BUILDING OPERATIONS SHOW GOOD INCREASE

Average Advance of 14 Per Cent. in Building Operations in Cities of Canada Over June of Last Year—West Makes Particular Good Showing—Winnipeg Leads the Dominion.
 "Construction" for August says that although somewhat less brisk than the preceding months, building operations in June were carried out to an extent considerably in advance of the progress noted in the corresponding period of 1909.

The west, in particular, made a most excellent showing, noting a cycle of unbroken gains, and reflecting the whole are, to say the least, highly gratifying, showing as they do, an average increase of 14 per cent. for August over the corresponding period of 1909.
