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





WALKING TO ASIA. Is Not Difficult When Bering This Strait Is Frozen.

On Aug. 15 we sailed through Be ring strait and were at last in the arctic. The straits are thirty-six miles wide, with East cape, a rounded, dome shaped mass of black basalt, on the Asiatic side and on the American side Cape Prince of Wales, a headline of sharper outline, but neither so lofty nor so sheer. In between the two capes and in line with them lie the two islands of Big and Little Diomede. Through the three narrow channels be tween the capes and the islands the tide runs with the swiftness of a river's current.

The Eskimos constantly cross from continent to continent in small boats. In still weather the passage can be made in a light kyack with perfect safety. The widest of the three channels is that between Big Diomede and East cape, and is, I should say, not more than fifteen miles across. While we were passing through the straits party of Eskimos in a skin we saw a boat paddling leisurely across from America to Asia. They no doubt had been on a visit to relatives or friends on the neighboring continent. We were told that in winter, when the strait is frozen solidly, the Eskimos frequently walk from one continent to the other .- From "A Year With a Whaler," by Walter Noble Burns.







........................ We have stories of eminent rascals such as Dick Turpin, Claude Duval and others, real or fictitious, but for

ambition for important criminal achievements none of these villains overtops Colonel Thomas Blood, who flourished in England during the pro-tectorship of the Cromwells and the reign of Charles II, One of Oliver Cromwell's sons gave Blood large grants of land in Ireland, which were confiscated on the restoration of the legitimate monarch. From this he began his career as a desperado of high degree. The following story es not deviate from the main facts of his boldest and last attempt.



His fa-ther had died at the block. After many

privations he had been recalled to the throne of England. His object was to pacify the various factions and cement them that he might have a peaceful reign. Under these circumstances it was natural that a desperado like Blood should affect him. He had been on both sides during the parliamentary war, at one time having joined the "fifth monarchy men." He convinced the king that his death—if he was exe-

cuted-would be avenged by hundreds of his associates. Another influence doubtless prevailed. Charles was an immoral man himself and admired any villain who was brave as well as wicked.

By hanging Blood Charles could have got rid of him, but even in his power so desperate a man was to be feared. The king pardoned him, restored his confiscated estates, and he was often thereafter seen in the presence cham-





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

Death of Sir George Ross

Toronto, March 7.-Sir George Ross, Senator of the Dominion of Canada, and prior to 1905 Premier of the Province of Ontario, died this morning, after an ill-ness of several weeks. He died on the stroke of eight o'clock, having been un-conscious for several days. The only persons present at the actual moment of dissolution were Dr. Garnet Greer, of the hospital staff, a nurse, and Sir Senator of the Dominion of Canada, and

George's valet. Sir George Ross was born September 18th, 1841, on a little farm now known as lot 11, fourteenth concession. East about three miles from the Williams,

land, in 1832. Four of the children were born in Scotland, but George, and his brother, the late Alexander Ross, and three sisters were native-born Canadians. He was educated in the log school-house near his home and at the Toronto Normal. At the age of 18 he became a school teacher, which profession he followed for eight years. In 1867 he became proprietor and editor of the Strathroy Age. Three years later he sold the Age and took a partnership in the Seaforth Expositor, and also wrote editorials for the London Advertiser. In 1871 he was appointed inspector of public schools for East Lambton. In 1872 he was elected to parliament to represent




