Speaking to the Times concerning the black fox industry in the island, he says that foxes in the island at the present time are valued at \$10,000,000. The population of the island is not more than 90,0000 people. He said he knew for an actual fact that recently Hon. Charles Dalton, the pioneer fox rancher received from one of his companies, a dividend amounting to \$40,000. The average dividend of the companies, he says is about 175 per cent aithough some are paying as high as 900 per cent cash dividend. Referring to the extent of the black fox industry and the manner in which it is increasing, he said that this year, the government one per cent tax on the increase—the young laxe—derived a revenue of \$86,000, which places the value of the young ones at \$18,000,000. The valuation is placed on the foxes by the owners themselves. The options of 1914 are selling from \$12,000 to \$12,500 a pair. During the last two years, he said, \$2,000,000 has been drawn from the dominion savings bank for investment in the black fox ranches.



GRFAT TELESCOPE FOR CANADA

World's Largest to Be Made by Firms In the United States

An Ottawa despatch says that Canada will be able to boast possession of the largest reflecting telsecope in the world. 
