



TAXES ON BEVERAGES.

LONDON, To-day. During a discussion on the Finance Bill in the Commons to-day, Reginald McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced the reduction from six to four and one-half pence pound in the new duty on cocoa and coffee, which comes into force to-day. McKenna explained that owing to the general admission of unfairness in the taxes on tea, coffee and cocoa, a thorough investigation had resulted in the conclusion that if the true relation of the taxes was made, that on coffee and cocoa should be four and one-half pence per pound, and that on tea 12 pence per pound. This relation meant, he said, that a cup of tea would bear the same taxation as a cup of cocoa or coffee. He hoped in any further alterations of the taxation they would still bear the same relation.



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
