OUTRAGEOUS PROCEEDING

NEW BRUNSWICK UNIVERSITY
STUDENT SOCIETY
ED. MONTAGUE.

On a Pledge of Conspiracy to
Hinder—Continued in the City from
yesterday night to this morning.

MONDAY, JULY 15.—A most outrageous
and unprovoked assault was made here
on Saturday afternoon, when Miss Annie
Thibbitts, the daughter of a well-known
merchant of Fredericton, N. B., and the
first lady in the University of New
Brunswick, who was passing through
Delaware on the evening of the 14th, was
attacked by a party of men, who were
having been mixed up in a mysterious
marriage case which occurred here a few
months ago. One of the men, who was
seen by the witness, was a young Englishman
after marrying one of the sisters dis-
appeared and has never since been heard
of.

Miss Thibbitts was never before in
Montreal and the warrant upon which
she was arrested charges her with having
conspired to hinder one of the Montreal
family on the 24th March last. The poor
girl was kept in the cells all Sunday and
Monday, and on Tuesday morning she was
obliged to give a bond of \$1000 for her
appearance on the 26th.

Her bondsmen, Messrs. G. W. Robinson,
George Kemp and G. W. Robinson,
the lawyer who defended her, were
subjected to much indignation and con-
tempt because of her arrest, and she was
not allowed to see any one of her friends
until she had been committed to the
penitentiary.

Yesterday Mrs. Thibbitts, of Fredericton,
received a telegram from her
daughter, Mary K. Thibbitts, now in Mon-
treal, stating that she had been arrested
for a crime which had been committed
at that place last March. Mrs. Thibbitts
is a most tender nature, and she was
advised by the gentleman to go to
Montreal with proof of her daughter's
identity, and of her attendance at the
University of New Brunswick at the time
mentioned.

Miss Thibbitts is one of Fredericton's
most prominent families, and had just
graduated from the University of New
Brunswick. After the closing of college
she went on a trip to New York, where
she met her sister Mrs. Howell, and the
supposition is that some of the friends
of the former were misled by the
latter into believing that she was
where she was not.

THE NEBRASKA CANAL.

Great Undertaking.

New York, July 13.—Advance sheets
have been issued by the Nicaragua Canal
Co. of a pamphlet which presents the
most complete description of the work
of constructing the great ship canal across
Isthmus. Free navigation will be had in the
San Juan river of sixty-four and a half
miles and in Lake Nicaragua of fifty-six
and a half miles a total of 121 miles.
With the exception of the rock cuts in the
canal, the route is all natural and will
be constructed, of twenty-two
miles, through the bush and in places
where the river is very shallow, and
the lake and river vessels can pass
each other and navigate with entire
freedom.
