"For six years past the town of Brockville has owned and operated a light and power plant. It is under a commission of five members, and possesses a manager, Mr. C. T. Wilkinson, who seems to know his business. Both gas and electricity are produced, and since 1901 the prices have been reduced from \$2 per thousand feet for gas and 20 cents per kilowatt hour for electricity, to \$1.25 and 10 cents, respectively. During the six years the net profit to the town has been \$7,090.17. Last year alone the surplus was \$4,002.58, in spite of the fact that \$3,368.60 was written off for depreciation of plant. The total off for depreciation of plant. The total revenue has been increased from \$38,154.19

London cables indicate that the fighting speech made by the British attorney

Rev. John F. Floyd, pastor of Coburg street Christian church, preached last night on the new theology, taking as his text Colossians 2:10: "Ye are complete in Him." London cables indicate that the fighting speech made by the British attorney general the other day, directed against the house of lords, expressed the feelings of the government generally. It is asserted that in the parliament which reassembles today government measures will be introduced such as may lead to a revolutionary change, bringing the lords practically into a position subordinate to the commons. Of course such a change could not be wrought in a year, or in sevential that the new theology is progressive and the present Christian faith not necessary to salvation was dealt with by the speaker at some length. He declared that the only new theology was that of Christ, which replaced the teaching of Moses, and needs no new revelation. 
