DUNDAS, Ont., Friday, July 26. - (Special.) - Fireman James Smith of Dundas was killed, and damage amounting to more than \$30,000 was caused in a fire at Jones Bros.' factory here shortly after midnight.

Smith was one of the oldest firemen in Dundas. He had been laid up with a bad gold for several days, and was advised by his doctor not to leave his home, but when the fire broke out he joined the brigade and was soon on the scene. He was working on the roof of the factory when he was overcome by the heavy smoke, and fell into the ruins, dying almost immedi-

Dr. Rykert was summoned after Smith's comrades had removed his body from the ruins, but life was extinct.

The fire started in the factory where the showcases are made, and spread rapidly. The damage is estimated at more than \$20,000, and is covered by insurance.

WESTERN CROPS PROMISE TO BREAK ALL RECORDS THO ANXIETY ISN'T OVER

Soaking Rains in Saskatchewan May Delay Harvesting, Put Hat and Coat in Sack to But Fears of Black Rust Are Subsiding-Yield Per Acre Expected to Be Greatest Ever Known. Keep Them Dry and Then Jumped Into the Water,

WINNIPEG, July 25 .- (Special.) - Thus far there is nothing untoward against a good crop production this year. Fears of black rust have not yet materialized, but the weather still causes anxiety in parts.

In Saskatchewan, rain is very general over the province, and if such weather continues it will seriously delay the ripening of the crops. Cupar, Normanton, Redville and Holgate report scattered hailstorms, but the damage is small.

There seems to be a very general opinion among farmers from all sections of the provinces, crop experts, elevator companies and farmers' organizations, that this year's crop will be the largest ever grown in western Canada, in which the Provincial Department of Agriculture of Manitoba coincides. GREATEST YIELD PER ACRE.

Not only will the total yield be the largest, but, judging by present conditions, the yield per acre will outstrip all previous performances. One of the best known agriculturists of western Canada states that harvest of the various crops will take place during the following periods: Barley, commence Aug. 1, completed Aug. 20; fall wheat, Aug. 10 to 25; spring wheat, Aug. 18 to Sept. 10; flax, Aug. 25 to Sept. 10; oats, Aug. 25 to Sept. 15.

This will put all grains in stook by the middle of September, fully three weeks ahead of the ordinary season.

A big broadside editorial opens thus The report of the Stanley committee of the house of representatives, which has been investigating the steel trust, has been the principal theme discussed here to-day in political and financial circles. Chairman Stanley reports against having the government regulate prices and wages, altho the steel company would not object to such legislation. He attempt to shore up the Sherman Act by a bill proposing many amendments to the act. These amend ments define many specific acts as proof of unlawful restraint of trade such as bribery of a competitor's emplove, selling below cost, contracting with customers not to sell to competitors, discriminating between customers, giving away goods or selling at slaughter prices to force competitors out of the field, controlling unduly raw material or machinery necessary to any business. Thus, for the steel commany to own 30 per cent, of the iron ore of the United States becomes, as a matter of law, a restaint of trade.

NEW YORK, July 25.—(Special.)—

Opens Door to Litigation. Oother provisions allow any state or individual to intervene in any suit for injunction or dissolution brought against an alleged trust by the federal government, either before or after judgment, and by cross-petition try out any claim for damages they may have against the trust. In all civil suits the burden of proof will be snift-ed so that the company will have to justify any restaintive trade as not being unreasonable.

Finally, upon a judgment dissolving the merger, all constituent companies may be forbidden to buy in the prop-erty of the trust, and, where the property of the dissolved merger is necessary for carriying on the business of competitors, the court may require the same to be sold in reasonable quantities at a price to be fixed by the court This clause would affect the United Shoe Machine Co., which can put any shoe manufacturer out of business, by withdrawing its machines from his

factory.
Other bills to be introduced forbid any steel company or coal company to own stock in a railway company, or for a railway company to own stock in them, and interlocking direct rates between such companies are forbidden.

THE HISTORY OF SAVINGS BANKS

It was in 1765 that the first savings bank in the world was established in Brunswick. Germany. A few years later another institution of the same kind, solely for the use of servants, was organized in Switzerland.

Soon the idea took root in other countries, says Harper's Weekly, and became popular. It was not until the eighteenth century, however, that such a bank appeared in England. Then one for children was established by Priscilla Wakefield, an enterprising resident of Tottenham.

This proving a success, four years later Mrs. Wakefield widened the scope of her plan by receiving deposits from adults. She had at first the assistance of six gentlemen acting as trustees, but as her business increased, so did the number of trustees. The Wakefield banks allowed interest at the rate of 5 per cent. on sums of one pound and over, provided money was not withdrawn within twelve months.

The next in the field was an English clergyman, who instituted a "Frugal-ity Bank," so called at the suggestion of Bentham, the political writer, who for a long time had been advocating establishment of saving banks under that title. This bank was intended for the use of parishioners; and the Rev. Joseph Smith, the president thereof, undertook to return all moneys received during the summer. with a bonus of one-third at Christmas. The Rev. H. VIAL OF ANCIENT WINE FOUND IN TOMB.

In the progress of excavation made with a view to the discovery of archeological inscriptions old wine has been discovered in a sarcophagus in a Gallo-Roman and Christian necropolis near Bordeau, France. The vial of ancient wine is deeply interesting to philclent wine is deeply interesting to philologists, archeologists and chemists, remarks a writer in Harper's Weekly.

In the midst of the ancient sepulchres a square monument showing all the characteristics of the Gallo-Roman style of the first century was found. Fitted into a recess under an arch was an enormous sarcophagus, and in it, lying by a skeleton, was a long glass vial of a form never found among the were analyzed to determine whether coloring matter or a poinson had been sealed in the tomb. The analysis showed all the principles of wine, old and dried; and the dust left on the sides of the vial as the wine dried when analyzed was found to contain tartar and tannin.

The wine, like the vial, seems to have originated in Syria, for very ancient bottles of the same kind found in Asia Minor, are kept in the museum of the Louvre. The form of the vial is the same, and the glass may have been made in the manufactory that furnish ed the vials in the Louvre. The wines of Syria were known and renowned in the early days of the Roman Empire, and in those days the commerce be-tween Syria and Bordeaux was brisk. 



answer to The World, Councillor Ball said. "If I were to express all I feel, I am afraid that I should be committed for contempt of court. It is monstrous that the privy council, sit-ting thousands of miles away, should be able to reverse the unanimous ver-dict of the Ontario Court of Appeal. The privy council seem to have a perverted idea as to the sanctity of vested interests, and invariably give consideration to wealthy corporations, to the prejudice of municipalities. Their lordships are not cognizant or the facts and the local conditions. In my pinon it behooves private members of parliament more than ever to carefully clause by clause, the bills promoted by companies, so that it shall be no longer possible for the people to be suddenly alive to the fact that their rights as citizens have been usurped by the skilful machinations of company lawvers."

A Ny person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and coccapied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.
