On opening the crates in the Oriental ports the consignees of past shipments have found that the rast shipments have found that the apples are as fresh as if taken from the tree. This is partly due to the fact that at this time of the year the perishable cargo only gets one day of tropical heat during the whole voyage across. The "Asia" took ap proximately 350 tons of this com-modity in her holds, the largest con-signment of apples to go through the Narrows this season for the Orient.
