A Desperate Deed Executed by Desperate Men Who Make Small Haul.

CANL MAIL CLERK SAVED BIG SU



Prof. McLennan Outines Great Advantages Over All Others.

Synopsis of Lecture

Prof. McLennan gave an account of the origin and development of the metric system of weights and measures; presented some of its chief characteristics; pointed out some of its advantages, and outlined its introduction into and adoption by a number of countries of the world.

He referred to the confusion which resulted from the indefinite standards of weight and of linear measurements adopted by the different nations in the early history of their development from barbarism. At the beginning of the eighteenth century the creation of a universal system to be mooted by the leading scientists of Europe, among the most active being James Wat, the inventor of the steam engine. In 1789 the French academy of sciences was instructed to devise a system of weights and measures which would be chambers of commerce, long lists of the world.
