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Trinity College School.

"Beati mundo corde."

The School was first established in the village of Weston, near Toronto, and was opened on the first of May 1865, under the Head-mastership of the Rev. C. H. Badgley, M.A. During the summer of 1868, the School was removed to Port Hope. In January, 1872, the first portion of the new buildings was completed and occupied. The School premises now consist of over twenty acres of land, affording ample space for large Cricket and Foot-ball grounds, situated on high land outside the town of Port Hope. The large and handsome building, including a beautiful Chapel, presents a south front of about three hundred feet in length, and a west front of eighty feet; it is capable of containing a School of upwards of 150 boys. A Drill-shed and Gymnasium have also been erected in the rear of the building.

Trinity College School was, by an Act of the Legislature of the Province of Ontario, passed during the Session of 1871-2, constituted a corporate body, consisting of the Lord Bishop of Toronto, the Chancellor of the University of Trinity College, the Provost and the Professors in Arts of Trinity College, the Head Master of the School, and such other persons as may from time to time be appointed by the Governing Body.

Course of Instruction.

The Course of Instruction includes all the usual branches of a sound education in Classics, Mathematics, English, German, French, Scripture History, Catechism, Natural Sciences, Book-keeping, Drawing, Vocal Music, and Military Drill.

Pupils are prepared for the Matriculation Examination of the Universities, and the Entrance Examinations of the Law and Medical Schools, the Royal Military College, the Army, Navy, &c. In the Modern Department special attention is directed to preparation for commercial pursuits. Instruction can also be obtained, if desired, in Telegraphy and Shorthand Writing.

The discipline and general management of the School are based upon the English Public School System, Out-of-school Government is, accordingly, to a large extent, vested in the hands of the Prefects, who are selected from the senior boys by the Head Master.

Fees.

The fees for board and tuition are \$267 per annum, or \$89 per term, and are payable at the beginning of each term *in advance*; if, however, payment of the fees, together with any school account of the previous term, is made during the first fortnight of term, a discount of ten per cent. off the fees is allowed, thus *reducing the charges to* \$240 per annum, or \$80 per term.

Fees for tuition only, \$60 per annum, or \$20 per term, payable in advance.

The Piano-forte is taught as an extra. Fee, for tuition and use of instrument, \$10 per term.

Each new boy, on admission to the School, is required to pay an entrance fee of \$4, which is devoted to the mainten-

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ance and improvement of the Boys' Library,* &c., and a fee of \$12, in lieu of bedding, &c., which are now supplied by the School, instead of, as formerly, by the Pupils.

The above Fees are inclusive of all School expenses, except books, stationery, drawing materials, &c., and medical attendance.

A Half-term's Notice must be given in writing before the removal of a Pupil. If such notice is not given, a Half-term's fee will be collected.

The following rule respecting the payment of Fees was adopted at a meeting of the Governing Body of the School, held on August 18th, 1870:—

"The Fees for Board and Tuition in each Term, and any balance which may remain for books or otherwise, from the previous Term, must be paid within a fortnight after a boy presents himself at the School. If this be not done, the Bursar is required to draw on the Parent or Guardian for the amount (with Bank charges), at ten days, and should this draft be returned dishonoured, the boy must be sent home by the Head Master."

Books and stationery are supplied in the School at the ordinary prices.

Boys over twelve years of age will be admitted to the School only on the production of such testimonials of previous good conduct and diligence, as shall perfectly satisfy the Head Master and the Governing Body.

To secure admission a deposit of \$10 must be made on application, which will be accounted for when the boy leaves the School.

Forms of application can be obtained from the Head Master.

*The Library now contains upwards of 800 volumes.

Exhibitions.

THE VENERABLE JOHN WILSON, M.A., Archdeacon of Peterborough, offers two Exhibitions, of the annual value of \$50 each, to the Sons of the Clergy in the Province of Ontario, tenable from year to year, during the whole period of the recipient's residence at the School, provided that his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The nomination to these Exhibitions rests in the hands of the Archdeacon, subject to the approval of the Head Master, to whom a letter testimonial of previous good conduct must be presented by the applicant.

The REV. HENRY WILSON, D. D., New York, offers an Exhibition (to be known as "The Montie Exhibition"), of the annual value of \$25, to the son of a Clergyman in the Diocese of Ontario, upon the same terms, *mutatis mutandis*, as the "Wilson Exhibitions."

Bursaries.

The Corporation offers to the sons of the Clergy in the Dominion of Canada TWENTY BURSARIES, of the annual value of \$120 each, tenable from year to year during the whole period of a boy's residence at the School, so long as his conduct and attention to his studies continue to satisfy the Head Master.

The son of any Clergyman who is, or was at the time of his death, actually engaged in Parochial or Missionary work, or in a Church School or College, in the Dominion, shall be eligible for a Bursary. Written application must be made to the Corporation by the Parent or Guardian of the boy, certifying that, without the aid thus afforded, the educational advantages of the School cannot be obtained for him. *Ceteris paribus* preference will be given to the sons of the Clergy in the Dioceses of Toronto, Ontario, Niagara, and Algoma.

Scholarship.

A Scholarship of the annual value of \$60 has been founded in memory of the late Rev. Frederick Alexander Bethune, M. A., who died on the 20th of January, 1877, at Cannes in France, and who had been for nine years a most efficient and zealous Assistant Master in the School.

The Scholarship (to be known as "THE REV. F. A. BETHUNE SCHOLARSHIP") will be awarded annually to the boy who obtains the highest number of marks for General Proficiency in the Fifth Form Examination in July, on condition that the holder continues for another year to pursue his studies in the Sixth Form of the School. The Scholarship will not be awarded unless at least two-thirds of the total number of marks be obtained.

Boarding.

Boarders are received into the School House, a building warmed and ventilated on the most approved system, and furnished with bath rooms and all other appliances which can promote the comfort and health of the boys. It is under the personal supervision of the Head Master, assisted by six Resident Masters, who direct the boys' evening work. The household arrangements are attended to by experienced Lady Matrons.

It is particularly requested that parents should send their boys to school with all their clothing, linen, and other requisites, carefully and *clearly marked with the name in full.*

It is desired that no eatables should be sent to the boys during Term, with the exception of fruit.

Pupils from a distance are allowed, upon application, to remain in residence during the Christmas and Easter Vacations at a charge of \$5 per week for board. No pupils are permitted to remain during the summer holidays.

It is recommended that Pocket Money should be supplied to the younger boys only through the Head Master, instead of directly from home. A small sum furnished weekly is more beneficial than an occasional larger amount.

Wednesdays, Saturdays, and Saints' Days, are half-holidays.

The Chapel.

During Term Prayers are said in the Chapel on Week-days at 8.45 in the morning, and immediately before study in the evening. On Sundays there are full services at 11 a. m. and 4 p.m. The Holy Communion is celebrated every Sunday morning at 7:30. The Lord Bishop of Toronto holds an Annual Confirmation in the Chapel on a Sunday before Easter.

Terms.

The School Year is divided into three Terms of about thirteen weeks each :—

Michaelmas Term, 1885 : From September 10 to December 23.

Lent Term, 1886 : January 13 to April 14.

Trinity Term, 1886 : April 28 to July 14.

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Vacations.

Two weeks at Easter ; eight weeks at Midsummer ; three weeks at Christmas. Return tickets are issued for the holidays by the Grand Trunk, Canadian Pacific, Northern and North-Western, and Midland Railways, for one fare and a third ; and for the Midsummer holidays by the Ontario and Richelieu Company's steamboats, at greatly reduced rates.

Examinations and Prizes.

Examinations are held at the end of the Michaelmas and Trinity Terms ; the latter is conducted by the Professors of Trinity College, and other gentlemen unconnected with the School. A General Proficiency Prize is given at Christmas and Midsummer to the head boy of each Form. A report of the progress and general conduct of each Pupil is sent by the Head Master to parents or guardians, at the end of each half-term, and at the close of each Examination.

In addition of the General Proficiency Prizes, most of which are provided by an annual grant from Trinity College, Toronto, the following special Prizes are offered for competition :—

The Chancellor's Prize is awarded to the Head Boy of the School, according to the result of the Midsummer Examination.

A Silver medal, presented by W. S. J. Douglas Esq., of New Orleans, La., (to be known as “THE DOUGLAS MEDAL”) is offered for competition. It is awarded to the boy who passes the best examination in Mathematics, in the highest Form.

A Bronze Medal, presented by Mrs. Perram and Mrs. Gaviller, is awarded annually, by vote of the Masters, to the boy who has chiefly distinguished himself by “Steady Perseverance in Industry, Courtesy, and Integrity.”

A Prize for Reading is offered by R. H. Bethune Esq.

A Prize for Botany is offered by the Rev. the Provost of Trinity College; and one for Physical Geography by the Hon. G. W. Allan, Chancellor of the University.

A Prize offered by the Head Master for the best Collection in any department of Natural Science, made by any boy during the course of the School year, is awarded at the end of the Summer Vacation.

The Rev. Professor Schneider, with the object of encouraging the reading of the Bible, offers two Prizes (the first of the value of \$10) to the boys who pass the best Examination on certain specified books of the Holy Scriptures. The Examination is held at the close of Lent Term, and the competition is open to the whole School.

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Classics—

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History, &

A friend of the School, as a token of his gratitude for the benefits that his sons have received there, offers Five Prizes annually, one to be awarded to the boy in each Form who obtains the *Second Place* in General Proficiency at the Midsummer Examination, on condition that his marks amount to at least sixty per cent. of the total number, and that he is not more than five per cent. of the marks behind the winner of the first place, the object being to reward very diligent boys who come very close to the winners of the First Prizes. No Second Prize will be given in any Form which does not contain at least ten competitors. Should there be more than five boys entitled to these Prizes, the Head Master shall award them to those who, in his judgment, have proved themselves most deserving by their steady work during the year.

The Prizes at Midsummer in the Fifth and Sixth Forms are now determined by the Examiners of the University of Trinity College, as the Matriculation and Scholarship Examinations are now held at the end of June, instead of in October as formerly.

Wykeham Hall, formerly the residence of the late Sir J. B. Macaulay, which was first acquired by the School in 1870, and greatly enlarged, is an extensive and handsome building, surrounded by beautiful and secluded grounds, admirably situated for school purposes.

TERMS.—The Scholastic Year is divided into four Terms of ten weeks. Michaelmas Term begins on the first Wednesday in September. Christmas Term begins on the 10th of November, and ends on the 10th of February, with Vacation from the 22nd of December to the 13th of January. Lent Term begins on the 11th of February. Trinity Term begins on the 22nd of April.
