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NOTE.

The need of means to help and guide in social worship those who are debarred by circumstances from Church services, was brought to the attention of the General Assembly at Winnipeg in 1897. The matter was referred to the Committee on the Uniformity of Worship for its consideration. That Committee reported to the Assembly at Montreal in 1898, and the Assembly appointed a Special Committee to take steps to prepare a devotional Manual, and send copies to all the Ministers of the Church for their information and consideration. The Special Committee having carried out their instructions reported to the Assembly at Hamilton in 1899, (*vide* the Acts and Proceedings, pages 74 and 311). The report was adopted and the Manual submitted by the Committee was remitted to Presbyteries.

At the Assembly at Halifax, June, 1900, the Committee reported (*vide* the Acts and Proceedings, pages 48, 61 and 287), and submitted the Manual revised in accordance with the views expressed by Presbyteries. The Assembly thereupon directed certain emendations to be made, and instructed the Committee to take steps to bring the little work to the further consideration of the Church.

In order to carry out the injunction of the Assembly, the Committee has arranged with the Westminster Co., Limited, of Toronto, to publish the Manual.

NOTE NO. 2.

The following report of the Special Committee was presented to the General Assembly at Toronto, June 19th, 1902, and the Assembly resolved that the Report be received and the Committee continued :

To the Venerable the General Assembly :

The Assembly at Winnipeg in 1897 had its attention directed to the need of providing some means of aiding and promoting social worship among groups of settlers and others who for the time being find themselves removed from the regular church services, and have no person able and willing to undertake to conduct services in the ordinary way. The subject was referred to a committee with instructions to consider and report

At the following Assembly in Montreal, 1898, a report having been received in favor of action, this Special Committee was appointed with instructions to prepare a Manual having the special objects in view, and to send a copy to each minister.

At the Assembly held in Hamilton in 1899, the Special Committee reported that they had complied with the instructions of the Assembly, that they had prepared a Manual entitled "Aids for Social Worship," and that they had printed an edition of 1,500 copies for distribution among ministers and elders, with the view of ascertaining the mind of the Church. The Manual having been received with a measure of favor, the Committee was instructed to submit it to Presbyteries.

At the Assembly in Halifax in 1900, the Special Committee, having carried out the directions given them, reported that they had heard from twenty-seven Presbyteries, and that all but three expressed approval of the object of the Assembly, and that twenty Presbyteries viewed with more or less favor the form and substance of the Manual submitted. There was, however, a divergence of opinion on some minor points, and it became the duty of the Committee, under the directions of the Assembly, to eliminate certain portions of the work, and ascertain further the mind of the Church

Having complied with the Assembly's injunctions, the Committee submitted a revised edition to Presbyteries, and reported progress at the Assembly in Ottawa in 1901. The Assembly instructed the Committee to complete the revision of the Manual, and submit it at next meeting for approval.

Again the Committee invited all Presbyteries to give expression of their views in all respects, and, moreover, publicly intimated through the Presbyterian magazines, that copies would be furnished free of charge to any members of the Church desirous of examining the work, with a view to render it more suitable for the purpose designed.

The Committee now report that the little volume, in its revised form, is generally received with favor. One Presby-

tery only, though fully recognizing the need of such a Manual, asks for further revision in literary style. The Synod of Hamilton and London has formally recommended the Manual for use.

Urgent requests have been received from missionaries and from students working in outlying parts of the Dominion, for a number of copies of the Manual. Under these circumstances, and in view of the design of the work, as set forth in the preface, the Committee have ventured to anticipate the wishes of the Assembly, and have placed at the disposal of each of those so desiring, ten, and in one case thirty, copies of the Manual, free of charge.

Officers commanding the contingents sent from Canada to South Africa, have gratefully accepted a number of copies of the Manual for use by themselves and the troops, in the absence of a chaplain. British officers elsewhere have sent for and obtained copies for use under similar circumstances.

Having endeavoured faithfully to carry out the instructions of the Assembly, the Committee now submit the result of their labors, in the hope that it may meet the purposes desired for a few years until something better takes its place. It has come to the knowledge of the Committee, since their appointment, that the need of such a work is great, and they hope and believe that, with God's blessing, this little Manual, in spite of its imperfections, will prove profitable to many, and eventually result in great benefit to the whole Church

All of which is respectfully submitted.

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PREFACE.

The want of suitable aids to worship on the Lord's Day is constantly felt in remote parts of the Dominion by those who are, for the time, cut off from the ordinary ministrations of the Church, and who desire to unite in the worship of God.

The design of this Manual is to furnish aids to social worship for those so situated. It may be found helpful to Pioneer-settlers, Explorers, Miners, Prospectors, Mounted Police, Volunteers on Military duty, Travellers by land or sea, Visitors to summer resorts, and other persons.

One complete Service is submitted, which may be followed as it is given, but from time to time it may be found desirable to modify the words. To effect this end, other prayers are furnished, any of which may be substituted, and thus, without changing the order, the Service may be varied at discretion, or complete Services may be arranged such as the four additional Services outlined on pages 16 to 19.

The alternative prayers appended to the Service submitted as a model, are arranged

under the headings "Invocation," "Confession," "Supplication," "Intercession," etc., but these names are used chiefly for convenience of reference. The spirit of adoration, gratitude and thanksgiving pervades all.

While the introduction of extemporaneous prayer is not excluded, the aim has been to impart to each service unity and completeness when the forms are read in the order indicated.

The model Service is taken with very slight change from "Short Sunday Services for Travellers," issued primarily for the use of surveying parties engaged on the Canadian Pacific Railway, in 1871 and following years. From the same source has been taken a number of the alternative prayers. The other prayers in the Manual have generally been taken from Presbyterian devotional works, such as the service books issued in connection with the United Presbyterian, the Free, and the Established Churches of Scotland. Some of the prayers have been supplied by members of the Assembly's Special Committee.

As the purpose of this Manual is to help and guide groups of individuals in out of the way

places to unite in common worship, and as there may, in some cases, be no one present familiar with the conduct of Divine Service, it is deemed advisable to furnish somewhat minute explanations and instructions for the guidance of such as may desire them. These instructions will be found at the end of the Manual.

Behold,

FORM OF SERVICE.

(The worshippers being assembled, the Reader may begin by reading the following, or a selection from the introductory sentences appended.)

FELLOW WORSHIPPERS,—

The Lord has said—

“Remember the Sabbath Day, to keep it holy.”

(Under some circumstances the following within brackets may be omitted :)

(Though for the present we are deprived of the regular service to which we have each been accustomed, yet we know that wherever men meet for the worship of God there He will be to hear and to bless them. He is the Father of us all, our constant Guardian and Protector.) Let us, therefore, as is most fitting on this Holy Day of Rest, unite as one family in the solemn duty and precious privilege of worshipping Him; and let us beseech with earnest prayer our Lord Jesus Christ, Who is the faithful guide of those who journey, and the unwearying guardian of those who sojourn, that He may bless us now assembled in His Name. May He help us worthily to praise Him for His

mercies, and ever to acknowledge Him in our rising up and lying down. Let us commend ourselves to His care, that He may strengthen us in mind and in body, prosper us in our undertakings, and direct our steps in the way of truth and righteousness, peace and prosperity.

The Prayer of Invocation.

(All assuming a devout attitude the Reader may proceed with the following, or substitute any other prayer of Invocation found under this heading.)

LET US PRAY.

Most Holy and Eternal God, look down in mercy upon Thy children now assembled before Thee, and let Thy Fatherly blessing be upon us and abide with us. Vouchsafe unto us Thy gracious and comforting presence, and let Thy heavenly peace rule in our hearts; grant us a true apprehension of Thy Divine Majesty, and a deep sense of our unworthiness; that so, approaching Thee with lowliness and devotion, we may commune with Thee in the spirit of Jesus Christ Our Lord. *Amen.*

(At the end of this and all other prayers the worshippers should signify their assent by saying *Amen.*)

A HYMN

(May be sung or read from the selection of Hymns appended.)

The Prayer of Confession.

(Other prayers will be found under this heading, any of which may be substituted for the following :)

LET US PRAY.

O God, Whose nature and property is ever to have mercy and to forgive, receive our humble petitions; and though we be tied and bound with the chain of our sins, yet let the pitifulness of Thy great mercy loose us; for the honour of Jesus Christ our Mediator and Advocate. *Amen.*

Almighty God, Who, though dwelling in the highest heavens, yet vouchsafest to regard the lowest creatures on earth, we humbly adore Thy Sacred Majesty, and with all the powers of our souls exalt and praise Thy Holy Name for the infinite blessings Thou hast so fully bestowed upon us; for electing us in Thy love and creating us in Thine image; for redeeming us by Thy Son, and sanctifying us by Thy Holy Spirit; for preserving us in all the changes and accidents of this life, and raising up our

thoughts to the hope of a better life; we devoutly thank Thee for Thy gracious protection during the past week, and for bringing us safely to this sacred day of rest. Continue, O Lord, Thy mercy to us, and as to-day Thou hast awakened our bodies from sleep, so raise our souls from sin, that during this week and every week we, unfeignedly renouncing all sin, may walk soberly, righteously, and godly, from day to day, in all holy obedience, before Thy face, through Jesus Christ Our Lord. *Amen.*

LET US PRAY.

Deliver us, Merciful God, from the evils that surround us, and guide our feet in the way of peace. May we carefully avoid all occasions of sin, and when, through frailty, we forget Thee, do Thou, in Thy mercy, remember us, so that as often as we fall by the evil propensity of our nature we may rise again by the help of Thy grace. Make us diligent and faithful in the duties of our calling, and in all the cares and crosses of the world may we be submissive to Thy divine will and pleasure. Let Thy blessing be upon our actions, and may Thy good Spirit direct our intentions, that both may tend to advance Thy glory, the good of others, and the eternal salvation of our own souls, through Jesus Christ our Saviour, Who, with Thee and the Holy Ghost, liveth and reigneth ever one God, world without end. *Amen.*

O our God, Who art present everywhere, bestow Thy favourable regard on us, Thy unworthy servants. Cause us to be assured that even in the lonely wilderness, on

the boundless prairie, in the trackless forest, on the mountain side, on the open sea, Thou art ever at hand to hear those who call upon Thee, and that whatsoever place may be hallowed by Thy true worship, shall prove none other than the House of God and the gate of heaven. *Amen.*

To Thy fatherly kindness and protection we solemnly commend not ourselves only but our beloved relatives and our friends, from whom we are at present separated. We earnestly beseech Thee to remember them with the favour Thou bearest to Thy people and visit them with Thy salvation. Graciously hear all these our supplications, for the sake of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. *Amen.*

O Lord, shew Thy mercy upon us: And grant us Thy salvation.

O God Most High, save the Queen : And replenish her plenteously with heavenly gifts.

Regard with Thy favour the Governor-General : And give guidance to all in authority (in this Dominion.)

Endue Thy ministers with righteousness : And make Thy chosen people joyful.

Make our country prosperous and peaceful : And let truth and justice, religion and piety, flourish and abound amongst us.

O God, make clean our hearts within us : And take not Thy Holy Spirit from us.

O Lord, deal not with us according to our sins ; Neither reward us according to our iniquities.

Be unto us a tower of strength : From the face of the enemy.

Let no evil happen unto us : Nor the son of iniquity approach to hurt us.

Blessed be the Lord daily : And may the God of our salvation make our goings prosperous.

May the crooked ways be made straight : And the rough places plain.

May the Lord give His angels charge over us : To keep us in all our ways.

O Lord, hear our prayer : And let our cry come unto Thee.

(Then may be said by all together.)

Our Father, Who art in Heaven, hallowed be Thy name; Thy kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven; give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive them that trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil; for Thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

(The following or other HYMN OF PRAISE appended may be read. If the worshippers generally are prepared to join, they may read the lines in italics.)

WE PRAISE THEE, O GOD; we acknowledge Thee to be the Lord.

Thine honourable, true—and only SON ;

Also the HOLY GHOST—the Comforter.

Thou art the King of glory—O Christ.

Thou art the everlasting Son—of the Father.

Thou didst humble Thyself to be born of
a Virgin.*

When Thou hadst overcome the sharpness
of death—Thou didst open the King-
dom of Heaven to all believers.

*Thou sittest at the right hand of God—in the
glory of the Father.*

our Judge.

*We therefore pray Thee, help Thy servants—
whom Thou hast redeemed with Thy
precious Blood.*

Make them to be numbered with Thy
saints—in glory everlasting.

O Lord, save Thy people—and bless Thine heritage.

Govern them—and lift them up forever.

Day by day—we magnify Thee.

And we worship Thy name—ever world without end.

Vouchsafe, O Lord, to keep us this day without sin.

O Lord, have mercy upon us, have mercy upon us.

O Lord, let Thy mercy lighten upon us, as our trust is in Thee.

O Lord, in Thee have I trusted; let me never be confounded.

(In the event of there being no person present to address the congregation, or no sermon to be read, the Ten Commandments and the Beatitudes may be introduced.)

The Concluding Prayer.

LET US PRAY.

O God, Who didst lead Abraham Thy Servant out of Ur of the Chaldees, and pre-

servedst him unhurt throughout the days of his pilgrimage: we beseech Thee to take us Thy servants under Thy Almighty protection. Be unto us a Helper in our duties. Be our Solace by the way, our Shadow from the heat, and our Comfort in the cold. Be our Refuge from the storm, and our Support in weariness. Be our Guardian in danger, our Staff in slippery places, and our Physician in sickness. From first to last be our Ruler and our Guide, and, when our earthly pilgrimage is over, may we share the joys and peace of Thy heavenly home, through the grace and love of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. *Amen.*

The Commandments.

(When the commandments are used in any service, the Reader shall say)

Let us join together in reading the Ten Commandments as they are recorded in the Book of Exodus, Chapter twentieth at the first verse.

(ALL STANDING.)

(These Commandments should be read audibly by the Reader alone, who will pause after each.)

FIRST.

And God spake all these words, saying :
I am the Lord Thy God, which have brought thee out of the land of Egypt, out of the house of bondage. Thou shalt have no other Gods before Me.

SECOND.

Thou shalt not make unto Thee any graven image or any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth : thou shalt not bow down thyself to them, nor serve them : for I the Lord thy God am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children unto the third and fourth generation of them that hate Me ; and showing mercy unto thousands of them that love Me, and keep My commandments.

THIRD.

Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord thy God in vain : for the Lord will not hold him guiltless that taketh His name in vain.

FOURTH.

Remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy. Six days shalt thou labour and do all thy work : but the seventh is the Sabbath of the Lord thy God : in it thou shalt not do any work, thou, nor thy son, nor thy daughter, thy man-servant nor thy maid-servant, nor thy cattle, nor thy stranger that is within thy gates : for in six days the Lord made heaven and earth, the sea, and all that in them is, and rested the seventh day : wherefore the Lord blessed the Sabbath day, and hallowed it.

FIFTH.

Honour thy father and thy mother : that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee.

SIXTH.

Thou shalt not kill.

SEVENTH.

Thou shalt not commit adultery.

EIGHTH.

Thou shalt not steal.

NINTH.

Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbour.

TENTH.

Thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's house, thou shalt not covet thy neighbour's wife, nor his man-servant, nor his maid-servant, nor his ox, nor his ass, nor anything that is thy neighbour's.

(All the Worshipers may say together)

Lord have mercy upon us: and write all these Thy laws in our hearts, we beseech Thee. Amen.

(THE READER ALONE)

Hear also what our Lord Jesus Christ saith:—Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy mind. This is the first and great commandment. And the second is like unto it. Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets.

Lobe thy neighbour as thyself.

The Beatitudes.

(When the Beatitudes are used in any service, the
Reader shall say)

Let us join together in reading the Beatitudes of our Lord Jesus Christ, as recorded in the Gospel according to Matthew, Chapter fifth, third verse :

(ALL STANDING.)

(These should be read audibly by the Reader alone, who will pause after each verse.)

Blessed are the poor in spirit : for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

Blessed are they that mourn : for they shall be comforted.

Blessed are the meek : for they shall inherit the earth.

Blessed are they which do hunger and thirst after righteousness : for they shall be filled.

Blessed are the merciful : for they shall obtain mercy.

Blessed are the pure in heart : for they shall see God.

Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God.

Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

(All the Worshippers may say together)

Write these words in our hearts, we beseech Thee, O Lord. Amen.

ALTERNATIVE INTRODUCTORY SENTENCES

No. 1.

Seek ye the Lord while He may be found ; call upon Him while He is near. Let the wicked forsake his way, and the unrighteous man his thoughts ; and let him return unto the Lord, and He will have mercy upon him, and to our God, for He will abundantly pardon.

Brethren, we are here met in obedience to the command that we forsake not the assembling of ourselves together, and in the hope of that promise which our Lord gave to His disciples, that wherever two or three shall meet together in His name He will be in the midst of them. Let us therefore, with reverence and godly fear, draw nigh to the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy and find grace to help in time of need.

No. 2.

Who shall ascend into the hill of the Lord? or who shall stand in His holy place?

He that hath clean hands and a pure heart; who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully.

He shall receive the blessing from the Lord, and righteousness from the God of his salvation.

The hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship Him.

Brethren, let us with humble and contrite hearts draw near to the throne of grace, in the name of our great High Priest and Advocate, Jesus Christ.

No. 3.

Behold, bless ye the Lord, all ye servants of the Lord, which by night stand in the house of the Lord.

It is a good thing to give thanks unto the Lord, and to sing praises unto Thy Name, O Most High: to show forth thy loving kindness in the morning, and Thy faithfulness every night.

Let my prayer be set forth before Thee

as incense : and the lifting up of my hands
as the evening sacrifice.

No. 4.

This is the day the Lord hath made : we
will rejoice and be glad in it.

Our help is in the name of the Lord who
hath made heaven and earth.

Let us, therefore, fellow Christians, unite
in offering to the Lord our God thanks and
praise for all His unspeakable mercies. Let
us remember that the Lord is nigh to all
that call upon Him, to all that call upon
Him in truth.

Though the Lord be high, yet hath He
respect unto the lowly : but the proud He
knoweth afar off.

He will fulfil the desire of them that fear
Him ; He also will hear their cry and will
save them.

No. 5.

Serve the Lord with gladness ; come be-
fore His presence with singing. Enter into
His gates with thanksgiving, and into His
courts with praise : be thankful unto Him
and bless His name.

Blessed is the people that know the joy-
ful sound : they shall walk, O Lord, in the

light of Thy countenance. In Thy name shall they rejoice all the day : and in Thy righteousness shall they be exalted.

As for me, I will come into Thy house in the multitude of Thy mercy : and in Thy fear will I worship toward Thy holy temple.

No. 6.

Let all the earth fear the Lord : let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of Him.

Behold, the eye of the Lord is upon them that fear Him, upon them that hope in His mercy.

Surely His salvation is nigh them that fear Him; that glory may dwell in our land.

No. 7.

Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised. Honour and majesty are before Him : strength and beauty are in His sanctuary.

Who in the Heaven can be compared with the Lord ? Who among the sons of the mighty can be likened unto the Lord ?

Who shall not fear Thee, O Lord, and glorify Thy name ? for Thou only art holy.

O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt His name together.

No. 8.

The Lord is nigh unto all them that call upon Him, to all that call upon him in truth. He will fulfil the desire of them that fear Him; He also will hear their cry and will save them.

This is the confidence that we have in Him, that if we ask anything according to His will, He heareth us.

Having these promises, let us draw near to the Throne of Grace with true hearts, in full assurance of faith.

No. 9.

If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.

If we confess our sins, God is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Rend your hearts, and not your garments, and turn unto the Lord your God : for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and of great kindness, and repenteth Him of the evil.

No. 10.

From the rising of the sun unto the going down of the same, the Lord's name is to be praised. The Lord is high above all

nations, and His glory above the heavens. Who is like unto the Lord our God, who dwelleth on high, who humbleth Himself to behold the things that are in heaven and in the earth ?

If two of you shall agree on earth as touching anything they shall ask, it shall be done for them of my Father which is in heaven. For where two or three are gathered together in My name, there am I in the midst of them.

have transgressed Thy holy laws in thought, word and deed.

We have not loved Thee with all our hearts; neither have we loved our neighbours as ourselves.

We have loved the world and the things that are of the world, and have not set our affection upon things above, nor laid up treasure in heaven, where Christ, our risen Lord, sitteth at Thy right hand.

No. 5.

No. 8.

O God, Who hast taught us that there is joy in heaven over one sinner that repenteth, accept we beseech Thee, the confession of our sins which we now make to Thee. Father, we have sinned and done evil in Thy sight; we have been disobedient and rebellious children, we have not loved Thee as we ought; but have broken Thy laws and been unthankful for Thy goodness. We have not loved our neighbour as ourselves, we have been selfish and unkind, we have forgotten the commandments of Christ, our Master. No. 9.

For all these our manifold offences and iniquities we do beseech Thy mercy; through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Grant, merciful Lord, unto Thy people pardon and peace, that we may be cleansed from all our sins, and that we may serve Thee with a quiet mind; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

No. 10.

Almighty God, Who art rich in mercy to all them that call upon Thee, hear us as we come to Thee humbly confessing our sins and imploring Thy pity and forgiveness. We have broken Thy holy laws by our deeds and by our words, and by the sinful affections of our hearts. We confess before Thee our disobedience and ingratitude, our pride and wilfulness, and all our great and manifold shortcomings both towards Thee and towards our fellow men.

O Lord, who despisest not the sighing of the contrite heart, have mercy upon Thy penitent children. Our hope is in Thee alone. Forgive us all the sins we have committed, and grant that, being saved from our iniquities, and made worthy to stand before Thee, we may henceforth serve Thee in truth; through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

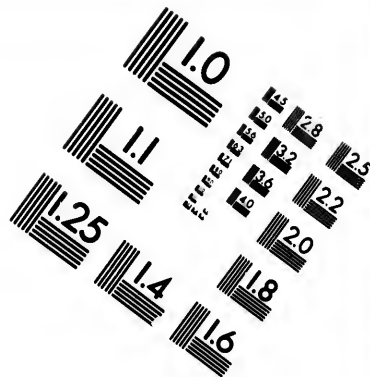
No. 7.

O God, who art good unto all men, and whose tender mercies are over all Thy works, receive in Thy mercy the intercessions we offer unto Thee.

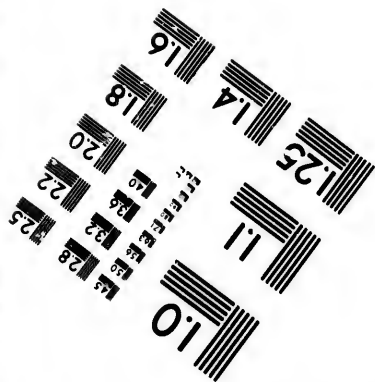

Grant that over all the hostile powers of evil we may be more than conquerors, through Him that loveth us. Enable us by Thy grace, to fight the good fight of faith ; to lay hold upon eternal life which Thou hast promised to bestow on everyone that overcometh.

Most merciful God, by Whose providence are all things which come into the lives of men, whether of suffering which Thou permittest, or of joy and gladness which Thou

givest, look we beseech Thee with eyes of compassion on the dear ones from whom we are separated. Be pleased, we beseech Thee, to pour down upon them the abundance of Thy mercy. Abide with them and bless them and let Thy heavenly peace rest in their hearts.

Incline Thine ear to these our humble prayers Through Jesus Christ our Lord, in whose name we further pray,

Our Father who art in Heaven, etc.

For the Army and Navy.

O Almighty, Lord God, Source of all Strength, King of Kings and Governor of the nations, we commend to Thy Fatherly care the men who are serving our Empire on land and sea, beseeching Thee to take them under Thine own protection and favorably to regard the cause of our Queen and Country. Be to them a Tower of Strength in the midst of danger. Lead them at all times to find courage by looking up to Thee, Who art the only giver of victory.

Almighty and most merciful Father, who rulest over all the Kingdoms of the World,

and disposest of them according to Thy good pleasure, we beseech Thee to forgive our individual and national sins, and grant us evermore as a people to use the power and every means which Thou givest us to the advancement of Thy kingdom; seeking always deliverance of the oppressed and as much as lieth in us, the good of all mankind. O Thou, Who art our Strength, our Refuge and our Everlasting Hope, fill the world with Thy glory, and by the radiance of Thy light, enlighten all the nations, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

Morning Prayers.

No. 1.

Heavenly Father, our Creator and our Preserver, we would return to Thee to give Thee thanks for the rest of the past night, and for Thy goodness and mercy in bringing us to a new day. Entering upon another period of our pilgrimage we commend ourselves and all who are dear to us, in body and in soul, to Thy protecting care. May no dangers befall us; may no perils beset our path; may no burdens come upon us

that we shall not be able to bear; may no temptations await us that we shall not be able to resist. Merciful Father, remember our weakness and give us strength to overcome sin. If our hearts have wandered from Thee may Thy love bring us back to Thy service. Assist us, O Lord, to feel our responsibilities and faithfully perform our duties. We implore the aid and guidance of Thy Holy Spirit throughout this day and henceforth; through Jesus Christ, our Lord. *Amen.*

Our Father, Who art in Heaven, etc.

No. 2.

We thank Thee, Heavenly Father, that Thou hast mercifully cared for us during the hours of darkness, and for the life and comforts which a new day brings us. Thou art daily loading us with Thy benefits; help us to show forth Thy praise.

Forgive us, we beseech Thee, our forgetfulness of Thee, and our disobedience to Thy holy law, and grant us Thy grace that henceforth we may try to please Thee in all that we say or do.

Bless us this day—and make us a blessing to others. Help us to save precious time. Strengthen us against temptation. Keep us

from danger and sin. May we live as Thou wouldst have us to live, and strive daily to do the things which are pleasing in Thy sight. Bless our dear friends. Remember in Thy mercy the sick, the sorrowing, and the poor, and do them all the good they need.

Hear this our morning prayer and help us reverently to pray as Christ has taught us.

Our Father, Who art in Heaven, &c.

No. 3.

Most Merciful Father, be pleased to accept our morning prayers. Look favourably upon us, we beseech Thee, while we bow before Thee. We come confessing our sins, and imploring afresh Thy continued protection.

We thank Thee for the mercies of the past, and for the measure of health and strength which Thou hast given us with the new day. Suffer us not to think little of our daily blessings because they are continually renewed to us. Give us, we beseech Thee, grateful hearts, and make us truly thankful for all Thy merciful kindness, and enable us to show our thankfulness by daily endeavouring to honour Thee in all that we do.

Thou, Lord, knowest the faults of each one of us ; we pray Thee to forgive them and incline us henceforth to walk humbly and diligently in Thy ways. We pray Thee to have compassion on us ; remove our ignorances of heavenly things and graciously pour Thy Holy Spirit upon us.

We know that we are disposed to evil, and to wander from Thee ; give us, we pray Thee, Thy sustaining hand, and guide us by Thy counsel. Whatever holy purposes Thy Spirit may awaken in our hearts, enable us to carry them into practice.

Merciful Father, be with the dear ones whom we love, wherever they are and whatever they may be doing, be their guardian and protector. May we and all dear to us be united to Thee in bonds which shall never be broken. Lord, grant to these our humble prayers an answer of mercy and peace, for the sake of Thy Son, Jesus Christ our Saviour. *Amen.*

Evening Prayers.

No. 1.

O Lord God, in Whose presence there is no darkness, keep and defend us in soul and

body, during the coming night and in all the darkness of this mortal life.

May we rest in the assurance of Thy favour; in the peace of a good conscience; in the hope of a better life; in the faith of Thy providence and protection; and in the love of Thy Spirit. May we rise up again in renewed health and strength for our several callings, to work the work of God while the day lasts, seeing the night cometh in which no man can work. And whether we wake or sleep, may we live together with Christ.

Lighten our darkness, we beseech Thee, O Lord; and by Thy great mercy defend us from all perils and dangers of this night, for the love of Thy only Son, our Saviour, Jesus Christ. *Amen.*

No. 2.

Blessed art Thou, O Lord, Who hast spared us during another day and hast brought us to the beginning of the night. Hear our prayers, and those of all Thy people: forgive us all our sins, negligences and ignorances: accept our evening supplications, and send down on Thine inheritance the fulness of Thy mercy and compassion.

Compass us about with Thy holy angels: arm us with the armour of Thy righteousness, and guard us by Thy power: deliver us from every assault and device of the adversary, and grant that we may pass this night and all the days and nights of our life in fulness of peace and holiness, without sin or offence, through Jesus Christ our Lord. *Amen.*

No. 3.

Accept, O Merciful Father, our thanksgiving for the mercies of the past day and of our past lives. We humbly acknowledge that to Thee we owe all we are and all we have. This night, we pray Thee, give us refreshing sleep to prepare and strengthen us, both in soul and body, for the duties of a new day and for any trials that may await us. We resign ourselves and all that is ours, and all who are dear to us, to Thy ever wakeful Providence, most humbly beseeching Thee that we may rise from our beds with hearts thankful, pure and devoted to Thy service, through Jesus Christ, our Lord.

O Thou Keeper of Israel, Who neither slumberest nor sleepest, be pleased in Thy mercy to watch over us this night, and

make us ever mindful of the time when we shall lie down in the dust. Preserve us while waking, and defend us while sleeping, that when we are awake we may watch with Christ, and when we sleep we may rest in peace. *Amen.*

Our Father, Who art in Heaven, etc.

A General Prayer.

We beseech Thee, O Heavenly Father, permit us to draw near unto Thee, while we humbly ask Thee to forgive whatever Thou hast seen amiss in us during our past lives; we offer Thee our hearty thanks for all that Thou hast done for us and pray that Thou wilt continue Thy goodness to us.

Through our frailty we have often offended against Thy holy law;

We have left undone those things which we ought to have done;

We have done those things which we ought not to have done;

May it please thee to cleanse us from our secret faults, and to keep us also from presumptuous sins;

Deliver us from anger, hatred, malice
and all uncharitableness ;

Keep us from hasty and hateful temper,
and dispose us to be kind and helpful to
each other and to all men ;

Inspire us with upright thoughts, pure
affections and chaste desires ;

O, Almighty Father, Who art kind to all,
even to the unthankful and to the evil, we
humbly praise Thee for Thy goodness to us
during the past, for our life and health,
our food and clothing, our friends and kin-
dred, and for Thy continual guidance and
protection. We beseech Thee to give us
help and strength to resist the Evil One and
to overcome sin. May Thy Holy Spirit ac-
company us henceforth, and so fill our hearts
that we may firmly believe in Thee, love
and reverence Thee, and keep Thy com-
mandments. Give us, we beseech Thee,
those blessings which Thou hast promised
to all who love and serve Thee.

O Lord, make us poor in spirit, that ours
may be the Kingdom of Heaven.

Make us to mourn for sin, that we may
be comforted by Thy grace.

Make us meek, O Lord, that we may inherit the earth.

Make us to hunger and thirst after righteousness, that we may be filled therewith.

Make us merciful, O Lord, that we may obtain mercy.

Make us pure in heart, that we may see Thee, our God.

Make us peace-makers, that we may be called the children of God.

Make us willing to be persecuted for righteousness' sake, that ours may be the Kingdom of Heaven.

Make us willing to be reviled and persecuted and have all manner of evil said against us falsely, for Christ's sake, that we may have our reward in Heaven.

Almighty Father, by Whose care and providence we are preserved and comforted, we beseech Thee to watch over all who are near and dear to us; shield them from all harm; keep them from all sin; and be with them to guide them in all their ways.

O God, our Father, grant us Thy heavenly grace, that we may so live from day to day, as in all things to please Thee; and seeing

we know neither the day nor the hour of our Master's coming, may we be always ready, so that living or dying we may be Thine; through the love and merits and mediation of Thy Son, Jesus Christ, our Saviour. *Amen.*

**May the very God of Peace sanctify us wholly,
and may our whole Spirit, and Soul and
Body, be preserved blameless unto
the coming of our Lord
Jesus Christ.**

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A Burial Service.

Blessed are the Dead which die
in the Lord from
henceforth.

The Burial of the Dead.

On account of climate and other reasons, it may be convenient and desirable to have a service at the house, to be followed by a short prayer at the grave.

The service may begin by reading Scripture sentences suitable to the circumstances, selected from the following :

We brought nothing into this world, and it is certain we can carry nothing out.—
I. Tim. VI. 7.

Lord make me know mine end, and the measure of my days, what it is ; that I may know how frail I am. Behold Thou hast made my days as an hand-breadth : and mine age is as nothing before Thee : verily every man at his best state is altogether vanity—*Ps. XXXIX. 4-5.*

The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away ; Blessed be the name of the Lord.—
Job I. 21.

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble, therefore will we not fear.—*Ps. XLVI. 1.*

Like as a father pitieth his children, so the Lord pitieth them that fear Him. For He knoweth our frame. He remembereth that we are dust : as for man his days are as grass : as a flower of the field so He flour-

isheth. For the wind passeth over it and it is gone, and the place thereof shall know it no more. But the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear him, and his righteousness unto children's children—*Ps. CIII. 13-17.*

Jesus saith, I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in Me though he were dead, yet shall he live: and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die—*John XI. 25-26.*

(The following may be read at the burial of a young child, or Sam. 12, 15-23 :)

Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not; for of such is the Kingdom of God. Verily, I say unto you, whosoever shall not receive the Kingdom of God as a little child he shall not enter therein. And He took them up in His arms, put his hands upon them and blessed them.—*Mark X., 14-16.*

Even so, it is not the will of your Father which is in Heaven that one of these little ones should perish.—*Matt. XVIII. 14.*

(At the burial of the Aged the following may be read:)

The hoary head is a crown of glory if it be found in the way of righteousness.—*Prov. XVI. 31.*

The righteous shall flourish like the palm tree: he shall grow like a cedar in Lebanon. Those that be planted in the house of the Lord, shall flourish in the courts of our God. They shall still bring forth fruit in old age, they shall be fat and flourishing, to show that the Lord is upright. He is my Rock; and there is no unrighteousness in Him.—*Psa. XCII. 12-15.*

Thou shalt come to thy grave in a full age; like as a shock of corn cometh in in his season.—*Job V. 26.*

(In case of sudden death the following may be read:)

Take ye heed, watch and pray; for ye know not when the time is, . . . for ye know not when the Master of the House cometh, at even, or at midnight, or at the cock-crowing, or in the morning; lest coming suddenly, he find you sleeping. And what I say unto you, I say unto you all, Watch.—*Mark XIII, 33-37.*

(Then may be read Psalm XC., which will be found in the Selection of Psalms in this Manual.)

(The following Lesson may then be read, the Reader saying : Let us hear the Word of God as it is written in the Fifteenth Chapter of St. Paul's First Epistle to the Corinthians, beginning with verse 20; or as alternative lines 1 Cor. 15, 1-19, and 2 Cor. 4-17, and 1 Thes. 4, 13-18.)

Now is Christ risen from the dead, and become the first fruits of them that slept. For since by man came death, by man came also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, even so in Christ shall all be made alive. But every man in his own order; Christ the first fruits; afterward they that are Christ's at His coming.

But some man will say, how are the dead raised up? and with what body do they come? thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened except it die. And that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat, or of some other grain; but God giveth it a body as it hath pleased Him, and to every seed his own body. So also is the resurrection of the dead. It is sown in corruption, it is raised in incorruption; it is sown in dishonour, it is raised in glory; it is

sown in weakness, it is raised in power; it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body. There is a natural body, and there is a spiritual body. Now this, I say, brethren, that flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God; neither doth corruption inherit incorruption.

Behold I show you a mystery; we shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound and the dead shall be raised incorruptible, and we shall be changed.

For this corruptible must put on incorruption, and this mortal must put on immortality. So when this corruptible shall have put on incorruption, and this mortal shall have put on immortality, then shall be brought to pass the saying that is written, death is swallowed up in victory. O death, where is thy sting? O grave where is thy victory? The sting of death is sin; and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God, which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore, my beloved brethren be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord.

(After these passages of Scripture the following prayer may be read:)

LET US PRAY.

Almighty and everlasting God, who sendest forth Thy Spirit and we are created, and Who takest away our breath and we die and return to the dust, we bow with reverence before Thy inscrutable judgments, remembering that Thou Who orderest all things according to Thine own will in Heaven and earth, art also our merciful and loving Father, who dost not willingly afflict nor grieve the children of men, but dost correct us that we may be partakers of Thy holiness. We would therefore be subject unto Thee, saying, the Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away: blessed be the name of the Lord.

Eternal and unchangeable Jehovah, with whom there is neither beginning of days nor end of years; we humble ourselves, as cometh perishing creatures, in Thy presence.

What is man O God, that Thou art mindful of him, or the son of man that Thou visitest him? Behold, Thou hast made our days as an handbreadth, and our age is as nothing before Thee.

O God our Father, who hast loved us, and hast given us everlasting consolation and good hope through grace; look with compassion, we beseech Thee, on the sorrowing friends and kindred of Thy servant whom Thou hast taken away. Enable them to say, Thy will be done.

Cause them to be persuaded in their hearts, that though this dispensation be afflicting, it is sent in love, and fraught with mercy. And let Thy fatherly chastening be sanctified, to the weaning of their affections from a vain world, and to their greater meetness for that better country, where sin and sorrow and death shall be no more.

O God, who art ever showing us, in Thy providence, no less than by the declarations of Thy word, that it is appointed unto men once to die, and that in the midst of life we are in death; make us deeply sensible, we beseech Thee, of the shortness and uncertainty of our time on earth; and give us grace to be watchful and prayerful, having our loins girt and our lights burning, as becometh servants waiting for their Lord, who know not the day nor the hour when He shall come to them. Let Thy Holy Spirit so lead us to walk before Thee

in holiness and righteousness all the days of our lives, that, when we have served Thee in our generation, we may depart in peace, and may, through the merits and grace of Thy beloved Son, be received into those blessed mansions of His Father's House, whither He has gone to prepare a place for all who love Him.

Our Father, Who art in Heaven, etc.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all ever more. *Amen.*

(Under some circumstances when it can be properly effected, it may be desirable at this stage to sing a favorite hymn of the departed.)

At the Grave.

(The following sentence from Scripture may be read :)

Man that is born of a woman is of few days and full of trouble. He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down. —(*Job XIV. 1-2.*) Then shall the dust return to the earth as it was; and the Spirit shall return unto God Who gave it. —(*Ecc. 12-7.*)

(When the body has been laid in the grave :)

Forasmuch as it hath pleased Almighty God to take out of this world the soul of the departed, we therefore commit the body to the ground*; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust; awaiting the general Resurrection in the last day, and the appearing of our Lord Jesus Christ; at whose second coming in glorious majesty to judge the world, the earth and the sea shall give up their dead; and the corruptible bodies of those who sleep in Him shall be changed and made like unto His own glorious body, according to the mighty working whereby he is able to subdue all things unto Himself.

(Then may be read)

And I heard a voice from Heaven saying unto me Write. Blessed are the dead which die in the Lord from henceforth : yea saith the Spirit, that they may rest from their labours; and their works do follow them.—
Rev. XIV. 13.

LET US PRAY.

Almighty and ever blessed God, beside this open grave we lift up our hearts unto Thee. We bless Thee that from the midst

*When this service is used at sea, substitute the words "We commit the body to the deep, awaiting the general Resurrection, etc."

of death and sorrow we can look up to Thee as our Refuge and Strength.

O Thou Who art the God of all comfort, Who healest the broken in heart and bindest up their wounds, mercifully look on those who are at this time bereaved. Be near to them in their sorrow and let their sorrow draw them nearer to Thee, and consecrate them to Thy service.

Let Thy grace enable them to say, not as we will but as Thou wilt, and in them let patience have her perfect work. May their minds be stayed on Thee, and be filled with Thy peace. Grant, O God, unto every one of us that as we know neither the day nor the hour when the Son of Man cometh, we may live as those who wait for their Master, having our lamps burning and our loins girt. May we be enabled to persevere and abound in every good work and word, that sanctified by Thy Spirit, we may have an entrance ministered to us abundantly into the everlasting kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, to Whom, with the Father and the Holy Spirit be glory for ever.

Our Father, Who art in Heaven, etc.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God the Father, and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all for ever. *Amen.*

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A Selection of Psalms.

(It is suggested that the verses in italics be read
by all the worshippers).

PSALM I.

Blessed is the man that walketh not in
the counsel of the ungodly, nor standeth in
the way of sinners, nor sitteth in the seat
of the scornful.

*But his delight is in the law of the LORD ;
and in his law doth he meditate day and
night.*

And he shall be like a tree planted by the
rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit
in his season ; his leaf also shall not wither ;
and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper.

*The ungodly are not so : but are like the
chaff which the wind driveth away.*

Therefore the ungodly shall not stand in
the judgment, nor sinners in the congrega-
tion of the righteous.

*For the LORD knoweth the way of the
righteous : but the way of the ungodly shall
perish.*

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PSALM VIII.

O LORD, our Lord, how excellent is Thy name in all the earth! who hast set Thy glory above the heavens.

Out of the mouth of babes and sucklings hast thou ordained strength because of thine enemies, that thou mightest still the enemy and the avenger.

When I consider Thy heavens, the work of Thy fingers, the moon and the stars, which Thou hast ordained;

What is man that Thou art mindful of him? and the son of man, that Thou visitest him?

For Thou hast made him a little lower than the angels, and hast crowned him with glory and honour.

Thou madest him to have dominion over the works of Thy hands; Thou hast put all things under his feet:

All sheep and oxen, yea, and the beasts of the field;

The fowl of the air, and the fish of the sea, and whatsoever passeth through the paths of the seas.

O LORD, our Lord, how excellent is Thy name in all the earth!

PSALM XIX.

The heavens declare the glory of God :
and the firmament sheweth his handiwork.

*Day unto day uttereth speech, and night
unto night sheweth knowledge.*

There is no speech nor language, where
their voice is not heard.

*Their line is gone out through all the earth,
and their words to the end of the world. In
them hath he set a tabernacle for the sun ;*

Which is as a bridegroom coming out of
his chamber, and rejoiceth as a strong man
to run a race.

*His going forth is from the end of the hea-
ven and his circuit unto the ends of it : and
there is nothing hid from the heat thereof.*

The law of the LORD is perfect, converting
the soul : the testimony of the LORD is sure,
making wise the simple :

*The statutes of the LORD are right, rejoicing
the heart : the commandment of the LORD is
pure, enlightening the eyes :*

The fear of the LORD is clean, enduring
for ever : the judgments of the LORD are
true and righteous altogether.

More to be desired are they than gold, yea, than much fine gold ; sweeter also than honey and the honeycombe.

Moreover, by them is thy servant warned : and in keeping of them there is great reward.

Who can understand his errors ? cleanse thou me from secret faults.

Keep back thy servant also from presumptuous sins ; let them not have dominion over me : then shall I be upright, and I shall be innocent from the great transgression.

Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O LORD, my strength and my Redeemer.

PSALM. XXIII.

The LORD is my shepherd ; I shall not want.

He maketh me to lie down in green pastures : he leadeth me beside the still waters.

He restoreth my soul : he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil : for thou art with me ; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

Thou preparest a table before me in the presence of mine enemies : thou anointest my head with oil ; my cup runneth over.

Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life ; and I will dwell in the house of the LORD for ever.

PSALM XXIV.

The earth is the LORD's, and the fulness thereof ; the world, and they that dwell therein :

For he hath founded it upon the seas, and established it upon the floods.

Who shall ascend into the hill of the LORD ? or who shall stand in his holy place ?

He that hath clean hands, and a pure heart ; who hath not lifted up his soul unto vanity, nor sworn deceitfully.

He shall receive the blessing from the LORD, and righteousness from the God of his salvation.

*This is the generation of them that seek him,
that seek thy face, O Jacob. Selah.*

Lift up your heads, O ye gates ; and be
ye lift up, ye everlasting doors ; and the
King of glory shall come in.

*Who is this King of glory? The LORD
strong and mighty, the LORD mighty in battle.*

Lift up your heads, O ye gates ; even lift
them up, ye everlasting doors ; and the
King of glory shall come in.

*Who is this King of glory? The LORD of
hosts, he is the King of glory. Selah.*

PSALM XXV.

Unto Thee, O LORD, do I lift up my soul.

*O my God, I trust in thee : let me not be
ashamed ; let not mine enemies triumph over
me.*

Yea, let none that wait on thee be ashamed :
let them be ashamed which transgress
without cause.

*Shew me thy ways, O LORD ; teach me thy
paths.*

Lead me in thy truth, and teach me : for
thou art the God of my salvation ; on thee
do I wait all the day.

Remember, O LORD, thy tender mercies and thy loving kindnesses ; for they have been ever of old.

Remember not the sins of my youth, nor my transgressions : according to thy mercy remember thou me, for thy goodness' sake, O LORD.

Good and upright is the LORD : therefore will he teach sinners in the way.

The meek will he guide in judgment, and the meek will he teach his way.

All the paths of the LORD are mercy and truth unto such as keep his covenant and his testimonies.

For thy name's sake, O LORD, pardon mine iniquity ; for it is great.

What man is he that feareth the LORD ? him shall he teach in the way that he shall choose.

His soul shall dwell at ease ; and his seed shall inherit the earth.

The secret of the LORD is with them that fear him ; and he will shew them his covenant.

Mine eyes are ever toward the LORD ; for he shall pluck my feet out of the net.

Turn thee unto me, and have mercy upon me ; for I am desolate and afflicted.

The troubles of my heart are enlarged :
O bring thou me out of my distresses.

*Look upon mine affliction, and my pain ;
and forgive all my sins.*

Consider mine enemies ; for they are
many ; and they hate me with cruel hatred.

*O keep my soul, and deliver me ; let me
not be ashamed ; for I put my trust in Thee.*

Let integrity and uprightness preserve
me ; for I wait on thee.

Redeem Israel, O God, out of all his troubles.

PSALM XXXII.

Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven,
whose sin is covered.

*Blessed is the man unto whom the LORD
imputeth not iniquity, and in whose spirit
there is no guile.*

When I kept silence, my bones waxed
old, through my roaring all the day long.

*For day and night thy hand was heavy
upon me : my moisture is turned into the
drought of summer. Selah.*

I acknowledged my sin unto thee, and
mine iniquity have I not hid. I said, I will

confess my transgressions unto the LORD ;
and thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin.
Selah.

*For this shall every one that is godly pray
unto thee in a time when thou mayest be found :
surely in the floods of great waters they shall
not come nigh unto him.*

Thou art my hiding place ; thou shalt
preserve me from trouble ; thou shalt com-
pass me about with songs of deliverance.
Selah.

*I will instruct thee and teach thee in the
way which thou shalt go ; I will guide thee
with mine eye.*

Be ye not as the horse, or as the mule,
which have no understanding ; whose mouth
must be held in with bit and bridle, lest
they come near unto thee.

*Many sorrows shall be to the wicked : but
he that trusteth in the LORD, mercy shall com-
pass him about.*

Be glad in the Lord, and rejoice, ye
righteous : and shout for joy, all ye that are
upright in heart.

PSALM XXXIV.

I will bless the LORD at all times ; his praise shall continually be in my mouth.

My soul shall make her boast in the LORD ; the humble shall hear thereof, and be glad.

O magnify the LORD with me, and let us exalt his name together.

I sought the LORD, and he heard me, and delivered me from all my fears.

They looked unto him, and were lightened ; and their faces were not ashamed.

This poor man cried, and the LORD heard him, and saved him out of all his troubles.

The angel of the LORD encampeth round about them that fear him, and delivereth them.

O taste and see that the LORD is good : blessed is the man that trusteth in him.

O fear the LORD, ye his saints : for there is no want to them that fear him.

The young lions do lack, and suffer hunger : but they that seek the LORD shall not want any good thing.

Come, ye children, hearken unto me : I will teach you the fear of the LORD.

What man is he that desireth life, and loveth many days, that he may see good?

Keep thy tongue from evil, and thy lips from speaking guile.

Depart from evil, and do good; seek peace, and pursue it.

The eyes of the LORD are upon the righteous, and his ears are open unto their cry.

The face of the LORD is against them that do evil, to cut off the remembrance of them from the earth.

The righteous cry, and the LORD heareth, and delivereth them out of all their troubles.

The LORD is nigh unto them that are of a broken heart; and saveth such as be of a contrite spirit.

Many are the afflictions of the righteous: but the LORD delivereth him out of them all.

He keepeth all his bones: not one of them is broken.

Evil shall slay the wicked; and they that hate the righteous shall be desolate.

The LORD redeemeth the soul of his servants; and none of them that trust in him shall be desolate.

PSALM XLVI.

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

Therefore will not we fear, though the earth be removed, and though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea ;

Though the waters thereof roar and be troubled, though the mountains shake with the swelling thereof. Selah.

There is a river, the streams whereof shall make glad the city of God, the holy place of the tabernacles of the Most High.

God is in the midst of her ; she shall not be moved : God shall help her, and that right early.

The heathen raged, the kingdoms were moved : he uttered his voice, the earth melted.

The LORD of hosts is with us ; the God of Jacob is our refuge. Selah.

Come, behold the works of the LORD, what desolations he hath made in the earth.

He maketh wars to cease unto the end of the earth ; he breaketh the bow, and cutteth the spear in sunder : he burneth the chariot in the fire.

Be still, and know that I am God ; I will be exalted among the heathen, I will be exalted in the earth.

The LORD of hosts is with us ; the God of Jacob is our refuge. Selah.

PSALM LXII.

Truly my soul waiteth upon God : from him cometh my salvation.

He only is my rock and my salvation ; he is my defence : I shall not be greatly moved.

How long will ye imagine mischief against a man ? ye shall be slain all of you : as a bowing wall shall ye be, and as a tottering fence.

They only consult to cast him down from his excellency ; they delight in lies : they bless with their mouth, but they curse inwardly. Selah.

My soul, wait thou only upon God : for my expectation is from him.

He only is my rock and my salvation : he is my defence : I shall not be moved.

In God is my salvation, and my glory : the rock of my strength, and my refuge, is in God.

Trust in him at all times ; ye people, pour out your heart before him : God is a refuge for us. Selah.

Surely men of low degree are vanity, and men of high degree are a lie : to be laid in the balance, they are altogether lighter than vanity.

Trust not in oppression, and become not vain in robbery : if riches increase, set not your heart upon them.

God hath spoken once ; twice have I heard this, that power belongeth unto God.

Also unto Thee, O LORD, belongeth mercy : for thou renderest to every man according to his work.

PSALM LXVII.

God be merciful unto us, and bless us ; and cause his face to shine upon us. Selah.

That thy way may be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations.

Let the people praise thee, O God ; let all the people praise thee.

O let the nations be glad, and sing for joy ; for thou shalt judge the people righteously, and govern the nations upon earth. Selah.

Let the people praise thee, O God ; let all the people praise thee.

Then shall the earth yield her increase ; and God, even our own God, shall bless us.

God shall bless us ; and all the ends of the earth shall fear him.

PSALM LXXXV.

LORD, thou hast been favourable unto thy land : thou hast brought back the captivity of Jacob.

Thou hast forgiven the iniquity of thy people, thou hast covered all their sin. Selah.

Thou hast taken away all thy wrath : thou hast turned thyself from the fierceness of thine anger.

Turn us, O God of our salvation, and cause thine anger toward us to cease.

Wilt thou be angry with us for ever ? wilt thou draw out thine anger to all generations ?

Wilt thou not revive us again, that thy people may rejoice in thee ?

Shew us thy mercy, O LORD, and grant us thy salvation.

*I will hear what God the LORD will speak :
for he will speak peace unto his people, and to
his saints : but let them not turn again to folly.*

Surely his salvation is nigh them that
fear him ; that glory may dwell in our land.

*Mercy and truth are met together ; right-
eousness and peace have kissed each other.*

Truth shall spring out of the earth ; and
righteousness shall look down from heaven.

*Yea, the LORD shall give that which is good ;
and our land shall yield her increase.*

Righteousness shall go before him, and
shall set us in the way of his steps.

PSALM LXXXVI.

Bow down Thine ear, O LORD, hear me ;
For I am poor and needy.

*Preserve my soul, for I am holy : O thou
my God, save thy servant that trusteth in thee.*

Be merciful unto me, O LORD : For I cry
unto thee daily.

*Rejoice the soul of thy servant : for unto
thee, O Lord, do I lift up my soul.*

For thou, LORD, art good, and ready to
forgive ; and plenteous in mercy unto all
them that call upon thee.

Give ear O LORD, unto my prayer ; and attend to the voice of my supplications.

In the day of my trouble I will call upon thee : for thou wilt answer me.

Among the gods there is none like unto thee, O Lord ; neither are there any works like unto thy works.

All nations whom thou hast made shall come and worship before thee, O LORD ; and shall glorify thy name.

For thou art great, and doest wondrous things : thou art God alone.

Teach me thy way, O LORD ; I will walk in thy truth : unite my heart to fear thy name.

I will praise thee, O Lord my God, with all my heart ; and I will glorify thy name for evermore.

For great is thy mercy toward me ; and thou hast delivered my soul from the lowest hell.

O God, the proud are risen against me, and the assemblies of violent men have sought after my soul, and have not set thee before them.

But Thou, O LORD, art a God full of compassion, and gracious ; longsuffering, and plenteous in mercy and truth.

*O turn unto me, and have mercy upon me:
give thy strength unto thy servant, and save
the son of thine handmaid.*

Shew me a token for good; that they
which hate me may see it, and be ashamed;
because thou, LORD, hast holpen me, and
comforted me.

PSALM XC.

LORD, thou hast been our dwelling place
in all generations.

*Before the mountains were brought forth, or
ever thou hadst formed the earth and the world,
even from everlasting to everlasting, thou art
God.*

Thou turnest man to destruction; and
sayest, Return, ye children of men.

*For a thousand years in thy sight are but
as yesterday when it is past, and as a watch
in the night.*

Thou carriest them away as with a flood;
they are as a sleep: in the morning they are
like grass which groweth up.

*In the morning it flourisheth, and groweth
up; in the evening it is cut down, and
withereth.*

For we are consumed by thine anger, and
by thy wrath are we troubled.

Thou hast set our iniquities before thee, our secret sins in the light of thy countenance.

For all our days are passed away in thy wrath; we spend our years as a tale that is told.

The days of our years are threescore years and ten; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labour and sorrow: for it is soon cut off, and we fly away.

Who knoweth the power of thine anger? even according to thy fear, so is thy wrath.

So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.

Return, O LORD, how long? and let it repent thee concerning thy servants.

O satisfy us early with thy mercy; that we may rejoice and be glad all our days.

Make us glad according to the days wherein thou hast afflicted us, and the years wherein we have seen evil.

Let thy work appear unto thy servants, and thy glory unto their children.

And let the beauty of the LORD our God be upon us: and establish thou the work of our hands upon us: yea, the work of our hands establish thou it.

PSALM XCI.

He that dwelleth in the secret place of the Most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty.

I will say of the Lord, He is my refuge, and my fortress: my God; in him will I trust.

Surely he shall deliver thee from the snare of the fowler, and from the noisome pestilence.

He shall cover thee with his feathers, and under his wings shalt thou trust: his truth shall be thy shield and buckler.

Thou shalt not be afraid for the terror by night, nor for the arrow that flieth by day,

Nor for the pestilence that walketh in darkness nor for the destruction that wasteth at noonday.

A thousand shall fall at thy side, and ten thousand at thy right hand; but it shall not come nigh thee.

Only with thine eyes shalt thou behold, and see the reward of the wicked.

Because thou hast made the LORD, which is my refuge, even the Most High, thy habitation,

There shall no evil befall thee, neither shall any plague come nigh thy dwelling.

For He shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways.

They shall bear thee up in their hands, lest thou dash thy foot against a stone.

Thou shalt tread upon the lion and adder ; the young lion and the dragon shalt thou trample under feet.

Because he hath set his love upon me, therefore will I deliver him : I will set him on high, because he hath known my name.

He shall call upon me, and I will answer him : I will be with him in trouble ; I will deliver him, and honour him.

With long life will I satisfy him, and shew him my salvation.

PSALM C.

Make a joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands.

Serve the LORD with gladness ; come before his presence with singing.

Know ye that the LORD he is God : it is he that hath made us, and not we ourselves : we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.

Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him, and bless his name.

For the LORD is good, his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endureth to all generations.

PSALM CIII.

Bless the LORD, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless his holy name.

Bless the LORD O my soul, and forget not all his benefits:

Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases;

Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with loving kindness and tender mercies;

Who satisfieth thy mouth with good things; so that thy youth is renewed like the eagle's.

The LORD executeth righteousness and judgment for all that are oppressed.

He made known his ways unto Moses, his acts unto the children of Israel.

The LORD is merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and plenteous in mercy.

He will not always chide; neither will he keep his anger forever.

He hath not dealt with us after our sins, nor rewarded us according to our iniquities.

For as the heaven is high above the earth, so great is his mercy toward them that fear him.

As far as the east is from the west, so far hath he removed our transgressions from us.

Like as a father pitieth his children, so the LORD pitieth them that fear him.

For he knoweth our frame; he remembereth that we are dust.

As for man, his days are as grass: as a flower of the field, so he flourisheth.

For the wind passeth over it, and it is gone; and the place thereof shall know it no more.

But the mercy of the LORD is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear him, and his righteousness unto children's children;

To such as keep His covenant, and to those that remember his commandments to do them.

The LORD hath prepared his throne in the heavens; and his kingdom ruleth over all.

Bless the LORD, ye his angels, that excel in strength, that do his commandments, hearkening unto the voice of his word.

Bless ye the LORD, all ye his hosts; ye ministers of his that do his pleasure.

Bless the LORD, all his works, in all places of his dominion: bless the LORD, O my soul.

PSALM CIV.

Bless the LORD, O my soul. O LORD my God, thou art very great; thou art clothed with honour and majesty.

Who coverest thyself with light as with a garment; who stretchest out the heavens like a curtain;

Who layeth the beams of his chambers in the waters; who maketh the clouds his chariot; who walketh upon the wings of the wind;

Who maketh his angels spirits; his ministers a flaming fire;

Who laid the foundations of the earth, that it should not be removed forever.

Thou coveredst it with the deep as with a garment: the waters stood above the mountains.

At thy rebuke they fled ; at the voice of thy thunder they hasted away.

They go up by the mountains ; they go down by the valleys unto the place which thou hast founded for them.

Thou hast set a bound that they may not pass over, that they turn not again to cover the earth.

He sendeth the springs into the valleys, which run among the hills.

They give drink to every beast of the field : the wild asses quench their thirst.

By them shall the fowls of the heaven have their habitation, which sing among the branches.

He watereth the hills from his chambers : the earth is satisfied with the fruit of thy works.

He causeth the grass to grow for the cattle, and herb for the service of man, that he may bring forth food out of the earth ;

And wine that maketh glad the heart of man, and oil to make his face to shine, and bread which strengtheneth man's heart.

The trees of the LORD are full of sap : the cedars of Lebanon which he hath planted ;

Where the birds make their nests: as for the stork, the fir trees are her house.

The high hills are a refuge for the wild goats, and the rocks for the conies.

He appointed the moon for seasons: the sun knoweth his going down.

Thou makest darkness, and it is night, wherein all the beasts of the forest do creep forth.

The young lions roar after their prey, and seek their meat from God.

The sun ariseth, they gather themselves together, and lay them down in their dens.

Man goeth forth unto his work, and to his labour, until the evening.

O LORD, how manifold are thy works! in wisdom hast thou made them all: the earth is full of thy riches.

So is this great and wide sea, wherein are things creeping innumerable, both small and great beasts.

There go the ships; there is that leviathan, whom thou hast made to play therein.

These wait all upon thee, that thou mayest give them their meat in due season.

That thou givest them they gather: thou openest thine hand, they are filled with good.

Thou hidest thy face, they are troubled; thou takest away their breath, they die, and return to their dust.

Thou sendest forth thy spirit, they are created; and thou renewest the face of the earth.

The glory of the LORD shall endure for ever: the LORD shall rejoice in his works.

He looketh on the earth, and it trembleth; he toucheth the hills, and they smoke.

I will sing unto the LORD as long as I live; I will sing praise to my God while I have my being.

My meditation of him shall be sweet: I will be glad in the LORD.

Let the sinners be consumed out of the earth, and let the wicked be no more. Bless thou the LORD, O my soul. Praise ye the LORD.

PSALM CVII.

O give thanks unto the LORD, for he is good; for his mercy endureth for ever.

Let the redeemed of the LORD say so, whom he hath redeemed from the hand of the enemy;

And gathered them out of the lands, from the East, and from the West, from the North, and from the South.

They wandered in the wilderness in a solitary way ; they found no city to dwell in.

Hungry and thirsty, their soul fainted in them.

Then they cried unto the LORD in their trouble, and he delivered them out of their distresses.

And he led them forth by the right way, that they might go to a city of habitation.

Oh that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men !

For he satisfieth the longing soul, and filleth the hungry soul with goodness.

Such as sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, being bound in affliction and iron ;

Because they rebelled against the words of God, and contemned the counsel of the Most High ;

Therefore he brought down their heart with labour ; they fell down, and there was none to help.

Then they cried unto the LORD in their trouble, and he saved them out of their distresses.

He brought them out of darkness and the shadow of death, and brake their bands in sunder.

Oh that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men !

For he hath broken the gates of brass, and cut the bars of iron in sunder.

Fools, because of their transgression, and because of their iniquities, are afflicted :

Their soul abhorreth all manner of meat ; and they draw near unto the gates of death.

Then they cry unto the LORD in their trouble ; and he saveth them out of their distresses.

He sent his word and healed them, and delivered them from their destructions.

Oh that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men !

And let them sacrifice the sacrifices of thanksgiving, and declare his works with rejoicing.

They that go down to the sea in ships, that do business in great waters ;

These see the works of the LORD, and his wonders in the deep.

For he commandeth, and raiseth the stormy wind, which lifteth up the waves thereof.

They mount up to the heaven, they go down again to the depths ; their soul is melted because of trouble.

They reel to and fro, and stagger like a drunken man, and are at their wit's end.

Then they cry unto the LORD in their trouble, and he bringeth them out of their distresses.

He maketh the storm a calm, so that the waves thereof are still.

Then are they glad because they be quiet ; so he bringeth them unto their desired haven.

O that men would praise the LORD for his goodness, and for his wonderful works to the children of men !

Let them exalt him also in the congregation of the people, and praise him in the assembly of the elders.

He turneth rivers into a wilderness, and the watersprings into dry ground :

A fruitful land into barrenness, for the wickedness of them that dwell therein.

He turneth the wilderness into a standing water, and dry ground into water-springs.

And there he maketh the hungry to dwell, that they may prepare a city for habitation;

And sow the fields, and plant vineyards, which may yield fruits of increase.

He blesseth them also, so that they are multiplied greatly, and suffereth not their cattle to decrease.

Again they are minished, and brought low through oppression, affliction, and sorrow.

He poureth contempt upon princes, and causeth them to wander in the wilderness, where there is no way.

Yet setteth he the poor on high from affliction, and maketh him families like a flock.

The righteous shall see it, and rejoice; and all iniquity shall stop her mouth.

Whoso is wise, and will observe these things, even they shall understand the lovingkindness of the LORD.

PSALM CXIII.

Praise ye the LORD. Praise, O ye servants of the LORD, praise the name of the LORD.

Blessed be the name of the LORD, from this time forth and for evermore.

From the rising of the sun unto the going down of the same, the LORD'S name is to be praised.

The LORD is high above all nations, and his glory above the heavens.

Who is like unto the LORD our God, who dwelleth on high ;

Who humbleth himself to behold the things that are in heaven, and in the earth !

He raiseth up the poor out of the dust, and lifteth the needy out of the dunghill ;

That he may set him with princes, even with the princes of his people.

He maketh the barren woman to keep house, and to be a joyful mother of children. Praise ye the LORD.

PSALM CXVI.

I love the LORD, because he hath heard
my voice and my supplications.

*Because he hath inclined his ear unto me,
therefore will I call upon him as long as I live.*

The sorrows of death compassed me, and
the pains of hell gat hold upon me: I
found trouble and sorrow.

*Then called I upon the name of the LORD :
O LORD, I beseech thee, deliver my soul.*

Gracious is the LORD, and righteous ; yea,
our God is merciful.

*The LORD preserveth the simple : I was
brought low, and he helped me.*

Return unto thy rest, O my soul ; for the
LORD hath dealt bountifully with thee.

*For thou hast delivered my soul from death,
mine eyes from tears, and my feet from falling.*

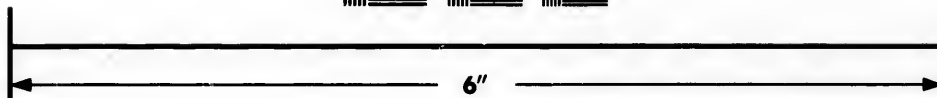
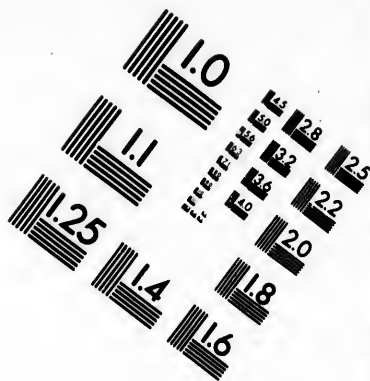
I will walk before the LORD in the land

Thou art my God, and I will praise thee; thou art my God, I will exalt thee.

O give thanks unto the LORD; for he is good: for his mercy endureth for ever.

PSALM CXIX.

Blessed are the undefiled in the way, who walk in the law of the LORD.

Blessed are they that keep his testimonies, and that seek him with the whole heart.

They also do no iniquity: they walk in his ways.

Thou hast commanded us to keep thy precepts diligently.

O that my ways were directed to keep thy statutes!

Then shall I not be ashamed, when I have respect unto all thy commandments.

I will praise thee with uprightness of heart, when I shall have learned thy righteous judgments.

I will keep thy statutes: O forsake me not utterly.

Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? By taking heed thereto according to thy word.

With my whole heart have I sought thee: O let me not wander from thy commandments.

Thy word have I hid in mine heart, that I might not sin against thee.

Blessed art thou, O LORD: teach me thy statutes.

With my lips have I declared all the judgments of thy mouth.

I have rejoiced in the way of thy testimonies as much as in all riches.

I will meditate in thy precepts, and have respect unto thy ways.

I will delight myself in thy statutes: I will not forget thy word.

Teach me, O LORD, the way of thy statutes, and I shall keep it unto the end.

Give me understanding, and I shall keep thy law; yea, I shall observe it with my whole heart.

Make me to go in the path of thy commandments; for therein do I delight.

I have refrained my feet from every evil way, that I might keep thy word.

I have not departed from thy judgments : for thou hast taught me.

How sweet are thy words unto my taste !
yea, sweeter than honey to my mouth !

*Through thy precepts I get understanding,
therefore I hate every false way.*

Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and a
light unto my path.

Explanations and Instructions.

The directions which follow are not intended for the use of Ministers and those who are already familiar with the manner of conducting Divine Service. They are designed to be helpful to persons who may be called upon to engage in Social Worship in remote parts of the country, or under circumstances when there is no minister to guide them.

In every group of pioneers, surveyors, or organized companies, there is generally a leader, who, resembling in some respects the Captain of a ship at sea, may properly consider it his duty, on each returning Lord's Day, to invite those around him to assemble for worship after the manner of Christians. In such case, the leader should either conduct the service or find another person to act in his place as Reader. The same may be said of military companies or other organized bodies. When there is no recognized leader, a Reader may be chosen as circumstances may determine.

In the absence of a Minister, all the worshippers being on an equal footing, it is recognized that each person should have an opportunity of taking part in the Service as far as practicable.

It should be constantly remembered that the one purpose of the service is the common worship of Almighty God, and that every individual is equally concerned in the solemn duty ; each person present should therefore heartily co-operate and assist to the extent of his power and opportunity. Necessarily there must be a Reader to conduct the devotions. While his voice alone will be heard in the common prayers, it should be attentively and devoutly, although inaudibly, followed. It is felt that all present may profitably take part in reading alternate verses, in prose Hymns of Praise, Psalms, and occasionally in Scripture Readings. All the worshippers should heartily join in the readings with a clear voice. The words and sentences intended to be spoken by the congregation are generally printed in italics. When the worshippers are not prepared to join in the Service, the whole may be read by the Reader.

It is scarcely necessary to say that congregational reading should be conducted reverently and devoutly. All hurry or confusion should be avoided, and a slight pause should be made at the end of each verse.

While generally the Reader's voice only will be heard in the prayers, and in the alternate verses of the several readings, it will sometimes be advantageous to have the Scripture lessons read by another person. A second voice is always desirable, as it destroys monotony and promotes interest in the service.

It is not expected that there will be much difficulty in respect to the singing of the Hymns introduced in the order of service, but, if there be no person present to raise the tune, the verses selected may be reverently read by the Reader alone.

Special prayers are furnished for the use of Settlers, Farmers, Miners, those at Sea or on Military Duty, and others. A Burial Service is likewise added, for the reason that in outlying portions of the country, there are occasions when funerals have to be conducted in the absence of a Minister.

When an ordinary service is to be conducted the following suggestions may be useful to the Reader chosen.

THE ORDINARY SERVICE.

The first duty of the Reader, when the worshippers are assembled, shall be to begin with the OPENING SENTENCES, given in the model service, page 5, or he may substitute any of the alternative sentences on pages 29 to 34, after which will follow :

The Prayer of Invocation, *vide* page 6, or 35 to 40.

When it appears desirable to substitute an alternative prayer for any of those given in the model service, it will be proper for the Reader to indicate to his fellow worshippers where the prayer selected to be read will be found, thus : "The words of the prayer will be found at page——." He will then, after a sufficient pause, begin by saying in all cases, "Let us pray."

Then the Reader shall announce a HYMN and call upon the congregation to sing the same to the praise of God. This Hymn should generally be expressive of adoration, invocation, or thanksgiving.

The Prayer of Confession shall thereafter be proceeded with in the same manner as the Invocation, *vide* page 7, or 41 to 54.

A PSALM OR PSALMS will follow, *vide* selection, page 146, the alternate verses, which may be read by the congregation, being in italics. If no sermon is to follow, a portion of the OLD TESTAMENT may be read, the Reader saying, "Let us read from the Old Testament, in the Book of——, Chapter——, Verse——. (A list of Old Testament readings will be found at page 140.)

A HYMN or METRICAL PSALM may then be sung, *vide* selections, pages 199 and 110.

The Prayer of Supplication thereafter to be offered, consisting chiefly of supplications and thanksgivings, *vide* page 9, or 55 to 72.

A portion of the NEW TESTAMENT shall next be read; the Reader saying at the beginning, "Let us read from the New Testament, in the——, chapter——, at the—— verse". (For a list of New Testament readings see pages 141 to 144.) At the close of Scripture readings should be said :

“the Lord bless to us the reading of His Holy word, and to His name be the glory.”

The Prayer of Intercession shall then be offered, *vide* page 10, or 73 to 92. Prayers of Intercession may generally end with the LORD'S PRAYER, which all the worshippers should audibly repeat.

OUR FATHER, WHO ART IN HEAVEN, HALLOWED BE THY NAME ; THY KINGDOM COME ; THY WILL BE DONE ON EARTH AS IT IS IN HEAVEN ; GIVE US THIS DAY OUR DAILY BREAD ; AND FORGIVE US OUR TRESPASSES, AS WE FORGIVE THEM THAT TRESPASS AGAINST US ; AND LEAD US NOT INTO TEMPTATION, BUT DELIVER US FROM EVIL ; FOR THINE IS THE KINGDOM, THE POWER AND THE GLORY, FOR EVER AND EVER. *Amen.*

THE HYMN OF PRAISE as it is given in the model service, or some other, may then be read by the Reader alone, or by all the worshippers joining in alternate verses as suggested, *vide* page 12, or 93 to 98.

AN ADDRESS OR SERMON will at this stage be in order, but, in the absence of either, the TEN COMMANDMENTS or the BEATITUDES, or

both may be read. (These will be found at page 21-26), or a SPECIAL PRAYER from the selection furnished, *vide* page 107, or any other appropriate for the occasion, may be offered. To be followed by

The Concluding Prayer, *vide* page 14, or 99 to 105.

An appropriate HYMN shall next be sung or read, to be followed by the benediction.

"The Lord bless us and keep us. The Lord make His face to shine upon us and be gracious unto us. The Lord lift up His countenance upon us and give us peace."

Amen.

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
