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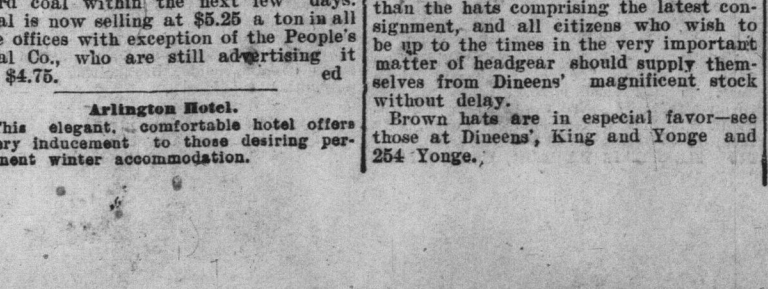
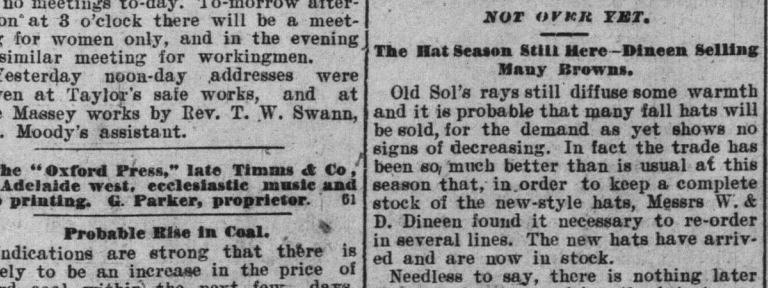
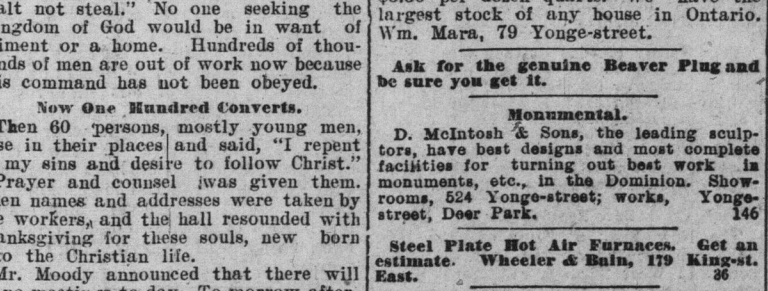
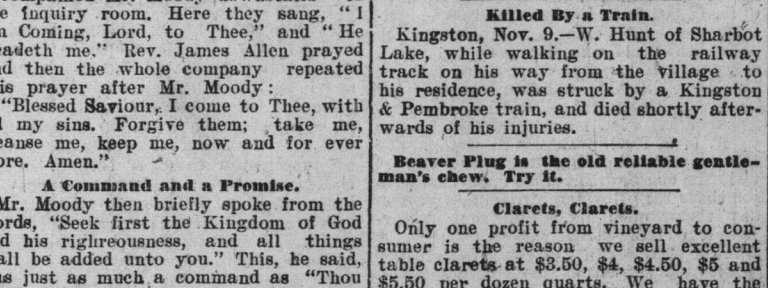
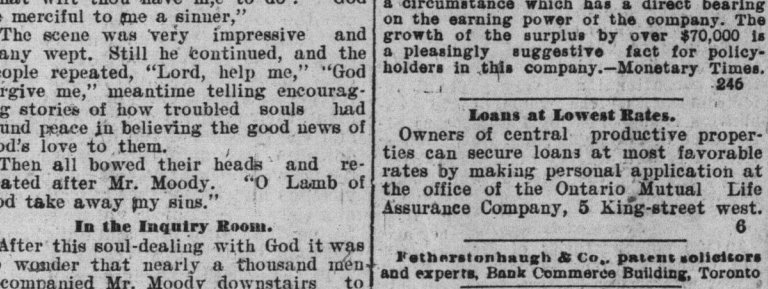
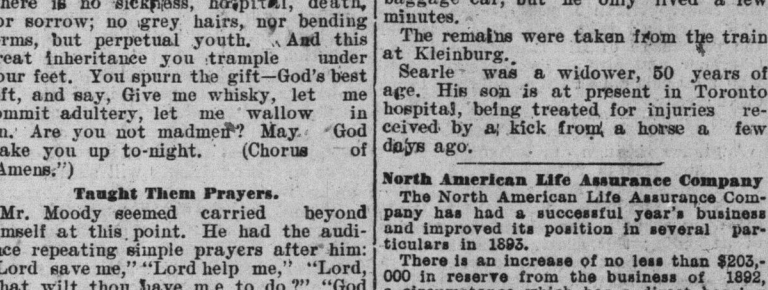
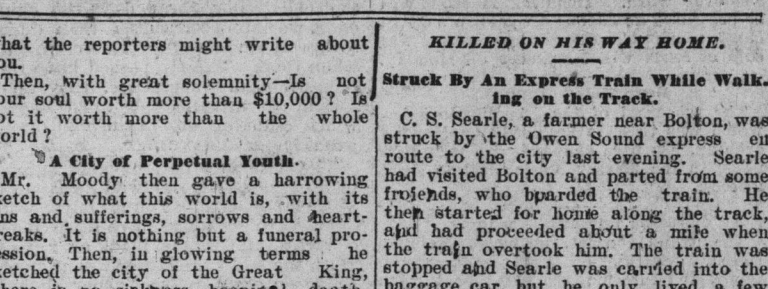
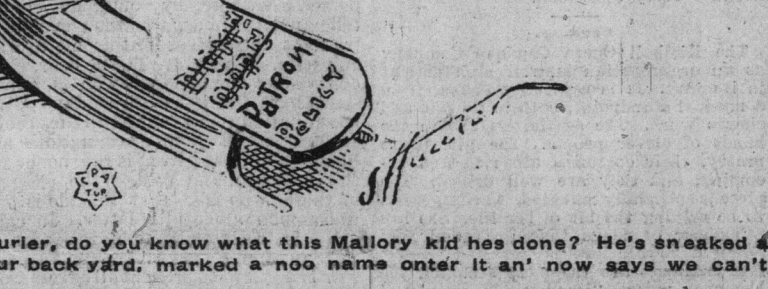
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NEARING A DECISIVE BATTLE

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THE BOODLE INVESTIGATION.

Mogers and Wheeler May Yet Be Placed Upon the Witness Stand—Little Evidence Remains.

No new evidence was added yesterday at the resumed investigation into the charge of boodles against aldermen. Council Nesbitt stated that without certain information, which he was in hopes of obtaining, he couldn't very well proceed with the cross-examination.

The first witness called was Alexander B. Smith, Superintendent of Construction for the Great Northwestern Telegraph Co. He knew Mr. J. J. Wright, and he had had several conversations with the gentleman relating to the electric lighting tenders.

W. A. Martin, secretary of the Toronto Electric Light Company, corroborated Manager Wright's evidence as to the interview he had had with witness, in which he had informed him that he had been approached by Ald. Stewart.

The enquiry was then adjourned until this morning at 11 o'clock. President Hannell of the Branch Electric Light Company has written to the City Engineer stating that his company does not do business on the basis of putting in a sum for "financing" their contracts.

At an adjourned meeting of the York Township Council, held yesterday, communication was received from John Hodges, stating that his wife had sustained injuries while walking along Coxwell avenue, caused by a loose plank, over which she tripped, falling heavily on her arm, and has since been unable to attend to her household duties since.

A bylaw was passed authorizing the reeve and treasurer to borrow money and continue all advances heretofore made. The time for the payment of taxes, in order to secure the five per cent. discount, was extended to Dec. 10.

SCIENCE AND INDUSTRY.

THE TYPHOON.

It Blows in China Seas and is Dreaded by Mariners.

"The worst storms," said the captain of a tramp steamer the other day, "are the typhoons of the Chinese seas. They cover a large area, are uncertain in their movements and follow each other quickly. Griffin, for instance, received \$2,500 by way of a present, outside of his salary, for winning the Futurity. He is a sober, well-mannered lad, and still very young, but he takes a great pride in his family, and is educating his sisters and brothers out of his earnings.—New York Sun.

THE WORLD OF WOMEN.

How They Would Run a City—Practical Ideas About Purifying the Government.

The Woman's Club of Denver is at present agitating the subject of municipal reform, with practical ideas of purifying the city government. In answer to the fact that there is great expense connected with the present charter, she said the expensiveness is not a fault, and advised increasing it if necessary to induce honorable capable business men to accept office. She commended sharply on the bare majority of votes required by the charter to permit the introduction of saloons in the suburban districts, and suggested that the number of years as taxpayer be increased from one to five before a man can be elected as a member of the City Council, and that no person who is directly or indirectly interested in any contract with the city, or who is indebted to the state, city or county for taxes, or who has been convicted for corrupt practices, shall be eligible for office.

"The amusing feature of our charter," said Mrs. Routt, "is that all officers except the Park Commissioners receive handsome salaries, while he receives no salary whatever, though the charter expressly states that these Park Commissioners must be men who shall be known for their business ability, probity, and public spirit. Just why this distinction should be made and for the first and only time the charter should call for men of business ability is difficult to understand."

Mrs. Routt brought her remarks to a close by saying: "Ladies, the whole matter lies in a nutshell. Christian men and women, moral men and women, and all decent right-minded men and women must attend the primaries, nominate and elect candidates for their offices, not because of their patriotism, and good municipal government will be the result. If the human race is to endure and civilization is to advance, men and women must work together and mutually aid one another to gain those higher ideals."

Another woman who participated in the discussion approved of the plan requiring that two-thirds of the owners of real estate within the frontage of the block in which the business of liquor selling is to be carried on shall sign a petition for a saloon, before it can be granted, and she further said: "Without undervaluing in the least the position of our Public School teachers, it seems to me that the officials who administer our city government hold places quite as important, and that we are therefore entitled to equal guarantees of their ability; hence I would propose an amendment to our city charter which would provide that all candidates for municipal offices should pass a rigid examination on all the articles contained in the said charter, and receive at least a third-grade certificate, before they be eligible to office, the possession and presentation of such certificate being necessary before any salary could be drawn."

Hereafter it is to be the duty of the women of Colorado to scrutinize closely the character of the candidate who presents himself for membership of the City Council.

METHODS OF EARNING A LIVING.

Entertainer of Young Persons—Shopping and Marketing For Society Women.

Women exhibit most admirable inventive powers when they are obliged to find a new way to earn a living and wish it to be one of refinement and pleasure as well as profit. The latest profession originated with a Miss Shippen of Philadelphia, who is an "entertainer of young persons and children" and a sort of conductor, as it were, of their parties. Her aim is to direct the amusements of the little ones according to their ages and tastes, and to instruct in the details of menu, decorations and games. She arrives at the house a few hours before the time to see that everything is in readiness, and when they are all assembled she entertains them, interests them in games, both old and new, some of which she has invented, and through these teaches them a bit of German and French. While they are enjoying a game to the fullest she sits down to the piano and plays a waltz, and they all begin to dance so they are sure not to tire of any one thing. The key to her method is to make each child as happy as possible.

Another unique method for women of refinement, good taste, and judgment to earn a livelihood is to do shopping and marketing for society women who have not time or inclination to do it themselves and do not wish to keep a competent housekeeper. One woman has made a fairly good income from this source, and in addition to the other things she sees the small children safely in school every morning and takes them home again, goes with them to the dressmaker's, shoemaker's, and milliner's, and in short superintends their entire wardrobe. After the marketing is done she returns again to the home to see that her order is properly filled. Three or four families can be served in this way by one woman, and when she goes home at night her time is her own.

Chicago's Pretty Women All Employed. The wonderful advantage of beauty of face and form in women is again exemplified by the experience of the manager of a publishing house in Chicago who advertised for a little beauty to work in a store window and display paper dress patterns. Eight women without a vestige of good looks or a trace of any thing might have lost through age of illness—except in their own estimation—appeared on the scene. They were too old or too young, or lacked the air of refinement and grace required to fill the window with charm and to the minds of the observers with desire for the patterns. So the homely ones had no chance. Not one pretty one has been found since, and the manager declares that all the pretty woman of Chicago who want employment are provided for. It is said that Chicago heads all other cities in the number of women employed in business.

THE PAPER ON THE WALLS.

Clergymen and Others Testify As to Their Injurious Effect on Public Morals.

Public School Inspector Chapman testified that the pictures were suggestive of lewdness. He would rather not see pictures of women in tight, established in the streets.

Rev. Canon Cayley believed that the posters were disgusting and a frightful education for children. They were indecently suggestive, and tended to corrupt public morals.

Rev. J. M. Scott and Mrs. McDonnell also thought the pictures would have a demoralizing effect on the public. A similar charge against Joe Price, bill poster, was remanded for a week.

END OF A ROMANTIC STORY.

Married His Sweetheart at the Doors of the Penitentiary.

Cleveland, Ohio, Nov. 9.—The end of a romantic story was the marriage in the jail of this county to-day of James N. Bray and Grace E. Price. Young E. Price is a prisoner charged with embezzlement. He is 24 years old and the son of an English army officer of high rank. About three years ago he left England and located in Canada. He had intended to become a shipman, but he fell in with evil companions and began to gamble. He was obliged to leave Canada, and Miss Hugo, who had fallen in love with him, accompanied him. They arrived in this city last summer and began living in an apartment house in a fashionable part of the city. Bray was smooth and polished, and among other things he secured, without money or price, a valuable piano. The collector called for the promised payment, but it was found that Bray sold the piano and disappeared with his supposed wife. Some weeks later he was captured in Houston, Texas, and brought to Cleveland, where he was indicted by the grand jury. His father was notified and sent \$500 to settle the case, but it could not be settled. Meanwhile Miss Hugo was as devoted to the young man as ever, and succeeded in earning enough with her needle to bring her to Cleveland. When Bray learned that he must go to the penitentiary, he concluded, as far as possible, right the wrong he had done the girl and the marriage which was solemnized to-day, was arranged. The bride is a beautiful and accomplished girl.

Independent Order of Foresters.

The European return of the I.O.F. for September, during which month Dr. Orin Strickland, the Supreme Chief, was visiting the Old Land, show the largest number of applications that were ever received in any one month since the introduction of Forestry into Europe, thus demonstrating the great energy and zeal of the Supreme Chief. The Supreme Chief has been invited to deliver an address before the National Fraternal Congress, which is to be held in London on the 20th inst. The Supreme Secretary, Mr. John A. McGillivray, who for the past month has been attending the High Court of California and addressing public gatherings and meeting Courts in the principal centres of Forestry in the West, along the Coast and in Manitoba, is expected to return on Monday.

The Benefits of Protection.

Baltimore, Md., Nov. 9.—Four hundred men employed at the Custom House were notified to-day that on next pay-day their wages would be increased 10 per cent. The proprietors of the new schedule has been struck owing to the Republican victory and the consequent prospective increase in the profits of the concern. A reduction had been made in the wages of the employees in November, 1893, immediately after the general election.

Weavers' Strike.

Six or eight weavers employed in the Toronto Carpet Company's works went out on strike yesterday, owing to an alleged reduction in their wages. Their strike has been filled by men imported from Amsterdam, New York.
