of the treasury has just made a ruhng of great importance to all shippers of ore and other goods by rail into the United States from British Co-lumbia. An appeal was taken by D. C. Corbin of Spokane against fixing a consular seal to every car of ore that came across the border and charg-ing a fee therefor. If this were allowed, the position of consular agent at Rossland would be the finest paying office in the service." "The treasury department states that there is no necessity for the attachment to cars of con-sular seals, but only consular invoices are re-quired for each importation. One invoice would be sufficient hereafter for each importation, without reference to the number of cars." The above dispatch considerably overestimates the importance of the consular seal. Judging from the telegram it would be imagined that the matter of sealing cars is an imposition upon the shipper, whereas the reverse is the case. 

ROADS A NECESSITY.

The residents of Nelson and Marcus. Wash., are about to build a snow road from Nelson to a point near Cascade City. This will be done by the people of these two Washington villages to avoid a quarantine that is put on horses at Grand Forks by the provincial authorities to prevent a spread of the glanders. The snow road will enable goods to be sent to the several mining camps on the Colville Indian reservation without passing through Canadian territory, and in this way the impediment

occasioned by the Provincial quarantine will be avoided. There was no petition to the county, state or federal authorities for the purpose of securing an appropriation for the construction of this roadway. The enterprising citizens of the two hamlets, they can scarcely be called
