Midnight Estimate 2,000 Dead In Halifax; Clear and Cold After Last Night's Blizzard; Gripping Tales of Incidents In The Disaster

Halifax, N. B., Dec. 8

In Halifax it is clear and cold today after the heavy storm in which more than a foot of snow fell. People are shivering in rooms with open windows, the frost forming on fragments of glass left. An official statement at last midnight placed the dead at 2,000, and injured in hospitals at 3,000. The property loss not as high as \$50,000,000, as first reported, but will probably run to \$20,000,000. The relief committee is asking \$30,000,000 to care for 20,000 deatitute poor in devastated area which comprises residential area for poopen working classes of Halifor. death roll. The search for bodies goes on, and 300 soldiers are taking a prominent part.

In a cellar at Richmond they saw a soldier in uniform frantically digging. He called to them for assistance. They found it was Private Henneberry, a former resident of Devil's Island, who had been overseas with a draft of the 63rd, and had recently been returned home wounded. "Here was my home," said Private Henneberry, "and I am sure I heard a moan a minute ago. The soldiers listened intently and again came the faint moan of a child in pain. With desperate energy the men dug away the still smouldering debris. Under a stove and protected by the protruding ash-pan, they found little eighteen months old Olive Henneberry. The child was in a semiconscious condition. Her mouth was slightly cut and there was a little mark on her face. When taken to Pine Hill Hospital she recovered quickly. The lads of the 63rd kept on with the work and found the remains of Mrs. Henneberry and her five other children.

A beautiful story is that of little Lola Burns, eight year old daughter of John Burns, Granville street. She was saying her morning prayer with a rosary clasped in her hands when the explosion came and was found in the middle of a devastated room, glass all about her in fragments, still offering prayer, but quite uninjured.

Children brought to hospitals black-faced and charred. Those living sometimes taken for colored children, and when washed, nurses were surprised to find them white.

Many families still separated, roseate hopes being based on the fact that hundreds have been sent out of the city to relief hospitals elsewhere, and that no lists of these have yet been received for checking.

Manitoba's Sympathy.

Amherst, N. S., Dec. 8-A private telegram from Halifax today to an undertaking firm in Amherst order 4,000 coffins and caskets to be forwarded to the stricten city of Halifax immediately. It said that the dead would reach 4,000.

Halifax, Dec. 8-Five thousand casualties, 2,000 dead, 3,000 other injured. This is the latest official estimate of the toll exacted in human lives and suffering by the explosion and fires of Thursday.

If anything were needed to add to the horrors of the tragedy, it was the heavy fall of snow which began early yesterday morning and continued all day, reaching the proportions of a blizzard last night, with the wind blowing forty miles an hour. It was heavy damp snow, that clung to the clothes, blinded the eyes and impeded the movements. Relief automobiles were progressing by inches merely, and those still working among the ruins suffered intensely from the cold, and at times were forced to cease work entirely.

A long distance call to Truro this afternoon elicited the information that hat town is also mable to get into satisfactory communication with Halifax. It is impossible to motor there owing to the heavy fall of snow and subsequent irifting, and no trains have arrived today.

Early this morning the citizens' relief committee wired Halifax that they ould accommodate 300 more injured people. This committee is composed of he town council, the head of the Victorian Order of Nurses, president of the Women's Council and heads of the Red Cross societies in addition to four citiens. This committee is organized under George W. Stewart and all details are being looked after in a systematic manner.

At the present time there are twenty critical cases receiving the attention of the committee, all others are considered less serious. Some of the unfortunate people are suffering from crushed limbs and serious cuts and lacerations.

Genoa. Dec. 1 (1984)—The first arried battle between allied and German alrmen over Sales trictery occurred around Basle today. It appears that the Germans, hard pressed by their opponents, entered Switzerland on purpose. The fight tools place at a great height and the number of the alreraft is unknown. The encounter lasted twenty minutes. Seven bombs were dropped on Swiss territory, but only material damage resulted.

Healthy cows, clean farm building, glass bottles. You remember. But it cost the farmer more to produce this milk and the dealer more to handle it. AND UP WENT THE PRICE.

And you know you didn't like the increased price at all, but when you had calmly and quietly considered the benefits and the advantages of the improved service, you came to the conclusion that you wouldn't, even for cheaper milk, go back to the old state of

So twelve cent milk today is an example of the progression to better things and of the general trend upwards of all things which the public need.

And the lesson is that we must pay our way. If we don't, someone is going under, and if one goes under, he is bound to effect the stability of someone else.

We are all more or less dependent, one on the other. The merchant must get more for his goods ,because he has to more for them; so it is with the manufacturer. The working man and woman must get higher wages; it takes more money to buy things today. The Public Utility also needs materials, and it needs labor, and in the open market it also must pay the prevailing prices. 





HABITUAL FARMERS WILL BE EXEMPTED

First Judgment of Central Appeal Judge is Final on Point; Act is Purely Selective.

Ottawa, Dec. 7—The first judgment rendered by Mr. Justice Duff, the central appeal judge for Canada, dealing with the provisions of the Military Service act as relating to farmers, has excited much interest here. Much of the difficulty connected with the interpretation of the act, concerning particularly the farmers of Canada, has been cleared away. This first judgment precisely affirms that competent persons habitually and effectively engaged in agricultural production are entitled to exemption on the ground that in order to sustain the military power of the Allies it is essential that there should be no diminution in such production and that the supply of agricultural

should be no diminution in such production and that the supply of agricultural labor is actually deficient.

Any effort that is being made or shall be made, by the opponents of the Military Service act to create any other impression to the farmers of Canada than what is actually contained in the first judgment of Mr. Justice Duff, would be a political dodge.

Purely Selective.

Purely Selective.

The judgment emphasizes what has hitherto been the argument of those responsible for the appeal, that the Military Service bill is essentially selective in its scope, and that the object of the bill is to see that the full man power of Canada shall be utilized in the spheres best calculated to help along the cause. The fact that this judgment has been rendered by Mr. Justice Duff, of the supreme court, far removed from the sphere of politics and politicians, will give the judgment its full statue to the people of Canada. This judgment of the central appeal judge is binding as law upon the appeal tribunals and local tribunals throughout the whole country. This judgment is law itself, as far as the subject of the exemption of the

the subject of the exemption of the farmers of Canada is concerned.


