THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF
THE PRISON GATE MISSION AND HAVEN,
320 SEATON ST., TORONTO,
1890-91.

In presenting our Annual Report, the Board of Managers desire to acknowledge, with deepest reverence, our thanks to Almighty God for the many signal blessings vouchsafed us during the past seventeen months, praising Him continually for His guidance and protection. The Report covers seventeen months, instead of twelve, owing to the change it was found needful to make to enable the Treasurer and Secretary to close the accounts at the same time of the year, as required for the Government returns. This change in the time of closing our year, and other reasons, led to the necessity of severing the tie that had for so many years connected our work with the Young Women's Christian Association. With many earnest wishes for the continuation and increase of our prosperity, our mother society granted us our independence in May last. As soon as the proper papers have been prepared, steps will be taken to secure the rights of incorporation.

The past seventeen months have been full of encouragement. Labourers seeking souls have been very earnestly at work in our vineyard, proclaiming to all the glad tidings of a Saviour and His free salvation.

Two industrial departments are now well established, and every effort towards partial self-support encouraged, as the Haven is a temporary and transferring home, these efforts are surrounded by many very serious difficulties, difficulties that will remain to be contended with as long as the nature of our home continues unchanged. The success attained in the industrial departments has been chiefly forwarded by the unwearied patience and efforts of the matrons and forewomen in charge, and also by the cheerful and reliable manner in which many of the inmates have assisted; some among them have earned special praise, and have shown a high appreciation of the Home, and a nonest desire to be industriously employed.

The attention of the Board of Managers has been directed to the very dilapidated condition of the old house, and Dr. Gullen, the attending physician, has for a long time constantly remarked upon the extremely unhealthy atmosphere of that part of the building. Proper ventilation is impossible, the plumbing has been condemned as unfit for use, and past repairing. Mr. Christie, Government Inspector, and Dr. Allan, City Health Officer, have reported the old wing as in an unsanitary state, and not practicable for repairing. So grave a condition of affairs obliged the consideration of the removal of the old wing and arranging for the completion of the proposed new building. In accordance with the request

of a deputation, the City Council generously made a special grant of \$700.00 a year for a term of years, to assist in the erection of the new building. It has been estimated that the sum of \$25,000.00 will be required to complete and furnish the proposed laundry business, this department being greatly cramped for want of room and better arrangements. Through the kind interest of Mr. Wm. Kerr and Mr. McCarter, a grant of \$250.00 has been received from the York County Council; a donation of \$100.00 per Mr. McCarter, and other small sums; these form the beginning of the sum so greatly needed to enable the Board of Managers to commence building. It is earnestly requested that every one reading this report will kindly make an effort to assist in raising the required \$25,000.

We wish to record our sincere sympathy with those members of our committee who have, in the providence of God, during the past months, been called upon to mourn the present loss of those dear to them. The sudden death of Mrs. Parkinson, in December, 1890, came as a solemn reminder of the uncertainty of life. In Mrs. Parkinson our Board lost an interested and earnest worker. The Master has also called from among us our faithful co-worker, Mr. Mair, who for so many years conducted the Monday evening Bible class. In recording so many instances of earthly trial and sorrow, our minds are led to turn to God's promises for comfort, that we may stay our hearts upon Him who has said, "I am the resurrection and the life; he that believeth in Me, though he were dead, yet shall he live; and whosoever liveth and believeth in Me shall never die."

Our grateful acknowledgments are due to many Christian workers, who have assisted in the spiritual work of the Home. The Ven. Archdeacon Boddy, who still continues to hold a short service every Tuesday afternoon. The Rev. Charles Silvester, Mr. W. H. Howland, Mr. Fairbairn, Mr. Stark, Mr. McCarter, Mr. Brace, Mr. Beaumont, Mr. Burke, Mr. Thos. Bone, Dr. Moffatt, Mr. W. Kerr, Mr. Best, Mr. Margaret, Mr. Davies and band of workers, Miss Parker, Miss Sweetnam, Miss Webster, Miss Aitken, and three circles of "King's Daughters."

Our harvest field has had many busy and earnest workers in it, and we rejoice to feel assured that the first and highest aim of our work, that of seeking souls, is carefully and faithfully carried out.

We are particularly indebted to the following friends for special efforts made to raise money during the past months:—Mr. and Mrs. A. R. Williams, for holding a parlor concert, and arranging for and managing a grand concert, held in Association Hall—Signor and Madam D'Auria, and the other artists who so kindly gave their services; Mrs. H. L. Canfield, for assisting with the arrangements for the grand concert; Mrs. Smith, Miss Sweetnam and Miss Aitken, in giving an "At Home" at the Haven; Miss Sweetnam, for visiting the Gaol; the city newspapers, for notices inserted; and several printing firms, for work done free of charge; Mr. Glendon, of the Dominion Organ Co., for arranging to supply us with a superior organ for the services, and after arranging to take the old instrument as part payment, in kindly granting it to the Home as a donation. Mrs. Neville kindly remembers to send a very acceptable yearly donation of a web of cotton.

The Board of management take this opportunity of returning their sincere thanks to all the kind friends who by their donations and yearly subscriptions have sustained the work in the past, and express their gratitude to the Ontario Legislature, the Toronto City Council and York County Council, for their grants of money towards the maintenance of Home.

The reports of the sub-committees for the past year and five months

are extremely encouraging. A much greater degree of system has prevailed in the Home. The work is carefully divided among the inmates. The following list of workers is given, April 1st, 1891:—8 women at work in the wash house; 8 women in the ironing room; 9 women in the sewing room; 1 woman in kitchen as assistant cook; 1 woman as messenger for laundry; 3 women in the dining rooms; 7 women employed at general housework; 2 women in charge of nurseries; 1 woman as house laundress; 1 woman as matron's help; 3 women going out to work by the day; 4 invalids; 1 incorrigible. Out of 49 inmates, 44 workers.

The faithful and unabated kindness of our attending physician, Dr. Augusta Stowe Gullen, calls for the sincerest expressions of appreciation. Very often are Dr. Gullen's kind offices in request, and with unwavering patience all are attended to. Some of these cases require attention of a nature disagreeable to administer to. But with Dr. Gullen personal considerations are ever set aside, and care and sympathy extended to every needy one.

Mrs. Moore, so widely known and esteemed in connection with our Haven, and its past and present inmates, has been able, notwithstanding the increasing burdens of age and failing health, to retain her position as head of the household. For some months Miss Moore has been devoting her services to the Home, thus relieving her mother of many of the duties depending upon her, a needful respite, which it is hoped will result in the perfect restoration of Mrs. Moore's health, and her long continued presence in the Home.

The Purchaser has been able to supply the Home with provisions of a superior quality, at low rates. The hospitals have been faithfully visited, and the influence of such visits is of great use in the work.

The Jail has been regularly visited, and any woman promising to come to the Haven, has been met upon the morning of her discharge if necessary. Young women serving first sentences are particularly visited.

The Laundry and Sewing Room reports will be found on another page. The success of these departments seems assured, and the benefit derived by the Home from their establishment cannot be fully estimated.

During the year a letter was received from the Secretary of the Young Women's Christian Association, inviting our Board to join in holding a "Union Prayer Meeting," at which all the committees of city charitable Homes were expected to meet and join in prayer, more especially that a spirit of unity and love might be poured into the hearts of all Christian workers, that by this means a blessing and furtherance of the Master's work might follow, and faithful workers be drawn into closer bonds of fellowship. Several of these meetings have been held, and a continuance of the Union Prayer Meeting is looked forward to.

The special service of praise and thanksgiving, held in our Home for the past two years, has commended itself to all those interested in our work. Each year so many special mercies are vouchsafed us, that a special service of praise and thanksgiving to the Heavenly Provider, as an acknowledgment seems eminently called for.

As the population of our city rapidly increases, greater numbers of friendless and fallen women are needing help, and there is an ever increasing need of earnest prayers, that the workers may be more consecrated and faithful—need of earnest prayer to strengthen the hands and hearts of those seeking the lost and wandering in the dark places of sin.

In looking up the different sources from which the Haven receives its inmates, we find that a number of very *respectable* women and girls are every year *obliged* (from lack of *means* to go elsewhere) to seek shelter in the Home. As the Home is for the shelter of fallen women, much regret

is felt that such a *necessity* should exist, and that outside of the House of Industry there is not a free home for even the *temporal* shelter of respectable women. Where the character is found to be respectable, prompt effort is made to secure a home or situation out of the Haven, and to furnish reliable guarantee of character. In some cases the wives of men out of work, or who are ill, come to us to be helped over a time of trial. Sometimes incorrigible cases from other institutions are sent to the Haven, if possible to tide them over "a restless time." Two cases for the Asylum were for some months sheltered, and proper steps taken for their removal to the Asylum. Varied indeed are the sources from which the household is made up, and no one, unacquainted with the work and the difficulties of governing a family formed of such dissimilar characters, can rightly understand the effort required, and the strain made upon the nervous system of the matrons in charge. When the labour required in the industrial departments, and that needed to maintain a cleanly and well ordered household is considered, it can be readily admitted, that in claiming to be an *industrious* family we are not going past the mark.

During the past year more than one or two of our former inmates have been comfortably married. Several infants have gone to adopted homes; forty-five infants were taken with their mothers to situations secured for them; thirty-five mothers took their infants to the Infant's Home. From these figures it will be seen that for over eighty infants was secured the personal care of their mothers. No infant is allowed to be separated from its mother unless for adoption, or when some fully responsible person undertakes to provide for it. Every effort is made to prevent the farming of infants. Every maternity case is required to promise to perform the duties of motherhood. This promise is given in the presence of the Board of Management, and is entered in the minutes. Three ways of providing for the future of the infant are optional to mothers:—To return to friends, in which case it is the rule to insure the knowledge that the friends are *willing* to receive them. To go to the Infants' Home, if eligible. To take a situation with infant. When friends or relatives of the woman are willing to take care of the infant, and become responsible for its welfare, this provision is allowed. The experience of years, during which many hundreds of maternity cases have been dealt with, is, that the future welfare of mother and child depends upon their *not being separated*; of all the necessities that force themselves upon the attention of the Board of Managers, this is one of the most important. Christian effort for the restoration of the lost and wandering, often brings the worker face to face with difficulties, of a nature that no wisdom of man, or precept of the world can solve. What law can society formulate that will enable justice to be done in a case where two persons sin equally—but where one, and the weaker one, alone bears the consequence of that dual sin. Think of it, in one year, one institution alone can show that nearly one hundred women, some under the age of sixteen, have had to become responsible for the support of their infants, while the fathers of these infants, who are able to earn a far greater wage do nothing for them whatever. Where are these fathers? It would be but loss of time to inquire further; *they are never* to be found. We can only try to render some help and encouragement to these heavily burdened women. Without a character, and with an infant in arms, work must be secured. What a prospect! And here a very sad truth must be mentioned, many—and in no way is this an exaggeration—of these girls are not fully wise, they are lacking the *ordinary* degree of mental capacity. In looking for a way in which some provision for such unfortunates can be made, it is intended to extend our work, to further enlarge the capacity of the building, and to

provide such industrial work within the Home, as will enable the inmates to be self-supporting, and assist them to rightly perform the duties of motherhood. We feel assured that every higher instinct of womanhood is by this means strengthened within them, and temptations removed. We confidently hope that the result will prove that *baby murders* will rapidly decrease. The cruel neglect and desertion of these unfortunate infants, and the magnitude of the death rate among them is a matter that demands our serious attention. If you doubt it, go find some of these slowly starved and plentifully drugged little ones—look into the poor distressed features—mark the lines of suffering—and the quickened breath. See on the face of a babe of months that look of age—watch that painful struggle for life, and then you will cease to doubt. Many charitable works are needed in our city, but none cries out more painfully, or more urgently to be undertaken, than this one, in which the distressed voice of the most helpless age of humanity waits forth an entreaty for help. Christian mothers, lend your aid in providing a home for these little babies, a home where they can have a mother's care. Christian men, to whom God has given the powers to provide, we ask your aid in providing for these helpless little ones.

“Have ye looked for the sheep in the desert?
 For those who have missed their way,
 Have ye seen in the wild waste places,
 Where the lost and wandering stray?
 Have ye trodden the lonely highway,
 The foul and darksome street?
 It may be ye'd see in the groaning
 The print of *My* wounded feet.
 Have ye wept with the broken-hearted,
 In their agony of woe?
 Ye might hear *Me* whispering beside you,
 'Tis a pathway I often go.
My disciples, *My* brethren, *My* friends,
 Can ye dare to follow *Me*?
 Then where the Master dwelleth,
 There shall the servant be.”

“THOU CROWNEST THE YEAR WITH THY GOODNESS.”

This we gratefully acknowledge in reviewing the work of the past twelve months, in connection with the various services and meetings held within these walls. We thank God that the good seed of the kingdom has again and again been sown, and that we have been cheered from time to time by the knowledge that it has taken deep root in the hearts of some of the hearers. We have also been much encouraged by the increasing interest evinced in these meetings by those *outside* the Home, and the readiness of Christian workers to *come in* and help us. So the seed is sown, and though reasoning sometimes suggest that the soil is unpromising, we rejoice that it is written, “In the morning sow thy seed, and in the evening withhold not thine hand, for thou knowest not whether shall prosper, this or that, or whether they both shall be alike good.”

The following cases selected from others will suffice to show that we have cause for thankfulness, and encouragement to labour on.
 A young girl sought the shelter of our “Home” some time since—
 one of the many of the “betrayed and forsaken.” While here she was

converted, and after a time left us to fill an honorable position in life. A young companion to whom she was much attached used to visit her when at the "Haven," and has since written to tell us, that through these visits and the influence of her friend, she also had been led to give her heart to the Lord.

An interesting German girl, who had been led astray, came to us, and after remaining here for a while, left, having obtained a situation. She has been to see us recently, and we were rejoiced to learn that she had become a Christian—had united with the Church—and was about to be married to one who is a servant of the Lord. She thankfully acknowledged the goodness of God in bringing her here. Scattered here and there throughout the country are bright and happy homes, where at the family altar the "Haven" is often remembered.

A dear child of God has lately left us for a permanent home. Within a short time she was deprived of a kind husband, and son, by accident, and of another son by malignant fever while from home. Following this came other losses, then, ill-health with *intense suffering*, but in all, she patiently endured, and will ever be grateful for the benefits here received.

In passing through one of the upper halls on a lovely morning this spring, we noticed two of our inmates seated at a window, into which the sunlight was streaming; both were Christians, the one "a sister" at times greatly afflicted—the other, a case of hereditary insanity, to be sent that day to an asylum for the insane. They were speaking of the "things of God" and saying "last words" to each other, and then softly and sweetly they sang together:

"Jesus, Saviour, pilot me,
Over life's tempestuous sea;
Unknown waves before me roll,
Hiding rock, and treacherous shoal
Chart and compass come from Thee,
Jesus, Saviour, pilot me."

We rejoiced in the thought, that though in the one case the mind was beclouded, and in the other the body was weak and frail, He would safely lead them both into the Haven of Eternal Rest.

CONSTITUTION

— OF THE —

Toronto Prison Gate Mission and Haven

I.

The Institution shall be called the Toronto Prison Gate Mission and Haven.

II.

The object of the Mission shall be, intermediate reformatory work, the visiting of the Gaol, the meeting of female prisoners on the morning of discharges, and the maintenance of a home for the shelter of friendless and fallen women.

III.

The management of the Toronto Prison Gate Mission and Haven shall be vested in a committee of Ladies, known as the Board of Management. The said Board of Management shall elect annually from among themselves, a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and appoint all Sub-Committees.

IV.

An Advisory Board of Gentlemen shall be elected at the annual business meeting, and shall be consulted in all matters referring to the building, and the important alterations and repairing thereof, also in the investment of the funds.

V.

The Board of Managers shall meet weekly for the transaction of all business. The annual meeting for the election of officers, shall be held on the first Wednesday of October, or as near that date as possible, at which annual meeting, a report of the preceding twelve months shall be submitted, and arrangements made for the annual public meeting.

VI.

The funds necessary for the support of this Institution, shall be procured from Government, County and City grants, annual subscriptions, donations, collections and bequests, &c.

VII.

In electing new members to the Board of Management, one month's notice in writing shall be given at one of the weekly meetings, in which notice shall be set forth, the name and residence of the lady proposed.

VIII.

The Board of Management shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution, By-Laws and Rules, provided one month's notice shall be given in writing, setting forth the alteration or amendment proposed, but no such alteration or amendment shall be made unless the same shall be carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Board of Management.

RULES

I.

The regular meetings of the Board of Management shall be held on Wednesday at half past ten. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary upon the order of the President, or at the request of any three members, at such time and place as may be ordered.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with Scripture reading and prayer. Five members, of whom one shall be an officer, shall form a quorum at regular weekly meeting. The President, or, in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, or some one chosen by the meeting shall preside. She shall sign the minutes of the preceding meeting, and shall propose and declare all resolutions, giving the casting vote in case of a tie.

III.

For the investment or disposal of the funds, or the sale of any of the property of the Institution, a quorum of nine members of the Board of Management, of whom three shall be officers, shall be necessary. But no such investment, or disposal, or sale shall take place without the consent in writing of a majority of the Advisory Board.

IV.

The Secretary shall keep a record of all business transacted, read the same at the following meeting, and inform the meeting of all correspondence connected with the work. She shall give notice of all special meetings, prepare an annual report of the progress and prospects of the Institution, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office.

V.

The Treasurer shall receive all monies for the use of the Institution, deposit the same in one of the chartered banks of the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditures, and pay all accounts by cheques, on the order of the Board of Managers. She shall present a report on the first Wednesday of each month; prepare a statement showing receipts and expenditure during the year, to be submitted at the annual business meeting. Said statement to be audited by some one appointed by the Board of Management.

VI.

The various departments of work shall be in charge of Sub-Committees, to consist of one or more members, and a report of each department shall be submitted upon the first Wednesday of each month.

VII.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all discussion shall be addressed to the chair, and only one member shall be allowed to speak at a time.

VIII.

Any member of the Board of Management absenting herself from 12 consecutive regular meetings, except from sickness, or other unavoidable cause, shall thereupon cease to be a member of the Board of Management. Members unavoidably absent are requested to notify the Secretary.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

The visitor for the week shall give a report every Wednesday. She shall interview all admissions, note departures, and temporarily absent in the hospitals. She shall read, pray and converse with inmates either individually or collectively, as she may deem proper. She shall have a general supervision of the household, and shall visit as frequently as possible. She shall confer with the Matron with regard to the holding of religious services at the Haven.

II.

City cases awaiting admission to maternity hospitals, shall not be received as regular inmates until they have procured a city pass.

III.

All maternity cases who are eligible for admission to the Infants' Home, shall be required to go there, unless some other provision for mother and child, approved of by the committee, has been made. Maternity cases, not eligible for admission to the Infants' Home, shall be arranged for by the Board of Management as soon as possible after admission.

IV.

Former inmates having left their situations without proper cause, are not to be admitted, unless they report themselves *immediately* to the Matron or a member of the Committee, and shall not be retained as inmates unless the Board of Management consider they had sufficient cause for leaving their situation.

V.

Inmates leaving other charitable institutions without just cause, shall not be retained as regular inmates.

VI.

Inmates incapable, through sickness, age or infirmity of employment and not having friends, shall be transferred, as speedily as possible to benevolent institutions in the city or elsewhere.

VII.

When circumstances admit, inmates shall be required to pay one dollar and a half a week for board—fifteen cents for lodging and breakfast. The admission of inmates shall not in any case, *depend* upon their ability to offer remuneration, and those able to pay are in no way excused from taking part in the work.

VIII.

Infants shall not be adopted without the approval of the Board of Management, and parties wishing to adopt must furnish references.

IX.

Applicants sent with a written order by the Mayor, any member of the Council, Minister, member of Board of Management or other responsible person, shall be admitted, *if the order be presented within a reasonable time after its issue*, applicant to await the action of the Board of Management.

(NOTE.—This condition is imposed, to prevent persons decidedly intoxicated from expecting to be admitted, any one sending applicant, will kindly mark the time in the note.)

RULES FOR MATRONS AND INMATES.

I.

It shall be the duty of the Matron to take charge of the household, receive visitors wishing to inspect the Institution, and those applying for servants and charwomen, interview all applicants for admission, and friends of the inmates. Inspect all letters received by inmates and control the behaviour of the inmates. In cases of insubordination, the Assistant Matrons shall appeal to her.

II.

The Matron shall take charge of all monies brought into the Home by inmates, giving a receipt for the same, keep an accurate account of money paid out for board and other expenses and submit said account to the Treasurer upon the first Wednesday of each month, and pay to her all money received for board during the foregoing month.

III.

The Matron shall admit all applicants subject to the approval of the Board of Management.

IV.

Inmates regularly engaged in the work of the industrial departments, shall not be sent to situations or removed from the department, without the knowledge and consent of the Convener of the Sub-Committee in charge of that department.

V.

The First Assistant Matron shall act in the absence of the Matron, have charge of the housekeeping, and the supervision of the maternity wing, and employ the inmates of said wing.

VI.

The Second Assistant Matron shall have charge of the Prison Gate wing and Laundry, and employ inmates of said wing.

VII.

A room in each wing of the building shall be set apart for use as a nursery, in which infants shall be kept separate from the rest of the inmates, during the hours of work; one, or more, women shall be placed in charge, and shall be responsible to the Assistant Matrons for the proper discharge of her duties.

VIII.

Inmates shall rise at 6 o'clock. Breakfast shall be served at 7.30, Dinner at 12, and Tea at 6 p.m. Morning prayers held at 8.15, Evening Prayers at 7.30. Hour for retiring 9.30. All inmates required to be present at prayers, and to attend the various services held in the Home.

IX.

All inmates are required to assist in the industrial departments and household work, any refusing to do so shall not be retained as an inmate

X.

When employment offers, any inmate capable of work shall be required to accept it. The rate of wages to be agreed upon in the presence of the Matron and proposed employer.

XI.

The use of profane language *strictly* forbidden, a second offence to be reported to the Board of Management. Smoking not allowed.

XII.

The infringement of any of the above rules, improper behaviour, and insubordination, if continued after remonstrance by the Matrons, weekly Visitor or any member of the Board of Management, shall render the offender liable to expulsion.

XIII.

Former inmates visiting the Haven shall report themselves at once to one of the Matrons, and shall not be allowed to enter the industrial departments or dormitories, without special permission.

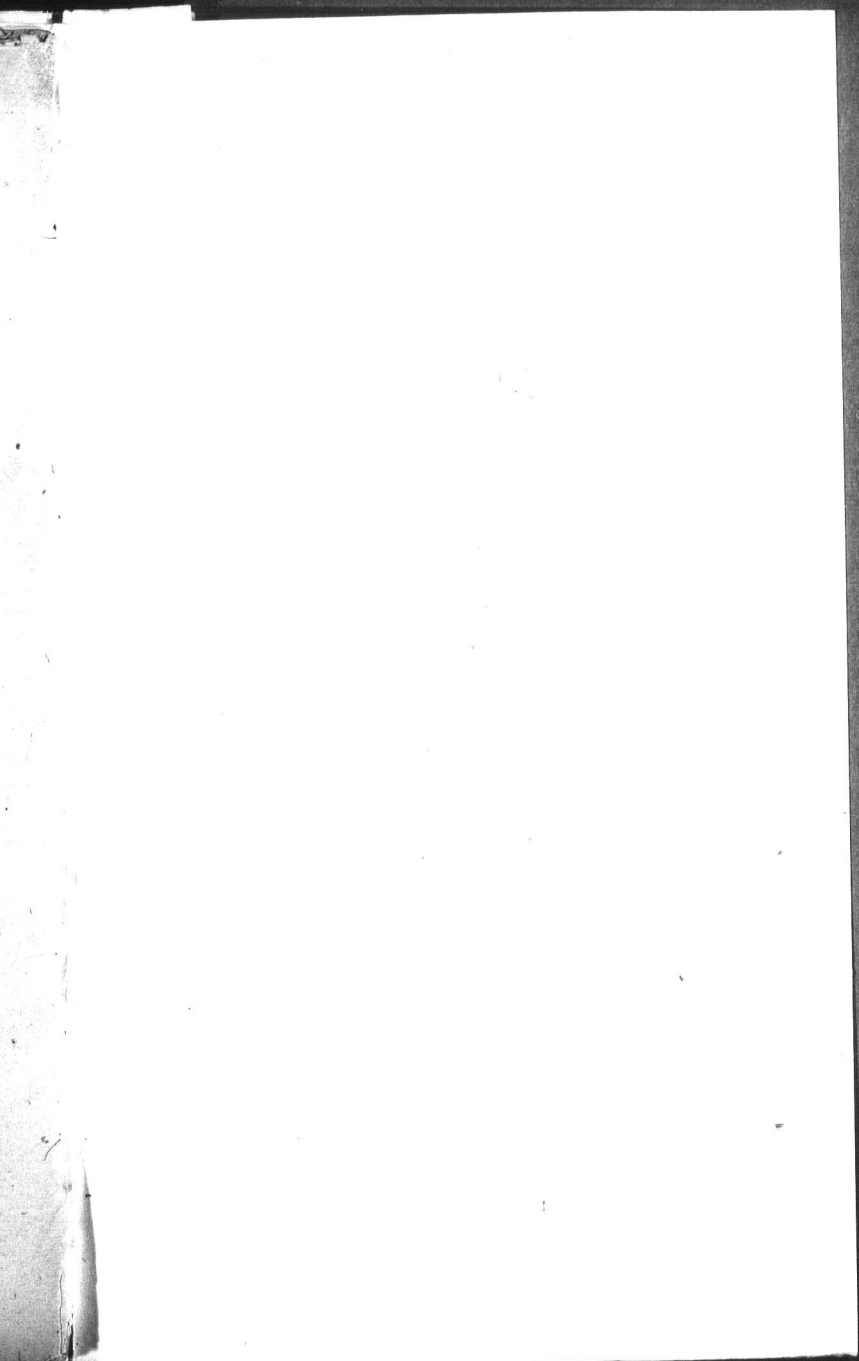
