The Nine Hour Movement in Dundas.

### Proposed Railway from Guelph to Collingwood.

MEETING IN GUELPH.

Any one looking at the map of Ontario, cannot fail to notice that there is a large and important section of country lying between Guelph and Collingwood, in a direct line, which is almost entirely destitute of railway communication and its many advantages. The proposed line from Hamilton to Hog's Bay, on the Georgian Bay, would to some extent benefit the section of country referred to, but its construction would entail a much heavier expense, while it would not receive the same help from the municipalities interested as this new and more direct line would.

Several gentlemen in Guelph have lately had this new project under Massie, immediately after his return from the Bruce railway campaign, called a meeting of the leading business men in town, which was held last (Friday) night in the Queen's Hotel, which was numerously attended. Mr. Massie was called to the chair, and Mr. Guthrie was appointed Secretary. The question was thoroughly discussed in all its bearings, and the many advantages of such a line of railway not only to Hamilton and Guelph, but to the whole section of country through which it would run, were pointed out by the differtheir serious consideration, and Mr. tario. run, were pointed out by the different speakers. It was finally moved by Mr. Innes, seconded by Mr. Melvin, and una nimously resolved :-

"That this meeting is of opinion that steps should be taken for the construction of a railway from Guelph to Collingwood, by way of Orangeville, and as it is desirable to obtain the co-operation and assistance of the city of Hamilton, the following gentlemen be a deputation to Hamilton, to confer with its leading citizens, with a view of enlisting their sympathy in this undertaking, and report at an adjourned meeting, at an early date, viz:—The Mayor, Messrs. This new railway scheme, as explained at the meeting, must commend itself to all interested.
