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

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

You may be pointed to the French yillage of St. Boniface, with its cathedral, its college, its hospital, its convent, and its Bishop's palace, supported by a small and poor population, and told that from these imposing structures, where the active brain of the ecclesiastic plans and develops its purposes, proceeds all the opposition to the national school system. But this may be an exaggeration. The school question is national question as well as a religious question. So far as I can learn the French

catholic population ARE VERY NEARLY UNANIMOUS for the restoration of the separate school system, but among Irish Catholics a much greater division of opinion seems to exist. If the pressure of the church were removed and the question could be divested of its political character there would soon be a wide acceptance of the new school system among Irish Catholics, but acceptance would be a slower growth among the French population. It is beyond doubt that the old separate school system was nefficient, and that the new, where fairly operative, is producing better educational results. And it must be apparent at least to the leading lay minds among the French Catholic element that if they are to hold their own in this new country they must master the English language A Home in the City and get a fair English education. EXTRACTING A LION'S TOOTH

An Unusual Operation at Lincoln Park,

Major, the big lion at Lincoln Park, Chicago, underwent a painful operation a few days ago. One of his teeth was drawn. For weeks he had been suffering from what the keepers could not determine. He was quiet, and in eating was very particular as to what food he was given. At last, thinking that Major might have malaria, one of the keepers, De Vry, in the capacity of physician, stepped into the cage to make a prossional examination. Major met him at the door, rubbed against the keeper like a cat, as is his custom, then without any suggestion on De Vry's part quietly lay down on his side.

"Let's see your tongue," said De Vry, ouching Major's jaws with his fingers. Major opened his mouth. Then De Vry took hold of each jaw and stretched the huge red cavern still wider. Major seemed to like it and lay very still. "No wonder you can't eat tough steak, Major," said De Vry. "You have a very

George Johnson, the Dominion statis cian at Ottawa, has been investigating the cost of education in the various provinces of Canada between the years 1888 and 1893, and his figures show that Manitoba expended proportionately more for public schools than any other province in the Dominion. Between these dates Ontario's expenditure upon public schools has remained stationary at \$1.87 per head of the population.
