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THE FLORIDA CYCLONE.

Loss of the S. S. "City of Vera Cruz." STATEMENTS OF THE SURVIVORS.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Sept. 5.—The steamer "Water Lily," from St. Augustine, arrived yesterday, having on board A. H. Owen, Civil Engineer, and four other survivors of the steamer "City of Vera Cruz."

From Owen's statement it appears that the steamer was not well dived and even before the gale grew furious the ship had a decided list. The officers and crew comprised 31 persons; 24 were rescued, 7 were killed.

Eleven of these on board are known to have been saved. The "City of Vera Cruz" left New York at 10 o'clock on Wednesday, the 25th ult. The cold wave of Wednesday, with rain, continued with a break with the sun E. Thursday and Friday, but it calmed down at midnight. The ship listed all the way and at 10 o'clock it was difficult to keep the deck on the table.

The weather was cloudy with frequent rain. At 1 p. m. on Saturday the Captain went to remain to Harris, the first officer. "I notice the barometer falling rapidly; we are going to have a hurricane," said Harris.

At 2 p. m. on Saturday the barometer was 30.1. The wind was blowing from the east by the force of the gale. The ship was pitching and rolling, and the water was pouring considerable water into the saloon and staterooms.
