Gunner Wm. Mister Gives His Life; Samuel J. Small of Milford Killed; Formidable Russian Reinforce- BRITISH REPO L. Corp. Anderson Was Native of This City

William Mister, for many years a rose from the ranks until he became serresident of St. John, has given his life in the defense of the motherland which he loved so well. When war was declared he immediately gave up his work here and sailed for England where he enlisted in an artillery unit. In a letter from his father, who resides in England, to Timothy Callaghan of Little River, the news of his death is conveyed and his bereaved father speaks with pride of the references to his son in a communication from the officer who informed him of the death of his son in France on July 24. For many years Gunner Mister had been employed in Lee's brickyards at Little River and had many friends who will hear of his death with sincere regret. He was forty-one years old.





Waste paper also collects in sheltered places, falls through grates into basement window openings, or accumulates against wooden buildings or fences; a lighted match or a cigar or cigarette stub carelessly thrown aside may fall upon this accumulation and cause a fire. Housing Law Outlined.

The provisions of a housing law would The provisions of a housing law would relate in part, (a) to plans for the construction of new dwellings; (b) to reconstruction or repair of old dwellings; (c) to occupation and maintenance of dwellings; (d) to massures for reducing the risk from fire; (e) to the executions and enforcements of the law.

A housing law should provide under the first heading (a) relating to the erection of new buildings for:

1. Prevention of land overcrowding by limiting the proportion of any lot that

limiting the proportion of any lot that may be occupied by buildings.

2. Adequate light and ventilation of dwellings by prescribing the minimum dimensions of rear-yards, side-yards and courts, and a minimum space between buildings 3. Room lighting and ventilation by providing a minimum proportion of window area to floor space, that win-dows must open directly upon street, yard or court and must have moveable

sashes.

4. Rooms of adequate size by fixing minimum floor space and height.

5. Lighting and ventilation of halls and staircases of multiple dwellings.

6. Adequate means of egress from each floor of multiple dwellings.

7. Lighting and ventilation of toilets.

8. Separate toilet accommodation for each family.

9. The prohibition of cellar closets, ex-

9. The prohibition of cellar closets, except under special conditions approved by health officer. supply for each family.
11. Effective drainage of courts, yards

12. That no multiple dwelling shall be erected and no building be occupied as a multiple dwelling where no connection can be had with proper sewerage system.






