

CALL ROMAINE A MURDERER

Sirong Verdict of the Coroner's Jury on the Cause of Death of Louis Goldsmith.

WIDOW TELLS A CLEAR STORY

Said the Prisoner Threatened to Shoot Her in Order to Get at Her Husband.

"We find that Louis Goldsmith came to his death from a bullet wound inflicted by Isaac Weller Romaine, and that the said Romaine did unlawfully kill and murder said Goldsmith."

Such is the substance of the verdict returned last night by the coroner's jury at the inquest on the body of Louis Goldsmith, who died on Monday afternoon from bullet wounds received on Friday night at his home on Victoria-street.

Coroner Johnston conducted the inquiry in the Police Court. Few persons not directly interested were present. H. H. Dewart appeared for the Crown, and T. C. Robinson for the accused, Romaine, who sat in the prisoner's dock.

Goldsmith Did Not Fear. Dr. J. B. Chisholm, house surgeon at the Emergency Hospital, was the first witness. Mr. Robinson asked him to get him to admit that Goldsmith, when he made his ante-mortem statement, was not in the fear of death, but the witness would not do so.

Brantford Will Enquire Into the Power Question

City Council and Board of Trade Appoint Committees to Confer, on Advice of T. H. Preston, M.L.A.—Important Bearing on Future of Telephone City.

Brantford, Feb. 10.—(Special)—The question of the development of electrical power at Niagara and the transmission of it to Brantford at reasonable rates called for discussion at the meeting of the City Council on Monday evening and at the meeting of the Board of Trade this evening. The matter was brought to their attention by the following letter from T. H. Preston, M.L.A.:

This application was refused at the last session of the assembly, because the city was asking permission to spend millions without reference to the rate-payers, and there was no provision for the regulation of the rates which would be charged to other municipalities. This application will be renewed during the approaching session of the assembly.

Government's Policy. The policy of the government thus far has been one of private ownership under suitable regulation, rather than that of government ownership.

Three Concessions Granted. Three concessions have already been granted private companies under two of which considerable development has already been made.

HOTEL IS QUARANTINED. Placards Indicating Smallpox Posted in Ridgeway.

Ridgeway, Ont., Feb. 10.—At 2 p.m. yesterday the Arlington Hotel was placed under quarantine placards posted reading smallpox, and the Provincial Inspector sent for, but he has not yet arrived. The attending physicians have pronounced it smallpox. The hotel has twenty-two inmates, of which six are affected.

PASSED BAD BILLS. Ottawa, Feb. 10.—Francis Vernon, the Montreal man arrested several days ago for uttering bogus Dominion bills, pleaded guilty in the Police Court this morning on four different counts. He was sentenced to five years in Kingston penitentiary on each count, the sentences to run concurrently.

STRIKE RUNS ALONG. Spaniards Propose to Support It Even With Firearms.

Cadix, Spain, Feb. 10.—The strike, which began here recently as the result of general dissatisfaction with the existing conditions, is rapidly spreading. Rioters to-day forced the proprietors of all the stores to close their establishments, and meetings were held, at which the speakers pledged themselves to continue the fight even with the use of firearms, if necessary.

MONOPOLY IN THE U.S.

Impressions Gleaned by a Toronto Citizen While Across Line.

Having been curbed in the States, the Bell Telephone Company has, apparently, transplanted in Canada the methods it found successful for many years in the Yankee Republic.

Following the line of the contest between the Interstate Commerce Commission and the Western Union, appealing to the courts of last resort, the Interstate Commerce Commission and the independent lines gradually established the principle that, as common carriers, the railroads had no authority to refuse connecting rights with the telephone company, and grant those rights to others.

The query naturally arises in this connection, "How long would the P. R. be satisfied to maintain a defence in a Canadian court?"

"I spent several months in the rural districts of Indiana and Ohio recently," said Mr. Hurd, "I found much the same conditions existed a few years ago there that Canada farmers are now confronted with.



At the Household Economic Association's meeting yesterday, presented by Mrs. J. L. Hughes, Mrs. Emma Scott-Ruff of Victoria College, gave an address on "A Fit Temple." First of all, she should know herself, and understand the care of the body. The compressing of the waist dwarfed the natural shape of the ribs, and retarded diaphragmatic breathing, less possible. Mrs. Scott-Ruff next spoke of the susceptibility to taking cold of different parts of the body, those most easily affected being the top of the head, back of the neck, ankles and wrists. Fashion should not rule the dress of a woman; there was even a sort of ethical hygiene in a handkerchief, which she should have in her hand, not raised above the head.

NEW BRITISH BATTLESHIPS.

New Type Will Be Built by the Admiralty.

New York, Feb. 10.—A special cable to The Herald from London says: That the British Admiralty is not blind to the rapid increase in the number of ships of greater displacement and improved armament which characterizes the building programs of other maritime powers is shown by its own program, the principal feature of which is a new type of warship designed by Mr. Watts surplus of the existing battleships in size and power designed by Mr. Watts. There will be three of these big fighting machines built. Their displacement will reach 18,000 tons, which is nearly 2,000 tons more than the King Edward class. The largest type battleship built by any power.
