General Post Office

Reduction of postage rate on newspapers, magazines and trade journals sent from the United Kingdom to Newfoundland or from Newfoundland to the United Kingdom will become effective on and after the 1st December instant.

Newspapers and periodicals registered as such in Newfoundland or the United Kingdom will be forwarded at a special rate of two cents (10 per lb., but newspapers not exceeding 2 ounces in weight are transmissible as heretofore for 1 cent (4d). In case of packet weighing over 1 lb., any fraction of a lb. is counted as a pound.

Packets intended for transmission must be posted in covers open at both ends, and easily removable for the purpose of examination.

No packet of newspapers or magazines posted for transmission at this rate must exceed in weight 5 lbs., or exceed 2 feet in length or 1 foot in width or depth.

The S. A. Band

Visits Conception Bay Towns

The S. A. Band of No. 2 Corps, St. John's, in charge of Staff-Capt. W. H. Cave, are touring Conception Bay towns this week and rendering a musical programme in most of the principal places. They left St. John's on Saturday, Jan. 22, and proceeded direct to Carbonear. While the train was stopped for a few moments at Bay Roberts station the band stepped on to the platform and serenaded this town by playing a couple of selections. The first concert took place in the S. A. Citadel at Carbonear Saturday night. Hundreds turned out to listen to the strains of music sweet, and all present voted the performance a rare treat. Meetings were also held Sunday morning, afternoon and night. Staff-Capt. Cave had charge, and nine conversations resulted.

On Monday night the musical programme was repeated in the S. A. Citadel at St. John's, where another large and appreciative audience was present. Taking the train at St. John's Tuesday afternoon the band came as far as Bay Roberts, where they detained and marched to Port-de-Grave, a distance of about four miles, playing lively airs as they went. The programme was again great at that place Tuesday evening, and returned made to Bay Roberts Wednesday morning. During the day they played some delightful music at night at the S. A. Citadel a large and attentive audience was present to show their appreciation of their efforts in rendering such an interesting and delightful programme, which was well received and applauded for about two hours, during which time not a dull moment was experienced.

A. H. Bence introduced the band to the audience, and on behalf of Bay Roberts tendered them a hearty welcome to this town.

The band has certainly made great progress during the past year, and under the leadership of Bandmaster C. Horwood, did credit to themselves and to the organization which they represent. Where there was their goods, and their players were careful and sympathetic playing was wanting, such was rendered. Every one present voted the event a great success.

Opening of the House

The opening of the second session of the 22nd General Assembly of Newfoundland took place on Wednesday afternoon, Jan. 23rd, at 3 o'clock. Thousands of people filled the grounds in front of the House of Parliament. The Constabulary, Brigades and R. N. R. were lined up on either side of the grounds, and when His Excellency Sir Ralph Williams and suite drove up, the G.L.B. band played the National Anthem. Arriving at the Chamber of the Legislative Council, the members of the House of Assembly were summoned, when His Excellency delivered the speech from the Throne. Numerous prominent citizens were among the audience, and many ladies. After the speech had been read, the members of the Legislature returned to the Assembly, while His Excellency returned to Government House.

Legislative Council

After the departure of His Excellency and suite at 3.30 p.m. Wednesday, the business of the Council for the present session was taken up. Hon. J. Alex. Robinson proposed that the members of the Council be sworn in.

The Hon. M. G. Winter, who made his maiden speech in the Chamber. After other matters had been taken up, the Council adjourned until 4.30 p.m. Tuesday.

House of Assembly

After the formal opening of the Legislature by His Excellency the Governor, the members of the House of Assembly returned to their Chamber when the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne was moved by Mr. R. A. Squires, the member for Trinity, and ably seconded by Mr. R. J. Devereaux, the member for Placentia and St. Mary's.

Sir Robert Bond, Leader of the Opposition, followed with a criticism of the speech. He was in turn followed by the Premier, Sir E. P. Morris.

After a committee was appointed to draft the Address in Reply, the House adjourned at 7.20 until 4 p.m. Thursday.

Our Toronto Letter

The Nfld. Society

Toronto, Canada, Jan. 18, 1910.—The adjourned meeting of the recently formed Nfld. Society of Toronto was held here on Sat., Jan. 15th, the purpose of the meeting being to elect officers and complete the details of organization. A very enthusiastic meeting it was, there being a large number of the stalwart sons of Nfld. present, and (I say it with pride) a finer looking lot of men never assembled themselves together on Canadian soil. While some are renewing old acquaintances and others forming new ones and giving the Nfld. hand-shake, for which Newfoundlanders are noted, a sound of applause makes us look toward the door. We find the applause is caused by the arrival of the Hon. A. B. Morine, who has done much toward the organization of the Newfoundlanders in Toronto. The meeting was opened and business at once attended to. The report of the Constitution and By-Laws Committee was presented and considered clause by clause until all are dealt with to the satisfaction of all present. The election of officers came next, and resulted in the following gentlemen being elected: President—Hon. A. B. Morine. 1st Vice-President—Rev. C. W. Follett. 2nd Vice-President—Edward Hudson. Secretary—Harold W. Thompson. Treasurer—Enos Hollett. Guard—Arthur Porter. Membership, Visiting and Entertainment committees were appointed to look after the interests of the Society. After this work had been completed, 150 men signed their names as members, and there were many pleasant smiles on the faces of men who have been endeavoring to bring this matter to a successful issue for some time, particularly Mr. Lewis LeGrow, who has put forth much effort to accomplish this work; and also Mr. W. Africa of the Twentieth Century

Missionary Speech Delivered by Rev. W. M. Grandy at the Annual Missionary Meeting, Sound Island, Nfld.

They are a responsive people. It cannot be said that in every instance the African is eager for the gospel of Christ. In many instances he has never heard of it; does not understand what it means. But most of them do believe that the white man's superiority over the black man is due to his religion. Therefore he believes if the African will adopt the white man's religion he will receive benefit thereby. The responsiveness of the African can be epitomized by an incident that fell under the observation of one of our missionaries. He with some natives was sitting upon the porch of a little cabin near Cape Palmas waiting to dedicate a native church which had been built by native hands and native money. The attention of the missionary was attracted by an old man who wore on his shoulders a patchwork quilt and was shuffling slowly along the road. He had a staff in

his hand upon which he leaned heavily. His steps were short and laboured and he appeared to be dragging one foot after the other. As he came within view the residents exclaimed "King Gedy" and descended to meet him. This man was probably near or about one hundred years of age and had not come from the nearest village, but had literally dragged himself for twelve miles to beg that a missionary be sent his people. This is simply one instance, but kings, chiefs, and lay deputations here and there catching such glimpses of the Sun of Righteousness, they are now and then begging for a candle. The white man's coming among them is often welcomed, and he is himself often well nigh worshipped; his example becomes the law of life for the natives. As Mr. Naylor (a missionary) was running a typewriter on board a West Coast ship, King Bonney an African and a man of large influence and wealth, hearing the clicking of the machine stepped into the cabin and doubled up with laughter at the sight of the bobbing type wheel. When he gained sufficient breath to speak, he said, "White man all same, like God." Repeatedly it has been said that the African thinks the white man's learning, inventions and moral life and power are Godlike. So that his whole life and example seems to amount almost to a dictation as to what the African is to do. But, alas! it too often happens that the white man's life and example, he knows, only leads the African astray.

They are a constant people. The African is not one who is led away by every passing influence, he is not as unstable as water. The African who has received the gospel of Christ and becomes converted, is constant. For ill—although the large white Christian population of North Africa was swept away before the Arabian invasion of the seventh century and the white church forever destroyed, the Nubian, Abyssinian and Coptic churches withstood the fire and sword of Mohammed and still stand as monuments of the African constancy. It is nothing short of a miracle of divine grace that the African man and woman, steeped in barbarian animations through untold generations, when converted to Jesus Christ, stands staunch and true in the faith of their fathers.

They are an imperiled people. The Mohammedans are spreading over the continent, and once an African becomes a Mohammedan it is more difficult to reach him with the gospel of Jesus Christ than when he was a pagan. Though Mohammedanism may lift them a little socially, it tolerates slavery, polygamy, and in fact all the wicked and subtle temptations that prey upon the hearts of men and end in social immorality. Africa is imperiled by the railroad, steam boat and caravans which are pushing into the interior and carrying with them the vices of civilization.

Wherever the un-Christian trader goes, he creates conditions that are worse than paganism. It often happens that whole populations have been swept away by rum and social evils which have been taken to Africa by the white man who cared only for the financial gain that he secured in the African trade. The hour for Africa has struck unless the Christians of this generation do what they can for that dark continent, for all of Africa may soon be subnerved in Mohammedanism or the vicious civilization of Europe and America. "Oh, white man," said an aged African chief to the first missionary among his people, "I don't know when I have not heard of your power and your learning. Why did you not come sooner? You have come now and these eyes are too blind to see you. These ears are too deaf to hear you. If you have any message give it to the young men; you are too late for me."

The perils of the African climate and many other disadvantages have called forth heroes and heroines to labour in that dark continent. Mrs. Day (a missionary's wife) who left her husband in Africa while she was home on sick leave, wrote from her dying bed to the husband who might have reached her before death, "Stay where you are; Africa needs you more than I do."

What wonder then that a native exclaimed, "Oh, white man, nothing

conquers you but death." Bishop Hannington, receiving his death thrust as he entered Uganda with the gospel, exclaimed, "I have purchased the way to Uganda with my life." A memorial meeting was held for Hannington, and at its close the leader asked how many of those present were willing to go to Africa and take Hannington's place, and it is said that two hundred stalwart Englishmen rose to their feet as volunteers.

The attention of the public is called to the fact that in the Circulars heretofore issued from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, purporting to be an extract of the Game Laws of Newfoundland, there are certain discrepancies and erroneous statements of the law which have crept into the abstract of the laws by the inadvertence of the Department in former years.

The following correction is to be noted: According to the existing law paragraph 9 on page 3 of the Circular or Abstract aforesaid should stand as follows:

9. "The sale or possession of any part of the carcass of a caribou between the First day of January and the thirty-first day of July in any year, both days inclusive, shall be prima facie evidence of the violation of the 6th Section of the 'Preservation of Deer Act, 1902,' which Section is as follows:—

"No person shall hunt, kill, or pursue with intent to kill any caribou from the first day of February to the thirty-first day of July in any year, both days inclusive, or from the first day of October to the 29th October, both days inclusive."

The seller or possessor of any part of such carcass shall be liable to the penalties provided under Section 3 of the said "Deer Preservation Act, 1902," unless he prove to the satisfaction of a Stipendiary Magistrate or Justice of the Peace before whom complaint is made, that the caribou was killed within a period when such killing was lawful.

Playing Our Part

What Are We Doing?

With the closing of the old year and the opening of a new one it is customary for preachers to urge upon their congregations the necessity of reviewing their lives as they have lived them during the year just closed. This is usually done for the purpose of having them see their faults, shortcomings and sins, if any, so that in the year upon which they have entered they may learn from the lessons of the past how best they may be able to use the days which are to come.

This same principle may with profit be applied to our lives secular. For if we review our actions during the year just gone, we may discover possibly something upon which we may not be able to rest the approbation of our best ideals and consciences. There are none too insignificant in this world but what he has some part to play. There are scarcely any problems of a public nature that concerns one but what concerns us all; and if this be true, it behoves us, as citizens, to examine ourselves and see if we have played our part well during the year just closed.

Whether we realize it or not, we are all vitally interested in the country in which we live; in the Empire to which we belong, and particularly in the town where our homes are and where we are supposed to make our living. Have we been interested as we should in its welfare? Or have we taken a back seat, merely watching and criticizing the other fellow's doings;

never applauding, never encouraging, never lending a hand or voice, but on the contrary doing everything possible to stop any progress in our midst. Or if not putting impediments in the way, assuming a negative attitude, which amounts to about the same. We remember, after the late election, a gentleman, saying to us one day, "Well, my that the Tories have been elected I hope the fishery the coming summer will be a failure, and the Norwegians will have the biggest catch that ever they had!" This is a picture of the man we are trying to describe. Ye fear there are too many such men in this struggling country of ours. When a man allows his politics to descend to such a level, we feel that he is of no account to be pitted.

There seems to exist in this town, as a result especially of the last political contest, a certain amount of bad feeling and jealousy. The defeated ones are said to be "sore" on the victors, but for the life of us we cannot see the reason why. No man or number of men holds any mortgage on the government of a country. A party is returned to power by the will of the people expressed through the ballot box, and under our system of government the majority wins.
In this connection we may cite the case of a municipal election held recently in a Canadian city where a man, the defeated candidate for Mayor, who was before his nomination a Controller, sent the following message to be read at the inaugural meeting of Council: "I leave with the kindest feelings to wards all of the members that if in the heat of debate I have offended anybody, I apologize. I am disappointed over my failure to be elected, but I feel no sense of defeat. I have been loyal to my colleagues and to the citizens, and would repeat every vote I registered during my three years of office. I wish the mayor-elect a year of progress." This, it seems to us, should be the correct attitude for any public man to assume. It sets a splendid example for men in public life in this country as well as the men who take an active part in the contest.

Do we want to build up our town? Do we want to secure certain industries which will give our people employment and stop the flow of immigration which is continually going on? If we do, we must stop our quibblings and bickerings, and to the winds non-essentials, and all
