A Tame Struggle of Sixty-four Rounds at North Judson, Ind.

Ohioaco, Feb. 13.—Not since the fistic encounter between Sullivan and Ryan has such interest beun taken in a fight as that which took place to-day at North Judson, Ind., between Myers and McAuliffs, which ended in a draw.

Shortly after 3.30 o'clock this morning the party arrived at North Judson and proceeded to the hall where the fight was to take place, but on arrival it was found that the hall was closed against them and an adjournment to the train was made. 


