, and to each other, for their language, used in debate this evening."

“Mr. Palmer and Mr. Whelan, who had retired, having been called in, and the foregoing Resolution, adopted by the House, having been read, Mr. Whelan rose in his place, and apologized to the House.

“Mr. Palmer then stated, in his place, that if time is given him to procure Witnesses, he is prepared to prove that at the time Mr. Whelan took his seat in the House, he was disqualified; he had already apologized to the House, and now did so again.”

On motion of the Hon. Colonial Treasurer—

“Ordered, That Mr. Palmer be required, without any unnecessary delay, to substantiate the accusation he had preferred against Mr. Whelan.”

On motion of the Hon. Mr. Coles—

“Ordered, That Mr. Whelan do, to-morrow, lay his qualification before the House.”

Resolved, That in order to investigate the present proceedings, it is reasonable that the witnesses to be adduced in evidence shall be sworn at the bar of this House by a Justice of the Peace.

JOHN DAWSON, the first witness called, was sworn as follows:

“The evidence you shall give, touching the Question of Privilege now before this Committee, shall be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth: So help you God.”

Mr. Whelan's Deed was handed to the witness.

1. Was the transfer on the back of the deed now produced to you, signed by you, and at what time and date? It was signed by me, but I am at a loss as to the day and date. It was signed at the day and date of the transfer on the back. The agreement was signed, but not the deed. When was the Transfer on the back signed? I am at a loss as to the date, it being so far back. It was not signed at that date.

2. How long after the 7th August, 1846, was the transfer signed? I cannot recollect the date.

3. Was the transfer given in accordance with a written agreement? It was.

4. Will you swear it was signed in the year 1846? The deed was given away by me, but not signed, in 1846.

5. Will you swear it was signed in 1847? No; I cannot.

6. Was a written agreement given by you in 1846? There was.

9. Where is the written agreement in accordance with which the transfer was executed? Handed over to the Hon. Mr. Whelan.

8. Do you believe, on your Oath, that the transfer was signed in the year 1847? I cannot say; it might or might not, but I rather think not.

9. Was the deed handed over to Mr. Whelan at the time the written agreement was entered into between you and him? It was.

10. Who were present when the transfer was signed? The Hon. Mr. Coles and the Hon. Mr. Warburton.

11. When the agreement was handed to Mr. Whelan, and the deed, what was the reason you did not transfer the deed at the same time? I did not get payment at the same time.

12. Was your wife's relinquishment of dower taken on the same day the transfer was executed? Yes.

13. Did you not get payment in accordance with your agreement? I did.

14. What was the amount of payment? £50.

15. Did you, *bona fide*, receive £50 for the land? Yes.

26. When did you receive the £50? At two different payments, (periods,) according to my agreement.

17. Did you get payment before it became due? I did.

18. What were the periods named by the agreement at which you were to receive the £50? I can't give an answer; it is out of my recollection.

19. Had you any claim on the land after the transfer was made? None at all.

20. Was it by note that you were secured in payment? Yes.

21. Did you consider that by your not signing the deed at the time you sold Mr. Whelan the property, you had any claim upon the land? None at all.

22. What was the date of the note? I really cannot give an answer as to the date.

23. Was it given at the time of the transfer? It was.

24. Was any money, and how much, paid down at the time of the transfer? No money was paid at the time.

25. Did Mr. Whelan secure your payment for the land in 1846, when the agreement was entered into between you and him? In no shape whatsoever, no further than his own bare word.

26. Did not the agreement secure you? In no shape.

27. Was the amount of purchase mentioned in the agreement? It was.

28. Was the amount £50? It was.

29. Had Mr. Whelan the right to sell the land, if he thought proper to do so, after the agreement was entered into in 1846? He had.

30. Who paid you the instalments of the purchase money? Mr. Whelan; can't name the day; he paid according to agreement.

31. Will you swear that the whole amount of the £50 has been not only received by you, but also applied to your own use and benefit? Yes, I do.

32. Did you receive any money within the last year? I did; upwards of £30.

33. Was that paid before it became due? It was paid at two different times. The last instalment was not paid until last month; I can't name the day.

34. Did you mention to any person that you expected to receive only £7 10s. for the land, after the time you made the agreement, in 1846? Never in the world—couldn't.

35. Where you ever offered more for the land than Mr. Whelan gave? I was offered for the land, when I had it but for a short time, £30, £40 and £45. £60 was my upset price.

36. What value did you set upon the land when you sold it to Mr. Whelan? I sold it to Mr. Whelan for £50, but I told him that £60 was my price when he first spoke for it.

37. Did you ever see the land yourself, or do you know what kind of land it is? I never did.

38. When did you cease paying the land tax for that land? I think a couple of years since; I had a farm adjoining it, and paid the tax for both at the same time; I charged Mr. Whelan with the tax, with his knowledge.

39. Had you any understanding with Mr. Whelan to that effect? I had.

40. Did you not pay the land tax for the year 1850? I don't think I did; I am not certain.

41. Did Mr. Whelan pay the land tax for a farm adjoining his, and for which you formerly paid? I can't answer.

42. Did you not inquire at the Receiver's Office whether the land tax was paid for the last year, 1851? No.

43. Who placed the wafer seals on the transfer? It was done in my presence, but I do not know by whom; it was done when I signed the transfer.

44. Do you know whether Mr. Whelan has been in treaty, for some time past, about purchasing a farm now owned by Francis Duggan, and for which he paid the land tax last year, and which you formerly paid? I believe he was; I know he was.

45. Was that land ever laid off by a surveyor? It was given in the deed to me with a plan.

46. Did you ever agree to sell or let any part of the seventy-three acres to Mr. Duggan, or any other person besides Mr. Whelan? I did; there were several in treaty for it before Mr. Whelan; several had applied since, but I sent them to Mr. Whelan.

47. What amount did you pay the Sheriff for the land? I can't recollect, the deed has been so long out of my hands; but it would speak for itself.

48. What price did you give for the farms adjoining the land in question? I can't recollect.

49. When Mr. Palmer called at your house, during the past week, did you hide yourself from him? I did not; I'd be very sorry to do so.

50. Did you send word to Mr. Palmer that you would be ready to see him, if he wished? I did, after Mr. Palmer was out; I was unwell when Mr. Palmer called, and had given orders to admit no one; but I sent Mr. Palmer word that I was ready to see him, after receiving his note.

51. Did Mr. Whelan attend at your house since last Tuesday? He did.

52. Are you aware that Mrs. Dawson, your wife, told Mr. Palmer, on two different days, when he called, that you were not at home? I know it; those were my orders with respect to any other person, as well as Mr. Palmer.

Witness discharged.

WILLIAM CUNDALL, Esq., sworn.

53. Were you Sheriff of Queen's County in 1843? Did you sell and convey any lands under Land Assessment sales in the year 1843, part of Lot 37; and to whom and at what price? I was Sheriff of this County in 1843; I received a writ at the suit of the Treasurer of this Island against 473 acres of land on Lot 37, in the month of May, 1843, for arrears of Land Assessment and costs; I sold 100 acres to L. C. Worthy, Esq., at £7 10; a second hundred to the same person at £9; a third hundred to J. D. Hazard, Esq., for £5 10; a fourth hundred to Robert Weeks, for £8 15; and 73 acres to John Dawson, for £6; the day of sale was the 24th July, 1843.

54. Who owns or claims, at present, the 73 acres sold to Mr. Dawson? I have heard Mr. Whelan, a member of this House; I know nothing of it personally.

55. Did you levy on each and every of the tracts mentioned? I did not; the levy was made on the first mentioned, in name of the whole, I believe, as I was not present.

56. Did you sell the 73 acres to Mr. John Dawson according to a plan exhibited at the time of sale, and by any known metes and bounds? I sold the 73 acres to Mr. John Dawson as follows:—Commencing at a stake in the line of division between Lots 48 and 37, at the distance of 28 chains and 80 links north of Lot 49; thence running east 104 chains; thence north 7 chains; thence west 104 chains; thence south 7 chains, to place of commencement; sold for 2s. 11d. debt, and £1 18s. 6d. costs.

57. By what means were you enabled to give a description of the lands? By the assistance of Mr. Joseph Ball, who gave a description for the deeds.

Witness discharged.

J. R. BOURKE, Esq., sworn.

58. Were you present at any Assessment Sale of Lands in 1843, on Lot 37? I think I was.

59. Are you acquainted with the situation of 73 acres then sold to Mr. John Dawson? I think so.

60. Do you recollect what sum it sold for? If I recollect right, £6.

61. What kind of land is it? Like land in general—some good, some bad.

62. What is the highest amount you would have given for the 73 acres yourself? I cannot say, as I did not know what the land was at the time.

63. What is your present opinion as to the value of it in the year 1850? I cannot exactly say; I would not wish to say; it is back land, and may be worth more to some than others.

64. Do you consider the land of more value in 1850, than it was in 1843, when sold? I should consider it was more valuable in 1843 than in 1850, as there was more timber on it in the former year than there is now.

65. Is there any public road to it, and has it any front by road or water? None that I am aware of, except a private wood road.

66. Would it not be worth more to you than to any other person, if there were valuable wood or timber on it? In point of timber it might.

67. Would you have given £30 for it at any time? I can't say that I would. It is principally for the timber that I would purchase it. The land would be more valuable for a farmer, of course.

68. Have you ever been on the land in question? I believe so.

69. What kind of wood or timber is there growing on the land? Part hard-wood, part soft-wood.

70. What would you consider the timber on 73 acres of land worth, provided it was fit for ship-building purposes? A good deal.

71. Are you aware of any masts for vessels having been cut on the said land? I cannot say. I had a mast cut not far from it, on Fitzsimmon's land.

72. What proportion of the land is dry, hardwood land? That is very hard to ascertain in the woods. I did not take particular notice. There might be from 20 to 30, or perhaps 40 acres—cannot exactly say.

73. You were at the sale, when this land was sold, did you consider it a great bargain at the price sold for? If I had considered it worth more, I would not have allowed it to go for that. I did not like to buy a pig in a poke.

74. Is not softwood land, in that locality, as valuable as hardwood, on account of the timber growing thereon? Certainly it is, when there is timber sufficient for sawing or building, and I would sooner purchase it than other land, for the value of the timber.

75. What did you give for the mast in question? I think 30s. for the tree, and I cut and hauled it myself.

76. How far is the rear of your farm from the land in question? About nine miles. I hold a mill-site on Fitzsimmons' farm.

77. What kind of timber was growing on the swamp? Softwood timber of all kinds—some sufficient for mill logs.

78. Was there much timber on the said land in 1846? Yes, there was some. On some parts there was not much—on other parts some bushes—some longer stuff.

79. How many mill logs, of 12 feet in length, do you think an acre of land would produce? It depends upon how the timber may produce.

80. Would a good acre produce 60 logs? It would produce 160, 260 or 500, according to the growth.

81. Have you been in the habit of buying mill logs? I have.

82. What do you in general give a piece for mill logs? That depends upon the size. On an average 1s. 6d. delivered at the mill.

83. How many mill logs did you at any time see on the land? I cannot exactly say. I have seen some.

84. What number of longers do you think an acre of land would produce? I never reckoned them.

85. What do you consider logs worth at the stump, cash? The average price is 9d. at the stump.

86. Would a good acre cut 5,000 longers? It might, if they would cut double lengths.

87. What do you give for longers at the stump, per hundred? I don't buy any in that way. I believe they get 2s. a hundred for them, cut.

88. What do you give, per hundred, for cutting longers? I don't get any cut in that way.

Witness discharged.

FRANCIS KELLY, Esq., sworn.

89. Are you acquainted with the situation of 73 acres of land on Lot 37, purchased by Mr. John Dawson, at Land Assessment Sale, and now claimed by Mr. Whelan? Yes, I know where it is.

90. State the quality of the land, and whether it has any front by road or water, or any public access? I was not on the land, except for about 20 or 30 chains, which was swamp. We then came into hardwood—cannot say the exact distance. The back part did not appear so bad as the front, but it was low wet land.

91. What do you consider the fair marketable value of the land was in the year 1850? From what I saw of it, I cannot conscientiously state the value.

92. Was it well covered with timber? When we came into the hard-wood, there was very good timber.

93. Would you have given £15 for it? I did not want it, and therefore would not give anything for it for myself.

94. Are there any shipyards in the vicinity? There was a shipyard at Vernon River and one at Mr. Hayden's, a good distance from it.

95. Are you aware of any timber having been hauled from that vicinity to shipyards? Yes.

96. Are you aware if any mast or masts has been cut on the land in question? No, not that I am aware.

97. What distance is the land in question from salt water? I think Vernon River is the nearest, distant five or six miles.

98. Do you know whether any ship timber was hauled off the land in question? Not that I can say.

99. What does land in that vicinity let for per acre? One shilling sterling, and one shilling currency, per acre—some less.

100. Is that in a wilderness state? Yes.

101. Do you consider it any disadvantage to have a part of a farm soft-wood land? No, if there is not too much of it.

102. Would the 73 acres in question, without front or access by public road, let for one shilling an acre? I cannot say whether it would or not; as long as any could be got in front of it, it would not.

103. Do people, in general, haul hardwood timber five or six miles in that part of the country; or do you think hard-wood timber of any value on that land? I do not know of any persons hauling timber, except for ship-timber, from that distance; numbers of persons, however, haul firewood to Charlottetown.

104. What is wood worth per cord, stumpage, in that locality? I am not aware of any being sold in that way.

Witness discharged.

JAMES D. HASZARD, Esq., sworn.

105. Did you purchase any land at Sheriff's Assessment Sale in 1843, part of Lot 37, and for what price? I think it was in 1843 that I purchased 100 acres, for about £9.

106. Did Mr. John Dawson purchase any, and have you ever been on the tract he purchased? I think Mr. Dawson purchased on the same day. Subsequently I had the curiosity to go over the adjoining lands of Mr. Weeks and Mr. Dawson. I went over the front and about the centre.

107. State quality of the tract purchased by Mr. Dawson? The front of the whole plots of land—Mr. Dawson's included—was swampy. As I descended towards the Hillsborough, the land appeared less valuable, being still more swampy.

108. Has it any road or water front, or any public access, and is it situate on the outer or inner part of Lot 37, and how far from any settlement? I think it is about a mile and a half from the Pisquid and Malpeque Roads—about mid-way between both—without any means of access from either. It fronts on one of the boundary lines of Lot 48.

109. What do you think the fair marketable value of the tract was in the year 1850? I do not think it was of the same value as my own. Mr. Mooney was to take mine at £30, but he did not think proper to ratify the bargain, therefore I consider that he did not think it worth that sum. As far as I could judge, the swamp ran diagonally across all the plots of ground.

110. Do you consider your inspection of the land in question sufficiently extensive to enable you to form an accurate estimate of its value? I think I could; I should be very glad to get £30 for mine at the present time.

111. You say you only examined the front of the land in question; what quantity of it would that be? The proportion of the chaining of it; I went through it near the centre, which was in a sloping direction, and appeared to be swampy; the back of my land is pretty good; I did not go on the back of the other.

112. In what year did you make the inspection of the land? I cannot say precisely—five or six years ago; it might have been later—three or four years ago.

113. What time of year was it when you were on the land? In the summer season. I recollect it was an extremely hot day.

114. Did you at any time previous to your inspection of the land, express any opinion as to its being insufficient to constitute a qualification for a member of this House? I might have expressed such an opinion. I should say it is decidedly not. I do not think it worth half the amount. I would not give £10 for it this moment.

115. Did you ever tell Mr. Mooney that Mr. Whelan's farm was not worth 50s.? I do not think I ever did. There might have been some joking to that effect.

116. Will you swear that your mind is not biased in forming that opinion by political feeling? Positively not. I come here to deliver my evidence fairly and honestly, as I should do.

117. What length of time did your inspection of the land in question occupy, and did your inspection include the whole of the lands sold? It might possibly have occupied an hour—that is, with reference to Mr. Weeks' and Mr. Dawson's land. I was a longer time on my own.

118. Why had you any curiosity to see the land in question? I believed, at the time, that it was in

Mr. Dawson's possession; I did not know of anybody else owning it but Mr. Dawson.

119. Did you get your feet wet when walking over the land you call swamp? It was a very dry time of year; I could not get any water to drink; it was a white sandy swamp, covered with blue-berry bushes.

120. Have you known soft-wood land produce good crops? Yes, I have, on mixed ground, seen pretty fair crops, when well manured.

121. Had you no opportunity of quenching your thirst before you went on the land? I got some milk at Mr. Vickerson's.

122. Had you, at the time you were on the land, heard that Mr. Whelan qualified on the same? I certainly had not.

Witness discharged.

HON. GEORGE COLES, sworn in his place.

123. Are you a subscribing witness to the transfer on the deed now produced to you? Yes.

124. When did you first see the transfer, as endorsed on the said deed? I think it must have been about the 24th April, 1850, the time of the assignment of the widow's dower.

125. Was the transfer executed at the same time as the dower was relinquished? The transfer on the deed was signed at the same time.

126. Were you aware, at the time of the transfer of the deed, that it was not recorded? I never looked at the deed; I knew that Mr. Whelan had the deed in his possession for some time previous.

127. Did you know that there was an agreement for the sale of the land previous to the execution of its deed: and are you aware that its conditions were fulfilled? Yes; I knew that Mr. Whelan had an agreement for the purchase of the land, previous to the time the deed was executed and the deed handed over.

Witness discharged.

PATRICK MOONEY, sworn.

128. Are you acquainted with the extent and quality of the land formerly known as Dawson's land, now the property of Mr. Whelan? Yes, I know a considerable about it.

129. Have you had the land in charge from Mr. Whelan, and have you been frequently over it? Yes, I had it in charge a year from last Fall.

130. Did you, at any time, make Mr. Whelan an offer for the purchase of the land, and what amount? I did; £50.

131. Was that offer made when Mr. Whelan contemplated leaving the Island? I do not know that he intended leaving the Island at that time; I wanted my brother to buy it before that.

132. While you had the management of the land, was timber cut upon it for ship-building purposes? Yes.

133. Can you state about what quantity was cut? Yes; Mr. Whelan ordered me to keep an account of the stumps, and to let no one cut without regulating the price with me; and I counted fifty-eight stumps.

134. What was the average price, at that time, of stumpage? The men or boys I caught said they had orders from their master, Mr. James Bourke, to cut at 9d. per tree; as some of them were large trees, I said I would not allow them to cut for less than 1s. per tree.

135. Do you know Mr. Haszard's land? Which is the best quality, Mr. Haszard's or Mr. Whelan's, and what was the price your brother was to pay Mr. Haszard for his land? Yes; Mr. Whelan's, in my opinion, is the best, a long way. I heard Mr. Haszard say that he offered it to my brother for £30.

136. Were there not several stumps which you valued at 3s. each? There were five.

137. Does the land afford good timber for ship-building, and is it to be found in any considerable quantity upon the land? Yes, a distance back; the front is low land, with nothing larger than longers upon it.

138. Did you hear of any spars being cut upon the land for masts, and what prices did they bring? I cannot say that I ever heard of any spars being cut on Mr. Whelan's land.

139. Was there any swamp on Mr. Whelan's land, and what quantity of it is of that description? I think between six and eight acres, or perhaps more, are swamp.

140. Is there any road leading to the land? There is a road partly made this last fall, that will run within half a mile of the front of it.

141. Is the swamp well covered with longers? Part of it.

142. Is it well suited for farming purposes? Very well, in my opinion.

143. What, in your opinion, would be the value of the land per year, for the timber and longers which it affords? I cannot state, because there is not so much ship-building now as there was a year or two ago.

144. What is it worth, per acre, for the wood? I suppose the wood, on an average, is worth 10s. per acre; I consider the land and wood, together, worth 15s. per acre.

145. Do you believe that fence-poles and fire-wood are of any value in that place, were you to offer it for sale? I do.

146. What would the wood be worth per cord for fire-wood, on the land? I cannot say; it would be worth more for ship-timber.

147. Were you desirous of becoming the purchaser of Mr. Whelan's land, when you offered £50 for it? Yes; I requested my brother to purchase

it from Mr. Dawson in the Winter of 1846 or 1847, and he told my brother that he had sold it to Mr. Whelan, and had nothing to do with it.

148. How much money did you authorize your brother to give Mr. Dawson for the land? I told him to get it as cheap as he could; but recommended him to buy it, as it was good land.

149. Which of your brothers was it for whom the land was to be bought from Mr. Dawson, and what was the highest price you recommended or advised him to give Mr. Dawson for it? It was my brother John who was to buy the land; I did not set any price upon it, but wished him to buy it, as it was a good piece of land.

150. Will you swear that there are 40 acres of hard-wood land within the 73 acres? I will not swear that, for I never saw it measured.

151. When you offered Mr. Whelan £50 for it, were you aware what price he was to pay for his purchase, and did you know the amount Mr. Dawson had bought it for at the Land Assessment Sale? I knew nothing at all about it; neither the price Mr. Dawson gave for the land, nor the price which Mr. Whelan was to pay Mr. Dawson for it.

152. Have you ever seen soft-wood growing on a hill? Yes, often.

153. How many acres of swamp, according to the best of your belief, are there in the front? I think, between seven and eight—there may be more or less.

154. Is there any, and how much, swamp in the rear? I do not think there is any swamp in the rear to injure the land; I went seventy-one chains back, and did not see any swamp.

155. When you offered Mr. Whelan £50 for the land, would you have paid it, on your oath, if he agreed to accept it? Of course I would; I did not expect to get it without paying for it.

156. Did you sign a Petition to the House of Assembly, to obtain a road to these farms? Yes.

Witness discharged.

PATRICK HUGHES, sworn.

157. Do you know the situation of 73 acres of land, on Lot 37, owned by Mr. Whelan? I have seen it.

158. Have you ever been over it, and how often? I have been through it repeatedly, but cannot tell how often.

159. What, in your opinion, is the value of the land? I cannot tell; but I know what I sold my own for, which is situated within 50 acres of it.

160. What did you sell your own land for? I sold my 150 acres for £90.

161. Have you heard of any ship-timber having been cut upon the land, and how much, as far as you can judge? Yes, but I cannot form an accurate es-

timate of the quantity; there has been considerable timber cut on it.

162. Have there been any masts, or spars for masts, cut upon Mr. Whelan's land? I cannot tell that; a number have been cut on my own and Mooney's land, and Mr. Whelan's was as likely to produce masts, as my land or Mr. Mooney's.

163. What did you sell the masts each for, cut upon your land? From £8 to 20s.

164. How far is your own land situate from Mr. Whelan's—what front has your land, and what right of way have you to it? I understood, some time ago, that Mr. Whelan's land adjoined mine, but about a year since I learned that there are 50 acres between; my hundred acres have 9 chains and 20 links front, on the same line as Mr. Whelan's; at the time of the purchase, there was no road to the land, and we had to cross another man's land to get to it.

165. You say a deal of timber has been cut on the land in question; can you say in what year it was cut? Last winter was the first time I knew of any being cut upon it.

166. Will you swear that Mr. Whelan's land is equally good in quality as your own was that you sold? I considered it so, by going through it.

Witness discharged.

Ordered, That the Speaker do take the chair, and that the Chairman report progress, and ask leave to sit again.

WEDNESDAY, MARCH 10.

PATRICK HUGHES, re-called.

167. You stated, in your evidence last night, that you purchased your farm for £30, and sold it for £90; do you believe that you got full value for it? No, I did not think I got full value for it, if I wished to live on it.

168. Is Mr. Whelan's land of an equally good quality with your own? I always considered it so.

169. You stated, last night, that you sold your 150 acres of land; have you signed the deeds, or any writing to convey the lands you say you have sold, and how much of the purchase money have you received? I have signed an agreement; I have not signed any deeds yet; I have received about £11 of the purchase money, and there is some more due, which I expect to get this day.

170. Was the whole of your land sold to the one person? No.

171. To how many persons, and in what quantities, and the price of each quantity? To two persons; I sold one person 50 acres at £30, and another 100 acres at £60.

172. What amount did you realize by the sale of timber cut off your land before you sold it? I should require time to make up the amount; probably be-

tween £20 and £30 during one winter; my father and another person worked upon the land another winter, but I do not know the value of the timber cut by them.

173. Was that the value of the timber at the stump, or after it was manufactured and hauled out? Some we sold at the stump, and more of it we manufactured and hauled out ourselves.

Witness discharged.

JAMES FITZSIMMONS, sworn.

174. Do you know the land owned by Mr. Whelan on Lot 37? I know the land that is called Mr. Whelan's.

175. Have you been over it frequently, and what is your opinion as to the quality of it? I have been over it frequently; my own land is alongside of it; there is plenty of good land on it; most of it is good land.

176. What, in your opinion, is the value of the 73 acres owned by Mr. Whelan; what amount would you be disposed to give for it, if you wanted it? I would not wish to value it for any man; I have purchased land alongside of it, and gave £30 for 50 acres; I will give £50 for it, if sold.

177. When did you first know that the land belonged to Mr. Whelan? About three years ago; we heard this land formerly called "Dawson's land."

178. Is Mr. Whelan's land better or worse in quality than yours, along-side of it? I think it is equal to the land I purchased along-side of it.

Witness discharged.

JAMES H. BOURKE, sworn.

179. Are you acquainted with the situation, extent and quality of a certain lot of land, owned by Mr. Whelan, on Lot 37? State what you know respecting it. I have seen a part of it; did not see it all; part of that I saw was very good land, part bad.

180. Did it produce good timber, especially four or five years ago? Yes, I believe it did.

181. What do you think is the present value of it? It was worth more some years ago than it is now; I do not know the value of it now.

182. If it produced good timber four or five years ago, what would be the value of it then? It would be worth more to some persons than to others; I would say it was worth £50, in consequence of the timber and a saw-mill there.

183. What do you swear the market value of it was in January, 1850? I cannot exactly say; I was not much through the land.

184. Do you believe Mr. Whelan's land was worth £50, cash, in January, 1850? I cannot exactly say; if I had been all through the land, I might be able to say; it might be worth that, or it might not.

Witness discharged.

Ordered, That the Speaker do take the Chair, and that the Chairman report progress, and ask leave to sit again.

THURSDAY, MARCH 10.

(Afternoon sitting.)

The Minutes of Evidence were read by the Clerk. Also, Deed of 73 acres of land, on Lot or Township 37, from W. Cundall, Sheriff of Queen's County, to John Dawson, &c., dated 24th July, 1843; assignment, on the back thereof, of the said seventy-three acres of land to Edward Whelan, &c., by the said John Dawson and Charlotte, his wife; Receipt of the said John Dawson for the sum of £50 currency, being the full consideration money mentioned in the said assignment; and the Relinquishment of Dower of the said Charlotte Dawson, taken before the Hon. J. Warburton, April 24, 1850.

Edward Palmer, Esq., and the Hon. Edward Whelan, having severally addressed the Committee, it was moved that the Speaker do take the Chair, and that the Chairman report progress, and ask leave to sit again, which was agreed to, and ordered accordingly.

THURSDAY, MARCH 11.

The Hon. Edward Whelan, and Edward Palmer, Esq., having, on motion of the Hon. Mr. Coles, withdrawn from the Committee, Mr. Fraser moved that the Committee do come to a Resolution as followeth:—

Resolved, as the opinion of this Committee, That Edward Palmer, Esq., has failed to substantiate his implied charge of Perjury against the Hon. Edward Whelan, a Member of this House, as made by him during the debate on the Lawyer's Bill.

Mr. Douse moved to amend the said Resolution, by striking out all after the word "Resolved," and inserting the following:

"That the Deed of conveyance of Seventy-three Acres of Wilderness Land on Township 37, conveyed from William Cundall, Esq., Sheriff of Queen's County, to John Dawson, dated July 24, 1843, and transferred to the Hon. Edward Whelan, April 24, 1850, comes within the meaning of the Fourth clause of an Act to confirm Titles to Lands purchased under the several Acts for levying an Assessment on all Lands in this Island, as passed, April, 1845, viz.:

"That no Deed of any Sale heretofore made, shall be deemed valid, unless such Deed be executed within Six months after the passing of this Act, nor shall any such Deed as aforesaid be valid, before the same be duly registered."

Mr. Thornton moved to substitute the following in lieu of the proposed Resolution and amendment thereto:—

"Whereas the following Resolution passed this House on the 2d instant: 'Whereas Edward Palmer,

Esq., a Member of this House, while the House was in Committee on the Lawyers' Bill, charged the Hon. Edward Whelan, a Member of this House, by implication, with being a Perjurer, by having taken his seat in this House without a qualification, which accusation this House believes to be unfounded: *Therefore, Resolved*, That Mr. Palmer retract the implied accusation against Mr. Whelan (unless he is prepared to substantiate same) and do apologize to this House for such uncalled for and unfounded language; and that Mr. Whelan be required to apologize to the House for the unbecoming language made use of by him in debate.'

"And Mr. Palmer being called upon to make the said apology, replied as follows: 'If time is given him to procure Witnesses, he is prepared to prove, that at the time Mr. Whelan took his seat in the House, he was disqualified. He had already apologized to the House; and now did so again.' Whereupon the House 'Ordered that Mr. Palmer be required, without any unnecessary delay, to substantiate the accusation he had preferred against Mr. Whelan.'

"And Whereas, upon a full investigation into the matter, before a Committee of Privileges, it appears that the Deed of the Property upon which Mr. Whelan qualified is a Sheriff's Deed, for Land sold at a Land Tax Sale, to Mr. John Dawson, and is dated 24th July, 1843, and the same was transferred to Mr. Whelan, as appears by indorsement on said Deed, and which transfer, by the evidence of Mr. John Dawson, and the subscribing Witness, was not executed by him until 24th April, 1850, is not yet recorded, nor was the consideration money fully paid until 1852; and, therefore, at the time of Mr. Whelan's qualifying as a Candidate, in February, 1850, he had not a legal qualification: *Resolved, therefore*, That this House deems Mr. Palmer has, by the evidence adduced, so far substantiated the charge, by proving that in February, 1850, Mr. Whelan had not a legal qualification; but this House considering, that when Mr. Whelan qualified as a Candidate in February, 1850, he was not fully acquainted with the provisions of the Act II Vic, cap. 21, the House, therefore, exonerate Mr. Whelan from the implied accusation of Perjury."

And the question being put on the said Resolution, it passed in the negative.

Yeas—9.

Nays—11.

The question was then put on the Amendment proposed by Mr. Douse, when it also passed in the negative.

Yeas—8.

Nays—12.

Mr. Haviland then proposed to amend the original motion of Mr. Fraser, by adding the following words thereto:—

"Inasmuch as this Committee are of opinion that the Hon. Edward Whelan was ignorant of the provisions of the Election Law of 1848, when he took the Qualification Oaths, in March, 1850."

Mr. Douse moved to amend the proposed amendment, by striking out the words "was ignorant of," and substituting the words "did not comprehend," in lieu thereof.

Ordered, That Mr. Douse have leave to withdraw the said Amendment.

The question was then put on Mr. Haviland's proposed Amendment, when it passed in the negative. And the question being put on the original Resolution, the Committee divided:

Yeas—11.

Nays—7.

So it was carried in the affirmative.

Mr. Fraser thereupon moved that the Committee do come to a further Resolution, as followeth:—

Resolved, as the opinion of this Committee, That the Deed laid on the table of the House, by the Hon. Edward Whelan, is a sufficient qualification to entitle him to a seat in this House, as a Member thereof.

Mr. Haviland proposed to amend the said motion, by striking out the word "is," in the third line, and inserting the words "was not," in lieu thereof, and adding the words "in March, 1850," at the end thereof.

And the motion being seconded, and the question put thereon, it passed in the negative.

The question being put on the original motion, the Committee divided:

Yeas—11.

Nays—8.

So it was carried in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Speaker do take the Chair, and that the Chairman report the Resolutions agreed to, and ask leave to sit again.

FRIDAY, MARCH 12.

Mr. Fraser moved that the Committee do come to a Resolution as followeth:

Whereas, Edward Palmer, Esq., in his place, accused, by implication, the Hon. Edward Whelan, of Perjury, and was allowed by this House the alternative of retracting or substantiating the same: and whereas, upon a full investigation, he having failed to substantiate said charge: *Therefore, Resolved*, That the Speaker do admonish Edward Palmer, Esq., and require him to make the following apology:

I, Edward Palmer, while in the heat of debate, in charging, by implication, the Hon. Edward Whelan, of Perjury, now acknowledge that I have done wrong, and retract the accusation.

Mr. Clark moved, in amendment, that the whole be struck out, and the following substituted:

Resolved, That as E. Palmer, Esq., a member of this House, has failed to prove the charge (by implication) of perjury, made by him against the Hon. E. Whelan, that he be called upon by the House to retract such charge, in accordance with the Resolution of the House of the 2d instant.

Mr. Warburton proposed to amend the said amendment by adding the following words thereto: "And that he be admonished by the Speaker."

The Hon. Mr. Coles moved that Mr. Warburton's amendment be withdrawn—which was carried in the affirmative; and

Ordered, accordingly.

The question being put on Mr. Clark's amendment to the original motion, it was agreed to by the Committee.

The Hon. Mr. Warburton then moved that the Committee do come to the following Resolution:—

Resolved, That E. Palmer, Esq., having failed to prove the charge of perjury preferred by him (by implication) against the Hon. E. Whelan, that he be called upon to defray the expenses of the Witnesses examined before the Committee on Privileges.

The Hon. Mr. Pope moved to amend the said motion, by inserting the words "summoned by him," after the word "Witnesses," in the fourth line thereof; and the question being then put on the said motion, it was carried in the affirmative.

The question being then put on the main motion, as amended, it was agreed to by the Committee.

Mr. Montgomery submitted the following Resolution:—

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, from the evidence adduced, that the Hon. E. Whelan had not a legal qualification when he took his seat in this House in March, 1850.

The Hon. Colonial Treasurer moved in amendment, that the Speaker do take the Chair, and that the Chairman report the Resolution agreed to.

The Committee divided on the motion of amendment:—

Yeas—10.

Nays—9.

So it was carried in the affirmative; and
Ordered, accordingly.

Copies of Despatches between the Colonial Minister and Lieutenant Governor, on the subject of desertions from the Garrison in Charlottetown.

MILITARY, No. 1.

DOWNING STREET,
February 19, 1852.

SIR:

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch No. 6, of the 30th ultimo, forwarding a return of the desertions which have taken place in the Military force in Prince Edward Island, during the year 1851.

I regret to find from this return, that the crime of desertion still continues to be of frequent occurrence in Prince Edward Island, notwithstanding the instructions which I have, from time to time, addressed to your Predecessor with a view of checking this evil. I must particularly request your attention to the Despatch which I addressed to him, under date of the 9th February, 1850, No. 11, Military, in which I instructed him to bring this subject under the consideration of the local Legislature, with the view of such measures being passed by that body as they might deem best adapted to check the crime in question; and I have to desire that you will report to me the steps which may have been taken in pursuance of those instructions.

You will, at the same time, cause it to be distinctly understood that, unless something effectual is done to put a stop to this evil, I shall be compelled to carry into execution the intention intimated in my Despatch above adverted to, viz.: to withdraw the Troops from the Island.

I have the honor to transmit a return by which your Lordship will perceive, that the number of deser-

tions from the garrison of Charlottetown, during the past year, amounts to no less than twenty, out of a company of one hundred men.

It is a subject of great regret to me, that my efforts to check desertion have not been more successful. I can assure your Lordship that I have done all in my power, and that I have received every assistance from the Commandant of the Garrison, and the Regimental Officers, but I am sorry to be compelled to say, that instead of receiving the support I expected from the Inhabitants of this Colony, obstacles have been thrown in my way.

In 1848, it was represented by the Officer commanding the detachment of the 23d Fusileers, then stationed here, that desertion was encouraged by the Inhabitants, for the purpose of benefiting themselves, by procuring cheap labour. I was extremely unwilling to give credit to such a charge, but I confess that my further experience leads me to believe that it may be true.

From the enclosed documents, marked Nos. 1 & 2, your Lordship will see, that at the last Trinity Term of the Supreme Court in Charlottetown, I brought forward what appeared to be a clear case against a man for harbouring a deserter, and that the Grand Jury thought proper to throw out the Bill. It is evident that my endeavours must be fruitless, unless I can succeed in punishing the persons who harbour deserters, and the conduct of the Grand Jury shows that, as far as they are concerned, no conviction shall take place for that offence.

Under the circumstances I have described, I felt it to be my duty to recommend to Lieutenant General Sir John Harvey, that the Garrison should be reduced from 100 to 80 men, its former amount, and it is satisfactory to me to learn, that your Lordship approves of that reduction.

I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch, No. 1, Military, of the 2d ultimo, with the return therein enclosed, of the desertions which have taken place from the Troops in Prince Edward Island, during the preceding year.

Adverting to the amount of these desertions, and to the circumstances connected with them, which are reported in your Despatch, I have to instruct you to bring the subject under the consideration of the Legislature of Prince Edward Island, when it meets;

and that you will call upon that body to pass such measures as they may deem best adapted to check the crime in question. But you must endeavour to impress upon the inhabitants of the Colony that, unless they shall co-operate with Her Majesty's Government in repressing desertion, the Troops will be withdrawn.

REPORT

OF THE VISITOR OF SCHOOLS FOR QUEEN'S COUNTY.

FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDING OCTOBER 30, 1851.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION;

In submitting another half-yearly Return on the state of Elementary Education in this County, embracing a list of the Schools in operation entitled to public aid—together with a Table of the number of Scholars attending the same—I cannot flatter myself with being able to supply much additional or interesting information to the School statistics already in possession of your Board, or to congratulate you on any marked increase in the means of instruction since the date of my last Report. On the contrary, there appears a decrease of Eight Schools, as compared with the number on the Roll in March last. Sixteen Schools in all have been closed since this time last year, while Seven Schools, then vacant, have been re-opened, and one new one established, or more properly, a District, as seen below, divided into two. The summary of the whole stands thus:—

making a total of Fifty-seven Schools imparting instruction to Two thousand Four hundred and Three Scholars.

The stations now vacant, referred to above, are Charlottetown Royalty, (Eastern District,) Fullerton's Marsh, Brackley Point Road, Springfield, (Lot 67.) New Cornwall, Rustico, (Cross Roads,) York River, New South Wiltshire, Union Road, Argyle, or South Shore, Pisquid Road, Fort Augustus, Orwell Head, Flat River, Wood Islands, Long Creek.

The Schools re-opened are—Campbelton, Rustico, (Two,) Brown's Creek, (near Murray Harbor Road,) Upper Newtown, Charlottetown Royalty, (West,) Belle Creek, (an additional School,) Dog River.

It is apparent that the existing Educational supply

is very much short of the requirements of the population, yet this acknowledged inadequacy is not entirely owing to the want of Teachers; the aim and effect of each successive enactment, for several years past, have been, very sensibly, to increase the competency of the Instructor: every year adds to the Roll of licensed Teachers: still it is a matter of notoriety, as well as of regret, that not a few of these, after short terms of service, periodically abandon the profession, because they do not find in it the means of comfortable subsistence, and that consideration which they have a right to enjoy: the fact is, that there is less a derth of good teachers than of pecuniary means and of good Schools.

Under the administration of the present law, notwithstanding the deficiencies complained of, many beneficial changes have taken place, alike to advance their own Education, and improve their methods of instruction in the Schools under their management; and it is prophetic of a better state of things to compare the present condition of the District Schools with their aspect ten years ago, and when scarcely any were in continuous operation, but those in a few of the oldest and most wealthy Settlements.

BRANCHES AND METHODS OF INSTRUCTION.

Under these heads, I have only to report, that in all District—including Female Schools—reading, writing, arithmetic and English grammar are taught, on the simultaneous, or collective plan. Geography is also taught in Twenty-one Schools to Two hundred and Twenty pupils. In this Branch, the greatest proficiency, during the past half year, appears to have been made in the following Schools, viz.:—Cavendish, Park Corner, Hope River, Lots 48 and 49, Little York, Newtown and New Glasgow. At the first of these stations may be seen on the School Room Wall, a large and neatly executed map of the world, constructed by the accomplished and zealous

Teacher of the District, for the use of his pupils. At Hope River, a class was found sufficiently advanced to be able to solve with facility many important and useful problems on the map.

The majority of Teachers are very desirous of introducing into their course this interesting branch, but cannot prevail on all their Trustees to procure the necessary maps.

English Grammar is taught in the above Schools, as also in those of Mill River, St. Peter's Road, Seal River, Gallows Point, Covehead Road, Brackley Point, New Glasgow, Rustico Road, Long River, Princetown Road, Elliot River, and Canoe Cove, by principle and analytically, with success.

The majority of these also use the Black-board, which they find admirably adapted for instructing in calculation, orthography, grammatical analysis, as well as in the construction of sentences. On this latter head, I have aimed at inculcating the importance of exercises on practical subjects, in composition and the epistolary art; and also of initiating young persons in useful habits of business, in keeping accounts, making out receipts, promisory notes, agreements, and contracts. Geometry and mensuration are taught in the Schools of Mill River, Hope River, Park Corner, Seal River, Covehead Road, Lot 48, (Cross Roads,) to thirty-five pupils in all.

The decrease of eight Schools, above alluded to, is reckoned independent of the two denominated "Primary," which were referred to in my Report of last October. Pending the question whether these Schools have a legal claim to the Government Allowance, I have omitted at this time inserting them under the head of Schools entitled to public aid, although I duly examined them in common with the rest. My Special Report on that at Beech Hill, Tracadie Road, transmitted, pursuant to the order of your Board, in July last, leaves me nothing further to add in this place, and will, I trust, enable you to decide on the validity of the claim of the Teacher to the usual allowance. The other, at New London Ponds, when last visited, in the month of August of the present year, was found to be as satisfactorily conducted as on former occasions—the progress of the children in the various branches being alike very creditable to themselves and the Teacher; yet I found that the Trustees could not conscientiously sign the Teacher's Certificate to the effect that the School was one coming within the meaning of the Act. I think that, in these peculiar circumstances, the claims of the Teachers, for the past year, are worthy the favorable consideration of the Legislature.

Although always solicitous to time my visits at the seasons in which the Agricultural operations are least active, and when the Schools are most likely to be found open, and the attendance fullest, I was yet

disappointed to find, in my recent tour of inspection, that the business of the Harvest had caused the temporary closing of the following Schools, and thus precluded their examination, viz: Lot 29, Point Prim, Brown's Creek, Uig, Canoe Cove, West River, (Western District.) The Trustees thereof, with whom I conferred, assured me that the requirements of the law had all along been complied with in each case; the total and average attendance on each of these Schools, I have, however, inserted here, as obtained either from Trustees then, or subsequently, from the respective Teachers. The Schools at Rustico Cross Roads, and at Fullarton's Marsh, were also closed—the first, two days, and the latter, one day, prior to my visit.

I would conclude by a brief allusion to the question of the establishment of Free Schools, which is beginning to agitate the mind of the country. As to the necessity of making a more adequate and permanent provision for Schools, so as to place within the reach of every child the ability to read and write at least, all classes of the community are very generally agreed; with regard to the means most expedient and best calculated to secure that end, a much greater diversity of opinion exists. Upon this question, however, supported by facts, by general observation, and the experience had of the present system, the Legislature will ere long, doubtless, decide in enacting a permanent and comprehensive law on the subject. The general feeling can only be tested with accuracy by public meetings, and which are soon expected to be held throughout the country. I may, however, add, that the more intelligent part of the population with whom I have conferred, regard with increasing favor those principles which form the basis of all good laws on the subject of elementary Education in Europe and America, viz: The establishment of a compulsory contribution, by means of an assessment on real property, determined by valuers themselves, subject to assessment.

In Canada, the Act of 1848 contemplates, over and above, a monthly contribution of so much per head, for Eight months in the year, varying from Three pence to Two shillings per month, according to the means of the parents.

In other places, the General Assessment being found ample, renders the Schools free to all. The Superintendent of Education for the above Province remarks—"That these principles, viz., assessment and rate in aid, have been misrepresented to the people, as unjust, tyrannical and vexatious, yet they have every where been attended with a success which has contributed to the prosperity and happiness of the people, exciting an interest in those who are bound to contribute towards the funds, and thereby tending to ensure the well working of the Law.

The foregoing are all the Schools in this County, established under the law. In the near vicinity of this County, is situated a School known as the Irish-town School—Mr. J. McLauchlan, Teacher. Having heard that the Visitor for Prince County was advised that this School was not within the bounds allotted for his inspection, or that some doubts had been raised on the subject, and that the School, at all events, had been left unexamined in the past year, I visited it in August last, when 23 children were

found in attendance, the elder classes of whom had made respectable progress in arithmetic, writing, and reading. The School seemed orderly and well conducted, and deserving of support. The locale of the School, however, does not admit of question. It is in Prince County, according to the new Boundary Line, being, in fact, between the old and the new lines. Although a considerable proportion of the

children attending come from this County, (Queen's,) the School is legally within the sphere of the supervision of the Prince County Visitor.

SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT

OF THE

VISITOR OF SCHOOLS FOR QUEEN'S COUNTY.

SUBMITTED JANUARY 29, 1852.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

GENTLEMEN;

In continuation of my periodical half-yearly Return, laid before you in October last, I subjoin this Supplementary Report, embracing various Statistics collected during my last tour of inspection, up to the 21st instant, and in time to enable you to lay the whole before the Legislature, as required by law.

The Examination of the different Schools has been conducted as regularly and thoroughly as heretofore; and, in conjunction with such of the School Trustees as attended, on each occasion, my efforts have been directed to the correction and prevention of abuses, which may be expected, occasionally, to appear, and more especially in circumstances where a cordial and active co-operation of Parents with Teachers is not found to exist, in carrying on the all-important and honorable business of instruction. I continue confirmed in opinions hitherto expressed, as to the operation of the existing School System, and the crying necessity for the establishment of a more comprehensive and efficient one. The classification of the annexed Tabular Details has been effected in as concise a mode as possible, so as to preclude the necessity here of any lengthened remarks. To avoid too voluminous a Report, I have not entered all the Schools in these Tables, but have selected sixteen in different and distant quarters, being, as nearly as possible, one-fourth of the whole number of Schools in this County; the aggregate of these Tables being quadrupled, and taken as an average, will show

without much variation, the total result for the whole County.

In the three months which have elapsed since the date of my last Report, several Schools have interchanged Teachers. The Princetown Road (9 miles) Station has become vacant by the sudden decease of the Teacher, whose exertions and success in forwarding the improvement of the children of the District had met the general, if not unanimous, approval of the parents. Two Schools, under licensed Teachers, have been recently opened, but not yet examined, viz: one at St. Peter's Road, (10 miles,) another at Lot 48. I feel gratified in adding to the list of the very best Schools heretofore reported on—those at Covehead Road, (Lot 34,) Brackley Point and Little York Settlements. In the District extending from Lot 48 to Belfast, both inclusive, the Schools continue, with one exception, to be ably and satisfactorily conducted; as the one referred to is now closed, further comment seems unnecessary. The like features of high improvement and advancement continue to characterize the Schools of the New London and Cavendish Districts, now including New Glasgow, which were more especially alluded to last year. The two Schools at Belle Creek, near Wood Islands, although in such close proximity, were both found, at my visit last week, to have Scholars in attendance sufficient to occupy the attention of both Teachers.

HALF-YEARLY REPORT

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION;
GENTLEMEN;

The subsequent summary, embodying an account of the recent Examination of the District Schools in the above-named County, together with the nature and extent of the instruction communicated in them, is now respectfully submitted.

The past half-year has been one of occupation, rather than acquisition. No augmentation has taken place in the number of Schools since I reported last; several, in operation at that time, have been discontinued, and as many new ones established. The at-

tendance appears to be steadily on the increase: an accession of one hundred and fifty being perceptible, in all, since last March.

Although this circumstance is encouraging, as indicating an increasing appreciation of the utility of Education, yet it is a matter of fact, and also of regret, that not one-half of the children within the County, that should be receiving regular instruction, participate in its privileges.

The following Abstract discriminates the number of Pupils attending each School, the number examined, Teacher's names, &c.

Of the above enumerated number over nine hundred are receiving instruction in reading and spelling, about six hundred in writing and arithmetic, two hundred in English grammar, and one hundred and twelve in geography.

In the Georgetown Grammar School, under my own personal charge, in addition to geography, English grammar, &c., the mensuration of superficies and solids, together with the elements of Euclid, are communicated to three. Those three are acquiring

a knowledge of the Latin tongue, two are translating Cæsar's Commentaries, and the other is conjugating the irregular verbs.

REMARKS.

In speaking of the general comparative proficiency attained during the by-gone half year, I would observe, that while it will bear comparison with that of any preceding corresponding period, it is greatly impeded by the irregularity observable in the attendance. Many Scholars do not attend more than seven or eight months in the year, and sometimes several are, alternately, or together for a brief period, sent to make up the time of one or more.

The Books in universal use are Murray's, with interspersions of the National. The New Testament

is used as a Class Book in all the Schools. The most recent and improved edition of Grey's Arithmetic, Chambers' and Stewart's Compendiums of Geography, are commonly used.

I am unable to report the erection of any new School Houses, or material improvement in the existing ones.

Trusting that the foregoing synopsis, though necessarily of a somewhat uniform nature, will give a sufficiently clear idea of the working of the District Schools throughout King's County.

GENTLEMEN OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION;

Conformably to your directions, I forward for your consideration the customary Report on the state and prospects of Education in this County.

The District Schools have numerically declined during the by-gone half year; although similar defections have occasionally occurred heretofore, I am inclined to attribute the present one principally to the prevalent anticipation of an immediate and fundamental alteration in the existing Educational Act, throughout the County, which expectation renders the people indifferent, in many localities, about engaging Teachers, until the provisions of the contemplated Act are ascertained, and several competent Masters have signified their determination of abandoning the profession, in the event of the absence of Legislative interference, and more adequate and permanent remuneration.

Of the Schools in present operation, the organization and general efficiency are, upon the whole, encouraging. Evidences of increasing usefulness and improvement are neither few nor far between; and though the system of instruction is, in some instances, unsatisfactory and defective—being too exclusively confined to an unintellectual and uninteresting routine—yet the majority of the Teachers having obtained license under the Act 10 Vic., when the standard of their qualifications was raised, and their tact in communicating knowledge to others, judiciously discriminated, the inevitable result of such preliminary preparation is abundantly manifested in the superior perception on the part of their Pupils, of the purport of what they acquire, and dexterity in applying it practically.

The Schools open at the present time, are as follow, viz:—

COURSE OF INSTRUCTION.

Reading, Writing, and Arithmetic, comprise the staple instruction afforded in the Schools.

The children are commonly advanced to the simultaneous acquisition of the two latter branches, whenever they are capable of reading and spelling with tolerable facility. They generally read in the forenoon, and write and cipher in the afternoon. Besides tasks from various Spelling Books and Dictionaries, exacted every morning, they are exercised at the conclusion of their Reading lessons, in spelling the more difficult words occurring therein, and questioned as to their signification, and where the Teachers are competent, their derivation explained and exemplified, which circumstance conduces to accelerate and facilitate accurate orthoepy, correct enunciation, and a judicious elocution. The greatest improvement in this branch was perceptible in Schools Nos. 1, 2, 3, 7, 8, 11, 12, 15, 16, 17, 18, 22, and 26.

In Arithmetic, the learners are commonly classified according to their talents and attainments.—Some Teachers enforce the committing of the rules to memory, and elicit skill and despatch by exercising the classes in practical questions of every-day occurrence. In calculating ability, the greatest amount of proficiency was exhibited in Schools Nos. 3, 7, 16, 17, 21, and 22.

Ordinary advancement only was apparent in Penmanship, except in those Schools wherein the intel-

lectual system is stringently enforced, and the purport of every thing inculcated. In those, the various transcriptions—though not so beautifully executed as could be wished—showed correctness in regard to spelling, use of capitals, punctuation, &c.

The best progress in this department has taken place in Schools Nos. 3, 7, 10, 14, 16, 17, 19, 21, and 22.

Grammar and Geography are inculcated in all the Schools but seven, viz: Nos. 4, 5, 6, 8, 9, 10, and 20.

One-half of those acquiring Grammar, are unacquainted with the Syntactic rules, but tolerably conversant with the etymological part, and can parse easy sentences pretty fairly. Their acquaintance with Geography is chiefly limited to a knowledge of places, seas, rivers, &c. When questioned about the physical peculiarities, productions, government, &c., of the various countries, a lamentable lack of information was instantly perceptible. The prevailing destitution of maps is an obstacle to the acquisition of this science. Maps or atlases, and the best geographies, are to be found in Schools Nos. 3, 11, 12, 16, 17, 18, 22, 24, 26, and 27.

The Infant School in Georgetown is still acceptably conducted, and dispenses instruction at very moderate charges. Its hitherto adequate support and estimation exemplifies the appreciation of its worth and usefulness. Systematically organized and judiciously managed, it is admirably adapted for the moral and intellectual development of the juvenile

faculties. But it is deserving of more tangible encouragement than well-merited eulogy. A reasonable Legislative annuity, in addition to the Master's present salary, could not be more worthily bestowed.

REMARKS.

As an essential change in the existing Act respecting Education is contemplated by the Legislature, and various conflicting opinions are afloat relative thereto, it may be neither irrelevant nor inopportune to submit, in an abbreviated form, the views which observation and some experience have induced me to entertain.

Education, as at present administered, is universally allowed to be defective, both in quantity and quality, and inadequate to the wants of the country. Any amelioration of the prevailing system, by assessment or otherwise, (I speak considerably,) will be gratefully hailed by nine-tenths of the inhabitants of King's County. In the event of such succedaneum, it might not be inexpedient that Teachers should undergo a re-examination; and that male Teachers, in addition to the branches required at present, possess a competent knowledge of Mensuration, of Superficies and Solids, Plain Trigonometry, and perhaps Navigation.

I would also beg to offer, suggestively, that in addition to the present assortment of Class Books, the Board of Education would sanction and direct the introduction into the public Seminaries of a judiciously composed manual on Practical Agriculture, a Treatise on the Fisheries, and a Compendium, in which the nature and effects of Alcoholic beverages would be graphically portrayed.

Respecting School Houses, I would suggest that, besides the dimensions, the number and size of the windows, a stove, and the internal furniture and arrangements, might not be unworthy of Legislative prescription, and conformity to such exacted, previous to their becoming entitled to the public allowance.

The youthful generation is, undeniably, the most important common good of every country: that which a State should value most highly, and watch over with the greatest solicitude. Every day, by its developments, corroborates the statement, that we live in most eventful times. Such being admitted, it imperatively behoves all, but especially the Government, to adopt whatever measures are best calculated to prepare them, individually and collectively, to meet the exigencies of futurity, and discharge the duties of their allotted sphere.

What does it avail to establish useful laws and ordinances, if our posterity cannot perfect and perpetuate them? To what purpose are we surrounded with the bounties of nature, if too ignorant to turn them to advantage? The duration and extension of everything valuable is dependent on the rising generation. They are to be the future defenders and benefactors of our country, the administrators of its affairs and offices, and the props of its welfare and continuance. If then, the Government of a country be indifferent to the conservation and suitable training of its chief care—if it neglect what should be recognized as its privilege and honor—the duty of furnishing the best instruction in its power, it leaves unfulfilled its highest obligation, and renounces its noblest good, and with it must rest the responsibility.

But, on the other hand—if animated by zeal for the public weal, and a determination to discharge with fidelity the trust confided in them—it will enact salutary regulations, placing the means of instruction within the reach of the whole juvenile portion of the community—it will prove itself the benefactor of the country, acquire permanent merit in its sight, and on it will be showered the grateful acknowledgments of an enlightened rising generation.

REPORT

OF THE

VISITOR OF SCHOOLS FOR PRINCE COUNTY.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

GENTLEMEN;

In compliance with your order that the School Visitors would submit to you a semi-annual Report, I have the honor to lay before you the results of my investigations since my communication to this Board in April last, and such opinions as the consideration of them has suggested.

Although the period of time which has elapsed, since my last Report as to the progress made in the management of the District Schools of Prince County, and the defects to be remedied—has been too brief to admit of prominent improvement, yet it is gratifying to me, to be able announce, as the result of a careful revision of the minutes of examinations recorded in my Journal, that the general aspect of these institutions exhibits striking indications of prosperity and usefulness.

The Teachers exemplify a laudable zeal to excel in their devotion to their arduous and responsible duties, and marked improvements in the methods of instruction prevail. The children manifest quiet and orderly demeanour. These are indications of efficiency. However, my duty is not merely to bear testimony to the advancement achieved, and to rejoice in it, but to represent any defects I ascertained in course of my inspection, and suggest appropriate remedies.

And as School-houses are in *statu quo*, with the exception of the one in N. Bedeque, which has recently been enlarged, and also finished on a plan somewhat similar to the arrangements in the Central Academy, the Board is respectfully referred to my former Reports, for details of the deficiencies incident to our system of District School education: such as the inconvenient sizes and objectionable sites of the School-houses, and unsuitable furniture, and the want of appliances for facilitating the acquisition of knowledge.

In the several Districts the School-houses do not correspond well with the private houses of the Inhabitants. I may, perhaps, be allowed in this connection to apply the strictures of an eminent philanthropist in relation to the apathy of the People with regard to Church accommodations, that the structure of the sactuary would be a fair criterion to determine the reverence for christianity in every community. The School-house is dedicated to education, as the house of worship is to religion, and the state of the edifice indicates the regard which the guardians of

youth cherish for the object to which they have devoted it.

I have procured several plans recommended by practical Teachers, with all the details of construction and fixture, with the view of enabling myself to give all the information I could obtain to remedy this repulsive deficiency in our system of popular education.

On this department of his duty the talented superintendent of education in Nova Scotia judiciously remarks, "material improvements in the construction and furniture of Schools are necessary to their proper working," but as this subject has been discussed to such length in my former Reports, elaborate details are unnecessary on this occasion. In all the Provinces, according to the returns made by the Commissioners of Education to the Legislatures, ill-constructed School-houses is one of the most obnoxious defects in the practical operation of their School systems. The facts in the case, in this country, as to the uniformity in deformity will justify recurring reprobation in our representations of the construction and location of School-houses.

I regard the improvements on Mr. Patterson's School worthy of imitation, and indicative of an awakened public spirit. The liberal appropriation made in the last Session of the Legislature to render the Central Academy more attractive in its external aspect, and convenient in its interior arrangements, are auspicious omens in favour of immediate reform in School-house architecture.

It may be permitted to us even to see the day when the abuses of the present and the past are swept from the face of this beautiful Isle.

As several frivolous and vexatious disputes in regard to the sites of School-houses and boundaries of Districts have come under your cognizance, it may not be irrelevant to the subject of this section to remark, that I believe it would be expedient to invest the Board of education with executive powers commensurate with its deliberative authority—in order to suppress in their incipient stages controversies arising in District; such a prerogative would promote the harmony and advance the interests of Education. The privilege of appeal in such cases encourage strife and litigation, and as "prevention is better than cure,"—perhaps in anticipation of such contingencies, the most effectual remedy for grievances of this kind would be to constitute the Board of Education a body corporate, to purchase, receive and hold real or personal

property for School purposes, and to determine the sites, sizes, furniture and such other matters as pertain to the organization of Schools.

SCHOOL REGISTERS.

I wish to call the attention of the Board to the subject of School Registers, without which, statistics indispensable to an accurate knowledge of the working of our system cannot be obtained. I would recommend a modification of the present form, and for that purpose I suggest that a book, which would serve for a series of years, be provided for every School, to be preserved as a permanent Record, exhibiting aggregate and average attendance, classification, &c., of the pupils, and that Returns should be transmitted semi-annually to the Secretary of the Board of Education.

Registers of this description will be less liable to be mislaid or mutilated, and may be available at any time for retrospective references, relative to the condition of the established Schools, besides authentic data would be thus provided to ascertain the improvement or deterioration of any of them from year to year—such checks would also be a caveat to Teachers against a relaxation of the rigour and vigilance incumbent on them in the routine of their daily duties.

ATTENDANCE.

Irregular attendance is one of the most prominent evils which exist in our Schools. For imparting instruction, through the medium of the School, the presence of the Scholar is as essential as the presence of the Teacher. I believe this to be the greatest obstacle to the advancement of a uniform system in our District Schools—irregular attendance is not only detrimental to the delinquents, but to those who attend regularly: absences render attempts at classification abortive—and subject the Teachers to various embarrassments, and distracting toil and trouble. This Report embraces all the principal seasons, which the farmers designate “busy times”—during these successive periods, all the children who are of age and capable of rendering any service, are kept “at home”—excepting on rainy days, when a host will go to School to make up for “the lost time” of one or two. This privilege of sending substitutes increases the labours and vexation of the Teacher, without conferring any benefit on children who claim it—and the pernicious practice of alternate attendance has prevailed to an unusual extent. It is difficult to prescribe an adequate remedy for this evil that can be enforced—Mr. Dawson, of Pictou, suggests Free Schools, supported by assessment—I apprehend that a definite time for the admission of scholars would be a mitigation of this adverse principle—so inwrought into the school habits of society.

In this connection I take leave to remark, that it would be expedient to establish by statute two regular

terms in the year for entering into engagements with Teachers who should receive the Government pay by quarterly instalments, the adoption of some such alteration in our school system would be hailed as an advantage by all the authorities and interests recognised in its organization and administration, and it would especially be conducive to the convenience of the clerks of the Executive Council, and the Colonial Treasurer.

TEACHERS.

I anticipated, from my knowledge of the prevalence of the pernicious practice of withdrawing children from school to meet with the results necessarily arising from it, but I did not expect to find many vacant schools. And the cause assigned for the resignation of a majority of Teachers, being inadequate remuneration, the occurrence of this contingency in the department of my official connection with the county, aggravated my disappointment. I therefore recorded in my Minutes this reprehensible coincidence in several districts for special representation in my Report to the Board of Education.

Messrs. Porteous, E. Blanchard, S. Davidson, J. Curry and M. McNeill have retired from the profession, to devote their time to other pursuits; these gentlemen are distinguished for their attainments in knowledge, and skill, and success in imparting it;—Messrs. G. R. Parsons and J. McKinnon have also abandoned it, with the view of preparing themselves for the Pulpit. Mr. James Sinclair has likewise intimated his intention to resume his studies in the Theological Seminary in connection with the synod of Pictou. These young men were esteemed and highly respected for their fidelity in the discharge of their duties, and the prosperity of their demeanour.

Two of the vacancies occasioned by secession from the scholastic corps in this County have already been supplied with able Teachers (one of them an experienced veteran), and notwithstanding the defection from our ranks, our staff of Schoolmasters comprises men of energy, zeal and perseverance. Several of them are eminent for professional tact and devotion to their duties.

All of them cherish ardent hopes that the plan proposed to elevate the standard of Education must, as a matter of course, also elevate Teachers to their legitimate position in society: thus animated and encouraged to steadfastness, “they wait a little longer for the good time coming,” confiding in the wisdom of the Administration for their speedy consumation, devoutly to be prayed for.

The fact that so many teachers have resigned for the reason alleged, should immediately attract the attention of all the friends of Education, and stimulate them to adopt effectual measures in vindication of the rights of the rising generation. A conviction

of my responsibility for omissions as well as commissions of duty, urges me, at the risk of incurring the imputation of interested motives, to magnify my office to entreat you to devote serious attention to this untoward circumstance.

There is a prevailing misconception of the object to be obtained by making provisions for a permanent School in every District—and it is no easy task to persuade the people of the propriety of giving suitable encouragement to good Schoolmasters.

Your caution in the examination of teachers is justifiable and indispensable. Better for the interests of all that the door of the School House be bolted and barred, than open to the incompetent or unworthy. But the impartial, faithful efforts made by your Board to ascertain the acquirements of candidates, and their aptitude to teach, are nevertheless useless, unless Schools are so organized and supported as to afford a prospect of permanent, profitable and pleasant employment.

All persons reside in fixed abodes, and enjoy some place invested with the sacred association of home; nobody but the Schoolmaster is obliged to board round—none but the Schoolmaster is put up at auction, and knocked off to the lowest bidder. As Guizot says, in his picture of the painful duties of this fated functionary, "he is doomed to toil, in short, for man, and to expect his recompence only from God."

The stringency of the law in relation to examination before admission as a District Teacher, even of the lowest class, should, as a legitimate consequence, secure suitable salaries for such as obtain license for that privilege. But the office of a Teacher is thankless and ill-requited, and, in most cases, even the incompetent render their employers *quid pro quo*—the service is equivalent to the salary. The Schoolmaster in Scotland devotes himself to his profession for life, because he knows that, for life, it will yield him a livelihood, and he enjoys also a house and garden, which is an encouragement to collect around him the comforts of life. In Prussia, superannuated Teachers enjoy retiring pensions.

May I be permitted to plead for a modification of similar policy on the part of our liberal Government; such a millenium is expected from its members by some of their constituents.

The important question is—how should the point at issue be settled? It has become an axiom that, "as is the Teacher, so will be the School," and the condition of the Schools cannot be improved, without increasing the compensation of the Masters. As many may not be entitled to this augmentation, will the inducement be given to justify such to incur the expense of a suitable systematic preparation? Between the employer and the employed, it would be right that the latter should be worthy of his hire;

but between the public and their children, a different policy should prevail.

In other countries, distinguished for improved systems of public instruction, the training of Teachers has gone hand in hand with a re-organization of the Schools, and with stringent regulations in regard to the attendance of scholars, the choice of school-books, the construction of school-houses, and the rate of Teacher's wages. It must be so here. What was accomplished in those cases, promptly and effectively, by the centralized and almost unlimited power of the Government, should be accomplished among us.

I am aware that some view the subject in a different light. "Let no law, however good, be passed, until the majority be convinced of its desirableness and practicability," is their maxim; but this argument is not the dictate of true wisdom in this case. From the prevailing indifference and misconception with regard to education, the Government should legislate ahead of public sentiment.

The newspaper press of both parties should also contribute its influence to advance the interests of Common Schools.

Salutary results have been derived from Clergymen attending the School Examinations, taking part in them, and addressing the Parents of the Pupils on a subject of common interest and common unity. Very interesting Teachers' evening meetings have occurred, at which the Teachers and public men present spoke on a given topic, connected with the interests of Schools. No sight is more touching and morally sublime than to see the People and their Pastors, the Magistrates and their neighbors, blended together and identified in association and feeling in the great work, which constitutes the essential life of the civilization of any country, the cement of its brotherhood, and the main-spring of its prosperity. Such a concentration of attention, such a combination of interest and influence in any neighborhood, cannot fail to invest the education of youth, and the diffusion of knowledge, with highest importance, and uplift the popular mind in its impulses, thinkings and aspirations.

METHODS OF INSTRUCTION.

As the course and system of Tuition, with suggestions for the best modes for securing uniformity of method, have been fully considered in former Reports, it is therefore unnecessary to resume the discussion in this.

I have to reiterate my regret that the rudiments of Geography and History are not taught in all the Schools; but it is to be hoped that children will henceforward be familiarized, from East Point to West Cape, with the Geography of the Island, as a new and cheap Map, suitable either for the private

family or the public school, is advertised for sale by Mr. G. T. Hazard. This production, irrespective of intrinsic merits and adaptation to the purposes of tuition, has additional claims for its introduction into our District Schools. It may be exhibited with advantage as a specimen of native talent, to stimulate our youth to emulation in the acquisition of useful knowledge, which they can attain without leaving the Island Institutions for instruction.

In my next report I may probably be able to represent the results of the donation of Books, presented by the Agricultural Society. The principles of Chemistry, as applied to Agriculture, should be introduced into the District Schools, as a great portion of our farming population cannot otherwise acquire a knowledge of this useful science.

In the conclusion of my last Report, I alluded to the efforts made by the Teachers in several sections of the County to adopt modifications of the most approved recent improvements, and as I anticipated the prominence given by me to the plan of instruction followed by the Rev. R. S. Patterson, awakened a general rivalry for distinction among the School-masters. A minute examination of the Scholars in the Central Bedeque School was so satisfactory as to induce me to procure from their Teacher an outline of his system, which I annex to this Report.

CONCLUDING REMARKS.

I conclude the Report with an expression of my conviction, which may be regarded as but the repetition of a truism, that the work in which we, in common with the friends and advocates of Popular Education throughout Christendom, are engaged, infinitely transcends, in importance, all other temporal interests. Disregard the Schools, and you degrade the People. In the footsteps of that degradation follow poverty, oppression, crime and anarchy.

Elevate the Schools, and you elevate the character of the People. You lift up the down-trodden, and give new courage to the faint-hearted. You take the first great step towards abolishing the fictitious distinctions which are permitted to exist in society, and make the equality of man a living reality. In this great work there should be no sluggards. Let no man cheat himself with the delusion that he is but one, and therefore it matters little whether he acts or not; of such units is the sum total of mankind made up. Let no man do himself the gross injustice to believe, and act upon the belief, that he can exert no influence; every member of the community can do something to advance the work, and is bound by the most solemn obligations to do what he can. It matters not what may be his condition or calling, whether the station he occupies be public or private, whether he is surrounded by the luxuries of civilized life, or the want even of its necessaries—there is that in the cause which should excite his liveliest interest, and call forth his noblest efforts. The preservation of our civil and religious rights, reputation, of property—the present and the future well-being of the country, ourselves, and children, demand at our hands prompt, efficient, unwearied action; it appeals to us as Christians, philanthropists, patriots! Be it our supreme solicitude to cherish, encourage, elevate the Schools! In the hands of our Legislators is their destiny. They may make it what they will—our glory, or our shame! The safe and sure foundation, or the sepulchre of our hopes! To what worthier cause can their influence be lent? To what holier service can the supremacy of their Administration be devoted?

SEMI-ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

SCHOOL VISITOR FOR PRINCE COUNTY.

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

GENTLEMEN;

I have the honor to submit to you this Appendix, in connection with my last semi-annual Report. As I deem it a duty incumbent on me to present to the Legislature, through you, facts and suggestions, that have been elicited, in the course of my recent inspection of the District Schools of Prince County.

A new School has lately been opened in Kildare; the vacancies in Travellers' Rest, and in Oyster Cove

have been supplied, but I regret to report that two efficient Schools have been closed, one in the District of Cascumpec, and the other in Western Bedeque, Mr. A. Sinclair's Trustees were disappointed in their arrangements for the completion of the new School-house, and the Rev. R. S. Patterson's retirement from the profession is a serious loss to that extensive district and the neighbouring settlements. The government, discipline and process of tuition adopted by him should have been met by corresponding efforts

on the part of all interested in that School, to sustain him in his laudable emulation to discharge his responsible duties according to the most approved modern methods.

This discouraging contingency urges me to reiterate my remarks relative to the duty of every district to employ a competent Teacher. If a man has a valuable colt to be tamed and broken to the harness, a skilful and experienced groom must be had to perform the task. If a waggon or a sleigh is to be constructed, with reference to beauty or convenience, the best workman is sought for the purpose. If an elegant coat or a handsome pair of boots are wanted, no bungler is employed to make them. No novice lawyer is retained when property or reputation is at stake. But when a Teacher is wanted, to educate his child—to fit the human being for the responsibilities of life—it has, in many instances, been disregarded as a matter of little consequence who is employed, provided he works cheap.

In selecting the Teacher all individual and personal considerations should be laid aside; political and sectarian prejudices should have no weight in the matter. The welfare of every child in the district should be the ruling consideration. The formation of a correct public opinion is of the utmost importance—for the primary cause of all the defects complained of in Education, and the source of all the evils that afflict the community in consequence of its neglect, is popular indifference.

The course of instruction pursued in the other Schools, has been substantially the same as in other years. The progress made by the Scholars in Campbelltown, Lot 7, is very satisfactory. Mr. Andrew Johnson, their Teacher, merits encouragement for his zeal and tact in discharging his duties.

The Acadian Schools under the surveillance of the Rev. Mr. McIntyre are numerous, and in other respects efficiently sustained. Messieurs S. Perry, F. Gaudet and G. Buote have several pupils who are making creditable progress in acquiring an elementary knowledge of the English Language, and also of arithmetic as usually taught in the District Schools.

Considering the inclemency of the weather, the attendance in the Schools in general, as exhibited by the Registers, did not vary much from the average statement in the schedule submitted in my last semi-annual Report.

The gratuitous distribution of the Pamphlet compiled by Judge Peters is considered a boon by teachers and parents, and I cherish sanguine expectations that the generous efforts made by the Royal Agricultural Society to introduce the "Hints to Farmers" into the District Schools, may be taken as a hint by our Legislators to make a still more liberal provision

for imparting a scientific knowledge of Husbandry in addition to the other branches taught in these institutions. The supply entrusted to me has been the means of enabling teachers to organise large classes, and adopt arrangements to induce their pupils to devote their leisure hours to the study of this useful manual.

As we had arrived at an interesting crisis in our educational, reform a sense of duty prompted me to proceed to the remote settlements in my circuit, and furnish the teachers with copies of the Petitions which had been prepared under the sanction of the Hon. Mr. Coles—but to avoid the imputation of selfish, mercenary motives, I did not interfere farther than urging the expediency of calling public meetings to ascertain without delay the public opinion on Free Schools, within their respective precincts. In my official relation to the County I studied to pursue the course suggested to me—and, therefore, secured the co-operation of several gentlemen of influence in every Township to procure signatures. The late snow storm retarded my progress through the districts, but philanthropists and patriots have generously engaged, in the meantime, to elicit the sentiments of the Inhabitants of Seven Mile Bay, Cape Traverse and Tryon, as Petitions, if there be any procured, must be presented to the Legislature before the time I have decided on for the examination of the schools in these localities.

I met accidentally with the Rev. Messrs. Sinclair and Cooper, at a Temperance Convention; held near the Dock, Cascumpec, and they informed me that they had concocted a measure of educational reform, which would be supported by their parishioners, and submitted to the Legislature. It is gratifying to know that this important interest, which underlies all others, is receiving such general consideration.

Discussion judiciously conducted evolves truth, and educational truths brought clearly before the mind of any community will ultimately induce right action. When the majority of individuals that compose any society come to value education as they ought, when they duly estimate its advantages, then they will urge their Representatives to render its blessings universal.

Horace Man truthfully remarks, "Every wise man, every wise community, desiring the prosperity of its children, in the most worldly sense, will spare no pains in giving them a generous education." And certainly intelligence enhances the value of a man's labor. A small compensation is the reward of mere physical power, while skill, combined with a moderate amount of strength, commands high wages.

It might be proved, that every child in the country has an inherent right to an education, but the argument would bring nothing new who acknowledge the conclusion—and it would have no influence over him

whose "logic hopper," in the language of another, "grinds out nothing but income and interest."

By presenting the idea of taxation, this measure encounters the opposition of one of the strongest passions of the age. Not only the sordid and avaricious, but even those whose virtue of frugality, by the force of habit, is imperceptibly sliding into the sin of parsimony, shew their symptoms of alarm. Men of property, without children, and men who have reared a family of children, and defrayed the expense of their education, fancy they see something of injustice in being called to pay for the education of others.

Upon each present generation rests the duty and obligation of educating and qualifying for usefulness that which immediately succeeds. From this responsibility there can be no escape.

And as the people have lately acquired an extension of their political privileges, in proportion as the structure of our Government gives force to public opinion, it is essential that public opinion should be enlightened, as every voter should understand im-

portant questions that come before the Legislature for Settlement, otherwise he will be as likely to oppose as promote not only the general welfare of the Island, but his own cherished interests.

The first duty of Government, and the surest evidence of good Government, is the encouragement of Education, which must here, as elsewhere, be the work of the Administration: and the expense, of which all should feel the necessity, and all will share the benefit, must, in a just proportion, be borne by all.

Therefore, a School Fund, for the entire support of our Schools, should be raised—a suitable School House and Apparatus, with a convenient Dwelling House for the Teacher, should be provided in every District; and every School House should be supplied with a well-qualified Teacher, who shall receive adequate remuneration.

There has been a decrease in attendance, chiefly through the influences specified in the premises; and in some degree from expectations of the immediate establishment of the Free System, engagements with Teachers have been de-

signedly deferred in several settlements. These embarrassments precluded the possibility of obtaining authentic or accurate Statistics.

A few Schools were vacant when I made my general visit, which will account for the blanks in the columns for attendance.

SIR :

I beg to indorse an account against the Government for the expenses of an Inquest. At the same time permit me to give a few words of explanation relative to an account, for the expenses of an Inquest on the body of a new born bastard infant, in August last, which drew forth an expression of disapprobation from the Governor in Council, regarding some of its items. First, regarding the number of Jurors, of whom there were seventeen. Notwithstanding the Coroner's Warrant enjoins the officer to summon Twenty-four, I seldom empanel more than Twelve or Thirteen. In this case, however, there was a strong suspicion of child murder, strengthened by the mother immediately absconding; and there was so much excitement in the place, I was induced, in consequence, to empanel more than the usual number, in order to secure impartiality.

Secondly, In all ordinary cases, I invariably give the necessary medical information myself, but in this, the earlier evidence made it probable that the verdict would be such as to bring it before a higher tribunal; and as the law requires all evidence before the Coroner to be taken on oath, and certified by him as such, I was under the impression that I could not give evidence of any legal value in a Court of which I was the presiding officer.

Thirdly, With these views, I was induced to send to Charlottetown for a Surgeon, and mentioned Dr. Jarvis—with whose person I was not even acquainted—thinking as a young practitioner he would be more likely to be found at leisure than others who had been longer established. I regret the charge he made, which, at the time, I thought excessive; but as the Act does not regulate the fees of medical men in such cases, I had no alternative but to render his account without comment.

Fourthly, Having to send under night, and in a storm of rain, I could obtain no messenger for a less sum than £2, which I had, besides, to pay in advance.

Fifthly, With regard to a medical man being found nearer at hand, I am not aware of any one nearer than Charlottetown, possessed of anatomical knowledge requisite to conduct an investigation of this kind, or, indeed, to give any evidence, which, as medical, would be of the slightest value.

The sum of £16 15s. may seem a large one, at one time, for Inquests; but it should not be overlooked, that £10 15s. of this sum was in repayment of money advanced by me in discharge of the necessary expenses, leaving the balance of £6 as remuneration to the Coroner for five days and three nights absence from his other avocations, and travelling one hundred and ten miles—which sum, after deducting 7s. 6d. per day for horse hire, ferryage and travelling expenses, gives him at the rate of 15s. per day. No very extravagant scale of remuneration to any one possessed of that amount of judicial, as well as medical information necessary for the efficient discharge of so responsible an office as that of Coroner.

I regret that I am obliged in so many instances to apply to the Governor for payment of accounts; but, in the great majority of instances, the people amongst whom I am called to act officially are extremely poor, so much so, that it is of no unfrequent occurrence for the whole inquest to appropriate its fees to the immediate relief of a family left destitute.

In conclusion, I beg to assure His Excellency in Council, that I have no interest in incurring unnecessary expence to the Governor, and no object in filling the appointment of Coroner, than that of faithfully discharging the duties of a very responsible office, and beg to signify my regret, that I should have unnecessarily done any thing to call for animadversion.

Bill to be entitled "An Act to Compel the Registration of the Original Grants, or Patents, of Lots or Townships of Land in this Island."

WHEREAS great injustice and inconvenience are caused to Tenants or Lessees in this Island, in consequence of the conflicting claims of various persons, who assume or claim themselves to be the original Grantees or Patentees from the Crown, or Proprietors of Lots or Townships of Land, the original Grants or Patents of which are not recorded in the Register Office of this Island, whereby said Tenants are at a loss how to ascertain who is the proper owner thereof, and are frequently harrassed by persons assuming to be Proprietors, and claiming rent, who have no real title to such Land. For remedy whereof, Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly as follows:

That the Original Grants or Patents from the Crown of Lots or Townships of Land in this Island, shall be registred according to law in the Office of the Registrar of Deeds in this Island, within Twelve months after this Act shall go into operation; and all such Grants or Patents which shall not be so registered at the expiration of the said period of Twelve months, shall be null and void, and the Lots or Townships to which they relate shall revert in the Crown, and it shall be unlawful for any person to sue or distrain for any rent in arrear in respect of any Land on any Lot or Township in this Island, the Original Grant or Patent whereof shall not be duly registered at or before the expiration of the period aforesaid; and when any person shall sue or distrain, and the Tenant shall defend, and an issue shall be joined thereon before such person on the trial thereof, shall be enabled to recover such Rent so sued or distrained for, in addition to the usual evidence required in such cases, he shall be obliged and required to produce evidence that the Original Grant or Patent from the Crown of the Lot or Township whereon the Land in respect of which the Rent arises may be, hath been duly registered in the said Office, in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this Act, previous to suing or making distraint, any thing in this Act or any Act to the contrary thereof, notwithstanding.

This Act shall not extend, or be construed to extend, to any other Rents than such as and shall have arisen and become due subsequent to the passing hereof.

Nothing in this Act contained shall have any force or effect until her Majesty's pleasure therein shall be known.
