



Representatives of the Toronto school board met the minister and deputy minister of education last week, and presented their case, asking for legislation that their case, asking for legislation that would compel the city council to issue debentures when the board decided that it must be done in the interest of the schools.

"The school children of Toronto," they said, "have been using geographies which give the population of the city as 60,000, all because to please the board of control we have to strike out \$15,000 or \$20,000 a year in our estimates and are, therefore, unable to buy new books."


