

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

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

HEAVY FIGHTING; GERMANS ARE MAKING DETERMINED EFFORT.

LONDON, June 21. Officials issued to-day by Austrian and Russian War Offices all indicate what has been anticipated, that the Germans are making a determined effort to resume the initiative lost by the Russian General Brusiloff's diversion, by a strong attack on General Kuropatkin's army in the north, especially in Volhynia on the Stry and Stokhod rivers in an effort to prevent the Russians receiving reinforcements. Although up to the present the Germans are making no striking advances, they are clearly holding up their opponents most stubborn fighting with fluctuating results proceeding around Gouziayn west of Kolki. The Germans are again attacking farther north in Smorgon district, and in the region of Riga. Military experts say that it remains to be seen whether the Germans will be able to bring sufficient pressure in those sections to relieve the hard pressed Austrians in Bukowina and enable them to make a fresh stand on a new line.

ADVANCING IN WEST AFRICA.

LONDON, June 21. The Allied forces invading German West Africa, are continuing to advance successfully, it was announced officially to-day. A column moving from British East Africa into the northeastern section of the German Colony, has occupied Kandenl. Another column, advancing from the south, has taken Lanfeaburg.

CHANGES IN CONSTANTINE'S MINISTRY.

ATHENS, June 21. King Constantine is taking up the

question of changes in the Ministry as a result of the continuation of the blockade by the Allies, and it is believed that former Premier Zaimist will be asked to try and form a cabinet which will be acceptable to the Entente.

NORWEGIAN TORPEDOED.

LONDON, June 21. The Norwegian steamer Aquila has been torpedoed by an Austrian submarine, 100 miles off Marzilles. Crew saved.

PROTEST FROM GREECE.

WASHINGTON, June 21. An identical note, protesting vigorously against the interference by the Allies with the marine trade of Greece, has been presented by the Greek minister to the State Department, diplomatic representatives and Secretary Lansing of the American Government. It asserts that the traditional principles have been violated and that Greece has been unable to obtain any official explanation or response to enquiries.

VIOLENT ATTACK ON FREICH POSITIONS.

PARIS, June 21. A violent attack on the French positions northwest of Rheims, was made by the Germans last night at Hill 108 and in the direction of Berry au Bac. The attack was repulsed by French artillery fire. The Germans exploded two mines before launching their infantry attack against the French trenches. Their repulse was due, the statement says, to the effectiveness of the French screen fire. In Verdun sector no infantry action was reported, but mutual bombardment was maintained during the night.

ITALIAN SUNK.

LONDON, June 21. The Italian steamer Poviga was sunk last night, according to Lloyd's.

PFLANGER'S ARMY CUT IN TWO.

LONDON, June 21. Confirmatory reports of the cutting in two of General Pflanger's army in Bukowina are contained in a despatch

to the Star from Petrograd to-day. When the Austrians retreated due south along the Rumanian border and others towards the Carpathians the hope was to save time and hold the Russians on a fortified line running from Kutly to the Sereth and along the rivers Mikhodra and Sereth but despite the delay caused by the prolonged defence of Czernowitz, General Letchitzky threw his reserves upon the heels of the retreating Austrians with such speed that he succeeded in reaching that line simultaneously with them, with the result that Pflanger's force was cut in half midway between Kutly and Sereth, at Stroginet.

GUARDSHIP BLOWN UP.

STOCKHOLM, June 21. A small German guardship has been blown up by a mine off Falsterbo.

WAR OFFICE COMMUNICATION.

LONDON, June 21. The following communication was issued by the War Office to-night: The day being devoid of any important incident, passed quietly on most parts of the front. An intermittent shelling occurred near Habuterna, Souchez Valley and Fellingheim, while mining continued briskly near Neuville, St. Vaast, and Loos salient near LaBassee. Yesterday evening five of the enemy's ammunition lorries came under fire of our artillery. One of them was hit, and all of them exploded.

RELATIVES PROHIBITED FROM VISITING FRANCE.

LONDON, June 21. After Monday next no relative of sick or wounded officers will be permitted to visit France, unless their condition is dangerous and special permission has been granted, it was announced to-day. This restriction has been imposed owing to the necessities of the military situation.

THE PETROL SUPPLY.

LONDON, June 21.

The Government have declared that a more effective diminution in the use of petrol by motor cars will be obtained by control than by increasing taxes on cars. Henceforth according to the announcement made in the Commons to-day, increased taxes are to be restricted to a central authority to be created, with power to grant permits for the purchase of a specified amount of petrol for which a license of six-pence per gallon must be paid at the time of purchase. For commercial cars or those of doctors and veterinary surgeons, permits will be issued at half rates. The discussion in the Commons elicited the general opinion that control of petrol would be more equitable than increasing the tax on motor cars, though one member of the House pointed out that the extra cost of petrol would be more than the amount of the extra tax. Efforts were made in the Commons to have the maximum income tax reduced from five to four shillings per pound, but the Government declined to do anything except to endeavour to relieve the incidence tax on small unearned incomes.

POTATOES SCARCE.

AMSTERDAM, June 21. According to the Vorwarts, a potato famine is threatening Cologne. The quantity available at the present time is two and a half pounds per head per week, but the paper declares that the sale of potatoes is to be completely stopped in the next few days.

CLASH WITH CARRANZA'S FORCES

EL PASO, June 21. A detachment of American cavalry clashed with Carranza's forces at Carrizal about 80 miles south of El Paso early to-day, both sides suffering heavy casualties. According to unofficial reports received by the Mexican military authorities who are investigating, forty Americans were killed by machine gun fire in a surprise attack. The Mexican casualties are said not to have been so heavy, but General Felix Gomez is named as being among the Mexican dead. An American command, said to have been a part of a scouting patrol from Auzman is returning to General Pershing's line of communication. General Gomezale, a Mexican commander, in Juarez, gave out the statement which he announced as official, that the Mexican command had taken 17 American prisoners; he also said that General Gomez' death is confirmed, but said he had no official reports.

May be Refloated.

Supt. H. A. Spudners, of the Anglo-American Telegraph Company, received a message last night stating that the S. S. Arache, which went ashore, Monday night, at Point Platte, Little Miquelon Island, was still aground. No cargo had been jettisoned, and no water was in the hold. With the assistance of another steamer she could be easily floated. The crew are still on board. The Arache is a steamer of 8,900 tons and is wheat-laden.

**The Economic
Policy of the Allies.**

Yesterday's message from London giving an account of the proceedings of the Economic Conference which met recently in Paris, is a document of first-rate importance. For some time the Allied nations have endeavored to reach some agreement, and to effect some sort of co-operation, however general, in commercial, as they had long since done in military, matters: this is the first announcement to the world of any result of the conferences of their representatives. While the programme which it merely outlines is an admirable one, pregnant with far-reaching consequences, we are inclined to see in it here and there suggestions of a Protective system which, familiar enough to the other countries concerned, will hardly be received by Free Trade England with unmixed satisfaction. We shall at any rate await with interest the comments of the English press upon the subject.

The measures outlined in the message are necessarily very general in their nature, and cannot be fairly estimated until they take more definite and practical shape. They are conveniently grouped under three heads: durants bello; transitory; or in the period of reconstruction immediately following the war; and post bellum, or future, for an indefinite time. The first two need no comment; they are what might be expected under existing circumstances; it is to the third class, the terms of economic union between the Allies of future years, that most interest attaches. If any real understanding is reached herein, and if these great Powers are able to combine their economic resources in an effective, workable manner, we see consequences following from it as momentous as any that the war will contain.

But we also think we see in it (though we may be mistaken), two widely different principles, of which we would commend the one as stronger, as we would deprecate the other. The first is the aim so to develop, organize and combine the resources of the Allies themselves that they may be utilized to the utmost, and that every country made as far as possible economically independent of Germany. This is an admirable object. Those resources are so enormous, they are so various, that if they are effectively exploited this independence should easily be realized. It should be unnecessary, of course, to point out that every Colony would come directly under the operation of the scheme and benefit considerably by it. The other principle, which has been openly advocated by extremists, is the waging of a war, by restrictive, prohibitory and other means, against German trade, of every kind and in every quarter. It says, in effect, "When we have humbled Germany's military power, we shall proceed to destroy, as far as possible, her commerce." This is a deplorable doctrine, though in the present heat of feeling it is bound to have many adherents. It embodies, in a tyrannical form, the spirit which has perhaps been responsible for more wars than all other causes together. Carried to its logical conclusion, (for-

unately quite impossible), it would mean the utter extinction of German trade, which is to say, of German industry and enterprise. It is not likely to be tolerated in England, where it has from the first been recognised, and stated, that we are fighting, not German trade, but Prussian militarism. There is a vast difference between them, even though the one has counted among its grandiose objects the advancement of the other. The world, and Britain in particular, has nothing to gain, and everything to lose, by the smothering of German commerce. There is only one way to reach (we will not say fight) German commercial enterprise, and that is to improve and organize our own trade, and to improve and organize our own country, and to improve and organize our own industry, and to improve and organize our own economy. This is the only way to reach the goal we seek, and to reach it in a manner that will be to the benefit of all.

At the Allies' Fair at New York when all Activities Stopped in Honor of Earl Kitchener.

New York, June 15.—Taps were sounded in honor of "K. of K." at the Allied Bazaar last night, and whole throngs of revellers, shouting and laughing, at one minute to nine, changed instantly into a procession of mourners, says the Tribune. Motor cars were stopped, at the entrance, and women in evening clothes shivered and bowed their heads, side by side with the humblest of the Britain's friends on the sidewalk.

Inside, all activities stopped when the bugle sounded. Twenty thousand faces were turned, and twenty thousand heads were bowed toward the front of the Grand Central Palace where the Rev. Dr. Manning, Rector of Trinity Church, read a short prayer in memory of the great war lord. Then the orchestra played England's hymn, "The Land of Hope and Glory." The New York crowd were so impressed that they forgot to hide their emotions, and when the tune changed to "Oward Christian Soldiers," everyone took up the refrain.

Then was seen the amazing spectacle of a huge, pleasure-seeking crowd singing as they went: "Like a Mighty Army, Moves the Church of God." At the head of the stairs stood a Kitchener memorial table. Many passed in their march to drop a coin into the box labeled "Do your bit for Kitchener's cause." The Kitchener memorial came at the end of the moment of the bazaar's greatest justification. To celebrate the death of the first \$1,000,000 mark, a festive dinner was given last night.

RUTH CAMERON.

"He is still a slave whose limbs alone are free."—Greek Proverb.



How many kinds of slavery there are! How few people who are really free in the largest sense of the word!

"Come to walk with me," I said to my neighbor one day. It was a jewel day, the kind when you feel the sense of spring in your heart so poignantly that it makes your heart ache, and the pain is sweeter than any pleasure—a day when it is almost a sin to be indoors if you don't have to.

"Oh, I'd love to," she said wistfully; "but I can't. I planned to clean my pantry."

"Let it go until to-morrow." And The Day After To-morrow It Rained.

"I can't. I plan to go to town to-morrow. Maybe I'll go with you the day after to-morrow."

The day after to-morrow it rained, a cold, miserable rain. It usually does.

That's what I mean by slavery. That woman is a slave to her plans. Again and again she misses things worth while because she is tied down by plans and schedules. She is never free to yield to some sudden impulse, to seize some unexpected pleasure, infinitely sweeter because it hasn't had half the taste taken out of it by exaggerated anticipation.

Other people are slaves to possessions. I know a woman who can never go away for the summer because she is afraid to shut her house up. She thinks she owns the house. As

a matter of fact, the house owns her, and keeps her tied to its apron strings all the hot, lonely summer when everyone else on the street goes away.

Slaves To "They Say." Many people are slaves to what people think. "They say" is a tyrant that makes people shape their lives to its pleasure.

Comfort slavery is another form of the most abject slavery. I think there are more people who are slaves to their own comfort and ease and convenience than to any other master.

How many compromises with their better selves people make, how many meannesses they are guilty of, how much of the finer kind of pride they sacrifice, because they or those dear to them must have their comfort and ease.

Thoreau Knew What Freedom Meant. Thoreau knew what freedom meant. We read about his perfectly independent life and many of us envy him, but we don't dream of emulating him. How could we? Modern life has us bound fast in its shackles.

"And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free." I love that verse. And this is one of the ways I like to translate it. If you can get at the real truth of the meaning of life, the truth about what is worth while and essential, you shall be free of all these shackles, you shall be free of the slavery of possessions and plans, the slavery of selfishness and all the other needless servitudes. Of course you will still have obligations—the obligations that home and friendship and love impose. But your service to them will be the service of love and free will, not bond service.

The latest fishery reports received by the Board of Trade are:— (Salmon Cove Pt. to Collier's North Pt.)—The catch to date is 30 qtls. with 25 for last week.

Prospects are much improved since last report and there is a plentiful supply of herring and caplin. The lobster catch is fair. Codfish is scarce with hook and line.

(Twillingate to Trump Island) — There is no improvement in codfishery prospects but caplin is plentiful for bait. Owing to stormy weather the traps have been unable to fish only part of the week in sheltered places where they averaged from 1/2 to 1 brl. The hook and line men did poor also, having only a good sign part of the week.

PARIS, To-day. The Germans exploded two mines before launching their infantry attack against the French trenches. Their repulse was due, the statement says, to the effectiveness of the French screen of fire. In the Verdun sector no infantry action was reported but mutual bombardment was maintained during the night.

ENEMY FIRMS IN ENGLAND.

LONDON, To-day. The Board of Trade has ordered The Hop Extract Company and The Horst Co., whose officials state they are controlled by E. J. Partello, of Chicago, to show cause within four days why they should not be wound up as enemy firms. One of the organizers of both companies is Baron Von Horst, a former Californian, who was interned in England soon after war began. It is stated that the Baron who has lived in England for years, accepted the German title after leaving the United States. He no longer owns shares or stock in either Company.

ENGLISH LIGHTSHIP SUNK.

LONDON, To-day. The G. Gorton Lightship, situated several miles off the English East Coast, has been sunk with the loss of 5 members of the crew drowned or killed, says a Central News despatch to-day from Great Yarmouth. Whether the sinking is due to a mine or a submarine is unknown. Survivors of the disaster who are badly injured have been landed.

HUGE RUSSIAN SPOILS.

PETROGRAD, To-day. The War Office announced today that the number of men captured by the Russian offensive in Volhynia and Galicia up to Thursday last week was 172,484. The total number of prisoners taken by General Brusiloff from June 3rd to 15th inclusive, says the statement is 3,350 officers, 169,134 men. We also captured 550 machine guns, 180 bomb-throwers, 119 artillery limbers, 34 searchlights and a large quantity of other war material. An official announcement says, in a severe engagement on the Stokhod River, German troops which made an attack in massed formation were repulsed and took to flight.

TAXES ON BEVERAGES.

LONDON, To-day. During a discussion on the Finance Bill in the Commons to-day, Reginald McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced the reduction from six to four and one-half pence per pound in the new duty on cocoa and coffee, which comes into force to-day. McKenna explained that owing to the general admission of unfairness in these taxes on cocoa and coffee, a thorough investigation had resulted in the conclusion that if the true relation of the taxes was made, that on coffee and cocoa should be four and one-half pence per pound, and that on tea 12 pence per pound. This relation meant, he said, that a cup of tea would bear the same taxation as a cup of cocoa or coffee. He hoped in any further alterations of the taxation they would still bear the same relation.

RUSSIANS BEAR BACK GERMANS.

PETROGRAD, To-day. At 3 o'clock on the following morning, in the region of the village of Rajmisto, on the Stokhod River northeast of Vorontschine, the enemy attacked in mass formation, and the engagement became a hand to hand fight. The Germans were unable to sustain our steady pressure and took to flight. They left in our hands wounded and prisoners, and a large amount of booty. Desperate fighting is in progress in the region of Klissine, further south. On the extreme left wing we are still pursuing the enemy and have crossed the Sereth River.

INTER-EMPIRE COMMERCE.

LONDON, To-day. Coinciding with the publication of the resolutions adopted by the Paris Economic Conference to-day, a Mansion House meeting under the auspices of British Empire Producers' Association created deep interest. It was left to the overseas delegates, Premier Hughes of Australia and Sir Geo. Egerton of Canada to drive the lesson home. Sir George pointed out that the war performed a great service in sweeping away old prejudices and bringing the nations of the Empire into closer union. He hoped that when peace came there would be some willingness and ability to banish old controversies and disputes. He emphasized the fact that production was the only basis of trade within the British Empire, every diversity of climate rendering it possible to produce for all requirements. He believed in

nationalization, particularly with regard to raw materials, when there was an attempt at monopoly. Referring to the sacrifices made for the military struggle, the Minister thought that the Allies would be capable of similar sacrifices in any trade war against the Central Powers. The Australian Premier, in his usual vigorous style, urged that the Paris resolutions be given effect to by immediate organization. There must be control of raw material within the Empire, re-peopling of the land and inter-Empire trade.

THE MEXICAN BATTLE.

WASHINGTON, To-day. General Funston reported to-night late that he had received official confirmation of a clash between Carranza and the American troops early to-day near Carrizal, in Mexico. He transmitted to the War Department the following report from Obufre, Gen. Bell, at El Paso, reports there was a clash this morning at Carrizal, near Villa Ahumada, between Carranza and American troops in which General Gomez and other Mexicans killed. Their numbers are unknown. The number of Americans killed or wounded is also unknown.

GERMAN INTRIGUE IN MEXICO.

WASHINGTON, To-day. Some intimation as to what General Carranza's next step will be was expected hourly to-night at the State Department. Official advices reported the American rejection of the demand for recall of General Pershing's troops from Mexico was under consideration by the first Chief of his Cabinet. The special agent, Rogers, who made the report, was unable to forecast the action of the factio Government and threw little light on what was going on in the Mexican Capital. From other sources, however, it is learned that European diplomats are exerting pressure upon Carranza to prevent him from going to war with the States. The Entente Allies are particularly anxious, it is understood, that nothing should occur this time to shut off oil supplies for the French and British navies from the Tampico field. Allied diplomatic representatives in Mexico believe too that German influence has been working on Carranza in an effort to create a situation which might embarrass the enemies of the Central Powers. They have associated German agencies, which have been active in stirring up a feeling against the States not only in Mexico but throughout South and Central America to prevent this country from securing the trade formerly handled by German merchants. The State Department had no official reports of peace-making efforts in Mexico City, although it has been informed directly by German officials and is studying all General Carranza's communications. His action during the last few months, however, has given little ground for official feeling of a hopeful view. His attitude is one of growing hostility, and officials are not inclined to believe now that it could be readily overcome. At the War Department, telegrams came during the day from many States reporting the mobilization of scores of regiments under canvas to-night. No marching orders for the border have been given, but they will go before the week is out.

LIGHTSHIP STRUCK MINE.

YARMOUTH, To-day. The G. Gorton Lightship, stationed several miles off the English coast, has been sunk by a mine according to survivors, two in number. They say Capt. Russ at the bow sighted the mine and gave warning. The explosion came an instant later. The force was so terrific that the vessel was raised out of the water and completely broken up.

GERMANS TRY TO SAVE KOVEL.

LONDON, To-day. Following the despatch of German efforts on the Russian front, military experts say great battle is developing on the line of the River Bug on a parallel line to be drawn through Kovel, Vladimir, Volhynia, and Lemberg, where the Germans are making desperate efforts to arrest the Russian advance in order to prevent the important railway junction of Kovel from falling into Russian hands. The northern part of the front, says the Daily Mail, seems likely to become as active as the southern part has been lately. The Germans know the loss of Kovel would seriously affect their northern army. It is significant that while they have transferred troops from other points they have not moved any from this particular district, says the Morning Post.

POSITION ON RUSSIAN FRONT.

PETROGRAD, To-day. A correspondent observes that the Germans are making a stand before Kovel and Viadrimir Volynski, but that the Russian advance continues on both flanks encountering stubborn resistance only on the direct road to Lemberg. The correspondent adds that the German lines on the Russian front are being pushed back.

STEAMER STERMOUNT.

HALIFAX, To-day. Crashing on the rocks of Joseph Island, east of Halifax, during a dense fog, on Tuesday morning, the Montreal Transportation Co.'s steamer Stermount is a total wreck. Capt Black and the crew of 19 men were compelled to abandon the ship a few hours after she went ashore. The steamer was bound from Philadelphia to Sydney in ballast for orders.

BERLIN PAPER SHORTAGE.

LONDON, To-day. The majority of Berlin newspaper proprietors have decided to reduce the size of their publications from July 1st, owing to the increasing cost of paper.

ULSTER NATIONALIST MEETING.

BELFAST, To-day. The Conference of Ulster Nationalists in Belfast on Friday will decide on a great deal more than the acceptance or rejection of Lloyd George's proposals. It will demonstrate whether the Nationalists Government is in future to be dominated by the clergy or the laity. The whole future of the Nationalist Parliamentary party is wrapped up in Friday's meeting. The Nationalist Press is sharply divided and the cleavage among the Nationalist public is no less marked. John Redmond will probably attend the meeting.

GERMANY AND SPAIN.

MADRID, To-day. A German submarine arrived to-day at Cartagena. The officers disembarked and left for Madrid with confidential messages for King Alfonso.

BELGIANS PROGRESS IN GERMAN EAST AFRICA.

HAVRE, To-day. Further successes for the Belgian columns invading German East Africa, are claimed in an official statement issued by the Belgian War Office to-day.

GERMAN GAIN AT VERDUN.

PARIS, To-day. After violent attacks lasting all night, the Germans captured the front line of trenches between Fumain Wood and Chenois in the Verdun sector according to an official statement. The Germans attacked in force on both banks of the Meuse, with the usual heavy bombardment. An attack on the south slope of Dealman Hill was checked by grenade detachments.

5 Months on the Way.

After being on the way for five months Lynch's wax paper bread wrappers have arrived at last. Want and starvation will tell them the truth. Then the militarists who recklessly and wantonly setting out to wreck Europe, have ruined their own country, must answer to the German people. That will be the beginning of the end.




