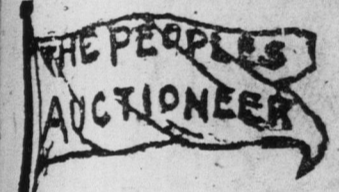

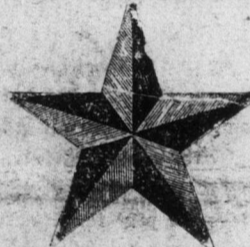

Rev. Mr. Whitmarsh, the Cochran Street Pastor, officiated at George Street on Sunday morning and gave a very edifying discourse on "Decisions," from which some very practical and important lessons were conveyed to the congregation. EVENING SERVICE.

Rev. Mr. Bartlett, the esteemed pastor, conducted the evening service and struck a very rich vein of thought in opening up the incident of the woman cured of an issue of blood, recorded in Luke 10, 45. "Collectivity" and "Individuality" were the pivotal centres of the discourse. Some persons had advanced the idea that the epoch of individuality had ended. This position was not sustained by the incident under consideration. The afflicted woman pressed into the crowd and touched Jesus, unperceived by the multitude around her, and that individual touch was recognised and brought to her the blessing she so greatly needed. A great deal depended upon the individual touch. It was this that gave power and effect to great civilizing and religious agencies. At certain periods in history great men had stood up in their individuality and thrown their shadow across the nations. Personal responsibility was close in touch with this idea; it could not be evaded by any mixing up with the multitude. There was one who saw the diseased woman in her perplexity, whose trouble was unperceived by the multitude, and who readily responded to her touch. This excellent discourse was interspersed with some very happy illustrations, which must have brought conviction and comfort to the hearts of the large congregation present on the occasion. Quite a full choir was present and the popular organist did his work with entire satisfaction. The young people, and in fact people of all classes who have not yet availed of these Sunday evening services are losing a great deal in the way of individual comfort and edification.

A very hearty invitation is extended by the pastor to all strangers, and the graceful ushers will always be in waiting to do their duty. Please do not forget, next Sunday night will have something of interest for you.



What is Morris Going to Do?

Three weeks have now passed since the announcement of the defeat of the Minister of Justice and the Minister of Agriculture and Mines at the polls. What is Morris going to do about it? Both hold their office to-day. How long does Morris intend to keep them there after their constituents have shown they have no confidence in these holders of portfolios? Does he intend to keep them there and try to find seats for them? As they are still there, it is only reasonable to suppose that he will open two constituencies for them. Why does he not do it? Is it because he fears he may lose two more seats and still have defeated ministers on his hands, and so imperil the life of the Government? If he followed the proper course he would do this. If he does not follow this course, it's because he fears to risk the life of his Government on the success in other constituencies of the present holders of these portfolios. These cases are not usual. They differ materially from an ordinary case of the defeat of a Minister. In the case of the Minister of Justice, as we have previously shown, two Memorials were presented to ex-Governor Williams praying him to dismiss the Hon. D. Morrison from the office he holds on account of certain acts and practice in connection with timber lands. Ex-Governor Williams did not dismiss him, but he expressed objection to the practices petitioned against. Mr. Morrison's constituents, however, withdrew their confidence from him and by converting an extraordinary majority into an extraordinary minority put him at the bottom of the poll.

Is the Premier, Sir Edward Morris, taking cognizance of this expression of lack of confidence of constituents, who hitherto for a quarter of century had returned Mr. Morrison every time he presented himself? Is the Premier, taking into consideration that the matters about which the first Memorials were sent affected the De-

partment of Agriculture and Mines, and that the head of this department is the other defeated Minister? If he has taken these matters into consideration, what is he going to do? Is he going to flout the district of Bonavista by sending these office holders elsewhere, or is he going to flout them and betray cowardice at the same time by putting either or both in the Legislative Council, if he can find seats for them there? Or what is he going to do? He has had plenty of time to make up his mind, and the people have got their eyes on him and are looking out for what he is going to do.

BY FALLING OVER CLIFF.
Deputy Minister of Justice Hutchings received the following message to-day from the Magistrate at L. Seie: "Alan Rideout, son of George Rideout, Lightkeeper, at Cape John Gull Island, fell over a cliff there on Saturday and was killed. The s.s. Prospero was signalled on Saturday night but her boat could not land. Capt. Keen reported the accident and a motor boat went to the island yesterday and brought the body here for interment."

Huerta Still Holds On.

Special to the Evening Telegram. MEXICO, City, To-day.
Resigned apparently to those conditions which make it necessary to carry on a dilatory campaign against his enemies, Huerta and his official dependents appeared serene yesterday convinced the States will not take more drastic measures toward the Mexican Government than those already taken. It has been rumored that Congress would not continue to meet, that it would be automatically dissolved, and that Huerta was about to quit office. All these rumors have been disproved by Congress launching itself into what promises to be a prolonged session. It is expected tomorrow the Congress will take up ratification or nullification of the Presidential elections. It is understood these will be annulled if no elections be called. Huerta will remain at the head of affairs, according to his intimates. No one realizes more fully than Huerta the desperate straits of his Government, but he has reiterated his intention of pouncing upon his enemies until he or they have won the National Palace. The idea of intervention is scoffed at, and the suggestion of a blockade received with scepticism. Huerta himself is credited with having said that while the ports might be easily taken it would be impossible for the invaders to get as far as the Capital. The financial situation is the most serious that Huerta is facing. The fact that the National treasury is practically empty is not hidden even from the most ignorant person in the City. Measures recently adopted to obtain funds have been such as to increase to remove any doubt of his remaining. A new stamp tax which will go into effect in December will practically double the revenue from this source. Special taxes have been imposed. The taxing of articles imported by parcel post is being discussed. Every possible opportunity for raising money is being carefully scrutinized by the Department of Finance and silver is scarce. It is feared the launching of one peso bills through the Republic will not serve to restore general confidence on the Banks at Bohua, each of these bills presume there is a metal reserve, but there is a fair proportion of the public which is skeptical about this.

Messrs. R. D. McRae & Sons received word on Monday of the arrival of their schooner Hilda R., Capt. Wm. Yeman, at the Western Islands with her fore rigging gone and other damages done.

Mr. J. C. Sheppard and family left for the early part of the week for St. John's, where they will reside in future, Mr. Sheppard being employed there.

Constable John Power, after doing 30 years duty here, has been transferred to St. John's, and left with his family for his new station on Tuesday. Three of Constable Power's sons were already working there with the Parker & Monroe Boot & Shoe Company.

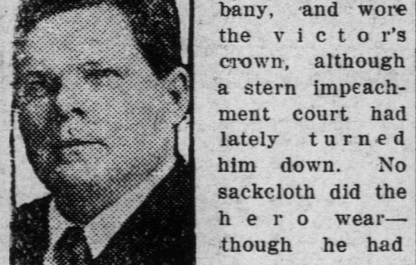

Street Car Jumps Track.

The street car No. 7, jumped the track at the junction of Adelaide and New Gower Streets yesterday afternoon. The Frailty of Man.

We are all liable to error and will be so to the end of time—the most careful will make mistakes, sometimes for are we merely human? With the fact of our own frailty staring us in the face, would it be reasonable on our part to neglect the means laid within our reach for the elimination of error? Errors in the counting house are costly but they can be avoided by the use of present day inventives, constructed as well as human ingenuity can suggest. It is to busy men that we speak—the others have no time to listen. To busy office-men the "Globe-Wernicke" devices come as a boon and a blessing, guarding as they do the essential records, which are the main vitality of business. These appliances are on view at Mr. Percie Johnson's office, and need only be seen to be appreciated.

Hunting Alligators With a Lasso.

A Business Not Yet Overcrowded. Shooting alligators is a game sport compared with the methods adopted by Mr. Lee and his two sons, who have an alligator business in Proserpine, North Queensland. If you fancy an alligator as a pet, all you have to do is to order one from Mr. Lee, who will deliver one of whatever age or size you desire. With lasso and dogs he captures them alive, but it is a perilous and exciting business. There is no dish an alligator likes so much as a nice dog, and knowing the reptile's weakness in this respect, Mr. Lee baits his trap with a yelping canine, into which, however, suffers no injury. On the sloping bank of a creek infested with alligators Mr. Lee constructs a trap, consisting of a barrier composed of sticks and brushwood, with a small hole like the entrance to a kennel. Behind the barrier he places a dog as bait, and the barking of the animal soon attracts the attention of one of the reptiles. As it scrambles towards the barrier the dog, which has been trained for the purpose, flies out and attacks the reptile, while Mr. Lee hurls a lasso over the alligator's head ere it has time to retreat.

Whipping the other end round a tree and securing it, Mr. Lee, armed with a forked stick attached to a rope with a running roose, tries to thrust it into the alligator's mouth. Every moment there is the danger of being seriously injured, if not killed, by a sweep of the powerful tail, or crushed in the reptile's jaws. Sometimes the struggle continues over an hour, but once the stick is thrust into the mouth of the exhausted alligator the rest is comparatively easy. The jaws and tail are rapidly trussed up with the rope, and the monster lies helpless.

To Mr. Lee belongs the credit of having caught alive in this fashion the largest alligator in Australia. The capture was made when executing an order for a live alligator for a firm in Melbourne. Though the tip of its tail was missing the reptile still showed a length of 17 feet 6 inches, and turned the scales of 28 cwt.

Mr. Lee's expertness in catching alligators recently led to a bet that he would recapture one fifteen and a half feet long, which he had sold to the layer of the bet, in ten minutes. Mr. Lee accepted the challenge, the alligator was set free in a creek, and Mr. Lee, assisted by his sons, caught it within five minutes.

OTTAWA, To-day. Canadian producers of silver will read with interest the communication weekly report Trade Commerce Department furnished by C. E. Just, Trade Commissioner, Hamburg. It is well known the German Government for the last forty years has kept a war fund of 120,000,000 marks of \$30,000,000 in gold coin hoarded in the Julius tower in the fortress of Spandau near Berlin. Under the Defence Act of last session the Reichstag empowered the Imperial government to create a new war fund of same value, but in silver coin. The effect of this will mean the purchase of some 25,000,000 ounces of silver. As a great deal of silver is being coined by Germany for ordinary purposes the circulation country will be marked for very considerable quantities of silver during the next few years.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, To-day. Viscount Gladstone, Governor General of South Africa, cabled the Foreign Office denouncing the false and exaggerated statements current in England and India regarding the alleged ill treatment of Hindu workers in South African mines. The allegations about shooting, flogging, or coercing Indians at work are absolutely false, says the message. Gladstone defended the Natal Government saying it will not use force to suppress unprovoked violence on the part of strikers. Dispatches from Durban say, although there have been no serious outbreaks, the situation is causing anxiety to Europeans who are arming themselves on account of the supplying of arms to Colliery workers. Hindu Colliers are kept inside barbed wire enclosures, the wires are electrified. Anybody touching them receives a shock of 220 volts.

Special to Evening Telegram.
OXFORD, England, To-day. Chancellor Lloyd George thinks it impossible now for women suffragists to secure the assent of a bill granting Parliamentary franchise to women in the British Isles, as they have not a majority of people behind them, and have not captured the political machines. He gave this reply to three deputations which waited on him here and broached the question of woman suffrage. The speakers for the deputation from the Oxford Men's Political Union, told Lloyd George frankly, he being in favor of votes for women, should wreck the Government, if it did not grant them Parliamentary franchise. Lloyd George replied he was ready to do anything within the limits of party loyalty to advance the cause of Woman Suffrage. For the present, he said, he did not feel called upon to go beyond these limitations. Outside these limits he indicated the women had got on without him. Lloyd George added he thought several of his Cabinet colleagues who held the same views as he did took up similar positions. Lloyd George reiterated that the multiplicity of some women had set public opinion in the British Isles against them. There was, he said, no use trying to pass a Women's Suffragettes Bill against the wishes of the public, in regard to forcible feeding of women who declared hunger strike while detained in prison for offenses against the law, the Chancellor said the only alternative was to allow them to starve, and that was counselled by nobody.

ALL BLACKS AGAIN.

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 15.—New Zealand's Rugby fifteen crowned to-day its long series of successes against the best California teams by defeating a fifteen, made up of the pick of American Rugby players, 51 to 2. Since their arrival in California six weeks ago, the New Zealanders have played twelve games. They scored a total of 505 points, while only six points were made against them.

HOLMER DEFEATED.

The Boston Globe says: H. Hedemann, of Australia, deprived Hans Holmer of his title as the one-mile professional running champion of the world on inexhaustibly easy terms in their match race at Audenshaw, Manchester, Eng., on Nov. 1. It was a slow race, and apparently Hedemann had the better sprint. He won by four yards in 4 min. 34 sec., which is about 10s. slower than Holmer did when he beat Frank Kanaly in September.

COSTS HARVARD \$35,000.

The appearance of eleven well-conditioned, thoroughly coached players on the field against Princeton and Yale for the championship represents an outlay of more than \$35,000. The entire coaching staff this season cost about \$15,000, and to this must be added the heavy expense of equipping and training a big squad of players, the hire of special trains, and many other items of cost. It is figured that each one of the thirty players comprising the present Harvard squad, cost the athletic association \$1,000 for his coaching and training, and this is a season that lasts about nine weeks. Harvard with her big outlay of money, isn't a bit more extravagant than other leading colleges.

WILL ROW IN ENGLAND.

Ernest Barry, the world's champion sculler, has received an offer to go to Australia and meet James Paddon, the Australian champion, in a match race for stakes of \$2,500 a side and the title. Barry replied that Paddon can have a race on the Thames in England next Spring for either \$2,500 or \$5,000 a side, but that his business would not allow him to row in Australia. It will be recalled that Arnie came all the way from Australia to give Barry the chance to race for the title for the second time, otherwise the championship would still be in Australia.

A Weird Procession.

Snake Charmers Follow Celebrated Performer to His Grave.
Five hundred snake charmers, sounding weird notes on their pipes, formed the unusual yet picturesque procession that followed to his grave Katch Sarak, a man of big renown in his business, who died in terrible agony as the result of a cobra bite received while practicing his profession in the neighborhood of Garden Reach, India.
"Gurus," or master, he had become dubbed by the people amongst whom he lived, such was his influence over poisonous reptiles. His services were sought recently by a neighbor who had missed many fowls from his compound. Going at dusk one day, the snake-charmer discovered a cobra of unusual size amongst the birds, so formidable, in fact, that he postponed his attempt to capture it until daylight, when he was successful in securing it.
Instead of dispatching the snake at once, he took it to the local bazaar for the edification of the natives. On attempting to extract its fangs, the cobra wriggled free and darted at its captor, who was bitten on three fingers. The "Gurus" supposed godlike qualities proved of no avail. Consternation reigned amongst the crowd as he lay in awful agony; the news of his plight spread swiftly through the bazaar and more than a hundred other snake-charmers scurried to the scene; but but all their efforts, all their devices, their earnest prayers, were of no avail against the powerful poison. Within ninety minutes Katch Sarak was dead.
With great ceremonial Katch Sarak's pipes, snake-basket, earthenware jars, and the other impediments of his craft were borne before him to the cemetery, where he was laid to rest amidst the heartrending wail of the pipes of his colleagues.

F Rays to Cease War.

The Man Who Promises to Make War Impossible, and How He Proposes to Do It.

Signor Ulivi and his wonderful F rays have already been described in Public Opinion. But the possibilities of his F rays are greater than have been widely realised. He claims to be able to ignite explosives at a distance. So doing will he end war?

Mr. Garrett Fisher discusses this possibility in an interesting article in the Daily Mail.

To Scrap Warships.
"The science, which has done so much to make war more costly and destructive, put an end to it?" he asks.

"It is just as conceivable that the discovery of the new form of radiation, which Signor Ulivi calls the F rays, if his claims turn out to be well founded, will go a long step in this direction. And in that case he will be an even greater benefactor of mankind than his countryman, Mr. Marconi. Great as we have lately seen the power of wireless telegraphy to be to save life at sea, infinitely greater would be the gain to humanity of an invention which made war all but impossible—or at any rate forced the scrapping of all the costly implements of destruction on which every Great Power is now spending tens of millions of pounds annually.

The Sorts of Rays.

"The F rays are stated to be capable of igniting explosives at a distance. If this is true, modern warfare is at an end. For it entirely depends on the use of explosives. The armory of to-day, with all its elaborate organisation and material, is simply a device for bringing the greatest possible number of guns and rifles to bear on a given spot. The battleship is a gigantic gun-carriage. Now, if the F rays really do what is claimed for them—even though they can only work at present over a few feet of space in a laboratory—the whole of the strategy and tactics of the twentieth century must go by the board. cal change in such more or less unstable substances as cordite or picric acid? What radium has taught us of the complex nature of the so-called atom should incline the modern physicist not to be unduly dogmatic in saying that such a claim is impossible. But we may be sure that he will demand very cogent experimental proof before he accepts it as valid. "No scientific reason, however," forbids us to hope that Signor Ulivi may triumph over his critics. If he does, what will happen to war? Will the necessary abandonment of guns and armour—with all their far-reaching consequences—simply mean a return to the arme blanche and the medieval artillery of bows and arrows, catapults and chargers, as set forth in Chapter 43 of 'The Cloister and the Hearth,' or will it give the pacifist his opportunity to cry halt to the dogs of war? Who can tell? Man is still a fighting animal—but possibly the shock of such a sudden reversion to the Dark Ages may enable him to see that war between civilised Powers is essentially out of date.

All Sorts of Rays.
"The F rays are said to be a new form of radiant energy—energy, that is to say, which is projected in all directions from the point where it is generated by the medium of waves produced in the subtle ether which fills not only what we call empty space, but also interstices of all solid bodies. The most obvious type of such energy is the light and heat which we get from the sun. This type has been known from the beginning of time, because our eyes and bodies are sensitive to it. But we now know that light and radiant heat correspond only to one small series of waves in the ether, and that there is a countless variety of other waves which produce entirely different physical effects.

"Wireless telegraphy is the result of a special set of waves—far bigger than those of light—which can only be detected by the 'electric eye' known as a coherer. "The Roentgen or X-rays, which now play so large a part in surgical work, are almost certainly another kind of waves in the ether, and the same thing is probably true of the Gamma-rays emitted by radium salts. "The reason why it has taken so many centuries of scientific work to discover the existence of all these forms of radiation is simply that our bodies are not so sensitive to their effects, as they are to radiant light and heat.

"Some psychologists hold that the phenomena of thought transference—what is known as telepathy—are due to a yet undiscovered kind of radiation, which is sent out under certain conditions of mental stress by one human brain and can be perceived by another brain through the medium of some 'sixth sense,' which is only developed in a few individuals and whose laws of action are still obscure.

Possible New Forms of Radiation.
"But no man of science now denies that there must be innumerable varieties of radiant energy transmitted through the ether which have not yet been studied by man. The waves of wireless telegraphy are many miles in length. Those of light are only about one-fifty-thousandth part of an inch long. There is no reason to doubt the existence of other waves lying between these extremes, which are capable of producing hitherto unsuspected physical effects when they fall upon a receiver which is in tune with their pulses.

"We all remember the storm of hilarious incredulity with which the world received the first announcement of Dr. Roentgen's discovery, less than twenty years ago, with its sensational corollary that a living man's skeleton could be photographed. We are wiser nowadays, and are prepared to consider almost any claim which is properly put forward for the capabilities of some new form of radiation."

War Against Legalized Murder.

(Clinical Congress Declares Surgeons Using Knife Must be Thoroughly Trained.)

Chicago, Nov. 15.—War against "legalized murder" by surgeons who are commissioned to wield the knife before they have been sufficiently trained, was declared at the closing session of the Clinical Congress today.

To prevent "criminal malpractice," so far as is possible, the Congress appointed a committee to visit the State legislatures of this country and the Provinces of Canada to urge enactment of the following into law: "Require physicians to have five years experience in general medical practice before permitting them to practice surgery, ordering that two years of their practice be passed in active hospital work or under the direction of a surgeon—generally recognized as of the highest attainments; requiring medical colleges to give full clinical advantages as part of their course in medicine."



The Fruit Trees.

By GEORGE FITCH, Author of "At Good Old Slivash."

While the gentle autumn is merging almost imperceptibly into winter, the careful house owner is inserting his next year's fruit trees into the hardened bosom of the earth. The infant fruit tree is a bright ray of promise which gladdens the winter for its eager owner. In the spring, however, it does not gladden the owner so much. This is because it is busy gladdening the borer, the caterpillar, the beetle and the predatory cut worm bug. Nothing is more hospitable than the young fruit tree which has survived a long, hard winter. One small tree can hold enough bugs of various descriptions and appetites to fit out a museum of natural history.

Winter is the happiest time for the owner and proprietor of the promiscuous fruit tree. In winter the tree blooms terrifically and bows beneath the burden of its ripe and luscious fruit. With the aid of a handsomely illustrated catalogue and a grate fire the householder can spend many a winter evening letting down apples out of his yearling orchard with derricks. But in the spring when the gnawful rabbit, the industrious blue jay and the consuming bug arrive and when winter lops around in the lap of May until the peach crop is exceedingly whence, the parent and guardian of the infant fruit tree is not so happy.

Later on he pours 11,000 gallons of metered water around said tree, wraps it with fly paper, bands its limbs, scrapes its roots, combats its limbs with a fine toothed comb and nurses it with perspiring care. In the course of time it brings forth fruit and 9,000 small boys emerge from the mysterious storehouse of youth and climb its tender branches—after which the early June cyclone picks it up and bears it swiftly away to deposit it in the parlor of a total stranger, with one limb thrust rakishly through the piano.

And yet many fruit trees arrive at maturity and make good with their owners. Nothing is more inspiring than to stroll forth in the evening with a china plate and harvest the peach crop that has rewarded several years of earnest endeavour. No great good is won without some sorrow, and fruit tree owners should not despair.

Healthy and Unhealthy Lighting.

Gas, it may be said, vitiates the atmosphere. True. But it also helps to purify it. Its purifying power is greater than its vitiating power. Electricity does not vitiate, nor does it purify. Hear what three eminent men have said:—

Much evidence has lately been adduced to show that gas is more useful than the electric light in promoting efficient ventilation of air. It is for this, amongst other reasons, that gas is being frequently substituted for the electric light. The latest example is, perhaps, the Society of Medical Officers of Health, which has recently installed gas on its premises, after experience with the electric light.—Dr. Jamieson B. Hurry.

He would merely add that no member who had experience of their meeting room under the old conditions could deny the improvement that had taken place since gas had been substituted for the electric light and the new system of heating and ventilation had been installed.—Dr. Reginald Duffield, before the Society of Medical Officers. I have in my mind's eye, at the moment, a hall which, in the old days was lighted by gas, and in which a large audience could, with comfort, sit through an hour's lecture, or with pleasure through a three hours' dinner, but which with the march of civilization, had its illumination changed from gas to electricity, the latter been employed with all the latest refinements to effect the lighting under the best conditions, with the result that any large gathering within its walls leads to a state little short of asphyxiation.—Vivian B. Lewes, Professor of Chemistry at the Royal Naval College, Greenwich.—nov.13

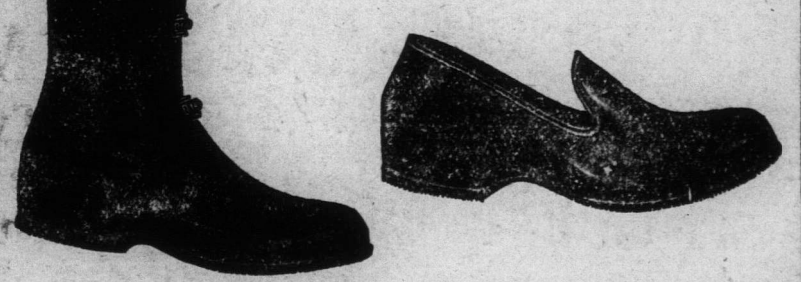

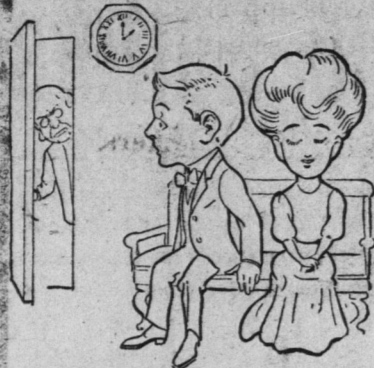

The Fallibility of Doctors.

In the middle of a consultation a hurry call penetrated from the outer office. The doctor hurriedly excused himself, sat down at his desk, and after a moment's intense thought, wrote a prescription. By the changing expression of his face, it was possible to follow the detachment of his mind from the subject he had been considering, and his focusing on the new problem. Hurried as he was, he read the prescription over carefully before he handed it to his assistant. As the assistant hastened off with it, the doctor turned to the waiting patient and said, "You know we doctors are the only men in the world who mustn't make mistakes." Then he added, whimsically, "and being men, we can't help it."

This little incident which I happened to witness the other day impressed me deeply. It was such an interesting commentary from the doctor's own view point on the fallibility of doctors.

It is surprising to see how many intelligent people seem to regard doctors as peculiarly infallible. Now mind you, this is not intended as a reflection upon physicians. Take them by and large, I think there is

not a finer class of men living. In what other profession is it common, almost the customary thing, to shade down the fee to the man who cannot afford to pay the full price? Why are there so few rich doctors? In what other profession is there so much pure charity work done? In what other profession are there so many men honest enough to take the bread out of their mouths by educating their clients not to need them, as most doctors try to educate their patients in preventive medicine.

But, honorable and generous gentlemen though they are, they are human and, therefore, they are fallible, — a thing which many people need to realize more fully.

Let me tell you what a prominent doctor said to me the other day. "I often marvel," he declared, "that so many people will take one doctor's word on such an important matter as a diagnosis involving an operation. A woman will go to every shop in town before she will pick out a suit, but she will let herself be cut up on a single doctor's advice."

And again, another physician, whom I had known since his youth, admitted in a confidential moment, "We doctors don't know half so much as you laymen think we do."

Medicine is still an inexact science, and doctors are only men after all, and as the corollary of these facts has already been stated, I won't bore you by repeating it.

Household Notes

Put a cupful of Indian meal, half a cupful of white flour and three tablespoonfuls of powdered borax in to a paper bag. Articles that need cleaning can be put into this bag and shaken.

Unlaid suits dried on a coat hanger and with the tape about the neck drawn up slightly will not draw out of shape about the neck, as they do when hung on the line by the shoulders.

In making custards or other food-stuffs calling for scalded milk, remember that if the milk is in a double boiler it reaches the right temperature as soon as the water in the outer utensil boils.

When a white enameled vessel has been discolored, simply fill the vessel with water and add a teaspoonful of chloride of lime. Let boil a few minutes.

A tablespoonful of Epsom salts added to one half gallon of cold water, thoroughly dissolved and poured over plant roots will hasten their growth wonderfully.

If part of a bottle of olives have been used, to keep the remainder add a pinch of salt to the brine, pour a teaspoonful of olive oil in the liquid and replace the cork.

In removing spots, put a thick pad of cheesecloth or some other material underneath the spot to absorb the dirty cleansing liquid that soaks through the garment.

Instead of just heating butter and sugar together for hard sauce, stir in to it one half cup of whipped cream and the white of an egg, beaten very light.

When a cork falls into the vinegar bottle, to get it out tie a nail on the top of a string so that it will not float, and it will be easy to get the string into place under the cork.

When a tablecloth begins to look thin in the fold, cut an inch off one side and also off one end and rehem end and side. This changes all the folds when the cloth is laundered.

A wire clothesline can be cleaned perfectly by rubbing with a woolen cloth saturated with coal oil and afterward with the same cloth liberally sprinkled with cleansing powder.

Take any old, discarded toothbrush to blacken shoes with paste. It is better than anything sold on the market for getting into cracks where dust is bound to collect.

It is not generally known that a large bowl of water placed in the gas oven, after the joint is removed, and the gas turned out, not only cools the kitchen, but is almost at boiling point for the washing up when the meal is finished.

Hair brushes should not be cleaned with hot water and soap, as this softens the bristles. Use soda dissolved in cold water, as the soda will remove the grease and dirt. Do not dry in the sun or by the fire, but stand on the handle in the shade to dry.

When cold irons are first placed on the gas the surface becomes quite wet, and if allowed to dry causes the iron to be rough; but if, when the iron has been on a few seconds, they are taken off and wiped with a duster, they will remain quite smooth, and will heat much more cleanly than at a fire.

How Gen. Booth Travelled.

In Costly Suite by Courtesy—Repeats Denial Issued by Secretary—Inspector Contradicts Report That Massey Hall Doors Were Stormed.

Behind a carefully tiled door at Salvation Army headquarters this morning, General Booth conducted a plain heart-to-heart talk with his officers.

"This is one of the few chances the officers will have of getting practical advice from the General," said a Captain to the Telegram. "There are so many things to learn about our work that an opportunity such as this is, to sit at the feet of the man who has wrestled with, and conquered almost all the problems that lie in the worker's path, is invaluable."

General Denies Story.

Between this meeting and the engagement the General had to address the Canadian Club at one o'clock to-day, there was just time for a word with the busy leader, but time enough for him to give a brief but emphatic denial to the report which came from New York, that he had travelled from England in the regal suite, costing \$775; and that Colonel Kitching and Morgan had occupied a room rated at \$250.

"My secretary has already issued a denial to that report in my name. What more can I add?" said the General when asked if the story were true.

He was quite merry about it—treated the thing as a great joke, and quite in line with many of the stories circulated from time to time by the army's critics. He didn't even blame the devil.

"We occupied the Royal suite on the Lusitania," Col. Kitching had already explained, "but it was by courtesy of the steamship company only. We paid the minimum rate, and only for the company's kindness would have had the same accommodation as anyone else."

Crowds Were Orderly.

Inspector Geddes, who had charge of the crowd at yesterday's meetings, denied the report appearing in a morning paper that a series of rushes had been made for the doors of Massey Hall, and that at times there was much disorder.

"The most orderly crowds we have ever handled," said the Inspector this morning. "The people began to line up for the afternoon meeting at 11 o'clock in the morning—as soon as the morning meeting began. And it was the same thing in the afternoon. People were standing two, three and four deep on Shuter and away down Victoria streets at 3 o'clock, in readiness for the 7 o'clock meeting."

"What about the attempts to storm the entrance?" he was asked.

"There were none. There wasn't a single hitch in our arrangements. The people did just as we asked, without fuss, bother or irritation. And we had crowds enough to fill Massey Hall three or four times over for each meeting."—Toronto Telegram.
