## Shall We Have One or Two State Universities?

The people of the province as a whole are not less interested in the university question than are the Alumni of Toronto University, who are to wait upon the Government to-day. Any scheme of university improvement involves the expenditure of a considerable sum of money, and every class of the community will be called upon to contribute its quota. If the Legislature were to sanction a yearly grant of even \$80,000, this would mean a capital expenditure of one million dollars. The question is therefore an important one.

Lady Milton, Lady Laurier and the wives of scores of members and Senators graced the galleries. Mr. Bourassa was heard in silence, excepting once or twice, when he made an unintentionally humorous stroke, which hit John Charlton or Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The Premier finished his reply at 6 o'clock. He was cheered constantly by both sides of the House and spoke with more than his usual animation and eloquence.

What Mr. Bourassa Said. At the start Mr. Bourassa said he had been called an advanced imperialist in Ontario and Quebec. But these were mere epithets, and he did not complain, because he despised any independent opinion from party newspapers. He claimed that Canada had no right to interfere in the war, but having been asked to do so, he would now have the right to pronounce upon it. He would never acknowledge that the Canadian Government had the right to go into the war by Order-in-Council.

On the issue of Imperialism, Mr. Bourassa went into Roman history for a parallel, and the speaker in England, Mr. Chamberlain told the people that every vote against the Government was a vote against the British Empire. He appealed to members on both sides of the House to support the Government.

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What Kind of Liberty? My hon. friend has spoken well and eloquently upon the cause of liberty, on which he has constituted himself an expert. I must ask him, what kind of liberty is it which will permit British subjects to be free to go to the King to serve him, no matter in what capacity? 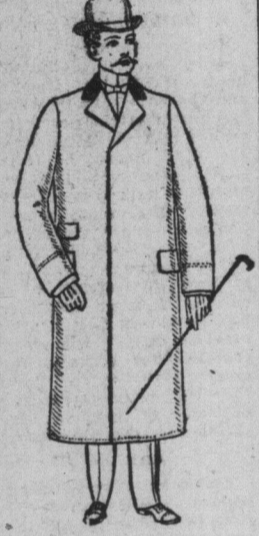
