In the far East.

Our call at Penang was brief, and as we arrived after dark and left before daylight next morning we did not see much. The pilot told us it was a very hot place; that a very wicked man had recently died there and after a few days absence had returned for his avocation. We went ashore at Singapore and had a delightful drive out to the public gardens, four miles from the S. S. pier. There is quite an extensive managerie in the gardens, and some lovely flowering plants. Between Singapore and Hong Kong we were in waters where the Chinese pirates formerly abounded, and where they still exist. Our steamer had on board over half a million pounds sterling worth of silver bars, but we were robbed. In Hong Kong we got one glimpse of China and several looks at the Chinese. I would rather live in India than in China, and the Indians, in modesty and general deportment, in public, are far superior to the Chinese women we saw; but the Chinese men are far more manly and independent than the Hindus. We saw the part of Hong Kong that was visited by the plague. All the streets leading into that part of the city, which strange to say was on the hillside, were walled up and the houses deserted. The Government is buying up all the property, and after removing the buildings, intends to lay out broad streets and sell the lots again to the citizens. Hong Kong is brimming over full of interesting sights and sounds, and under the guidance of an American dentist, named Robe, and a friendly police inspector, we managed to take in a generous quantity of them. We felt chilly in Hong Kong with the temperature at 66 degrees. When we reached Shanghai the mercury went down to 54 degrees we shivered, but when we ran into Yokohama in a snow-storm with ice forming on deck, we remembered some old times. At Nagasaki, in Japan, we had the great good fortune, through the cheek of the ship's barber (and some of our own), to get into the Japanese navy-yard, and to go all over a Japanese gunboat that had been in action off Chefoo, and was in the dry dock for repairs. She had four holes in her hull, but though two of them were below the water line she had not been disabled. The Japanese officers, for some reason inscrutable to our whole ship's company, and to ourselves, relaxed their rules of "absolutely no admittance" and treated us (as the barber and myself) as though we had been harmless people, or reporters, or something of that kind,--touched their hats to us, detailed a petty officer to show us over the yard and the gunboat, and offered us drinks, which the barber imbibed, when we came away. There were 17 gun-boats of different nationalities and different sizes lying at anchor in Nagasaki harbor. Among them was the Japanese war-ship that began the little unpleasantness last fall by sinking the Chinese transport lying the English flag, Kew Shing. She had also been under fire at Chefoo, and had a hole in her side above water line as big as a wall-peg. I had two hours ashore at Kebe and 6 at Yokohama, and made the most of my opportunities. Every body seemed full of the war. All the little boys from 5 years up, wore military caps. Japan is a queer country, different from anything I ever saw before.

Last Tuesday the Societies of C. E., of Upper and Lower Canada met with the Society at the hotel, Boston. The evening. After listening to music, recitations and several excellent papers, the members voted themselves to getting acquainted. When the meeting was over all expressed the wish to thus meet again.

As advertised Madame Rosa D'Eria and husband gave one of their renowned concerts. The audience was fair but such music was deserving of a better.

MARCH 20th.—On Sat. 16th, William Sutton of Church St., started on a trip to Boston.

Last week Mr Abram Masters received a telegram stating the death of his son Douglas, at the hospital, Boston. The body will be brought home for interment. Funeral, Friday 22nd.

Distribution of Samples of Grain From the Experimental Farm at Ottawa.

To the Editor of the ACADIAN. During the past eight years samples of these varieties of grain which have succeeded best on the Experimental Farms have been distributed on application in 3-4 bushels to farmers in all parts of the Dominion free through the mail.

Last year I was instructed by the Honorable Minister of Agriculture to forward, as far as practicable, two samples to each applicant, but the applications received were so numerous that on this basis of distribution all the available stock had been promised by the middle of February, and all later applicants could not be supplied.

The Care of the Stove.

Once a month, says a good authority, is as often as a stove will require blacking. If it is properly cared for in the meantime, and this monthly rejuvination will be made much easier and more effective if conducted in a systematic and understanding manner.

It is an advantage to wet the blacking with coffee instead of water. After a small section has been covered with blacking from one brush, it should be polished off with a dry brush, and when the whole stove has been gone over in this way, it should be rubbed with an old chambray cloth for the purpose, or a clean cotton cloth.

Uses for Salt.

There are a number of persons who do not know in how many ways common table salt may be used or of what practical value it is aside from cooking purposes. To such, the following will prove interesting.

One pint of fine salt mixed with two pints of wood ashes will mend cracks in stoves. When cinders accumulate in the grate, throw in a handful of salt, let stand a few minutes and they will be easily removed.

A teaspoonful added to the water in which cut flowers are placed, will preserve them for time indefinite.

A little rubbed on the griddles before greasing, will prevent the cakes from sticking.


