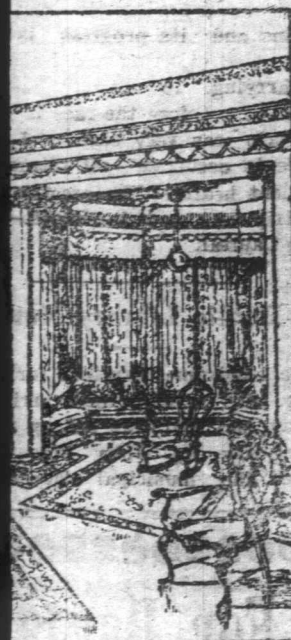

FIFTH ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE W.C.T.U.

Officers Elected—Meets at Medicine Hat Next Year— Number of Resolutions Passed Condemn Cigarettes and Brandied Confections.

The fifth annual convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union opened in the Metropolitan church in Regina last Friday. Routine work took up the day hours. In the evening a public meeting was held. Addresses of welcome were delivered by Lieut.-Gov. Forget, Mayor Smith, and ministers of the churches.

On Saturday the election of officers took place and resulted as follows: Pres. Mrs. L. C. McKinney, of Claresholm, Alta. Vice Pres., Mrs. S. H. Craig, of Olds, Alta. Cor. Sec., Mrs. J. J. Burbeck, of Saskatoon. Rec. Sec., Mrs. C. C. Knight, Regina. Treas., Mrs. E. K. Strathy, Lacombe, Alta. Sec. Young Women's Branch: Mrs. A. E. Humphries, Lethbridge, Alta. The proposed amendment to the constitution providing for separate organizations in the two provinces, was discussed and negatively decided. As a token of valuable services rendered in the work of the union, a provincial life membership was presented to Mrs. Craig on Saturday.

According to the report of the credential committee 55 delegates attended the convention. The work of the convention concluded on Monday. The next convention is to be held at Medicine Hat. The following were the chief resolutions adopted: That as an organization we urge that men and women everywhere practice and encourage total abstinence from alcoholic drinks, and in view of the fact that the liquor traffic is morally wrong and therefore can never be made legally right, we stand for the entire prohibition of the manufacture and importation of the same. C.P.R. STRIKE SETTLED MEETING WITH SUCCESS

The Men Accept the Arbitrator's Award—The Manitoba Government Instrumental in Bringing About The End. Ald. Wilkinson Being Well Received in the Country—Meetings Arranged For—North Will Do Well.

The machinists of the C.P.R. who have been on strike two months have come to terms with the company. The adjustment of the strike was brought about through the good offices of the government of Manitoba. The strike was first declared on August 5th and the agreement upon which the strike was settled was signed in Winnipeg on Oct. 4th. Too much credit cannot be given Hon. Robert Rogers and Hon. Colin H. Campbell, members of the Manitoba government for the work they have done in having the strike settled. Hon. Robt. Rogers acted in Montreal and Hon. Colin H. Campbell, in Winnipeg.

The terms of settlement are: 1. The men are to notify the Labor Bureau that they accept the award. 2. The strike to be called off east and west separately, and at once. 3. The company is to use all reasonable means to find situations for the men and to prevent discrimination against those who have been on strike.

Lord Milner will be in Regina next Wednesday.

Mrs. W. M. Martin has returned from a holiday trip in Ontario.

P. M. Brett has returned from a holiday trip to the Pacific coast.

The C.N.R. line between here and Brandon has been hauling freight for the past week.

There were 790 homestead entries made at the Dominion lands office here in September.

Wilkinson's Committee Rooms are located on the ground floor of the Northern Bank building.

Harry Gollnick has rented the Tudge abattoir and is killing for several of the local butchers.

The annual meeting of the curling club will be held in R. B. Ferguson's office tomorrow night.

Rev. Alexander Mans, the colored pastor of a church in London, Ont., died last week at the age of 118.

Geo. Mollard was down from Waterloo for a few days this week. He reports business good in that town.

Mrs. John Beattie, of Ferguson, Ont., is in the city visiting her daughters, Mrs. R. B. Ferguson and Mrs. Jas. McAra.

The receipts at the customs port of Regina for September amounted to \$42,683.83. For August they amounted to \$38,745.55.

The Tudge-Arnold case over the Tudge abattoir was up for hearing in the courts this week. The judge has reserved his decision.

J. B. Hawkes, ex-M.L.A., of Balgonie, has expressed his intention of supporting W. M. Martin in the present federal campaign.

The C.N.R. has leased an office in the city to be used as a telegraph office. They will be open for business after the 15th of this month.

Dr. James McLeod of Regina was married on Sept. 24 to Miss Sadie McLeod, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh McLeod of Bradalbane, P.E.I.

Col. Steele, acting D.O.C. for military district No. 10, is in the city today. During his stay here he is a guest of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. D. Wood.

Police Magistrate Trant of this city is stumping the constituency in the interests of the Liberal candidate. No doubt the Scott government will ask for his resignation at once.

Gordon, Ironsides & Pares, the cattle and meat firm, will open a branch here this fall. The firm has secured a site in Block 200 from the city and will erect a large warehouse immediately.

Mrs. Kennedy of Braside, Dixie, announces the engagement of her daughter, Harriett to Percival H. Gordon, of Regina, Sask., the marriage to take place very quietly on Oct. 7th.—Toronto Star.

The remains of Chas. Livingstone were interred in Regina on Sunday afternoon. Livingstone, whose father and brother resided here, was killed while working on the G.T.P. construction east of Winnipeg.

Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Nutrie returned last week from their wedding trip. On Thursday the members of the staff of the attorney general's department waited on Mr. Nutrie and presented him with a silver tea set.

The annual harvest thanksgiving services were held in St. Paul's church last Sunday. The church was very appropriately decorated and two splendid sermons were delivered by Rev. G. C. Hill. The special music was splendidly rendered.

The withdrawal of J. K. McInnis from the campaign has somewhat upset the plans of the Liberal organizers in this constituency. They had a good deal of literature ready to send out in condemnation of Mr. McInnis. It was proposed to send this out about two weeks before the election.

The city has about completed the work on the swimming basin at Wascona Lake. The basin will be about 200 ft. by 100 ft. The bottom of the basin far the greater part is made of concrete and the balance is gravel. The basin will be bounded by posts connected with ropes. The water will be of different depths.

A one-armed man named Clarke, was sentenced on Thursday to four years in the penitentiary for having stolen a gold watch and chain from the McAra residence above the court house. Clarke has only one hand and sold pencils for a living. While canvassing the city he visited the court house and went upstairs and took the valuables from Miss McAra's room.

Rev. Father Vaughan delivered an interesting lecture in Knox church on Monday evening under the auspices of the Knox Church Brotherhood. As a Shakesperian lecturer, his equal has

not appeared in Regina and the audience were abundantly repaid for their attendance. After the lecture the local Council of the Knights of Columbus entertained the reverend gentleman at a supper at the King's Hotel.

G. Ens, M.L.A., from Rosthern is stumping in this constituency. Judging from other speeches which he has made in Regina, a fair translation of his speech would read as follows: "Mine friends, I'm here to tell you that I believe in Sir Wilfrid Laurier. I am also here to tell you that I agree with Premier Scott that you should vote for Martin." The only speech this orator ever made in the legislative assembly, reads: "Mr. Speaker, I am just here to agree to whatever the premier says."

The arrest and conviction at Moose Jaw on Thursday of Joseph Conway for horse stealing, the arrest of Kid Royals and Josh Birch in Montana and the sentencing of a fourth named Hofferson to the N.D. penitentiary breaks up a bad gang of horse rustlers who have been operating in southern Saskatchewan and states adjoining to the south for some time. These were the leaders, Convery admitted working with a gang which stole a number of horses in the ranch country near the boundary south of Moose Jaw, but claimed that he was forced by the gang to be with it. Kid Royals was a notorious outlaw and was shot by a sheriff in Montana recently.

A Yellow Grass gentleman and a dusky maiden were principles in a police court escape this week. The man was in love with the maiden and came up prepared for the services of the minister. Upon promises of her consent to marriage he had presented her with a watch and money. Receiving this she was preparing to decamp when the police stepped in and gathered her to the civic pile where she was charged with receiving money under false pretences. The man and maid met again and again, his heart was touched and he was prepared to complete the ceremony. The police didn't agree and after getting the man his valuable gifts proceeded to have the woman account for her previous behavior. This was done but evidently she got off free, and the faithful man is to marry the faithless lass.
