Derringham is nursed back to life by a rich widow, who becomes engaged to him, but who subsequently throws him over when she finds that he is going to be lame. Derringham hastens to Greece, catches Halcyone in the temple of her goddess, and after another beautiful scene all ends well.

### S. A. Congress.

Hand-liners in the neighbourhood of Bryant's Cove Point and no doubt other places as well, complain that trappers are ruining them by placing their traps on the fishing ground. It is not only the size of the trap but the several moorings makes it impossible to put down a line near them. There is talk of petitioning the Government to have the evil abated.

So quiet has been the season at the new public building that a bird built its nest there and has hatched out its little ones—7 in number.

Our regatta takes place to-day. The day is a delightful one so far, clear, bright and yet cool. Quite a large number of visitors are in town and a very pleasant day seems in store for all of us.

A glance at the programme causes us a little regret at there being no fisherman's race. The fishermen are the main-stay and for our part we always enjoyed a race when none but fishermen were permitted to row.

Five boats will contest. They are the Beeslie, J. Garland, cox; Maggie, J. C. Ash; Myrtle, F. C. Archibald; Winnie, C. Pike; Mary, Wm. Carson. Seven races will be contested.

Broken Promises

We observe that Mr. Albert Bayley, Surveyor, seems to be an adjunct of the Prime Minister's campaigning.

It will be remembered that Mr. Albert Bayley was kept in the Burin District about the time the Prime Minister made his campaign in Burin District.

As to the possibilities of carrying out this promise, Sir Edward declared there were no difficulties in the way.

The necessary revenue required to maintain the various public services is shown by the fact that nearly \$100,000 has been collected annually for the past eight years, over and above what was required to meet the demands of the public services.

Sir Edward is boasting of surpluses the past three years and flagrantly breaking his word at the same time.

In spite of the ease he speaks of, he has done nothing. Tea has not been placed on the free list. Sugar has not been placed on the free list.

Now, what is the real reason of the breach of this solemn pledge to the people. It is not far to seek.

It was apparently entered into almost thoughtlessly. The matter of the loans which would be necessary for the carrying-out of the branch railway programme was winked out of sight.

They were undoubtedly not dealt with adequately. The people were not advised properly by Sir Edward Morris of the burdens the programme would entail.

Indeed, Sir Edward himself does not seem to have realized the risks he was rushing into, not only in 1908, 1909, but even in 1910, when the Railway Extension proposals and the Loan Bill were introduced in the Legislature.

A perusal of his Branch Railway Speech of February, 1910, will convince any one that he believed at that time, the railway projects would be paid for out of the first loan and that the only change in the country when these branches were completed would be the interest on that loan, which he gave roughly at \$140,000 a year.

"In other words, when all these lines are built, the interest on the cost, which we shall have to pay, will be \$140,000 a year."

"It may be asked, can the Colony afford \$140,000 a year for five branch railways. . .? Is it worth it?"

"The whole of the branches will then (meaning 1915) be completed, and the question must naturally arise, what will the revenue be in 1915? Will it be sufficient to meet this interest charge of \$140,000, and pay for all the other services on their increased votes?"

"And as we remarked last Saturday:—"In these extracts it will be observed that Sir Edward gives the assurance that when the five branch lines are completed, to use his express words again, "the outlay for interest will be only \$140,000 a year, to meet the cost of these branch railways."

Nor was he alone among the members of the Government party in contributing to the dissemination of these estimates of the financial burdens the Branch railway undertaking would entail.

Here in part is what the official report of the speech of the Hon. R. K. Bishop in introducing the bill to the Legislative Council, contains on this matter:—"He would expect the members of this Council, above all others in the Colony, perhaps, to enter upon a consideration of this subject, which involves the expenditure of very large sums of money (probably four mil-

(thons of dollars) with great caution, but at the same time with an unbiased mind. . . . But we had found other means of meeting the demands of the public service, and the royalty to be paid from Bell Island, added to the 75,000 to which the Colony was previously committed, would more than meet the entire issue of bonds for the construction and equipment of the whole of the projected lines."

The Hon. R. K. Bishop adopts the suggestion of the Premier that some \$4,000,000 would be the probable cost, and the interest on it would meet the burden for the construction and equipment of the whole of the projected branch.

The Hon. J. C. Crosbie echoed the same estimate as the Premier for he said in his speech of Feb. 10th, 1910, "It has been asked where we are going to get the \$140,000 to pay the interest on the railroad."

On the same day the Hon. C. H. Emerson endorsed the Premier in these words:—"The Hon. the Premier has also pointed out where the interest to be paid is to come from, and that no extra taxation will be imposed to meet that interest."

It was small wonder then that Sir Edward Morris tried to explain away the impression he had created and his followers emphasized, when he had to approach the Legislature for permission to float another loan. But he did float a second loan for branch railway purposes and he has not attempted to carry out his pledge to Reduce Taxation, and to our mind the hindsight of the Premier about the cost of his railway projects explains clearly his failure to keep his word about putting tea, sugar, pork and other prime necessities of life on the free list.

## Dramatic Escape

In originality of conception and ingenuity of execution, the escape of Prince Krabotkin from the prison of the Nikolaevsk Military Hospital in St. Petersburg in 1876 is probably unparalleled in prison annals. Twelve conspirators outside the prison took part in it, but not one of them was ever arrested or suspected, although many of them were subsequently banished to Siberia for other political offences.

The escape was made in broad daylight, about five o'clock in the afternoon, and with such novel accessories as cherries, opera hats, music, a black mare, and a microscope. The chances were at least ten to one that it would fail, notwithstanding the extraordinary ingenuity with which it was planned, but every device and stratagem worked perfectly, and the liberated prisoner dined that night in Donon's restaurant, the most fashionable of the capital, while the entire police force of the capital was ransacking the city in search of him.

Nobody ever imagined that he would be shrewd and bold enough to take his dinner in so public a place, and his single detective looked for him there, although search was made in scores of other places, and every exit from the city was carefully guarded that a mouse could hardly have crept through unobserved.—The "Century."

It is believed the 2 vessels will cross the ocean practically together and the Lake Champlain will keep in wireless touch with the Corsican.

The resolute determination of the citizens of New York to rid the police force of the system of graft and blackmail was given forcible expression to last night at a meeting of the Union, when they appointed a vigilance committee of prominent men and women to see that the public officers now engaged in exposing treasonable alliance of police with organized crime were supported.

## Stole a Barrel of Fish.

Yesterday afternoon Const. Lawlor arrested a fisherman, who is charged with the larceny of a quantity of fish. The accused visited the premises of Messrs. Goodridge & Sons, rolled a barrel of fish away which was left standing on the wharf, and then went and sold the stolen property to a city grocer for cash. In the meantime Capt. Whelan, of Goodridge's employ, who witnessed the theft being committed, communicated with the police station, and the arrest followed. The prisoner was tried before Judge Conroy to-day, acknowledged the theft, and was fined \$10 or 30 days. The fish has been secured by the police and will be returned to the rightful owners.

Some ladies think they may, under the privileges of the de-shabbie be loose and negligent of their dress in the morning. But be you, from the moment you rise till the moment you go to bed, as cleanly and properly dressed as at the hours

of dinner or tea. A lady who has been seen a sloven in the morning will never efface the impression she has made with all the dress and pageantry she can afterwards involve herself in.—Thomas Jefferson in a letter to his daughter.

A young girl was sorting out her clothes for the week's washing. She held up a distinctly soiled petticoat for inspection, hesitated over it for a moment, and then put it back in the wardrobe. "That's too soiled to wear afterwards any more," she decided, "but I guess I can wear it with my morning dresses another week."

Don't you think that's rather a queer point of view?

When the morning is the freshest, sweetest time in all the day, why should anything too soiled be worn at the tag end of the day be considered suitable to wear then? And yet you'll admit that it is a very common habit among women to exact a few days of wear in the kitchen from the afternoon toggery which is too soiled to appear again in the living room before it has been washed.

And just as "tacky" as this habit of

wearing half soiled things in the morning is that of finishing up half worn finery about one's housework. One of the nicest girls I ever knew had this queer trick. She was a wholesome looking girl who would ever have been a perfect picture going about her housework in a fresh percale or gingham, but in a faded blue crepe, torn and spotted and trimmed with disgustingly soiled lace she was anything but a picture,—except perhaps an illustration of an article on the wrong way to do it.

To my mind percale and gingham and such cloths belong to the morning just as naturally and inextricably as silks and laces belong to the evening. They are of the genus of morning, a fresh and crisp and dainty; like morning light, and morning flowers and morning bird songs.

It seems to me that no matter how wealthy one might be one could not buy anything more beautiful for the morning than a fresh and simple cotton dress. At a house party I once attended one of the wealthier guests used to appear at breakfast in a rich negligee of pale blue silk and lace. It probably cost ten times as much as the little pink gingham dress of her next neighbour, but to my mind it was not half so beautiful because not half so appropriate to the genus of the morning.

### Household Notes.

Nothing makes a finer polish for tinware than good wood ashes.

Medicine should never be left in sight of the invalid in the sickroom.

A mixture of borax and red pepper is good to rid closets of insects.

Jonquils or daffodils are placed to advantage in a brass or copper urn or vase.

Undue consumption of tea, coffee, cocoa and chocolate will make the skin sallow.

To make sure that bread will rise in cold weather, warm the flour before mixing.

A small quantity of chopped figs added to a nut and apple salad gives an excellent flavor.

Shoes will last much longer if occasionally rubbed with vaseline when they are new.

Chiffon velvet is a most excellent thing for brushing a felt hat, whether a man's or a woman's.

A long-handled buttonhook should be kept in the laundry to clean the lint from the tub outlets.

Boiled rice or baked potato will go excellently with sweetbreads, and the dish is good for the sick.

For obstinate nosebleed, put an ice pack or a cloth wrung out in ice water at the back of the neck.

The cheaper and lighter the pan the whither and lighter your bread when you bake in a gas range.

To insure that potted plants will thrive, always have a little water in the saucer under the flower pot.

A cloth skirt should never be hung up inside out, as this tends to crease it more than anything else.

Bronzes should be cleaned by rubbing with sweet oil. Rub dry with a soft cloth and polish with chamolis.

Gruel, when properly prepared, should be a little thicker than cream and should be absolutely free from lumps.

After putting buttered paper in the cake pans, sprinkle in just a little flour. This will keep the cakes from sticking.

A little alcohol rubbed on quickly will clean a dirty window better than soap; ammonia in wash water is equally good.

To make a candle burn low for sickroom use, put salt around the wick under the flame. It will give a soft, steady light and will burn all night.

Remove the scale from palms by washing them in water to which has been added a few drops of cedar oil. If the scale is not all gone in a week, wash them again.

Pecan sandwiches always win popularity. Cut even slices of graham or rye bread, butter, lay on halves of shelled pecan nuts, salt slightly and serve.

Instead of throwing away the unsealed envelopes that bring circulars, cut off the gummed strips and save them. They will serve a hundred household uses.

Sew hangers inside the bottom ruffles of silk petticoats and hang them upside down. They will retain their freshness longer, wear longer and look much better.

Cold water soothes the pain of any sudden inflammation of the eye; hot water will help a dull pain, and a weak solution of boric acid is always good for the eye.

To clean silver, apply kerosene with either a brush or soft cloth, then rinse in scalding water. No other method is so easy and no other method will give such a luster.


