BRUNSWICK CHAPTER MEET.

The first regular monthly meeting since June of the Brunswick Chapter, I. O. D. E., was held yesterday afternoon at the residence of Mrs. W. I. Fenton with the regent, Mrs. G. S. Mayes, in the chair. The "Lest-we-forget" fund was reported as having many calls upon it, all of which it has met. A letter was read from Lieutenant-Colonel Murray MacLaren informing the chapter that \$272 was due the chapter as refund money from the sale of huts to the British government. It was decided to devote one half of this sum to the New Brunswick branch of the St. John Ambulance Brigade, and to place the balance in the "Lest-we-forget" fund. Mrs. J. Boyle Travers gave a report of the burial of W. A. John in Cedar Hill, for which the chapter had undertaken the responsibility. She also spoke of the fund for the benefit of Mrs. John, and said that many generous contributions had been received.

Mrs. Herbert Mayes, the educational secretary, gave an account of the presentation of prizes at the St. Patrick's and the Albert schools in June. Preliminary plans were made for holding the annual Halloween dance.

Among the delegates at Montreal were Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Ellis of Vancouver, brother of F. O. Ellis of this city. Mr. and Mrs. Ellis are coming to St. John to visit relatives here. Mrs. Shaw was accompanied to Montreal by her daughter, Miss Hilda Shaw.

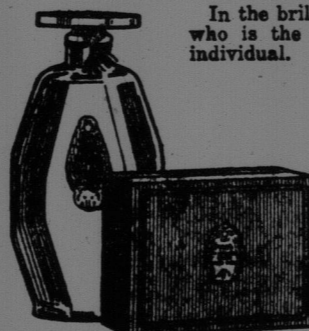

MAY PROBATE TWO WILLS OF ONE MAN

Question Raised in Court Over Estate of Late T. Lovett - No Limit to Probate.

(Montreal Gazette.) Sitting in the Probate Division of the Superior Court yesterday, Mr. Justice Bruneau handed down judgment maintaining the principle of law that if two wills are written by one person, both may be admitted to probate, providing the one is not inconsistent with the other, does not pronounce with the other, is good or otherwise; it merely finds that the document in question is authentic. The question was raised in a case in which Thomas Lovett, M. D., petitioner for the probate of the will of his father, the late Thomas Lovett, engineer, of 1530 St. Denis street. The will was made in holograph form on January 2, 1917, and testator died on March 2 of the same year. He instituted petitioner one of the trustees and legatees, and provided that his estate should be left in trust, the usufruct of all his properties to be paid to testator's widow. At her death there was to be a division of the estate amongst members of testator's family. Mrs. Elizabeth Commins, one of testator's daughters, and a beneficiary under the will, opposed her brother's petition on the ground that a first will of her father, also made in holograph form, and dated October 1, 1906, had been probated already, and she submitted that unless that was attacked and set aside a second will could not be proved. Mr. Justice Bruneau said this pretension could not be upheld. Established jurisprudence, he added, was against this and it was sufficient to cite the ruling in the case of Cutta and Gilbert, reported in Beauchamp's Jurisprudence of the Privy Council, in the first volume at page 307. His Lordship said, further, that while the second will disposed of property which did not belong to testator when he made his first will, the two wills in question were not incompatible. Both were susceptible to verification. The court therefore granted the petition and ordered probate of the second will bearing date of March 2, 1917. Markey and Co. appeared for the petitioner.

THE STORM HITS RHODE ISLAND

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Providence, R. I., Sept. 13.—Damage estimated at hundreds of thousands of dollars was done by a brief hail and thunderstorm, accompanied by a forty-five-mile an hour gale in a narrow area extending through Cranston, Warwick, and East Providence today. Thousands of panes of glass were broken, the interiors of homes and business establishments were flooded and fruit trees were stripped. Street car, telephone and electric light and power service was interrupted. The hail stones in some cases measured one and a half inches in diameter. A market gardener in Cranston estimated his loss at \$200,000, while one factory near there reported 2,000 panes of glass broken.

WOODSTOCK FAIR OPENED.

The provincial exhibition opened at Woodstock last evening. E. P. Bradt, deputy minister of agriculture, delivered the opening address in the absence of J. F. Tweeddale, minister of agriculture. Thomas Noddin, mayor of Woodstock, welcomed the visitors and paid a glowing tribute to the quality and variety of the display. Entries in live stock, vegetables and seeds are said to be the largest in the history of the fair.

WAS HERE FOR EXHIBITION

G. Lowell Myers, who was formerly in charge of the Marine Department of T. McAvity & Sons, Ltd. and who is now sales manager of the Lunenburg Foundry Co., Ltd. of Lunenburg, N. S., is in the city spending a few days with friends. He had a booth in the exhibition and while there renewed acquaintances with many friends. He considered the exhibition a great success and spoke highly of it from an advertising standpoint. He will return to his home Thursday. Mr. Myers was one of the best second basemen in this city and since moving to Nova Scotia has been taking a prominent part in baseball.

PRESBYTERIANS IN TRURO ARE CELEBRATING

Truro, N. S., Sept. 13.—This was a red letter day in the annals of Presbyterianism in Truro and indeed in Canada, for it marked the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the oldest Presbyterian church in the dominion. The anniversary services began at 9 o'clock this afternoon and were continued till nearly 8. Many eminent divines of the Presbyterian church were on the platform which was banked with flowers. On the pipe organ was hung a blue banner that had flown from a flag pole fifty years ago when the church celebrated its centennial and again in 1886 when the Truro presbytery celebrated its 100th anniversary.

Rev. H. J. Fraser, pastor of St. Andrew's church Truro, presided and the four principal speakers were: Rev. C. McKinnon, D. D., principal of Pine Hill College, Halifax; Rev. Thos. Stewart, D. D., Halifax; Rev. Anderson Rogers, D. D., of Antigonish and Rev. John Pringle, D. D., of Sydney. At the close of Dr. Pringle's address two honor rolls were unveiled. On them were inscribed the names of 188 members of the congregation who had taken part in the war, thirty-two of them having made the supreme sacrifice. This evening the new pastor of the church, Rev. John Mutch, of Toronto, was inducted.

A SAD TALE OF HOW TWO THIRSTY FARMERS WERE BUNCOED AT THE FAIR.

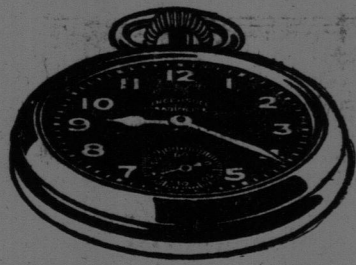

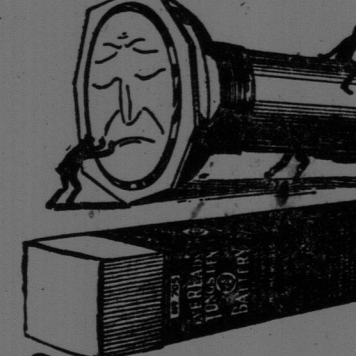

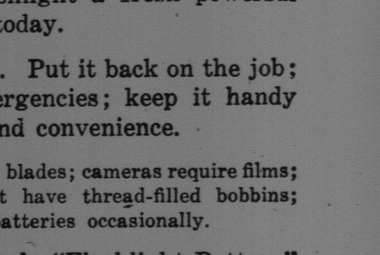
