That all words after the word "that" in the amendment be left out, and the following substituted therefor: "That it be an instruction to the Warden to see that in future all moneys be paid to the County Treasurer direct."

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By-LAWS.

BY-LAW NO. 576.

A BY-LAW to raise a sum of money by assessment in aid of Public Schools in the Townships in the County of Welland for the year 1891.

Whereas the Standing Committee on Education, in and by their report, recommended that the sums therein mentioned be raised the current year in the several Townships in aid of Public Schools;

And whereas the Corporation of the County of Welland desires to carry such recommendation into effect, and enacts as follows:

That there shall be levied and collected in the several Townships within the County of Welland, the current year, for payment of legally qualified teachers of Public Schools therein, the sums hereinafter named, which said sums so to be raised shall be over and above and in addition to all other rates whatsoever, in the manner and within the time limited and appointed by law for levying and collecting taxes generally, and shall be paid over to the Sub-Treasurers for the said Townships in which the same is raised on or before the 14th day of December next, or on or before such other day as shall be fixed in any By-Law of such Township which may be passed fix-

A BY-LAW to establish the Equalized Value of Assessed Property in the County of Welland, for the Purpose of Imposing County Rates for the Year 1891.

Whereas it is necessary and expedient to establish by By-law what shall be the equalized value of assessed property in the several Municipalities comprising the County of Welland;

The general condition of the building was very satisfactory, the

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beds and bedding, corridors, etc., were clean and tidy, and the dietary and discipline are observed in accordance with the Jail regulations.

Now that the Court House and the Jailer's residences are supplied with water from the Town Water-works, it is desirable that the Jail should be supplied from the same source for general purposes.

A bath-room is very much needed, and there is a small room over the Turnkey's room which could be fitted up for this purpose very well; water-closets could also be placed at the end of the corridors on the male and female sides of the Jail. If the water service were introduced these improvements would make the Jail very complete.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE RE MARSH LANDS ACCOUNTS.

To the Warden and Councillors of the County of Welland, in Council Assembled—

Your Committee having examined the books in connection with Marsh Lands Accounts since 1873, beg leave to report as follows:

That in accordance with the instructions contained in a resolution passed on the 31st day of January, 1891, the County Clerk presented the statement annexed, marked A, B and C.

As statement C was manifestly incomplete, your committee were unable to ascertain whether the amount of money shown as having been received had been actually paid over to the Treasurer, the column in the statement for that purpose being left blank in most cases even where the money had been paid.

We have accordingly prepared three Schedules of account from the Day Book and Ledger, and carefully checked the same with the cash account and Auditors' reports for the several years.

Schedule No. 1 contains in the first column the amounts paid in in cash on Marsh Land account for the several years 1873 to 1890 inclusive, and in the second column such of the amounts as appear from the Auditors' Reports to have been paid to the Treasurer. The sums checked with red appear both in the Day Book and Ledger, those not so checked in the Ledger only, and the various amounts charged to Mr. D'Everardo are so noted in the margin.

Schedule No. 2 is a summary of amounts acknowledged to have been paid and which were necessary to close up the different accounts, but which do not appear from the Auditors' reports to have found their way into the County Treasury, and which represent a total apparent deficiency of \$5,959.27.

Schedule No. 3 is a statement of accounts still outstanding in the Marsh Land Ledger, from which it would appear that in the purchase by J. C. Page of Lot 3, Con. 4, Wainfleet, with interest charged been pa

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ding in the purinterest charged to Oct. 1st, 1884, being a total of \$295 on that date, has not been paid.

An account current with D. D'Everardo, balance due on County Dec. 24th, 1874, \$748.84.

Balance outstanding on D. D'Everardo's Bond account on July 5th, 1875, \$2,789.98.

Balance outstanding on Henry and John Aikens and Edward Henderson's joint note, per acct. rendered Nov. 1st, 1886, being amount then due to discharge William Hurst mortgage, \$68.97.

Amount outstanding on Geo. J. Duncan mortgage (interest charged to March 25th, 1885). \$11.05.

Amount outstanding on Albert E. Hilts mortgage on Nov. 1st, 1890, \$71.75.

We have found some Printer's errors in the Auditors' reports contained in the printed minutes upon comparing them with the originals, the only one of special importance being that Edward Lee is credited on Jan. 16th, 1883, with having paid \$1200 when the amount should have been \$200.

Your Committee are of the opinion that the Marsh Lands books should have been audited from year to year, and we regard it as being very unfortunate that they were not so audited, since in that event these deficiencies could not have passed undiscovered.

There appears to have been no regular method pursued in the keeping of the books, entries appearing in the Ledger which cannot be found in the Day Book, and as a consequence we were in some cases unable to compare credits in mortgage accounts with their corresponding debits. We have checked over a number of the largest closed mortgage accounts, and all so checked have been found correct.

Your Committee are of the opinion that the amounts noted as charged to D. D'Everardo should have been collected at the time

instead of being charged, and that some negligence has been shown in this particular.

The small figures to the right of column 2 in Schedule 1 indicate the year of Audit where such does not correspond with date of payment.

Some entries in Treasurer's accounts are credited as payments by J. C. Page, but to note all would interfere with the clearness of account, and we did not think it necessary to add to the length of this report by stating time several amounts were held over.

The payment by the Government of \$1225 in 1884 does not appear in this Audit, but the Treasurer got the money and has it credited in contingent account. We have examined contingent account all through the several years, but find no other credits therein which could possibly be Marsh Land monies. The present audit is one of cash or apparently cash payments, only no notice being taken of cross entries, etc., or even transfers of Debits from one account to another. The report is much reduced from the original draft, but we think contains all necessary information, and is substantially a correct statement of the Defalcation which must apparently have been carried on from year to year to the loss of the County. The original notes, etc., of your Auditors are open to the inspection of the Council.

ACCOMMODATIONS.

In nearly all the schools the accommodations have generally been adequate, and they have been kept in a very good condition in regard to repairs and cleanliness.

During the year two new schools have been built, and improve ments have been made in some others; and the schools, upon the whole, are improving in regard to school-rooms, furniture, equipments and out-door premises.

An excellent object lesson as to what the school room and its surroundings should be was afforded Trustees and Teachers by the public school at Niagara Falls South, when the last meeting of the County Teachers' Association was held, in regard to which the following resolution was adopted by the meeting: "That the thanks of this Association are due and are hereby tendered the Trustees and Teachers for the valuable object lesson their school affords to the Teachers and Trustees of the County."

ORDER AND DISCIPLINE.

The importance of order and discipline, upon which the Teacher's efficiency and the pupil's progress in a great measure depend, can hardly be overestimated. The maintaining of proper order and discipline, however, is one of the most difficult duties the Teacher has to perform, and that young and inexperienced teachers should not in all points succeed so well as could be desired is only what might be expected. Owing to the circumstance that the school-room is, in the great majority of schools, the only place in which pupils can assemble, greater liberty is in danger of being taken in it, before or after school, or at recess, than might be considered in accordance with the best order and discipline. In the Teacher's presence at least, and that of visitors, boisterous play, whistling and noises of a

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less musical character are out of place. I am glad, however, to be able to speak favorably of the order and discipline of the schools in general, and to note the respectful demeanor of the pupils.

STATE OF PROFICIENCY.

In regard to the state of proficiency, in our best schools it is excellent in the subject generally; other schools have attained to that distinction in some of the subjects, or to that of good; others show a middling state of proficiency; while in others there are classes in which it is inferior, but these are rather the exceptions.

REWARDS AND PUNISHMENTS.

The rewards usually employed are merit marks, merit cards, head marks, taking places in class, posting results of written examinations in the school-room, or publishing them, and prizes.

The usual punishments are standing on the floor, detention, misdemeanor marks, corporal punishment when deemed necessary, and, very rarely, suspension for a short time, or, in extreme cases, expulsion.

COUNTY MODEL SCHOOL.

The County Model School comprises four departments, and an additional department in a separate room for the principal during the Model School session, which lasts 15 weeks. During the last session there were 17 teachers in training, all of whom underwent an examination which was partly written and consisted partly in practical teaching before the County Board of Examiners. The results of this examination showed that the teachers in training had been under painstaking and efficient instruction, and all were deemed by the Board qualified to teach, and were accordingly awarded certificates.

PRIZE COMPETITION.

In addition to the prizes awarded by teachers to pupils for diligence, punctuality and good conduct, a Dominion Flag was offered for competition to all the public schools of the County by the *Empire* for the best essay on "The Patriotic Influence of Hoisting the Flag on the school-house," for which a number of the schools

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competed. The successful competitor was the Chippawa Public School, by an essay which breathed a spirit that would do no discredit to the patriotism of our fathers who fought upon those plains, and upon which many of them fell; and there seems to be a peculiar fitness, in addition to the merit of having won it, in Chippawa's being the possessor of that flag.

Should your Council see its way to offering a similar prize to the schools of the County, it would contribute in a special manner to the education of the rising generation in loyalty and patriotism.

REPORT OF HOUSE OF INDUSTRY.

To the Warden and Council of the County of Welland-

Your Committee on House of Industry beg leave to submit the following report:

The number of inmates at present in the Institution is 38, and the following have left since the first of January, 1891:

Wm. Hobbins, absconded.

Geo. Overholt, absent without leave, overstayed his leave.

Harry Doyle, absconded.

E Van Sickle, absconded, overstayed his leave.

M. Irving, absconded, overstayed his leave.

Ino. Brooks, " " " "

Five deaths have occurred during the same period.

Two of the most troublesome inmates, who have required con-

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stant care and watching, have been removed to the Orillia asylum. There are two or three others who should be removed to the same or some other similar institution as soon as possible.

A woman, Sarah Allen, in an advanced state of pregnancy, was committed on the third day of March from the Town of Niagara Falls, being certified as a person duly entitled to be placed on the insane and destitute list. During her confinement it was found necessary to call in Dr. W. A. Smith to attend upon her, as there was not sufficient time to notify the regular physician.

Your Committee found a considerable quantity of tile purchased last year still unlaid, and directed the Keeper to have these put into the ground, which has been done at a total cost of about \$18.17. There yet remains a strip of ground which has been furrowed out and prepared for underdraining, but as there were no tile on hand to finish the same, and having regard to the expressed opinion of your Council in reference to further underdraining works, your Committee declined to authorize the purchase of any more tile to carry on the work.

John Ford, an inmate who absconded from the House of Industry last fall, was picked up in a nearly frozen condition near Grimsby and committed to the General and Marine Hospital at St. Catharines. An account for his care, amounting to \$28.70, was transmitted to and paid by your Committee, and he was returned to the House as soon as he was in a fit condition to be removed.

The cost of removing the inmates Clark and Ray to Orillia asylum amounted to \$40.80.

The expenditure outside of ordinary running expenses has been small, the only items worthy of mention being the purchase of a new lawn-mower, the one formerly used being entirely worn out, at a cost of \$6.50; one hand roller, \$14; post for grape vines, \$2.52; maple trees to replace those which had died, \$5, and a small quantity of plank to repair the sidewalk through Mr. Price's lot, which has proved a great convenience.

Dr. Emmett presented an account of \$46.50 for surgical instru-

ments purchased by him from J. Stevens & Co., and which he informed your Committee were needful for the use of the Institution. When this account was first presented the instruments apparently were not in the office at the House of Industry, and as they were purchased without the authority of the Committee, we beg to refer the amount to the Council for payment.

The policy for insurance on the buildings has been renewed at the reduced rate of sixty cents on the \$100, thereby effecting a saving of \$12.

Since the middle of April but one female servant has been employed, the other one having left at that time.

MEMORIAL TO PROVINCIAL SECRETARY RE NIAGARA FALLS AWARD.

To Sir Alexander Campbell, K. C. M. G., Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Ontario—

The Memorial of the Council of the County of Welland:

HUMBLY SHEWETH—Whereas the Town of Niagara Falls, then the Town of Clifton in the County of Welland, withdrew from the jurisdiction of the said County on the first day of July, A.D. 1881, for the term of five years, and such withdrawal was confirmed by proclamation of the then Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario:

And whereas an Arbitration was held between the said County and Town to determine the compensation to be paid by the said Town to the said County on account of such withdrawal, and an award was made which continued in force from the first day of July, 1881, to the first day of July, 1886;

And whereas on the 26th day of January, A.D. 1887, his honour the Lieutenant-Governor did approve of a certain order in Council made, declaring that the then existing award should cease;

And whereas an Arbitration was held between the said Town and County, and an award made on the 21st day of March, A.D. 1887, fixing the amount to be paid by the said Town to the said County as compensation on account of said withdrawal, and providing that said award should be and continue in force from the first day of July, 1886, to the first day of July, 1891;

And whereas the said Council have expended, since the said last mentioned award was entered into, in the erection of residences for the officials of the County Gaol, the sum of or about the sum of five thousand dollars, under the direction of the Inspector of Gaols and Prisons for Ontario;

And whereas the assessed value of real and personal property has greatly increased in the said Town of Niagara Falls, and the in-

crease has been much greater proportionately than in the remainder of the said County;

Your Memorialists therefore humbly pray that you may be pleased to direct that the amount of the compensation determined in the above mentioned award, dated the twenty-first day of March, A.D. 1887, be reconsidered, and that the existing arrangement shall cease on and after the first day of July, A.D. 1891, being the termination of the five years mentioned in said award.

On a Report dated 9th February, 1891, from the Minister of

the Interior, stating that in the month of April, 1889, the Memorial attached hereto was submitted by the Municipal Council of the County of Welland, in the Province of Ontario, showing that a certain tract of Ordnance land extending south-westerly from the point of junction of the Garrison Road and Lake Shore Road in the Village of Fort Erie to Helena street in the Township of Bertie, formerly occupied by the Buffalo and Brantford Railway Company, has been abandoned by the said Company and has reverted to the Crown; that the land has been occupied as a public road since the year 1873, and kept in repair by the Municipalities of Fort Erie and Bertie, and and that its use as a public road is of great benefit to the residents of the locality;

The Minister further states that the Memorialists ask that the Municipalities of Bertie and Fort Erie may be confirmed in the possession of the tract of land, to be used as a public highway, and in the event of the grant being made to them they agree to execute a conveyance to the Crown of that portion of Leopold Street extending in an Easterly direction from the east side of Albert Street to Mary Street, as shown colored blue on the copy of a plan prepared by Geo.
