TOPICS OF THE DAY.

PUZZLE OF THE SEA.

The ship *Miwers*, just into the port of Vancouver, B. C., reports that Feloon Island has come into sight again. Feloon Island, which is one of the Tofts or Friendly group, in the south Pacific, is the 15-puzzle of navigators. Scarcely ever is it completed showing its location when the mysterious island entirely disappears from sight. Then when sailors have made up their minds that no such island ever existed and that they must have been dreaming, it will bob up again above the surface of the ocean like a hot penny.

Faloon Island is or was—it is always dangerous to speak of it in the present tense—located 35 miles distant from its nearest neighbor, Tokoa, one of the principal members of the Tofts group. It was first seen in 1885 and at once attracted the attention of scientists, who were anxious to determine the nature of the fœces which could add another island to the thousands which already dotted the surface of the south Pacific. It was easy to determine that Feloon Island was of volcanic origin. Its cliffs rose more than 150 feet above the level of the sea, and on the flat portions of the island it was only necessary to dig down six or eight feet to reach a temperature which would boil water, while on the surface the thermometer only marked 85 degrees above zero.

The fact that the island is entirely composed of volcanic conglomerate and that there is a distant smell of sulphur in the air makes it certain that it was driven up by a submarine volcano.

The most careful scientific examination of the Faloon Island was that made by the officers of the British ship *Egeria* in October, 1889. They found the island entirely uninhabited and projecting out of the ocean in the shape of a high and symmetrical black oval. It was almost destitute of either animal or vegetable life, except three or four seedling plants, evidently carried to the island by wandering birds. Two young coconut trees, not in a flourishing condition, were all the signs of vegetation, and a single sand piper and a solitary moth were the only living things which a careful search of the island revealed.

At the time of the *Egeria's* visit, four years after the island appeared for the first time, the waves of the ocean, which beat upon the high, black and barren shore of the island with great velocity, were fast eating it away. It was predicted then that within a few years it would entirely disappear unless some new volcanic activity should give it a new lease of life.

Since that visit Faloon Island has twice disappeared, only to be driven up again by the resistless force operating beneath it. Later explorers found some natives who, during the prolonged eruption in 1885, which resulted in the formation of the island, went in their canoes from Tokoa and watched the forces of the volcano at work. Before its last disappearance, in 1898, still other visitors had discovered apertures in the upper part of the grim black cliff from which smoke and steam were still issuing.—Exchange.

THE LEPEHS OF HAWAII.

The isolation of the lepers in Hawaii is to be made more strict. There is a conviction among members of the Honolulu board of health that extra precaution is required to prevent the increase of the dread disease. The eradication of it seems too much to hope for. At present there are nearly 1000 lepers at Molokai, all but forty-five of them being natives of the islands. Thirty are Chinese, five Americans, four British, five German, and one Norwegian. Strange to say, there is not a single Japanese among the segregated lepers.

Interesting Happenings The World Over.

A number of paragraphs have been going the rounds on the subject of the restoration of the titular abbot of the English branch of the Benedictine Order of the pre-Reformation dignity of mitred abbot. The "Daily Chronicle" states: "The only mitred abbot in England is the Right Rev. Wilfrid Hipwood, of the Cistercian abbey at Coalville, near Leicester. The titles of Westminster, York, Reading and Glastonbury are held by English Benedictines, under the jurisdiction of the newly-elected president general, Dom Gasquet. The ceremony of conferring the mitres upon the abbots, including Dom Gasquet himself, will probably take place in the new Westminster Cathedral shortly after the opening. The crozier and pectoral cross of an abbot is made of carved wood. He bears the crozier of the former turned inward to show that his jurisdiction is purely monastic. He is also permitted to confer the tonsure and minor orders upon his own monks. The abbatial dignity was also conceded to the historical English College of Douai, which is also under Benedictine rule."

IN THE PALACE OF THE KING.

(By F. Marion Crawford. The Macmillan Co.)
Mr Crawford's latest novel is "A love story of old Madrid"—the Madrid of Philip the Second,—and we have no hesitation in saying that it will rank very high among the best of the romances with which this remarkable writer has enriched our literature. It opens strongly, and enchains the readers attention till the last page. It is intensely dramatic; indeed it has already been dramatized and enacted with great applause. It sparkles with epigram, and the dialogue is unusually felicitous without the least strain or unsaturation. Its psychology is keen and correct; and the author's marvellous experience, observation and knowledge of men furnish new surprises in every chapter. That the period of the story is reconstructed with skill and scholarship does not surprise us; it has long ago been shown that historical knowledge and the historical imagination are among the ordinary resources of this marvellously versatile man. The art of the story also deserves a word of special tribute; for Mr. Crawford is an artist always, and in this book he is found at his best. We realize that we have bestowed very unusual praise on this story of Don John of Austria and Dolores—they are beautiful characters,—but we feel that every reader who takes up the volume will share our enthusiasm. The illustrations by Fred R. are a delight.—Ave Maria.

Although the visit of the Persian Shah to Belgium is now past history, one little incident of it may interest our readers. A luncheon was given at Ostend one Friday in honor of the royal visitor. Several Catholic guests refused meat when it was handed them, and this did not escape the notice of the Shah. He asked an explanation, and after receiving it, turned to the members of the Liberal party present and inquired why they also did not follow the teachings of their religion. The equivocal answer which one accord of him did not seem to satisfy Mousnier-Dia. He professed himself unable to understand how any Belgian citizen could turn aside from the customs and ceremonies of his country and the Catholic Church.

The Archbishop of Sees will be authorized to lend the pallium of Thomas a Becket, in the chapter house treasury, for the opening of the new Roman Catholic Cathedral at Westminster. The ring and crozier of Becket are already in Cardinal Vaughan's possession, so that the British "emblems" will be vested from head to foot in the murdered Archbishop's pontificals.

A gift presented to his Holiness by the Spanish pilgrims last in Rome was a book, every leaf of which was a bank note of a thousand francs, the whole of these costly leaves comprising the sum of 250,000 francs, bequeathed to His Holiness by a Spanish lady, recently deceased, of the Diocese of Bilbao.

Lord Halifax and several eminent gentlemen of the Episcopalian Church are advocating the proposition to present to the villagers of Oberammergau a thank offering in the name of those who witnessed the Passion play. The gift will probably be a magnificent chalice for the parish church.

The Holy See is considering the advisability of extending to the entire priest-hood of the Roman rite the privilege which is confined at present to the Church in certain portions of the Spanish dominions of ordering three Masses on All Souls' Day.

The Caledonian Club will hold their annual St. Andrew's dinner on the evening of Thursday, Nov. 23rd at the Queen Hotel.

ALAN J. Stewart, the man who killed Donald Stewart at Belle River is missing. The Government is responsible for this lack of administration of justice.

Rev. Father John C. Barry, rector of St. John's Catholic Church, Concord, N. B., was struck by a mule car and instantly killed on Wednesday last.

Lord Wolsey intends as soon as possible to visit the island of St. Helena in the Atlantic, South Africa (1879) and Egypt (1882).

NORMAN McDonald, a Prince Edward Islander, fell down under the stairs of the Hotel de Ville, in Montreal, B. C., a distance of one hundred feet and sustained fatal injuries.

PAUL Adams states that the Province of Prince Edward Island has been awarded a gold medal for the exhibit of vegetable and fruit, and silver medal for the exhibit to horticulture.

In the previous election, thirty thousand people, Yale University defeated Princeton 29 to 0 on Saturday. This is the worst defeat Princeton has ever sustained in her football career.

Rev. Dr. Murphy fell at the altar of St. Mary's Church, Halifax, Saturday morning while saying Mass. Hemorrhage of the brain was the result, three doctors were called in and the patient is recovering.

SERGEANT Arthur J. B. Mellich and Private Thomas Leitch of the Island contingent arrived in the city by the Princess at about midnight Saturday night. A large number of friends were at the wharf to meet them and they were enthusiastically welcomed.

The British steamer Georgian Prince from Hull, England for Philadelphia, rounded on Nov. 19th, fourteen men, comprising the crew of the Norwegian barque Highflyer, which had been abandoned at sea in a sinking condition. The Highflyer was a vessel of 935 tons, and had left Campbellton, P. E. Island, October 19th for Newport, Wales.

Mr. M. F. Hogan of this city, on Thursday received the news that his brother-in-law, Mr. William Hogan, fell from a train in Boston on the 19th inst., and had both legs severed below the knees. Before he was picked up several trains had passed over him. He was removed as quickly as possible to the hospital where found and died four hours later.

PRINCE EDWARD Island potatoes are not so plentiful in Halifax just now as they usually are at this season of the year, but there are a couple of weeks yet before navigation is likely to close. The price of Nova Scotia potatoes is about 10c per bushel, and New Brunswick potatoes being more plentiful, probably a much more as 10c per bushel.—H. Herald.

The Princess was delayed for about an hour on Thursday night, owing to an accident which occurred to the train about half a mile from Pictou Station. The safe sprang and the engine was derailed, and the car going into the river. About 200 feet of the track was torn up rapidly however, so that the train and its passengers were conveyed to Pictou by train.

A VALERIAN horse belonging to Mr. Donald Robertson of Brudenell, and another belonging to Mr. David Shaw, were taken from their stables on night last week. Mr. Robertson's horse was found several days afterwards in an open field near Charlottetown. A quantity of wool which was stolen at the same time has not been found. There is no trace of Mr. Shaw's horse as yet.

JOHN McQuarrie and George McQuarrie have been sent up to the Supreme Court on a charge of assault upon Mr. McLeod of Murray River. The defendants had been charged by the doctor of trespassing on his land and on a small acre, and as a result the doctor was severely beaten about the head and body with sticks. The suit is said to have been commenced on October 24th, since which time Dr. McLeod has been laid up with his injuries.

A BARRING robbery was perpetrated in Boston about 4 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon, when the contents of Dr. MacLeod's safe at 85 Lowell Street, West End, were taken into and a safe weighing some 300 lbs. and containing \$2,000 worth of money, diamonds, watches and jewelry, was taken out bodily and carried away. Mr. Moore, who is a retail trader, and kept their stock in-trade in the safe which stood in a room on the first floor of the house, which they also occupied as a sleeping room.

Messrs. Ryan and Thompson, owners of the Colonial gold mine at Bonfret, N. S., are the possessors of a gold brick weighing 2700 ounces, and valued at \$24,000. It is the largest brick of gold ever found in Nova Scotia and it came from 110 tons of quartz. To secure it the owners spent \$1800, giving them a margin of \$22,200. During the past three months this mine has yielded \$70,000 in gold from an expenditure of \$2000 and with less than a score of men working it. The property consists of 300 acres and only a small portion has been worked. It is a bonanza and will be fully developed at once. Its value is estimated in millions.

The Caledonian Club held a reception Thursday night to do honor to Rev. Mr. Fullerton, and Lieutenant J. A. Macdonald, prominent members of the Club, who have been absent on duty in the service of their country in South Africa. A large number of guests were present. Addresses of welcome were presented to each of the gentlemen, accompanied by sentimental and in recognition of their services. Both gentlemen thanked the Club in fitting words for the honor bestowed upon them and expressed their present by narrating some of their experiences while on the field. The singing of "Auld Lang Syne" and the National Anthem brought the proceedings to a close.

WEDNESDAY last was declaration day in the East and West Ridings of Prince County. In East Prince Mr. Lortney was declared elected by a majority of 225, and Mr. Hackett was declared elected by a majority of 3. This is declaration day for East and West Queen's and King's. In West Prince Mr. McLeelan demanded a recount which was to be before Judge McLeod, at Summerside, yesterday. When the Judge opened his court to commence the recount, it was found one of the ballot-boxes had been stolen from the train on the way from Alberton. In consequence of this the recount was adjourned till today to see if the missing box could be recovered. Is this part of the machine, of which we hear so much?

At a large and intelligent meeting of the Liberal Conservative electors of Charlottetown, held in the Lyceum on Monday evening last, James Paton, Esq., and Dr. S. R. Jenkins, were unanimously chosen as the opposition candidates for the city. The nominations were received with the greatest enthusiasm, and cheer after cheer rent the air as the candidates appeared on the platform. Both made short and spirited speeches, thanking the people and asking that the campaign be conducted free from all manner of corruption. A clean election is what they intend to run. The candidates are strong and popular men, and we expect to see them both elected on December the 14th.

In South Africa!

No official news has been received from South Africa since General Roberts' dispatch of November 12, in which he said that the Boer commandos appeared to be acting independently, with no particular object except to harass the British as much as possible. A press telegram sent from Pretoria last night, signed by General Buller's widow to Commandant-General Buller, induced him to send his terms of surrender to General Roberts. The burgesses of Johannesburg predict that the end of the war is near. Statements similar to these being frequently heard. The report cannot be accepted until it is confirmed.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

CAZAR OF RUSSIA ILL. The Czar of Russia is ill. It is stated in some quarters that his illness is due to poisoning. An attempt, it is stated, was also made to poison the Empress.

QUEEN THANKS CANADIANS. Queen Victoria received a detachment of mixed colonial troops, including a number of Canadians at Windsor on Friday afternoon and personally thanked them for their loyal services to the Empire.

IN THE PHILIPPINES. Last week witnessed a very considerable increase in rebel and American activity in the field. Many skirmishes occurred, and there were several small engagements in the northern and southern Luzon. Notable among the week's engagements was General Grant's advance with MacArthur and American forces upon a rebel stronghold, 25 miles north of Manila, which was defended by 200 insurgents. After a hard-fought battle, the fighting for the greater part of a day, the enemy was dislodged from the mountainous position and his forces were killed and stores with considerable ammunition were destroyed. Fifty Filipinos were killed and many others wounded. The insurgents carried off their dead. The American losses were eleven privates and one sergeant wounded and one Maanabell killed.

In South Africa

A London cable of the 6th says: The remainder of the Royal Canadian Regiment left Cape Town today on the Hawarden Castle. They will come direct to England, where they will be the guests of the mother country. A grand reception awaits them, as the gallant conduct of the Canadians has won the admiration of every Englishman. The scenes on the arrival of Col. Otter and his men will rival and likely surpass those witnessed on the return of Lord Roberts, in a despatch dated Johannesburg, November 15th, reports to the war office as follows:— "Smith-Dorrien states that Major Saunders and Captain Chalmers, (of the Canadian Mounted Rifles), behaved with great gallantry in the action of November 2nd. Saunders rode into the enemy's line and was killed, and Chalmers was wounded and his horse was killed, and Chalmers went to his assistance. Saunders implored him to leave, but he refused and the patient Chalmers was, I grieve to say, killed."

The news from South Africa is more stirring than for several weeks. Gen. Smith-Dorrien has again been engaged; Col. Douglas has organized a Boer laager and the main of the garrisons have been broken up in Orange River Colony, and elsewhere, but the most determined action was fifty miles north west of Kroonstad, where Gen. DeWet's force was badly cut up, and defeated, after a severe engagement. Mr. Steyn and Gen. DeWet narrowly escaped capture, but eight guns and all the ammunition and wagons were left in the hands of British Cavalry after a long and desperate fight.

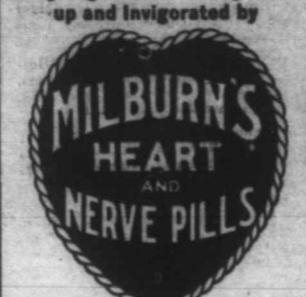
Col. Legh, who commanded the British force in this brilliant action, was killed. He was one of Lord Kitchener's men who greatly distinguished himself in the Khartoum campaign, was one of the best cavalry officers in the British Army and was only 20 years of age. Lord Kitchener has the reputation of being a cold, unemotional general, who never appreciates what is done for him. He has retained this reputation in South Africa, where nearly all the officers who did "exceptionally good work before Khartoum have been singled out for promotion and for places of honor and difficulty. While the two Boer leaders escaped their comrades, to get all the guns and supplies, and was utterly routed.

Gen. DeWet is now the real leader of the Boer cause and his prestige will be increased by this serious defeat. A dozen other Boer generals are still in the field. Gen. Botha, whose health is improved, is from Volksrust in the Transvaal, and Gen. Viljoen, is near him, with Gen. DeWet, Gen. Schalk Burger is in the mountains near Lydenburg, and Gen. Erasmus is to the north, while Gen. Gubbler and Lemmer are in various sections of the Transvaal.

Lord Roberts has evidently made the capture of Gen. DeWet, and Mr. Steyn, his next work, and is employing mobile mounted forces to hunt them down at all points.
