New York, April 25—The White Star line today received a wireless list of identified dead from the Mackay-Bennett cable ship, in response to a request by the company's officials, who desired to check off the names contained in the first list sent Monday. Today's list confirmed all names in the first wireless with but one exception.

In the first message, there appeared the name "Nihilschedig A. Butt." In the check off list this name is separated into "Nahil Schedig" and L. Butt." After an examination of all the passenger list, the officials have been able to find only one "Butt" that being "Archibald W. Butt," President Taft's military aide. There is asid that this is the body of a member of the crew. The opinion is advanced that "L. Butt" may be Major Butt. Of the 205 bodies recovered by the Mackay-Bennett, and now being brought to Halifax, only forty-three have been identified, leaving 162 unidentified dead on board.

Justin McCarthy began life as a journalist in 1848, in his native city of Cork. In 1862 he went to Liverpool and later to London, where in 1870 he became a leader-writer for the Daily News. He entered parliament in 1870. All through the varied phases of the Home Rule struggle Justin McCarthy, while an ardent advocate of the cause, was moderate in the expression of his views, and held the respect and esteem of all. As a writer his style was singularly clear and charming, and he wrote without bitterness. He lived in stirring times, the contemporary of great men in literature, politics, science and religion, He has left pen pictures of many of them, and stories of the events in which they moved, that will be cheriahed now that he has laid down the life that never seemed to him à burden, but ratter an opportunity for service to the causes which appealed to him. His son, Justin Huntil, McCarthy, also achieved fame as a dramatist, novelist and historian, and also sat in parliament; but was not so able a man as his distinguished father. 


