Note and Comment

A bet has been made on the old question: Was J. L. Sullivan champion of the world? This paper has taken the affirmative. The fight books all give the Boston gladiator the crown, the record running like this:

1888—John L. Sullivan beat Jake Kilrain, \$10,000 a side, at Richmond, Miss., July 17, in 7 rounds, and world's championship.

The Sullivan-Kilrain match was made and the articles drawn up in the old Ross House in Toronto, a copy of which has this paragraph: "The said fight shall be for the diamond ring representing the championship of the world."

Corbett won the world's championship by defeating Sullivan in 1892 and was so recognized before he defeated Charlie Mitchell, which was in '94.

POWER TO EXPROPRIATE TO BE SOUGHT BY CITY

Board of Control Orders Application Prepared—Against Buying Stock.

A decision to have City Solicitor Johnston draw up a formal application to the legislature for power to expropriate the street railway was unanimously reached at yesterday's meeting of the board of control.

Controller Church, in moving that legislation be sought along the lines of the bill of 1906, whereby the city could cancel the railway agreement should the company fail to carry out its orders as to service and extensions within six months, declared that such a power in the city's hands would be a great compeller.

Purchase of Stock. "Shouldn't we also ask the right to purchase railway stock?" suggested Controller Foster, second of the motion. "We don't want to buy stock," replied Mayor Geary, but the controller thought the city might at some future time find the power useful.

"We have at present certain powers as to investing city funds," added the mayor. "Would you like to have added the power to buy railway stock?" "We might do the same as we did with the Consumers' Gas Company," explained Controller Foster. The mayor asked if he would have the city represented by one director, and the controller said it might be four, advisable to seek control of the company by getting a majority of the stock.

"That's not the way to get control of the street railway," declared the mayor, emphatically. "Shouldn't we pay for franchises?" Controller Church said it was a ridiculous contention that the city should expire period of the franchise. There was no such provision when the legislature gave the city power to expropriate the electric light company.

Controller Spence said he was quite in sympathy with the proposal to expropriate, but that he thought it would be desirable to have the application drawn up by the city solicitor so that it would be technically correct. "Without compensation for goodwill," asked the mayor. "No, I wouldn't put that in," replied the controller.

The mayor suggested that the expropriation bill should be drafted as it set forth the city as having certain rights which the courts had since determined it did not possess. Controller Church assented.

CITY TO GET SUPPORT OF LOCAL LEGISLATORS

Co-operation Regarding Private Bills Promised—Time Limit Elastic.

Members of the city legislation and reception committee who conferred with local members of the legislature at the parliament buildings yesterday regarding the city's bill to be presented at the coming session, as well as the bill with the prospect of securing more support from the Queen's Park lawmakers than has been usual.

Only a comparatively small portion of the applications likely to be made were in condition to be discussed, but the items taken up appeared to be favorably received. No definite opposition of any sort developed, but the legislators intimated that they would not like to be understood as committing themselves to the proposal to grant the Consumers' Gas Co. plant renewal funds to \$750,000 nor to the city park department obtaining control of Baimy Beach Park, now managed by a commission appointed by the old municipality of East Toronto, as they thought there might be considerable opposition.

Power to Buy Parks. An item which seemed to meet with favor was Controller Spence's proposal that the city be empowered to issue debentures yearly, amounting to half a mill on the tax rate for acquiring park land, subject to a two-thirds vote of council.

Other items discussed were: To reduce the qualification of frehold voters at municipal elections from \$400 to \$200; to enable the city to utilize the Ashbridge's marsh roadway for building a spur line into the marsh; to enable the city to grant \$12,000 for an extension to the House of Industry, it being not city-owned institution; to establish a standard of purity for milk supplied to the public similar to the standard demanded of milk used in cheese factories and several minor matters.

Members of the legislature present were: Hon. R. A. Pyne, Hon. J. J. Poy, Hon. I. B. Lucas, Hon. Thos. Crawford, W. D. McPherson, M. L. A., and T. R. Whitford, M. L. A. Aid Maguire, chairman, and nearly all the members of the legislation committee were on hand.

City Solicitor Johnston, referring to the fact that the clerk of the legislature notified Aid Maguire yesterday morning that the time for presenting the city's bill, as prescribed by statute, was past, says there is no reason to be alarmed. While the statute says that private bills must be presented not later than two weeks before the opening of the legislature, an extension of time can be easily secured by the legislature's reviving the act, a frequent device in the past.

St. Clair Avenue Widening. With the request that the city abandon the project of widening St. Clair avenue from Yonge street to Easthurst street to a width of 100 feet by adding 24 feet to the present width, a deputation of residents waited on the clerk of council yesterday. Their contention of control of the street, and the widening had originated elsewhere, and that while required to pay two-thirds of the cost, they considered the work they would detract from the value of their property.

The spokesman were Chancellor Sir John Boyd, Thos. Gibson, R. A. Donald and J. Russell Snow. Consideration was promised when the works committee's report is before the widening is before the board.

Railway Bonuses. The sum total of the bonuses paid by the city to various steam railway companies is \$1,498,717.81, according to a statement of the city treasurer supplied the board. Mr. Coady stated also that the city contributed \$1,025,346 for Esplanade improvements in the mutual interest of the railways.

Cost of Street Cleaning. Dr. Sheard, medical health officer, is asking an appropriation of \$50,375 this year, as against \$49,725 expended last year, an increase of \$650. There is, however, a big increase in the amount asked for the street-cleaning department, namely, \$651,000, as against \$490,000 last year. This is largely due to the request for \$125,000 for additions to the plant, including two crematories, \$70,000, northwest stables and land required of \$25,000, and maintenance is \$40,000 more than last year partly owing to increased garbage collection. The whole amount for scavenger collections is \$295,000.

Dispute Over Lot. Assessment Commissioner Forman will be consulted before the board decides what disposition to make of the lot, 72 feet by 250 feet, on the south side of the Esplanade, at the foot of Frederick street. The Police Iron Works claim that the city contracted in 1906 to sell them the lot at \$15,000, but the city solicitor contends that the agreement was never completed. The lot has since been leased to the Milne Coal Co. for \$2000 a year and taxes, and Mr. Milne offers to purchase it at \$25,000.

An offer to expend \$1000 on equipping a playground in a suitable location can be secured, it has been made by the McCormick estate, which has large property holdings at the head of Avenue road. The Playgrounds Association will consider the proposition.
