C., Dec. 15.—Profits from the sale of liquor in British Columbia government stores for the six months ended Sept. 30, 1928, amounted to \$1,402,499, against \$1,250,195 in the previous six months period, an increase of \$152,304, acmording to figures laid before the Legislature yesterday by Hon. A. M. Manson, Attorney-General.

Liquor profits have totalled \$5,642,531 since government control came into force in July, 1921. Municipalities will receive \$466,331 out of the liquor prifits for the last six months period.

This is an increase of \$50,641 over the amount received by municipalities in the previous six months, when \$415,689 was distributed among them,

The sum of \$190,866 will be taken out of liquor profits for aid of hospitals and institutions. Since Government liquor control came into force in British Columbia, Mr. Manson sald, municipalities have received \$1,587,789 out of liquor profits after the amounts paid to hospitals have been deducted. should be made happy. Outside of the Jacquet River seizure the greatest roundup of Christmas liquor in the Maritime Provinces this week was made at Mahone, N. S., where the Canadian mounted police seized 1,800 gallons of spirits valued at \$40,000. The seizure revealed a wholesale smuggling of rum into Nova Scotia on a great scale. The seizure in Mahone had its equally sensational sequels in Halifax when, on a warrant issued by Stipendiary Magistrate Hollowas, of the schooner D. C. Mulhall, was arrested by the Royal Mounted force charged with smuggling, and placed in the county jail. At the same time the schooner was refused clearance papers by the customs and placed under seizure by the authorities. The distribution of that portion of the cargo which had already been disposed of was largely to Halifax city, while the ownership of the rum is said to be in Charlottetown.

Let stand 10 minutes and bake on a hot well greased griddle. The batter for baking should be thin and "runny." Buckwheat cakes require a hotter griddle than corn meal or wheat cakes.







# TO GUARD HEALTH

Dr. Sullivan Gives Address on Medical Fence Building

The riches of health are beyond price and can only be secured in youth and those parents and teachers who use their influence to impress this fact upon children are playing their part with the great scientists of the world who are the medical fence buildings, and through research are fighting disease and disabilities.

That was the theme of the scholarly and illuminating address given last night before the Women's Canadian Club by Dr. E. V. Sullivan, of St. Stephen. The mover of the vote, Mrs. Richard Hooper, spoke of the public health nurses as the best means of carrying health instruction to the homes and urged other organizations to follow the lead of the Women's Institute in providing scholarships for training the nurses in public health work.

KEEPING THE STAGE CLEAN

Every theatre manager who produces an offensive and salacious show should be compelled to pay the penalty of such violation of the law, says The New York Herald. He knows what he is doing when he deliberately plans to attract a certain part of the theatregoing public by means of an entertainment which will appeal to its lowest instincts. He knows; moreover, that he is doing it with the purpose of deriving profit from an illegal and vicious course. He ought not to be allowed to escape the penalty for his acts.

In his wise charge to the Grand Jury last week Judge Collins spoke of New York's justifiable pride in the reputation of the city for civic purity and the necessity for safeguarding that enviable possession. Equally praiseworthy was his suggestion that the citiy must be kept clean and that any act in violation of the law should be speedily punished.

The Department of Licences has been deprived by a decision of the Court of Appeals of the regulatory power most feared by theatre managers. This was the power of the Commissioner of Licenses to revoke the license of any playhouse in which an illegal performance was given. No other penalty ever did so much to keep violations of the laws of decency in check. Now that the play jury will not be called into service by Commissioner of Licenses Glatzmayer it is through the efforts of the Grand Jury that the stage will in the future be purged of impropriety. Judge Collins revealed his intention to be just in the investigation of all accused plays when he said, in suggesting that the Grand Jury get its evidence from the District Attorney and the police, that the larger roportion of our theatre managers are high minded, respectable men, who would not tolerate indecency in their theatrical performances. They are compelled nevertheless to suffer from the actions of their less scrupulous colleagues.

Since it has been reported by the representatives of the police that the stage has been cleared of much of the indecency charged against it, and this same view is held by delegates from religious bodies which only a few months ago found much to condemn, it seems that the Grand Jury, inspired by such wise and tolerant advice as Judge Collins gave in his charge, will be equal to keeping the New York stage in the future up to the high standard which Judge Collins has set. 




