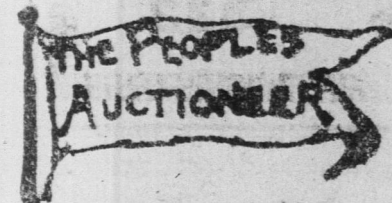

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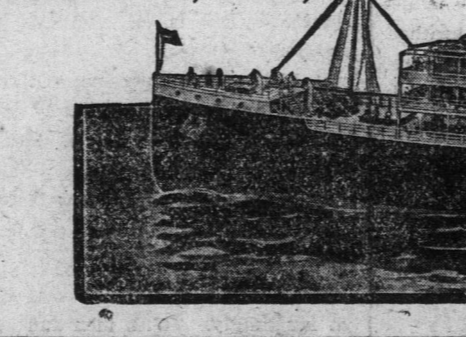

## War News.

### Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

**OFFICIAL.**  
LONDON, Nov. 25.  
The Governor, Newfoundland:  
France—Artillery duels.  
Russia—The Germans have been obliged to fall back in places on the Riga front.  
Italy—Important successes on the Carso summit and near the Church of San Martino. Over five hundred prisoners captured.  
Serbia—Enemy report capture of Mitrovica and Prishtina.

### GRECE'S REPLY SATISFACTORY.

LONDON, Nov. 25.  
Although the full text of the Greek Government's reply to the Entente Powers has not yet been made public in England, there is every indication that the British Government is satisfied with the position taken at Athens. The assurances given by Greece fitly in a marked degree from her previous expressions of benevolent neutrality. They are neither vague nor evasive, but promise explicitly that no military measures will be taken against the Serbian, French or British troops in case they retreat to Greek territory. Whether this guarantee of safety to the allied troops will carry Greece to the extent of opposing with her army any German forces which might attempt to pursue the Allies across the Greek border probably will not be ascertained until full details are received in regard to the assurances to London. However, it may be inferred that Greece has yielded on every essential point raised by the Allies. The situation therefore might be regarded as having been cleared.

### GERMANS DISAPPOINTED.

BERLIN, Nov. 25.  
Advices received here to-day from Onovo on the Danube, Serbia, disappointed the hopes of those who have been expecting the immediate production of copper from the mines at Vor, in northern Serbia, belonging to a French Company. Before they retreated, the Serbians destroyed the stamping works, relieving the shafts and tore down the buildings of the mines. A staff of German engineers are now inspecting the properties to determine whether it will be possible to resume operations.

### LONDON BUDGET.

LONDON, Nov. 25.  
Cordial relations between Greece and the Entente Powers has been established with the Greek Government's assurances that no attempt will be made to interfere with allied troops, should they under any contingency, be forced to cross the Greek frontier, and that, as heretofore, railway and other facilities will be afforded. That the assurances and guarantees that they will be abided by, are satisfactory to the Allies is shown in the fact that Greek grain shipments, which had been held up at Malina, have been allowed to proceed to their destinations, relieving what would have been a very serious shortage in bread supplies, if their detention had been prolonged. It is understood that the Allies are promised a Greece monetary indemnity after the war for any damage which might be done through the occupation of Greek territory.

### CANADIAN TROOPS ARRIVE IN ENGLAND.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.  
It is officially announced through the press censor's office that the troopship Missanaba, which sailed from Canada with troops, has arrived safely in England.

### GERMANY CLOSING SWISS FRONTIER.

GENEVA, Nov. 25.  
Germany has again closed the Swiss frontier from Basel to Constance. It will probably remain closed for a week. Reason for action unknown.

### GERMAN-AUSTRIAN OFFICERS IN CHINESE ARMY.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 25.  
The assertion is made by the Peking correspondent of the Novoe Vremya that German and Austrian officers are now being employed in the Chinese army, particularly in arsenals.

### RELIEF OF BELGIUM.

GALVESTON, Nov. 25.  
It was learned to-day that the commission for the relief of Belgium has chartered five steamers, which will carry cargoes of wheat from this port within the next few weeks. The first of these ships, the steamer Photinia, docked to-day.

### GIVEN A SEAT IN THE CABINET.

LONDON, Nov. 25.  
Herbert Samuel, Postmaster General, has been given a seat in the Cabinet. He has been appointed Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, the post recently vacated by Winston Spencer Churchill. Samuel will hold the position of Postmaster General. He will draw no salary as Chancellor of the Duchy.

PETROGRAD, Nov. 25.  
The bodies of two German aviators, pilot and observer of an airplane of the Albatross type, were discovered to-day in a marsh near

### As a result of the success of the

Austro-Germans and Bulgarians in gaining command of Kossovo Plain the Serbian Government has moved to Scutari, while the army is defending the little fringe of Serbia which lies between the Sitnica River and the Albanian and Montenegrin frontiers. It can be provisioned from Scutari, from which place the Montenegrins have built good roads during their occupation. Montenegro is still in possession of the Serbians, but the Bulgarians are pushing toward it, while the army of General Von Gallwitz is reported to be on its way down the Vardar Valley to help the Bulgarians to attack the Anglo-French forces. Heavy cannonading continues on the western front. Winter has put a stop to any big movement on the western front, while the Italians are persisting in their offensive, and are daily getting nearer Gorizia across the Isonzo, and to Rovereto and Riva in Trentino.

### WILL CONFER THE GRAND CROSS

PARIS, Nov. 25.  
At a meeting of the Cabinet to-day, presided over by President Poincare, General Pau was charged with a mission to Russia to confer on General Michael Y. Alekseyev, Chief of the Russian General Staff, the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honour.

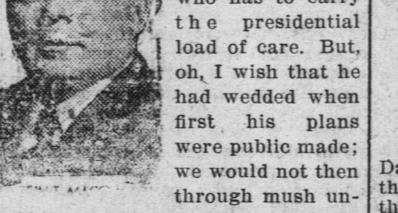

### Prohibition Carried.

Last night the poll for St. Barbe's was declared, showing that 1,069 electors had voted for Prohibition and 5,348 against it. There is thus a majority of 19,617 for Prohibition, and this satisfies overwhelmingly one of the conditions laid down by the Legislature for the bringing of the Prohibition Act into force on January 1st, 1917. A second condition was also laid down to bring the Act into force and that was the number in favor of Prohibition should reach 40 per cent. of the Revised List of Electors of the Election of 1913. The number on this list was 61,451, and the number of votes required was 24,581. This vote has been exceeded by 284 votes, the number of votes polled for Prohibition being 24,965. All the conditions to satisfy the form of the Statute have thus been complied with and the Prohibition Act will come into force on the date provided. A little more than three-fifths of the voters who recorded their votes at the last General Election voted at the Prohibition Election. The two-fifths who did not vote include those who were away in the woods and who had no facilities to return to their districts to vote, those who were overseas on military and naval service, those who were indifferent and did not care whether prohibition was carried or not, and those who considered that abstention from voting was a way of opposing prohibition. The majority in favor of prohibition is decisive and definite. It shows unmistakably the feelings of the electorate. The number of electors who voted in favor of prohibition shows not only an overwhelming majority over those who voted against it, but the number of electors who voted in the affirmative is approximately 2,500 more than the number of voters which sustained the Morris Government at the last General Election.

### Cathedral Finance Committee.

\$100,000 Loan Called for by Archbishop Oversubscribed.

A meeting of the Cathedral Finance Committee was held in the Episcopal Library, last evening 8.30. The following gentlemen were present: Rev. J. J. McDermott, Admin.; Rt. Hon. Sir E. P. Morris, Hons. M. P. Cashin, J. D. Ryan and J. J. Murphy; Inspector General Sullivan; Messrs. J. F. Parker, W. J. Ellis, M. J. Kennedy, C. O'N. Conroy, J. M. Kent, John Barron, George Shea, J. V. O'Dea and J. J. Tobin. His Grace, the Archbishop presided. Mr. J. M. Kent, the Secretary, read the minutes of the last meeting which were adopted. The Archbishop in opening the meeting reviewed the progress that had been made in connection with the raising of the proposed loan. He stated that the response had altogether exceeded his anticipations. He was pleased to be able to state that although it was only a month since he had issued the circulars asking for subscriptions already the loan of \$100,000.00 for which he asked the congregation had been oversubscribed. This he described as being very gratifying to himself and as being a matter of congratulation to the Catholic community generally. He further intimated that the subscription list to the present loan might now be regarded as closed, but that he intended issuing bonds to the extent of \$50,000.00 more in the Spring and he stated that applications for this loan would be received between this and the spring. The meeting then discussed the details in connection with the issuing of the proposed bonds, and the matter of preparing the issue was referred to a committee of the following gentlemen:—Hons. M. P. Cashin and J. D. Ryan, Messrs. C. O'N. Conroy and J. M. Kent. After some further discussion as to the finances of the Diocese the meeting adjourned.

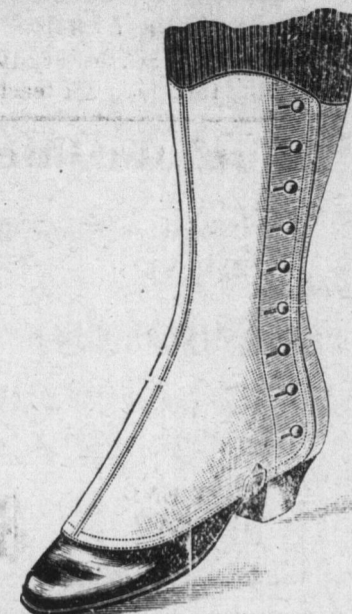

## The Talent for Adventure.

By RUTH CAMERON.



"She has the talent for adventure," someone said to me the other day in describing a woman. I should like to meet her, shouldn't you? It is a great talent, that talent for adventure. It may not be so readily convertible into money as some other talents, but what do we most want money for except to buy happiness, and this talent for adventure can be coined directly into happiness without being passed through the gross medium of money.

Of course you know what I mean by the talent for adventure—the gift of finding adventures not only in the out-of-the-way situation, not only in travel or in danger, but in everyday life.

Nothing Happened to Him While She Was Away.

Nathaniel Hawthorne once wrote to his wife:

"Nothing at all has happened to me since I left you. It puzzles me to conceive how you meet with so many more events than I. You will have a volume to tell me when we meet, and you will pour your beloved voice into my ears in a long stream; at length you will pause and say, 'But what has your life been?' and then will stupid I look back upon what I call my life for three or four days past, and behold, a blank!"

It is evident from this and the rest of the letter that Hawthorne not only loved his wife dearly, but was very dependent upon her. He had a great and wonderful talent, but he didn't

have the talent for adventure which she so evidently possessed, and he needed her to give flavor to his life.

**They Give Flavor to Our Lives.**

That is just what they do, the people with the talent for adventure; they give flavor not only to their own lives, but to the lives of all with whom they are associated.

I once spent a week end in a quiet little country town with a woman so talented. We were driven down to our camp by the hired man of one of the neighbors. The lady of the talent drew him out to talk to us, and behold, he proved to be one of the most interesting characters I had ever met—a man who had lived and travelled and dreamed and could tell about it all on the rare occasions when he chose to (we learned afterwards that his confidences to us were almost unprecedented).

The next day the lady of the talent warmly admired a beautiful dog we met on the road and that led to our being shown over his kennels by the master of some of the finest kennels in the country.

Besides these, we had two or three more adventures—all in a day and a half.

**Even Poverty Can Be Made An Adventure.**

Of course these things happened on an outing, but even in one's daily routine there are adventures for those who have the talent and the will to find them.

"It isn't sordid, trying to see what a quarter can be made to do," says one of Robert Herrick's characters. "It's exciting."

And again, he writes of this same character: "To her, poverty had not been limiting or grinding, but an exhilarating fight that taxed her resources of mind and body."

Of course that's in a book, but I

### STEAMER ESCAPES SUBMARINE.

PARIS, To-day.—The Minister of Marine in a communication made public last night, says the French steamer *Tofna* was shelled by a submarine in the Western Mediterranean, but that the Captain of the steamer with remarkable quickness of decision steered his vessel into the teeth of the gale and the submarine unable to keep up its speed against head seas relinquished the chase after firing three shells. The communication advised some passengers aided by a few members of the crew notwithstanding the express orders of the Captain of the *Tofna* to the contrary, lowered the boats, which were immediately swamped. The *Tofna* arrived safely at Marseilles.

### THREATENING BULGARIAN LINES.

LONDON, To-day.—A Times despatch from Monastir, dated Nov. 25, says: The Bulgarians have shown no renewed activity on the Prilep front, but the heavy firing heard this morning a few miles South-east of Prilep suggests that somebody got behind them and are threatening their lines of communication.

### PATROL FIGHTING.

LONDON, To-day.—A despatch to the Times from Cairo, referring to an official communication, reporting an encounter with the Turks at Alkanaria, Egypt, explains that it was merely a collision with patrol and should not be regarded as a recrudescence of Turkish activity.

### SUCCESS ATTRIBUTED TO KITCHENER AND COCHIN.

ATHENS, To-day.—According to the latest news from Saloniki, the French line is still unbroken, the reports that the Bulgarians have occupied Krivolak being unfounded. On the contrary all their attacks have been repulsed. The happy turn in events between the Entente Powers and the Greek Government is generally attributed here to the visits of Lord Kitchener and Denys Cochin. The joint note of the Powers to the Greek Government was only on general lines. Now that the Allies proposed have been accepted in principle, details will be settled further by special negotiations.

### NAVAL BRIGADES SAFE.

LONDON, To-day.—The safety of both the British and French naval brigades which recently were in Belgrade, is now assured. The French section arrived at Monastir near the Greek border a few days ago. A telegram has been received from Admiral Trowbridge, commanding the British brigade, dated from Mitrovitz, November 20, stating that all was well. The British and French naval brigades were sent to Belgrade last fall and took part in the fighting against the Germans and Austrians, preceding the evacuation of the Capital of the Serbians. While nothing is known officially of the movements of the men since they left Belgrade, or whether they have taken part in any of the Allied operations against the Germans and Austro-Hungarians, it seems probable that the British who are in the region of Mitrovitz are fighting with the Serbs, who evacuated Mitrovitz only a day or two ago. Admiral Trowbridge married a Halifax lady, Miss Duffus.

Their experience was a trying one and when they were rescued they were in an exhausted condition, having no food of any kind for several days. They were given food and clothing by Capt. Kennedy, who landed them at Change Islands and placed them in care of the light keeper at that place.

### COIN MACHINES.

Coin-handling machines have now reached such a degree of perfection that a machine will take a bucketful of coins of all denominations, sort them out, pick out all the mutilated pieces and reject them, do all the others up in neat bundles of standard sizes—such as 25 pennies in a bundle—count them, add them all up together, and hand out a slip of paper on which is printed the total sum in dollars and cents. An electric motor turns the crank that does the work.

### GERMANS AS ONLY PREY.

Paris, Nov. 22.—Emile Constant expressed regret in the Chamber of Deputies that there were men in France who preferred hunting with a gun to going to the front with it. He questioned the Minister of Agriculture, Jules Méline, concerning the reasons for the Government permitting hunting with firearms. M. Méline replied that trapping had failed to keep down the game. The damage to crops, he said, had become so great from hares, pheasants, and rabbits that something had to be done to protect farm products. Therefore, permission to hunt had been granted. Besides, game coming into Paris in quantities would lower the price of meat.

### LONDON'S HOME GUARDS.

London, Nov. 23.—The home guards composed of brokers, clerks, agents and other men exempt from active service working in London's financial district, showed themselves a well trained and physical fit body of troops at a recent inspection. When the civilian troops received permission from the war office to organize, they encountered ridicule in many quarters, but they bought their own uniforms and went to work with a will. Every Sunday afternoon squads drilled in the courts and buildings and in the public parks, and on Saturday afternoons and Sundays, the men either went to the county to practice trench digging or harden themselves with marching.

### Crew of Schr. Blanche M. Rose

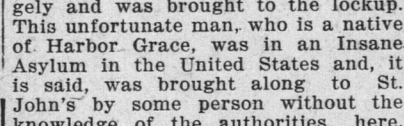
Were Short of Food and Water Before Craft Was Abandoned.  
 News of the experience of the crew of the schr. *Blanche M. Rose*, which was abandoned off the Cape Breton coast, is now eagerly awaited. That the survivors of the ill-fated craft must have had an awful time of it is evidenced in a message that reached the city to-day stating that those on board were short of food and water before being taken off the sinking craft by the *Mary Duff*. This information is confirmed by a message received this morning by Mrs. Clements, of York Street, from Sydney where the crew was brought by the rescuing vessel. Mrs. Clements had three sons on the *Blanche M. Rose*, one of whom was master. The 19 survivors are expected to arrive in the city by tomorrow's express.

### HEAVY LOSERS.

The Clements family who owned the *Blanche M. Rose* are heavy losers. The schr. was only partially insured, we hear, being covered for \$1,200, but there was not a cent of insurance carried on her cargo, which included 700 quintals of codfish, 30 casks of oil, besides some fishing gear and the belongings of the crew. In other words the owners stand to lose over six thousand dollars. The *Blanche M. Rose* was 50 tons register, built at Hr. Breton, was formerly used as a banker out of that port and was insured upon to be as fine and as staunch a vessel as ever sailed out of Fortune Bay.

### Strange Case.

A middle aged man was found by the police last evening acting strangely and was brought to the lockup. This unfortunate man, who is a native of Harbor Grace, was in an insane Asylum in the United States and, it is said, was brought along to St. John's by some person without the knowledge of the authorities here, left at large in the streets of St. John. The authorities are now investigating this strange case and the man is being held in the meantime.

### Items of News From Everywhere

Col. Neussler, a Swiss military statistician, calculates that the total number of killed in the war now going on as five million.

Prince Albert, second son of King George and a midshipman in the navy, is laid up in London with an obstinate gastric disorder, which will necessitate a few weeks' special treatment. He underwent an operation for appendicitis in August, 1914.

The poisonous gas factory at Dornach, Alsace, was attacked on Nov. 5th by French aviators, and virtually destroyed. The manager and forty-two workmen are said to have been suffocated, while other employees were overcome and sent to hospitals.

The death is announced in England in his fifty-ninth year of Sir Robert Laidlaw, president of the World's Sunday School Association. He was a liberal in politics, was a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, and was knighted in 1909.

It is stated in Frankfurt that forty German soldiers were condemned to death at Libau recently in connection with the shooting of an officer. The men were carousing in a cafe, when the officer ordered them to be silent. One of the soldiers shot him dead.

It is stated in Moscow that General Grigoriev, who was in command of Kovno fortress, has been court-martialled and sentenced to fifteen years' imprisonment for surrendering the fortress to the enemy, although he had supplies of munitions and provisions sufficient to last for a considerable time.

Francis McManus, in his hundred and third year, died on Nov. 11th at his residence in Maitland, five miles east of Brockville, Ont., after a week's illness. He was born in Ireland, had resided at Maitland seventy years, and for sixty years was a member of the Masonic fraternity.

French newspapers disclose the fact that practically all the personal fortune of Czar Ferdinand of Bulgaria is in a London bank. His mother, Princess Clementine of France,

placed up her money in trust to prevent Ferdinand from squandering it.

A hospital motor ambulance costing \$5,000 will be presented to the British Empire Association of Chicago as a memorial to the late Miss Edith Cavell, the nurse murdered by the German military authorities at Brussels.

A London paper announced on Nov. 13th that it was authorized to state that since the beginning of the war fourteen battleships and battle cruisers, all superdreadnoughts, have been added to the British fleet, as well as a large number of minor warships designed to meet the demands which have developed during the course of the great conflict.

A large number of young Irishmen of military age, mostly farmers' sons from Connaught, have been refused passage to America by the Cunard steamship Company. It was alleged that these men received assistance from German sources in the United States.

What is believed to be a piece of fuse has been found by stevedores at Halifax, N.S., among the bags of sugar which they were removing from the steamer 'Rio Leges'. The steamer put into Halifax on Nov. 5th with her cargo of sugar on fire, and much of it was destroyed. The 'Rio Leges' was bound from New York to Queenstown.

A vigorous campaign undertaken by the French Government to punish persons who have profited unduly from the needs of the nation is well under way, and already several persons have been fined heavily and sentenced to five and ten years' imprisonment.

The Berlin 'Vorwärts' has again been suppressed temporarily. It is one of the leading Socialist newspapers of Germany, and is the organ of the Social-Democratic party. It has been in collision with the government on several occasions, and twice previously during the war was suspended temporarily.

The French Minister of the Interior has issued new regulations for the sale of alcohol throughout France. The regulations forbid the sale of alcoholic drinks before 11 o'clock in the morning, and the sale to women and

minors under 18 is forbidden entirely. The Minister's circular allows the prefects to use a certain amount of discretion in applying the regulations. Thus women are allowed to use alcohol at hours at which it may be considered as an accessory to food.

A measure is to be introduced in the Peruvian Senate to reform the Constitution. The Prime Minister opposes the measure, and it is said that if it is carried he will submit his resignation. A measure providing for a change in the Constitution, granting religious freedom, was recently passed by both houses of the Peruvian Parliament. Despatches from Lima recently stated that there was much opposition to the adoption of the constitutional change, which requires the authorization of two Congresses.

When the British transport 'Marquette' was torpedoed and sunk in the Aegean Sea last month, nearly a hundred of the personnel were unaccounted for, among whom were ten women nurses of New Zealand. A story is now told by the captain of a French cruiser, who, on coming to the rescue, says that on board were thirty-six nursing sisters and when the French boats came on the scene the nurses called out with one accord, "Fighting men first." Such an instance of devotion to the flag surely deserves to live in British history.

Seven patients suffering from cancer have been completely cured by assisting nature's efforts, according to Dr. Robert Bell head of the cancer research department of the Battersea General Hospital in London. Dr. Bell says it has been demonstrated beyond doubt that the healing power of nature, if sufficiently assisted by regulating the diet regimen of patients, together with the administration of therapeutic agents, has proved in many instances quite competent not only to overcome the disease, but to bring about complete recovery.

Developments of a startling character are expected when the United States Government has run to earth the ringleaders in the Teuton conspiracy to destroy factories making munitions for the Allies and ships transporting these munitions, as Robert Frey, alias Fay, the German secret service agent now in custody in New York with several others, is offering to turn States' evidence in order to save himself. It is asserted that Frey has named men high in the diplomatic service of the Central Powers and men prominent in German and Austro-Hungarian circles in New York as his fellow conspirators.

A statement given out in Washington by Mr. Garrison, Secretary of War, discloses officially for the first time details of the proposed military policy of the Administration. The plan proposes to increase the regular army from 108,000 to 141,843 officers and men; to organize a federal citizen army of 400,000 (to be enlisted 133,000 a year for three years); to strengthen the State militia by increased appropriations and closer cooperation; and to spend \$20,000,000 a year for four years on coast defences, and \$26,000,000 a year for four years, in the accumulation of reserve material for use by a force of 500,000 men.

Eight hundred big guns made for France and Great Britain by the Bethlehem Steel Company were destroyed on Nov. 10th, when machine shop No. 4 of the plant at Bethlehem, Penn., was burned. The monetary loss was only \$2,000,000, but the greater loss is in the time necessary to replace the big guns and the still more valuable machinery, and the consequent delay in filling war orders. The Bethlehem fire had barely been put out when flames started in a pattern shop at the Edgewater, Del., plant of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, and patterns valued at \$40,000 were destroyed. The origin of this fire is not yet known. One million dollars, approximately, damage was done by fire which early on Nov. 11th destroyed one of the wire rope shops of the John A. Roebling Sons Company plant in Trenton, N.J. Due to the fact that the company has orders for war material for European countries, rumours were in circulation that the fire was of incendiary origin, but nothing has been found as yet to substantiate such reports. There is much rejoicing in the Berlin and Vienna press over these fires, whose origin perhaps they know.

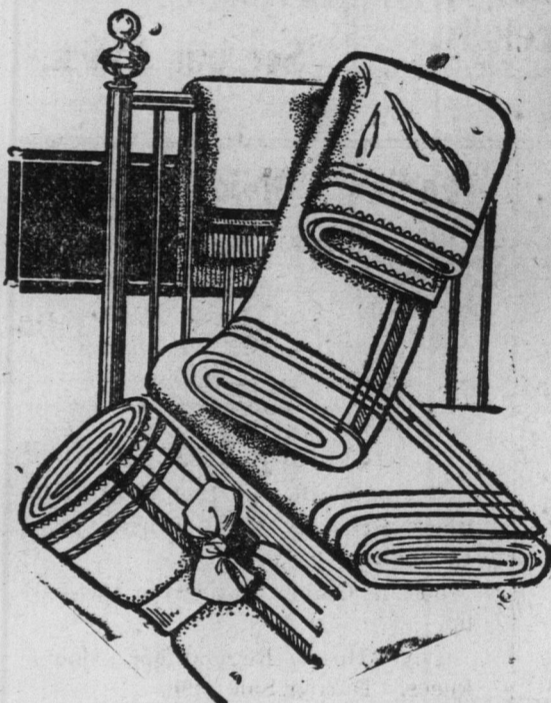

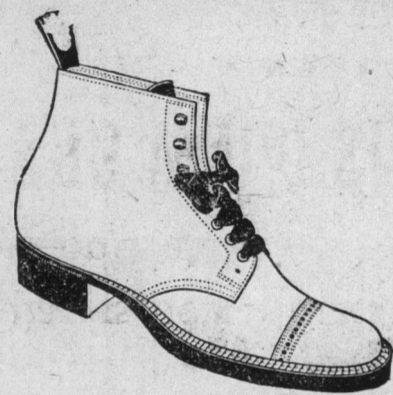

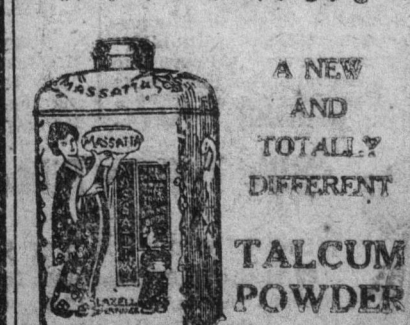
